to appear to Her Majesty in Council, that any parish wholly or in part within such borough is provided with a sufficient burial ground, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, in and by such Order, to direct that no part of such parish shall be assessed towards defraying the expenses of executing the said Act in such borough, and that in such case no burial ground provided for such borough, under the said Act, shall be deemed to be provided for such parish:

And whereas the rector, churchwardens, and orner inhabitants of the parish or ecclesiastical district of Gateshead Fell have presented a Petition to Her Majesty in Council, setting forth that Gateshead Fell was in 1809 erected into a separate and distinct rectory and parish; that they are satisfied with the accommodation provided for interments in their own churchyard; that, anticipating the wants of the parishioners in future years, the Churchwardens have been and are in treaty with the owners of land immediately contiguous, for increasing the area of the churchyard of Gateshead Fell, to double its present size; and that the Petitioners have no desire to be included under the operation of the Burial Board of Gateshead:

And whereas it appears to Her Majesty, the said parish or ecclesiastical district of Gateshead Fell is provided with a sufficient burial ground for the requirements of the parishioners of the said parish or ecclesiastical district; but that there is difficulty and inconvenience in providing, under the above-mentioned Act, passed in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of other parts of the parish of Gateshead, in the

said borough:

Now therefore Her Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the borough of Gateshead, for providing requisite places of burial, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, intituled An Act to make further provision for the "burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis," or of any other Act of Parliament relating to burials, for the inhabit-ants of those parts of the parish of Gateshead, within the said borough, which are not included within the limits of the ecclesiastical district of Gateshead Fell, and that the said ecclesiastical district or parish of Gateshead Fell be and it is hereby exempted from the operation of this Order, which is limited exclusively in its effect to the other parts of the parish of Gateshead, within the said borough.
