REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend the Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness The Prince Consort.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before each Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

A DESPATCH and its inclosures, of which the following are copies, have been received at the War-Office from Major-General Pratt, C.B.:

Head Quarters, Camp Waitara, New Zealand,
23rd January, 1861.

IN continuation of my despatch of the 19th instant, I have the honour to state, for the information of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-chief, that since that date, the 19th, 20th, and 21st instant, have been employed in increasing and completing No. 3 Redoubt, and commencing a double sap in a direct line towards the enemy's position in the bush, and on the morning of the 22nd I proceeded, with the Head Quarters of the 40th Regiment, to the new redoubt, in order to its occupation, with numbers amounting to 290 rank and file.

A little before daylight this morning (23rd instant) heavy firing was heard from the front; a report soon reached me that No. 3 Redoubt had been attacked by the enemy in great force, and that they had been repulsed with severe loss. I reached the advance with an addition of 120 men, and found that the enemy had made a most daring attack on the advanced redoubt, which had been met in the most determined manner, and a long line of dead and dying Maories lay on the ground; whilst there is little doubt at least double the number of the enemy have crept away wounded, to die.

I enclose Lieutenant-Colonel Leslie's very clear account of the affair, and I coincide with that officer most cordially in his opinion of the gallantry of the troops and their officers. The two companies of the 65th Regiment under Captain MacGregor, were most effective in driving the enemy out of the ditch of the front face; whilst the company of the 12th Regiment, under Captain Miller (until wounded), afterwards under Lieutenant Lowry, assisted in driving the enemy from the ditch in the left face, and then charged them with the bayonet through the high fern. I regret exceedingly the death of that gallant young officer Lieutenant Jackson, of the 40th Regiment, who fell in the zealous performance of his duty, and am happy to find that the wound of Captain Miller, 12th Regiment, is not severe; and I beg to bring to His Royal Highness's notice the officers named by myself, and also Lieutenant-Colonel Leslie, together with the officers named in his report, and to add that in this as well as on all other occasions in which the troops have been employed here, officers and men vie with each other who will do their duty most efficiently.

I enclose a nominal return of our casualties, which are not many considering the desperate character of the attack.

I also enclose a roll of the Maories, who up to this hour have been recognised, and with regard to them I have pursued the same course as at Mahoetahi; that is, have brought in the chiefs (noted in the margin)* for interment in New Plymouth; the inferior chiefs and followers have been buried on the ground, and the wounded natives brought into this camp for treatment in hospital, but it is known that many chiefs of high rank were killed and buried on the ground as minor chiefs.

I trust that the severe losses this manly and high-spirited race are so continually receiving will teach them how unavailing are their efforts against Her Majesty's supremacy, and will lead soon to a termination of this unhappy internecine war.

*No. 3 Redoubt in front of Huirangi,
23rd January, 1861.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report for the information of the Major-General Commanding, that a most determined attack was made by the enemy on No. 3 Redoubt this morning, which, after about one and a-half hours hard fighting, was gallantly repulsed by the troops under my command (stated in the margin),* supported by a detachment sent to my assistance by Colonel Wyatt, 65th Regiment, commanding No. 1 Redoubt.

The attack commenced at half-past 3 o'clock, a.m. A storming party of the enemy having crept up through the fern, and effected a lodgment in the ditch of the left face of the redoubt, and having a strong support about 100 yards in their rear, as well as a line of skirmishers on all flanks of the redoubt.

The plan of the enemy appeared to be to keep down the fire of our men on the parapets by their supports and by their line of skirmishers, while the storming party scaled the left face of the Redoubt.

The force under my command was under arms previous to the attack, and quickly replied to the fire of the enemy, who, in the most determined and desperate manner, rushed up the sides of the parapet, and, in some instances, seized hold of the men's bayonets, while others crept round to the rear of the redoubt and fired through the gabions which had been placed to fill up the entrances to the work, and one of the Royal Engineers was in this manner killed while coming out of his tent.

A perfect storm of bullets was poured on us from all sides for a considerable time, and I deemed it advisable to call for assistance from Colonel Wyatt, 65th Regiment, commanding No. 1 Redoubt, for the purpose of dislodging the enemy from our ditch as I had no hand-grenades. I accordingly directed the regimental call of the 65th Regiment to be sounded, followed by the advance, which signal was promptly responded to by Colonel Wyatt, who despatched two companies of the 65th Regiment, under Captain Macgregor and Lieutenant Urquhart, as well as one company of the 12th under Captain Miller; one company of the 65th crept round the front face of the redoubt, and lined the sap at present being thrown out in advance of the redoubt, the other crept up the rear face, at the same time I directed Captain Miller to charge the ditch where the enemy was lodged; Captain Miller was, I regret

to say, wounded while carrying out my orders, but his company was led on by Lieutenant Lowry, and it charged in a most gallant and effective manner, while the 65th, under Lieutenant Urquhart on the front and Captain MacGregor on the rear face, advanced and fired on the enemy, who immediately retired on this combined attack. A heavy fire was then kept up on the retreating Maories by the 40th from the parapets, by the 24-pounder howitzer under Lieutenant Macnaghten, Royal Artillery, and by the 8-inch gun in charge of a detachment of the Royal Naval Brigade.

The enemy completely routed, retired in great confusion, leaving their dead and wounded, together with arms and accoutrements, in our hands; they were pursued for some distance by part of the 65th and 12th until they were recalled by me to the redoubt.

I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the 40th Regiment, and of the troops of all arms, who showed the greatest steadiness throughout the engagement, and who, although the attack of the enemy commenced under cover of darkness, never showed the slightest symptom of confusion, the officers equalling their men in gallantry and steadiness, and I would wish particularly to bring to the notice of the Major-General the assistance I received from Major Nelson, Captains Messenger and Richards, 40th Regiment, and would also desire to bring before him the names of Captain MacGregor and Lieutenant Urquhart, 65th Regiment, as well as that of Captain Miller, 12th Regiment, and Captain Mould, Royal Engineers, and Lieutenant Macnaghten, Royal Artillery.

Of the losses of the enemy, I cannot form, an exact estimate, but they must have been very heavy, they left in our hands 34 killed, 2 mortally wounded, and 4 prisoners wounded.

I beg to enclose casualty returns, and have to deplore the loss of Lieutenant Jackson, 40th Regiment, who was mortally wounded, and died soon after the engagement; he was an officer of very great promise, and on all occasions had evinced the greatest coolness, judgment, and gallantry.

Admiralty, April 30, 1861.

A DESPATCH, dated at the Naval Camp, Waitara, 9th February, 1861, from which the following is an extract, has been received from Commodore Seymour, of Her Majesty's ship Pelorus, the Senior Officer of Her Majesty's ships on the Australian Station.

"On the following day the sap was carried past them and a redoubt (No. 6) was commenced on the very edge of the bush on the left of the road leading up to the Te Are Pah from Hiurangi.

"We have since then been employed in cutting down the bush and making a road by which we can advance on Te Are unmolested from the forest on our right.

"No. 6 has been completed, armed with an 8-inch gun (Naval), and occupied by the Head Quarters of the 65th Regiment under Colonel Wyatt.

"During all these operations the naval brigade has taken its share of the work, and in consequence of an application to that effect having been made to me by the Major-General Commanding, I have placed the services of Lieutenant Battscombe, of Her Majesty's ship Pelorus, at his disposal, as an Assistant Engineer, the duties of which he performs in addition to those of senior Lieutenant of the naval brigade.

"There have been very few casualties on our side since those of the 23rd ultimo, but I regret to say, that one of our best seamen, John Fisher, Captain of No. 1 gun in the advanced redoubt, was very severely wounded on the 8th instant, by a volley from a spot in the forest to our right, whence the enemy had fired ineffectually the previous day."

The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Edward Swynfen Lewis, of Little Aston Hall, in the parish of Shenstone, and of Park Hall, in the parish of Caverswall, in the county of Stafford, Esquire (commonly called the Honourable Edward Swynfen Lewis), second but only surviving son of Edward Lewis, Viscount St. Vincent, by Mary Anne, his second wife, third; but only surviving daughter of Thomas Parker, late of Park Hall aforesaid, Esquire, and sister of Thomas Hawe Parker, also of Park Hall, Esquire, all deceased, Her Royal licence and authority that he may (from motives of affectionate respect to the memory of his said maternal uncle, the said Thomas-Hawe Parker), henceforth assume and take the surname of Parker in addition to and before that of Lewis, and bear the arms of Parker quarterly, in the second quarter, with those of Lewis, and that the said surname and arms may in like manner be taken, used and borne by his issue; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Consul, at New York, enclosing a copy of the following circular letter, from the Secretary to the United States Treasury, to Collectors of Customs, with reference to the payment of duties under the new American Tariff:

Official Circular from the Secretary of the Treasury—Duties, Warehousing, and Allowances.

The Secretary of the Treasury has issued the following important explanatory circular in relation to the new Tariff law:

"Treasury Department, March 20, 1861.

"Sir,

"As numerous inquiries have been made respecting various provisions of the Tariff Act of March 2, 1861, it is deemed proper to state for

your information and government, as well as the information of others concerned, the views in part entertained by this Department on the subject.

"All questions of liability to duty or exemption therefrom, of merchandize imported under the provisions of the new Tariff, and questions as to the rates of duty thereon will be determined in accordance with the provisions of the 5th section of the Tariff Act of 1857, which section will, in the opinion of this Department, still remain in force on and after the 1st proximo unrepealed and unmodified.

"The clause in the Tariff Act of 1861, repealing such of existing laws as are repugnant to its provisions, is not considered to change or modify the warehousing or appraisement laws and regulations now in force, except in one particular, which is, that in cases where a bill of lading is presented showing the day of actual shipment certified to by a Consular officer of the United States, such date, in lieu of the 'period of exportation' prescribed by existing laws, shall be the date at which the foreign market value of the merchandize shall be estimated and ascertained by the appraisers, in order to the assessment of *ad valorem* duties.

"In the case of merchandize actually on ship-board, and bound to the United States, on or before the 17th instant, and of merchandize on board of vessels in port on the 1st of April next, where the vessels have been regularly entered at the Custom-house, the owners or importers of such merchandize will be permitted to enter for consumption or warehousing at the rates of duty now existing, or if the rates of duty on the merchandize are lessened by the Tariff of 1861, they may at their option enter at the lesser rates. The same privilege will be extended to all merchandize in public store, unclaimed on the 1st proximo, when entered for consumption or warehousing, in pursuance of law; and all merchandize in warehouse, under bond, on the 1st proximo, will be entitled to entry for withdrawal at rates of duty now existing, or if the rates of duty on the merchandize are lessened by the Tariff of 1861, the entry thereof may, at the option of the importer or owner, be made at the lesser rate.

"In allowances on account of tare, draft, &c., on goods subject to specific duty under the new tariff, officers of the customs will be governed by the provisions of the 58th and 59th sections of the General Collection Act of March 2, 1799, which are again brought into operation.

The following is the section of the law of 1857 referred to in Mr. Chase's letter:—

"SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, That on the entry of any goods, wares, and merchandize imported on and after the first day of July aforesaid, the decision of the collector of the customs at the port of importation and entry as to their liability to duty, or exemption therefrom, shall be final and conclusive against the owner, importer, consignee, or agent, shall, within ten days after such entry, give notice to the collector, in writing, of his dissatisfaction with such decision, setting forth therein distinctly and specifically his ground of objection thereto, and shall, within thirty days after the date of such decision, appeal therefrom to the Secretary of the Treasury, whose decision on such appeal shall be final and con-

clusive; and the said goods, wares, and merchandize shall be liable to duty or exempted therefrom accordingly, any act of Congress to the contrary notwithstanding, unless suit shall be brought within thirty days after such decision for any duties that may have been paid or may hereafter be paid, on said goods, or within thirty days after the duties shall have been paid in cases where such goods shall be in bond."
