

represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Upper Chelsea and of the chapelry district of Saint Saviour, Upper Chelsea, in the same county and diocese, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Simon, Upper Chelsea.'

"And with the like consent of the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, testified as aforesaid, we further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Simon, Upper Chelsea, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Upper Chelsea, in the county of Middlesex, and diocese of London, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, and also all that portion of the chapelry district of Saint Saviour, Upper Chelsea, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary dividing the said chapelry district from the parish of Saint Luke, Chelsea, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Marlborough-road opposite to the middle of the western end of James-street, and extending thence in a direction generally north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-mentioned street, and along the middle of Milner-street and Milner-terrace to a point in the middle of the fence dividing an estate belonging to Miss Mary Bridget Moore, on the west from an estate belonging to Earl Cadogan, on the east, and extending thence in a direction generally southward along the middle of such fence (which fence or a portion thereof, forms also the fence inclosing the site of the church of Saint Simon, Chelsea, with the premises attached thereto), to the middle of the street called Cadogan-terrace, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last-mentioned terrace as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of South-street, and extending thence southward to and along the middle of such last-mentioned street, to the middle of King's-road and extending thence westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road, as far as the boundary dividing the parish of Upper Chelsea from the parish of Saint Luke, Chelsea aforesaid, and extending thence in a direction generally either northward or westward along such boundary to the point opposite to the middle of the western end of James-street, where the said imaginary line commenced."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered,

that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Simon, situate in the parish of Upper Chelsea, in the county of Middlesex, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Simon, Upper Chelsea," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the ninth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen, situate at Bowling, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Stephen situate at Bowling aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop, of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that portion of the said parish of Bradford, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which portion, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Bowling.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert Bishop, of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Burnet, the present vicar or incumbent of the said parish of Brad-
