WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared, and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip, situate at Girlington, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip, situate at Girlington aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Bradford, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed; all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, Girlington.'

"And with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: provided always, that so long as the Reverend John Burnet, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Bradford shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, all the fees which shall be received in respect of the performance of the said offices in the church of Saint Philip aforesaid, shall be paid by the incumbent thereof to the said John Burnet.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the

premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, Girlington, being:—

"All that part of the township of Manningham, in the parish of Saint Peter, Bradford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is situate to the west and south of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary dividing the said township of Manningham from the township of Heaton, in the same parish, at a point in the middle of Toller-lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said lane, and of Little-lane, to a point in the middle of Duckworth-lane, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named lane, to the western boundary of the new parish of Manningham, and extending thence in a direction either southward or south-eastward along the said boundary (crossing Wheatley-lane) to a point in the middle of Wheatley footpath, opposite to the middle of the northern end of a certain other foot-path, leading from Wheatley-footpath aforesaid to Thornton-road, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of such footpath leading to Thornton-road, and across the said road to a boundary stone, inscribed 'G. St. P. D. C. 1860,' and placed on the southern side of the same road, and extending thence south-westward in a direct line to a point upon the boundary dividing the said township of Manningham from the township of Horton, in the parish of Bradford aforesaid, in the middle of Bradford Beck, opposite to its point of junction with the stream or sluice connecting the said Beck with the piece of water known as the New Mill Dam."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip, situate at Girlington, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, Girlington," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.
