

Charles Holland, late of No. 15, Seymour-street, Euston-square, Middlesex, Watchmaker and Jeweller, and for part of the time while there also a Photographer, and during the whole time letting lodgings.

William Williams, of Boreham Wood, Eistree, Herts, Beer-house Keeper, and Dealer in Hay and Grocery.

Samuel Levy, formerly of No. 111, and now of No. 39½, both in Middlesex-street, Whitechapel, Middlesex, Greengrocer and General Dealer.

Daniel James Hutchins, formerly of Bute-street, Cardiff, Glamorganshire, Draper and Outfitter, then of No. 3, Croom's-hill, Greenwich, Kent (his wife residing at Bute-street aforesaid), and late of No. 1, Clifton-grove, Aylum-road, Old Kent-road, Surrey, formerly Manager of a Warehouseman's Slop Department, his wife afterwards engaged in the same department, and latterly Commission Traveller to Warehousemen.

William Fish (sued with Henry De Grey Warter), formerly of No. 23, St. John-street, Westminster, Middlesex, Money Lender (formerly in conjunction with William Elliott, and latterly with Cornelius Fallon) and Discount Agent, Proprietor and Manager of a Loan Office, called the St. John's Loan Office, occasionally describing himself of No. 20, Millbank-street, Westminster, then of No. 7, Mount-gardens, Westminster-bridge-road, Lambeth, Surrey, and late of No. 2A, Ponsonby-place, Vauxhall-bridge-road, Pimlico, Middlesex, Debt Collector, and occasionally Betting on Horse Races.

John Adams, formerly of the George and Dragon Inn, Market-place, Witney, Oxfordshire, Publican, next of Standlake, near Witney aforesaid, Farmer and Horse Dealer, next of the Vineyard Farm, Abingdon, Berkshire, Farmer and Horse Dealer, then a Prisoner in the Debtors' Prison for London and Middlesex, and then and late of No. 74, Praed-street, Paddington, Middlesex, out of business.

Reuben Abrahams, formerly of Queen's-arcade, Liverpool, Lancashire, Butcher, in copartnership with Phineas Isaacs, under the style of Abrahams and Isaacs, and during the time residing at Hepworth-street, Liverpool aforesaid, then of King-street, Covent-garden, out of business, then of Russell-court, Drury-lane, out of business, then of May's-buildings, Covent-Garden, then of No. 310, Strand, at both places a Furniture Dealer, and then and now of White Horse-yard, Drury Lane, all in Middlesex, Furniture Dealer.

Frederick Jenkins, formerly of No. 5, Holles-place, Prince of Wales-road, Kentish Town, Journeyman Pianoforte Maker, then of the same place, and of No. 10, London-street, Tottenham Court-road, both in the county of Middlesex, Journeyman Pianoforte Maker, next of the same place, Pianoforte Manufacturer on his own account, the name over his door being William Jenkins and Sons, but not trading in those names or having a partner, occasionally during above period letting lodgings, from March, 1859, to March, 1861, Secretary to the West London Benefit Building Society, No. 8, from November, 1860, Secretary to the West London Benefit Building Societies, Nos. 8 and 9, and from November, 1860, of No. 10, London-street aforesaid, Secretary as last aforesaid.

Alexander Isaacs, formerly of No. 15, White-street, Houndsditch, City, and late of No. 8, Sharp's-Buildings, Sparrow-corner, Minories, both in Middlesex, dealer in clothes and government stores.

Joseph Sharp, sued and committed as J. Sharp, formerly of Park-place, Brixton, afterwards of No. 3, the Lawn, South Lambeth, both in Surrey, Clerk to a Proctor and Notary, at the same time renting a shop at No. 55, Parliament-street, Westminster, Middlesex, and carrying on business as a Tobaccoist, and late of No. 3, the Lawn aforesaid, Proctor's Clerk.

John Pear, formerly of No. 24, Richards-terrace, Lorrmore-road, Walworth, Surrey, and carrying on business at the same time at No. 22, Gresham-street, City, afterwards of No. 19, City-road, carrying on business at the place aforesaid, and afterwards at No. 21, Walbrook, City, all in Middlesex, Hair Dresser, Wig Maker, and Perfumer.

Thomas Townshend Coughin (trading and known as Thos. T. Coughin, sued as Thomas Coughin, and sued with Thomas Stone), formerly of Duppa's-hill, Croydon, Surrey, first trading there in copartnership with Thomas Stone, under the style of Stone and Co., as Engineers, then trading in copartnership with Benjamin Parker and the

said Thomas Stone, at Duppa's-hill aforesaid, under the style of Stone and Co., Starch Makers, and during the same time being Foreman to a Patent Starch Company, at Croydon, Surrey, and afterwards Foreman to a Starch Maker (the said Benjamin Parker), and at the same time renting an office at No. 21, Lawrence Pountney-lane, London, and late of No. 5, Frith-road, Tamworth-road, Croydon, Surrey, out of business, for part of the time living privately at No. 2, Handcroft-road, Croydon, Surrey.

George Murray, formerly of Peckham Rye, Surrey, in copartnership with Alfred Gibson, as Insurance Brokers and General Agents, at No. 9, Great St. Helen's, Bishops-gate-street, London, under the style first of Gibson, Linton, and Coy., and afterwards Gibson, Murray, and Co., having for part of the time a partner in the firm by name Mark Dyett, who carried on business in Western Australia, under the style of Gibson, Murray, Dyett, and Coy., then of No. 3, Montem-villas, Adelaide-road, Haverstock-hill, Middlesex, for part of the time buying Goods on Commission, having an office at No. 5, Anstinfriars, City, and other part of the time unemployed, and next and late of the Spread Eagle Hotel, Gracechurch-street, City, out of employment, for three years last past renting an office at No. 1, Pinner's-court, Old Broad-street, City, all in Middlesex, during part of the above period having some land in Western Australia, Director of and Shareholder in the Colonization Assurance Corporation, of No. 3, Cannon-street, City, Director of and Shareholder in the British and Foreign Ships' Sheathing Company (Limited), late of Leadenhall-street, City, and Director of and Shareholder in the Rossic and Canadi Lea Mines Company (Limited), late of Gresham-house, City.

George Ackermann, sued as George Ackerman, and sued with James Ackerman, formerly of No. 106, Strand, Stationer, Printer and Publisher, in partnership with David Alexander Young, trading under the style of Ackermann and Co., then of No. 1, Bickerton-terrace, Haverstock-hill, all in Middlesex, Manager of the Arts Department to a firm of Lithographers and Publishers, afterwards of No. 4, Nile-terrace, Old Kent-road, Surrey, for part of the time in the same employment, and afterwards out of business, his wife keeping a School there, afterwards of No. 1, Peckham-grove, Camberwell, Surrey, carrying on business with James Haefkens Ackermann, at No. 33, Hatton-garden, Middlesex, Commission Agents and Importers of Foreign Goods, under the style of G. Ackermann and Son, and afterwards and late of Bridge-street, Gainsborough, Lincolnshire, out of business, his wife keeping a School there, and for part of the time staying at No. 11, Victoria-road South, Kentish-town, Middlesex.
