Board of Trade, Whitehall, January 20, 1861.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, enclosing a copy of a Decree altering as follows the customs' duties levied in the ports of the Neapolitan provinces, under the Decree referred to in the Board of Trade Notification of the 29th October last, published in the London Gazette of the 30th of that month:—

1. The exceptions specified in the Table of Import Duties appended to the Board of Trade Notification in question, so far as relates to classes 8, 9, 10, 11, and 14 (i.e., all the classes therein specified except classes 2, 19, and 20), are abolished. The articles comprised in those classes will consequently henceforward pay the duties levied on them under the Sardinian Tariff.

2. The duty on oil exported from the above provinces is fixed at 1 ducat 90 grs. per cantar (196½ lbs. avoirdupois), instead of 2 ducats 20 grs. per cantar.

3. The export duty on rags is fixed at 6 ducats per cantar, instead of 8 ducats.

4. The stamp-duty hitherto levied on certain foreign merchandize is abolished.

5. An additional duty of one-tenth, or 10 per cent., is levied on all articles of import and export. This additional duty includes the duty of 2½ per cent. hitherto levied for public works; but is supplemental to, and not in substitution for, the similar additional duty of 10 per cent referred to in the above-mentioned notice of the Board of Trade, of the 29th October last. The Decree provides that both additional duties of 10 per cent. are to remain in force as long as various foreign flags (amongst which is the British flag) continue to enjoy the reduction of 10 per cent. on the nominal amount of customs' duties accorded to them by treaty.

THE Secretary of State for India in Council gives notice that he will be prepared to receive on Friday, the 8th February, at or before one o'clock, tenders for a loan of £3,000,000, on security of stock to be created under the provisions of an Act of the last session of Parliament, and to bear interest at the rate of five cent. per annum, payable half-yearly at the Bank of England, on the 5th January, and the 5th July in each year.

The stock not to be redeemable until 5th July, 1870, but to be redeemable at par on or after that day, upon one year's previous notice having been given in The London Gazette by the Secretary of State for India in Council.

The books of the stock will be kept at the Bank of England, where all assignments and transfers will be made. No stamp duties whatsoever will be charged on the transfers.

The tenders to be for the whole or any part of such loan, but not for sums of less than £500 stock, and to state what amount of money will be given for every £100 of the said stock. The tenders are to be delivered in, sealed, at the Accountant General's Department, at this office.
