(Alteration of Line during progress of Bill.)

HEREAS a Bill is now pending in Parliament under the above name or short title; and whereas since the deposit of the plans and sections therein referred to, as having in the month of November last been deposited with the Clerks of the Peace for the counties of Salop and Montgomery, it has been found expedient that the railways by such Bill sought to be authorized, should, between the points hereinafter mentioned, be constructed according to a different line from that delineated on the plans deposited as aforesaid.
