# By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

#### Addresses.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who shall read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly scritten thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

#### War-Office, February 15, 1861.

ORD HERBERT has received a Despatch and its inclosures, of which the following are copies, addressed to the Military Secretary by Major-General Pratt, C.B.:

Head Quarters, New Plymouth, Taranaki, 10th November, 1860. SIR,

REFERRING to my despatch of the 16th ultimo I have the honour to state, for the information of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-chief, that the Governor's letters were to the effect that the Waikato Tribes had marched in force to join William Kingi, on the 11th October, and it became necessary for me to restore the men to the Waitara Camp, which had been denuded of half its force for my expedition to the South, and also to strengthen the town and out-posts.

The reports from the Native Department were, from the peculiar character of the Maori movements, of the most fluctuating character, and varied day by day; at one time the enemy were in the immediate neighbourhood and might be expected on any day, at another they would not move before the end of November, or in December, thus rendering it impossible to form any

decisive plan regarding them.

On the evening of the 5th instant, however, I received from Mr. Drummond Hay reliable information that the Waikatos had crossed the Waitara River in force, that morning, for the purpose of joining Wm. Kingi, and that they would be at Mahoetahi, about eight miles from this, that night or next morning.

I immediately arranged that a column, (strength as per margin)\* should move from this, under my personal command, at 5 A.M. so as to reach Mahoetahi at 81, and also that another column (see margin)† under Colonel Mould, R. E., should move from the Camp at the Waitara and join me at

Mahoetahi at the same hour.

The intended move from New Plymouth was carried out, and the Mangoraka river crossed without opposition, and, on nearing Mahoetahi Hill, the site of a dilapidated Pah with a few palissades and wharves, which my column did a little after 8 A.M., we were met by a heavy fire

from the Waikatoes, who occupied it as well as the swamp, gullies, and fern land contiguous.

This was returned by the skirmishers of the 65th regiment posted on the road leading to the Pah. The guns were quickly brought into position, and the militia directed to take post to the left.

The ammunition and camp equipage being now mostly over the river, I ordered the Militia to seize a hill a little in advance on the left, close to the Pah and to occupy it, this being effected a portion of the 65th Regiment, under Captain Turner, were directed to fix bayonets and storm the Pah in front, the Militia being ordered to do the same on the left flank of it. This was done by both in the most gallant manner, the enemy still retaining, for a short time, hold of a portion of the Pah, and keeping up a most galling fire from the fern and swamp.

The 12th and 40th Regiments having now succeeded in bringing up the whole of the ammunition, camp equipage, &c., extended the right of the line throwing it forward, while Colonel Mould, with the column from the Waitara Camp, came into action on the left. The enemy finding himself thus hemmed in, and under a murderous cross fire, after an action that lasted two hours,

turned and fled with much loss.

I pursued with a portion of the force consisting of the 12th, 40th, 65th,\* and with two guns crossed the Waiongona river, and the retreat was so rapid and the rout so complete, that at two miles from the Camp several wounded prisoners were taken, and dead bodies found. The road all along was stained with blood. Then having swept round by Ngatiparirua and the Onuku-Kaitara stockade rejoined the force at Mahoetahi, where, leaving 300 men under Colonel Mould, R.E., to occupy this position, and eventually another more desirable in its neighbourhood, the troops returned to New Plymouth after a long and arduous day's work, and a portion of the force from the Waitara rejoined the Camp.

Amongst the killed are five very important Chiefs, the first being the leading man of the Maori King movement, the four others, very influential chiefs; there were also many chiefs of minor note killed; it is not easy to obtain accurate intelligence of the numbers of the enemy who were in the field or who have been slain; but from the bodies counted on the spot, which we buried, and that were being brought in wounded from the fern where they lay concealed, I should think from 80 to 100 were killed and wounded, of this latter five were brought in as prisoners, and one unwounded

man.

I never saw a more gigantic or powerful set of men than these tribes, and being armed with well finished English rifles and double barrelled fowling pieces they were able to keep up a most continuous fire, whilst their power of concealment was most marvellous, indeed when closely upon them we only knew of their whereabouts by the smoke from their guns. Many of these arms were captured by our men on the field and brought into Camp.

I trust this defeat of the enemy will have good effect, and it is a curious circumstance that an insulting challenge (which I inclose) was signed by the first named Chief, who was killed the very day after he crossed the Waitara. . . . .

Our loss was 4 killed, and 2 officers and 13 men wounded, as per casualty return.

I append the report from Colonel Mould, R.E., relative to the column under his command, re-

marking only, that the east end of the Pah was, in my opinion, occupied a little earlier than Colonel Mould supposes, but that the arrival of his column aided most materially in driving the enemy from the slope of the hill on the outside of the Pah, and from their strong position in the swamp.

I have now the great satisfaction of testifying to the gallant behaviour of the troops; Artillery, Engineers, Line, Marine Artillery of the Naval Brigade, Militia, and Volunteers, all vied with each other as how best to reach the enemy. The behaviour of that noble corps, the 65th Regiment, and the Militia was most conspicuous, and at the commencement of the action the brunt fell upon them, as well as all the casualties except two.

It is out of my power to name all who were distinguished for their gallantry, but I beg to bring to His Royal Highness's notice the following officers of the general and personal staff, i.e.:

Lieutenant-Colonel Sillery, Deputy Quarter-Master-General, who was slightly wounded in the Pah; James Mouat, Esq., Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals; Lieutenant-Colonel Carey, Deputy-Adjutant-General, as usual most conspicuous; Henry Par lett, Esq., Assistant-Commissary-General; Lieutenant Forster, R.A. and A.D.C.; and Lieutenant King, acting as Militia A.D.C.; and the following officers commanding corps, i.e.:

Captain Strover, Royal Artillery; Captain Mould, Royal Engineers; Major Hutchins, 12th Regiment; Lieutenant-Colonel A. Leslie, 40th Regiment; Captain Turner, 65th Regiment, who commanded the advance and stormed the Pah, and was severely wounded after entering it; Major Herbert, Taranaki Militia, who gallantly led the storming party on the left flank; and it is due to the continuous and energetic conduct of Lieutenant Urquhart, 65th Regiment, to name that officer als, and I beg to bring particularly to His Royal Highness's notice the services of Colonel Mould, Royal Engineers, commanding the column from the camp at the Waitara, and to state that I cordially concur in the praise of the officers named in his report, and which, to save prolixity, I do not enter on mine, but beg that it may be considered as a portion of this despatch.

It is right that I should notice the gentlemen attached to the Native Department. It was Mr. Drummond Hay who came in from the Waitara with the intelligence of the advance of the enemy, and he as well as Mr. Parris accompanied the respective columns and remained with the forces during the whole day, and rendered most important service.

I inclose a state of the whole force, casualty returns, and sketches of the ground.

> Muhoetahi, advanced Camp from Wuitara, 6th November, 1860.

IN obedience to the instructions contained in your letter of the 5th instant, received at 12½ midnight, I marched this morning with the Force

noted in the margin,\* at 7 a. m., immediately I had received notice by telegraph that the column advancing from New Plymouth were leaving Bell Block, taking the way by the Prophet's Pah, in preference to the Devon Line by which I had been discretionally ordered to proceed, as it was signalled that the enemy were in force in that direction, on the mounds upon which the column under my direction covering the construction of a bridge were skirmishing on the 5th instant.

Some few native scouts were seen from the Waitara Block-house on the sand hills, near the mouth of the Waiongona, which induced me to halt for a few minutes until I had satisfied myself that I had nothing to fear on the flank and rear of the column. After the column had proceeded about half a mile from the ford of the Waiongona I heard firing from heavy guns in the direction of Mahoetahi, upon which I pushed on with all due precaution until I came in sight of the Pah, the west end of which was observed in possession of the troops, whilst the east end, together with the swamp on north was held by the rebels. I thereupon sent forward the advanced guard to the cover of a furze fence, along the Devon line, north of the Pah, which apparently caused the enemy to leave the east end of the Pah, as the movement of the former was almost immediately followed by that of the latter, who took refuge in the part of the swamp immediately below the spot they had left, and where they were distinctly seen clustered. Upon which I ordered the howitzer to the front, in the prolongation of one of the bends in the swamp, and had two rounds of spherical case thrown into them, the second of which clearly dislodged them, as immediately after it exploded they ran from their

The 65th detachment rushed from the furze hedge at the same moment and assisted in harassing the rebels in their retreat.

After giving orders for the remainder of my column, with the howitzer, to advance to the wooded knoll, in a direction transverse to the line of the enemy's retreat, I had the honour to join the Major-General, to report my arrival, and to place myself under his immediate orders.

I would beg to bring to the notice of the Major-General the conduct of the troops composing my column previous to their junction with those advancing from town, which was all that could be desired, the necessary prudence and intelligence being displayed on the march, part of which was through a very difficult country, and as soon as the enemy was seen their ardour, coupled with skill in selecting cover, was conspicuous.

It hardly becomes me to speak of Major Nelson, who led the column and his own gallant detachment, immediately commanded by Captain Bowdler, under my direction, his known high military character does not require any eulogy from me. It is just, however, that on an occasion so important in this war as the skirmish of this day, the conduct of individuals should be particularized.

Lieut. Talbot, 65th regiment, who commanded the advanced guard, deserves every praise and

encouragement for his coolness, energy, and activity in personally leading his men to seize every point of importance on the front and flanks of the line of march, and also when coming into action. The precision with which the shells were thrown from the howitzer, and the way in which it was brought to the front by Lieut. Macnaghten, Royal Artillery, reflects great credit on the professional ability of that officer.

I must not omit to mention and to bring to the favourable notice of the Major-General, Lieutenant Morris, Royal Marine Artillery, who commanded the escort especially attached to the howitzer, and also Ensign Wheelan, 40th regiment, Acting Staff Officer of the Waitara Camp, who rendered, with his customary intelligence, most useful assistance in conveying orders to different points in the column.

I am happy to say that there was not any casualty in the column.

A return of ammunition expended will be duly forwarded.

I beg in conclusion to state that the friendly natives who were directed to inter the bodies of the rebels, gave little or no assistance, and that the duty was principally performed by the troops

THEREAS the CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY COMMISSIONERS, appointed for the purposes of the Act of the 19th and 20th Vict., cap. 88, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by the said Act, have framed the two following Statutes, dated the 31st day of July, 1860, respecting the Fellowship founded by the Reverend Drue Drury, and respecting the two Fellowships founded by the Reverend Dr. Millington, respectively, at MAGDALENE COLLEGE, in the said University of Cambridge; and whereas the said Statutes have been laid before the Governing Body of the said College, and before the Visitor thereof, and no objection has been made thereto, and have been this day laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same are published in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act; And NOTICE is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons mentioned in the 39th section of that Act, within one month after this publication, to petition Her Majesty in Council against the approbation of the said Statutes, or any part thereof. WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the nineteenth and twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for "the good government and extension of the "University of Cambridge, of the Colleges "therein, and of the College of King Henry the "Sixth at Eton," do hereby, in execution of the powers vested in us by the said Act, make the following Statutes with respect to the Fellowship founded by the Reverend Drue Drury, at Magdalene College, in the University of Cambridge.

In any future election to the Fellowship founded by the Reverend Drue Drury, such election shall be made by the Governing Body of Magdalene College; and it shall not be necessary for them in any such election to have regard to any special restriction or limitation upon their choice contained in the will of the Founder; but the election shall be made in all respects in the same manner as that to the Foundation Fellowships of the College.

Any Fellow hereafter elected upon the Foundation of the Reverend Drue Drury, shall be subject to the same rules and conditions as to residence and tenure of his Fellowship as the Fellows on the Foundation of the College, and shall not be subject to any other restrictions or limitations than the other Fellows of the College.

The emoluments derived by the College from the Benefaction of the Reverend Drue Drury shall (subject and without prejudice to any existing interest in the same) be carried to the general funds of the College to be applied in the manner directed by the Statutes of the College.

Given under our common seal this thirty-first day of July, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty.



WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the nineteenth and twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the good government and extension of the University of Cambridge, of the Colleges therein,

and of the College of King Henry the Sixth at Eton," do hereby, in execution of the powers vested in us by the said Act, make the following Statute concerning the two Fellowships at the College of Saint Mary Magealene, in the University of Cambridge, founded by the Reverend Dr. Millington.

The right of preference in the election to the two Fellowships founded by the Reverend Dr. Millington, at Magdalene Collège, in the University of Cambridge, heretofore enjoyed by persons educated at the Grammar School of Shrewsbury,

is hereby abolished.

The two Fellowships on the Foundation of the Reverend Dr. Millington shall (after the expiration of existing rights) be consolidated into one Fellowship, the election to which shall be made in the same manner as that to the Foundation Fellowships of the College, and such Fellowship shall thenceforth be considered as an Open Fellowship on the Foundation of the College.

WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the nineteenth and twentieth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make further provision for "the good government and extension of the "University of Cambridge, of the Colleges therein, "and of the College of King Henry the Sixth at "Eton," do hereby, in execution of the powers vested in us by the said Act, make the following Statute respecting the Scholarship founded by Mr. John Stock, at Corpus Christi College, in the University of Cambridge:

From the date of the confirmation of this Statute by Her Majesty in Council, there shall be no further election to the Scholarship at Corpus Christi College founded by Mr. John Stock, in 1780, for a Scholar from St. Paul's School.

In lieu thereof, there shall be established at the said College, an Exhibition of the value of Thirty pounds a-year, for a Scholar educated at St. Paul's School, and recommended by the Head Master.

No person shall be entitled to present himself as a candidate for such Exhibition who has not been educated at St. Paul's School for the space of three

years at least.

The Candidates for such Exhibition shall be examined in such manner as the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College shall from time to time direct, in order to ascertain their fitness to become Students of the College.

In default of any duly qualified candidate from St. Paul's School, the Exhibition then vacant shall

be treated as open to general competition.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Monte-Video, enclosing a copy of a Monte-Videan Decree, permitting the exportation, free of duty, from the 1st January last, of meat, dried, smoked, or prepared in brine or otherwise.

Mr. Lettsom's despatch encloses also a copy of another Decree of the Government of Monte-Video, containing the following provisions with reference to the warehousing of merchandize in

transit through that country.

ART. 1. Merchandize in general, deposited for transit in the warehouses of the State, will be exempt from the payment of warehouse rent for the period of one year from the date of the opening of the register of the vessels by which it was

2. The period in question, in the case for goods warehoused at the date of the Decree will be reckoned from that date (November 6th, 1860).

3. Merchandize intended for transit from El Salto to adjacent territories, by Santa Rosa and El Cuarein, or vice versa, is moreover exempted

from wharfage duty.

4. The port of Colonia is declared to be a port for the trans-shipment and deposit of goods. The latter privilege to come into force as soon as the requisite Customs' officers and warehouses can be provided.

A third Decree of the same Government, forwarded by Mr. Lettsom, provides that Brazilian produce (which had previously enjoyed a favoured treatment when imported into Monte-Video) shall in future pay the same rates of duty as those charged upon similar produce imported from other countries.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Minister in Japan, transmitting a copy of the following port regulations for the Port of Hakodadi, which have been sanctioned by him, in accordance with Articles 4 and 5 of the Order in Council of the 23rd January, 1860.

# REGULATIONS FOR THE PORT OF . HAKODADI.

I. The harbour of Hakodadi extends from the

town to the buoy.

II. Information as to the limits of the anchorage within which cargo may be discharged and shipped will be obtained at the Consulate office. Cargo discharged or shipped beyond such limits will be subject to confiscation.

III. Every British vessel on entering the port must show her colours and keep them hoisted, until she shall have been reported at the Consu-

late, and her papers deposited there.

IV. No boat or vessel the property of a British subject, but not provided with a British sailing letter or certificate of registering, shall hoist the . British ensign within the port or anchorage, nor ... shall she exhibit within such limits any flag so similar to the British ensign, as not to be distinguishable from it; neither shill any British subject hoist the British ensign (or any flag not distinguishable from it) over any residence or place on shore, without special authority so

V. Masters of ships on depositing their ship's papers at the Consulate office must also deliver a copy of the import manifest, together with a list of all passengers and persons not forming part of

the registered crew on board.

VI. Masters of a British vessel must not permit foreigners, not being subjects of Treaty Powers, to land, without special permission so to do, and they will be held liable to provide a return passage for such foreign subjects as they may bring to the port, in addition to any penalty they may incur for breach of regulation.

VII. When a vessel is ready to leave the port, the master will obtain a port clearance from the Custom-House, which document, together with a manifest of his export cargo, and a list of persons (not forming part of the crew) intending to leave the port in his vessel must be delivered at the Consulate office before the ship's papers can be

returned to him.

VIII. Stone or ballast shall not be thrown overboard within the limits of the harbour.

IX. Any vessel having on board any large quantity of gunpowder or other combustible, must, until its discharge, anchor only in such berth as shall be assigned to her.

X. Masters of vessels will be held accountable for the conduct of their crews on shore; and no seaman must be allowed on shore except between

the hours of sunrise and sunset.

XI. Seamen found on shore after sunset, or at any time drunk or disorderly, will be apprehended; and any fine inflicted which he may be unable to pay will be levied upon the master of the vessel to which he belongs, besides such further penalty as may be incurred by the master for any neglect on his part.

XII. Should any seaman absent himself from his vessel without permission the master shall without loss of time report the same at the Con-

sulate office.

XIII. No seaman or person belonging to a British ship may be discharged or left behind without the express sanction of the Consul and in comformity with such stipulations as he may

require.

XIV. No British subject may establish either a boarding-house, eating-house, or other public house of entertainment, without the sanction of the Consul, and under such conditions as he may require; any person harbouring a seaman who is a deserter, or who cannot produce his discharge with written sanction from the Consul to reside on shore, will be liable to the penalty attending breach of these regulations.

XV. Every British subject intending to reside on shore must register his name at the Consulate office within ten days after his arrival; and any British subject having in his employ a subject of a nation not entitled by Treaty to have residence in Japan, must register the name of such servants, for whose behaviour he will be held accountable.

XVI. The discharge of fire-arms on shore in the neighbourhood of residences or thoroughfares, or afloat within the limits of the anchorage, is strictly prohibited.

XVII. All cases of death occurring either afloat or on shore, must be immediately reported

at the Consulate office.

XVIII. British subjects are strictly prohibited from using violence against Japanese offenders or taking the law into their own hands, unless in strict self-defence, and where they are menaced with bodily injury. Any Japanese guilty of an offence may be detained and delivered over to the Custom-house officials, from whom a receipt may be claimed stating the name of the offence charged against him, and the name of the complainant. The matter should then be reported at the Consulate office.

XIX. Riding furiously through the streets of

the town is strictly prohibited.

XX. The distance to which British subjects may extend their excursions is limited by Treaty to the territory around Hakodadi. The limits in several directions are marked by a notice in English under the hand of the Consul. Fuller information can be obtained at the Consulate office. Persons wilfully breaking the Regulations in this respect, or refusing to return when so requested by Japanese officials, will subject themselves to be brought back by force, and to any further penalty which may be adjudged appropriate.

XXI. Resistance by force to Japanese officers in the exercise of their duty will entail severe

penalties.

XXII. Any violation of the Laws and Customs of the country, so as wilfully to cause alarm or give offence (save in so far as such Laws and Customs have been abrogated in favour of foreigners) is strictly prohibited.

XXIII. The breach of any of the foregoing Regulations will entail a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars or three months' imprison-
