WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any

county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the division of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county palatine of Lancaster, in general quarter sessions assembled at Kirkdale, on the thirtieth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that the town of Warrington may be declared an additional polling place for the said division, within which such place is situate.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said town of Warrington shall be an additional polling place for the southern division of the county of Lancaster; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said southern division, in general quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, section seventy-one, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for uniting prospectively the sinecure rectory of Saint Florence, in the county of Pembroke, and in the diocese of Saint David's, with the vicarage of Saint Florence, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas the vicarage and parish church of Saint Florence aforesaid is a benefice with cure of souls within the meaning of the said Act, and the patronage thereof is vested in and belongs to the holder for the time being of the sinecure rectory of the parish and church of Saint Florence aforesaid, which rectory of Saint Florence is a sinecure preferment, within the meaning of the same Act.

"And whereas the patronage of, and right of appointment to, the said sinecure rectory is vested in and belongs to the master, fellows, and scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge.

"And whereas the present holder of the same sinecure rectory, and patron in right thereof of the said vicarage, is the Reverend Thomas Salwey.

"And whereas application has been made to us by the said master, fellows, and scholars, to take the necessary steps for uniting, in the manner hereinafter mentioned, the said sinecure rectory with the said vicarage, so as to form one benefice, with cure of souls; and we are of opinion that it is desirable so to do.

Now, therefore, with the consents of the master, fellows, and scholars of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge aforesaid, as patrons of the said sinecure rectory; in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their corporate seal, and of the said Thomas Salwey, as Patron, in right of his sinecure rectory aforesaid of the said vicarage, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that on any avoidance of the said sinecure rectory of Saint Florence which may happen during the incumbency of the said vicarage of Saint Florence by the Reverend George William Birkett, Clerk, the present vicar thereof, or if no such avoidance take place, then, upon the avoidance of the said vicarage which shall happen next after the said Thomas Salwey shall have ceased to hold or to be incumbent of the said sinecure rectory, the same sinecure rectory and vicarage shall become and be permanently united and consolidated, and shall form one benefice, with cure of souls, by the name of the Rectory of Saint Florence; and that the person who shall be incumbent of such consolidated benefice and his successors, incumbents of the same rectory, shall be entitled to all and every the emoluments as well of the said sinecure

rectory as of the said vicarage, and that the patronage of and right of nomination to the said rectory, with cure of souls, shall after such union as aforesaid be vested in, belong to, and be exercised by the master, fellows, and scholars of the said College of Saint John the Evangelist for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the said rectory of Saint Florence, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Saint David's.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words following; that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Matthew, situate at West Newton, in the parish of Bromfield, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Matthew, situate at West Newton aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Henry Montagu, Bishop of Carlisle, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Bromfield, described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be

named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, West Newton.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry Montagu, Bishop of Carlisle, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, West Newton, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Bromfield, in the county of Cumberland and diocese of Carlisle, whersin the present incumbent now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is comprised within the township of West Newton.

"And also all that portion of the township of Langrigg and Mealrigg, in the same parish, which is situate to the west of an imaginary line, commencing on the boundary dividing the said township of Langrigg and Mealrigg from the township of West Newton aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the stream called 'Dub Stangs,' opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'W. N. St. M. D. C. 1860. No. 1.' placed on the southern bank of the said stream, at the extremity of the northern end of the fence which divides the close known as 'Burk Mire,' and belonging to Joseph Wilson, of the East Mill, Aspatria, in the said county of Cumberland, farmer and miller, from the close known as the 'Pasture,' and belonging to John Younghusband, of Abbey Cooper, in the same county, Esquire, and extending thence in a direct line due north to the boundary dividing the parish of Bromfield aforesaid from the parish of Holme Cultram, at a point in the middle of the stream called 'Holme Dub,' opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'W. N. St. M. D. C. 1860. No. 2,' placed on the southern bank of the same stream, at a distance of one hundred and forty-five yards to the west of the point at which the stream or sow, which divides certain lands situate in Mealrigg, on the west, from certain other lands situate in Langrigg, on the east, unites with the stream called 'Holme Dub' as aforesaid."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Matthew, situate at West Newton, in the parish of Bromfield, in the county of Cumberland, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, West Newton," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Carlisle.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Netherbury in Terra, in the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us.

"Whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, formerly belonging to the said prebend of Netherbury in Terra (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the twenty-seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty four, by the decease of the Reverend George Stanley Faber, Bachelor in Divinity, the then prebendary, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases, or grant or grants thereof:

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Netherbury in Terra, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London

Gazette, pursuant to the said Act, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit ;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively ; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed ;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows ; viz. :

In the parish churchyard, *HALIFAX*, and in the burials-grounds of the Square Chapel, Holy Trinity Church, Salem Chapel, Sion Chapel, St. James's Church, and Hanover-street Chapel, all in *Halifax*, from the first of *November*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, to the first of *June*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the churchyard of the parish of *BISLEY*, Gloucestershire, from the 31st of *October* to the thirty-first of *December*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the parish churchyard of *EAST MOLESEY*, in the county of *Surrey*, from the first of *November*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, to the first of *May*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the parish churchyard of *WANSTEAD*, *ESSEX*, from the first of *December*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, to the first of *June*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the eighth of *February*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, burials were directed to be forthwith discontinued (with certain exceptions) in the parish churchyard and in the Independent Chapel Burial-ground, *SAXMUNDHAM* ; and such Order was, on the twenty-fourth of *June*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, varied in respect of the churchyard ; and the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard and burial-ground has since

been extended to the first of *January*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one ; and it seems fit that the said Orders be varied. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, which can be opened without the exposure of human remains, burials be forthwith discontinued in all that part of the parish churchyard of *SAXMUNDHAM* lying on the south side of the church ; that, on the north side, burials be permitted, provided no human remains be exposed in opening the graves ; and that burials be continued in the Independent Chapel Burial-ground, *SAXMUNDHAM*, provided that, in opening the graves, no human remains be exposed.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the seventh of *April*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, burials were directed to be discontinued (with certain exceptions), on and after the eighteenth of *April*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the burial-ground of *St. George's Chapel, OLD BRENTFORD*, in the parish of *Ealing*, which period was afterwards extended to the first of *February*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, subject to certain conditions, and it seems fit that the said Orders be varied ; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be permitted in the unoccupied part of the said churchyard until the first day of *May*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, on condition that only one body be buried in each grave.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-first day of *August*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials were directed to be discontinued in the *MANCHESTER GENERAL CEMETERY AT HARPURHEY*, with certain exceptions, and except so far as was compatible with certain regulations therein contained, and such Order was, on the twenty-second day of *October*, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, varied, and it seems fit that the said Orders be varied ; now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments therein be forthwith discontinued, except in accordance with the official regulations for new burial-grounds, omitting Rules 3 and 6, on condition that a layer of earth, not less than a foot thick, be interposed between coffins buried in earthen graves ; and that on and after the first of *January*, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the regulations for new burial-grounds be observed with the exception of Rule 3, with the above conditions as to burials in earthen graves.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws con-

"cerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the following modifications:

OADBY, LEICESTERSHIRE.—Forthwith beneath the *Parish Church*, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the *Parish Churchyard*.

CHROMER.—Forthwith in all earthen family graves in the *Parish Churchyard*.

PEMBROKE.—From and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in *St. Daniel's Cemetery*, except in graves and vaults which are free from water, and except in so far as they can be conducted in accordance with the Official Regulations for New Burial Grounds.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the third day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the *London Gazette*; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said third day of January.

WHEREAS the Local Board of Health for the district of Rugby, in the county of Warwick, established under "The Public Health Act, 1848," have, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating that the said district of Rugby is co-extensive with the district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, that no Burial Board has been appointed for the said district, under any of the Burial Acts now in force, and that an Order in Council has been made for closing the burial-ground within the said district, as mentioned in such Order, and praying that Her Majesty would be pleased to order that the said Local Board of Health shall be the Burial Board for the district of Rugby aforesaid.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such petition, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the third day of January next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be published in the *London Gazette* and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in the district of the Local Board of

Health of Rugby aforesaid, one month at least before the said third day of January next.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appear to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough, stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough for providing such places of burial, under the provisions of the said Act; provided always that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough, one month at least before such petition is so considered.

And whereas the Town Council of the borough of Gateshead, in the county of Durham, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating that two Orders in Council have been issued for closing (with the exceptions or modifications therein mentioned) certain burial grounds within the parish of Gateshead; that the said parish is wholly situate within the said borough of Gateshead; and that the several burial grounds mentioned in the said two Orders in Council are all situate within the said borough, and within the said parish, and representing that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Gateshead, under the provisions of the above recited Act, passed in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, and praying that powers may be vested in the said Town Council of the borough of Gateshead for providing places of burial, under the provisions of the various Acts of Parliament relating to burials, for the inhabitants of the said parish of Gateshead:

And whereas notice of such Petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council has been duly published as required by the said first-recited Act:

And whereas by the ninth section of the above-recited Act, passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, it is enacted that where, previously to the making of any Order in Council, under the said Act, it shall be made

to appear to Her Majesty in Council, that any parish wholly or in part within such borough is provided with a sufficient burial ground, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, in and by such Order, to direct that no part of such parish shall be assessed towards defraying the expenses of executing the said Act in such borough, and that in such case no burial ground provided for such borough, under the said Act, shall be deemed to be provided for such parish:

III, cap. 29, intituled "An Act for inclosing and leasing a piece of waste land called the Marsh, within the parish and borough of Newcastle-under-Lyme, in the county of Stafford, and applying the profits thereof in aid of the Poors' Rates of the said parish and borough;" and also of the Act 23rd Geo. III, cap. 10, intituled "An Act to amend an Act passed in the 22nd year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for inclosing and leasing a piece of waste land called the Marsh, within the parish and borough of Newcastle-under-
