PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a

copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, enclosing a copy of the *Moniteur*, containing a Report, by Monsieur Coste, upon the subject of the improvement of the French Fisheries, of which the following is a translation.

REPORT addressed to the EMPEROR OF THE FRENCH, by M. COSTE, Member of the Institute, relative to the organisation of Sea Fisheries considered as the means of extending the Naval Power of France.

SIRE,

The idea of submitting the sea to the laws of cultivation is no longer a mere disputable hope held out by science, which depreciation, the inseparable companion of truth, can consign at once to the class of chimeras, as it has endeavoured to do, time after time, with regard to all the splendid discoveries, which are now the boast of mankind, for entering into the feelings of our maritime population; this idea converts the ocean into an actual manufactory of food, which may be collected in such spots as industry may determine upon. Thus, by an organisation based on a strict application of the laws of life, industry can transform our coasts into a productive field, capable of supplying every European market.

It is true that, hitherto, exertions in this direction have been confined to the breeding of shell-fish, but in this trade such surprising effects have followed within two years, that in some places on the sea-coast, the wealth already created has altered the social condition of the inhabitants.

In the Island of Rhé, for example, more than three thousand men, who, but the other day, were penniless, left the interior of the island and proceeded to the coast to take possession of the *reclaimed land*, which the administration had divided into allotments for them, with a view to give each a direct interest in the common work. The unflinching perseverance of this army of labourers has not been daunted either by the necessity of draining the vast and unproductive area of mud, extending for many leagues, or by the labour of procuring materials for forming the enclosures destined to be turned to account.

They broke in pieces, by blasting and using the pickaxe, the enormous ridges of rock surrounding the island, and with the fragments constructed enclosures along the whole extent of the coast which they wished to free from mud. There, in the centre of these enclosed spots, they have placed stones in a vertical position, sufficiently near to each other to allow the waves, after breaking on these obstacles, to recede in rapid currents, washing the mud with them towards the sloping part, from which a channel carries it off in a single stream to the open sea.

Each enclosure thus arranged cleanses itself, and is rendered productive, by the play of the water.

Fifteen hundred of these enclosures are in full activity, placed in regular lines like houses in a town, with carriage-roads and foot-paths covering, from Rivedoux to Loix, a surface of 630,000 square metres, a gigantic work, which the inhabitants of the island are following up, with unexampled enthusiasm, in the remaining portion of the coast, where two thousand new enclosures are in the course of erection.

Scarcely had the land, so wonderfully reclaimed from the sea, undergone the preparation necessary to render it productive, when the seed, brought by the current from the open sea, spread there, and remained in quantities hardly to be believed. The fragments of rock, forming the walls of the

inclosures, and those collected within the spaces, surrounded by these walls, disappeared beneath vast beds of oysters, very soon to be ready for market, just as the soil of our pastures beneath the herbage that covers it. Any one, at pleasure, may verify this fact for himself, when the tide recedes from these collecting grounds, where the shell fish may be gathered dry-shod with as much ease as vines in a vineyard, or vegetables in a garden.

The agents of the local authorities have counted there, on an average, six hundred oysters per square metre, which gives for all the enclosures now in work a total of 378 millions, representing a sum of from six to eight millions of francs.

These honest but unpretending labourers, enlightened by a ray of abstract science, have thus succeeded in raising on some kilometres of unproductive beach, a more abundant harvest than is gathered annually from the whole sea-coast of France.

What will be the result when the whole circumference of the island is placed under cultivation?

But it is not so much the magnitude of the material result, as the moral end to which this result leads, which is most striking in looking at the success of this bold undertaking.

This industrious colony in fact, has not confined its operations to the individual efforts of each of its members; but it has raised the dignity of its labours to a higher standard by the formation of a company, the members of which are all jointly liable, as far as the general interests are concerned, whilst individual property is not in the slightest degree affected by the partnership.

The Company is divided by the deed of partnership into four communities, called after their respective localities, Vert-clos, Préau, Saint Laurent, and Rivedoux.

Each community elects three delegates for purposes of internal management, and to act as representatives in their relations with the naval authorities.

Each community swears in a guard to look after its own stock, and provides for their pay in its special Budget.

All the communities, lastly, meet in a general assembly at the theatre of the island to discuss the requirements of their branch of industry, new improvements in the method of conducting it, and experiments to be tried, just as questions of abstract science are brought under discussion in an academy.

In all this, Sire, the principle of a beneficial organization may clearly be traced, which applied to all the branches of Fishery, will be the means of reconstituting our maritime population on a new footing, making their firesides, at the same time, the seat of their wealth, and the centre of a system for the defence of our coasts.

But to realise this reconstitution, which has been initiated by the organization of the oyster trade, two things are urgently needed: firstly, to place the maritime population in possession of reservoirs upon the sea-coast, where they can deposit those descriptions of fish which admit of being reared. Secondly, to furnish them with the means of providing themselves with vessels capable of standing the dangers attending open sea fishing, and in all weathers; of carrying the produce of their fishing to the reservoirs or market in their holds, converted into tanks. The sole, turbot, brill, lobster, crab, ray, &c., adapt themselves perfectly to this system of domestication. They fatten on the dirt, as animals in a farm-yard. The truth of this has been proved by experiments in my own trial ponds at Concarneau.

When our fishermen have thus at their disposal marine folds, so to speak, they will not be obliged to carry their fish to market till they can meet with a lucrative sale, whilst under the present state of affairs they are under the necessity of selling at any price offered, or of losing the produce of their labour, as their commodity is one which loses its value if not not consumed at once.

Customers, on their part, will be able to order beforehand for their own tables, or to meet the demands of their trade, the number, description, and weight of fish they wish to be forwarded to them, which the owners of these reservoirs will supply them at the appointed day and hour. Thanks to this facility of despatch, no loss or waste will be incurred. Trade in the produce of the sea will be carried on with as great security and precision as that in the produce of the earth.

On the coast of England I have seen pools where ship loads of crabs and lobsters are kept in store, brought from Norway, Ireland, and oftener still from Brittany, in vessels provided with tanks. These large shell fish, enclosed by thirty, forty, or fifty thousand at a time in these pools, the water of which is renewed by the tide, are fed and kept in reserve for the London market, where, on an average, the very fish supplied by our fishermen at the low price of from four to five francs the dozen to the foreign speculator, find purchasers at from thirty to forty francs the dozen.

When the owner has brought his stock to market, he will not let it go except he is satisfied with his profit. If not satisfied he has only to replace his fish in his baskets, carry them back to the reservoir, and wait for a better opportunity. A good stock in hand enables him to meet any demand, however unexpected.

Now, if foreign energy can supply distant markets with the produce of our coasts, and, after defraying the enormous expenses of exportation, turn it into a source of wealth, what profits would not our maritime population derive by organising this trade to meet home consumption!

I am superintending at this moment, thanks to the means your Majesty has placed at my disposal, the construction of a tank, covering an area of 1500 metres, which will serve as a model to those fishermen who are disposed to enter the path of progress. They will see on what scientific principles the natural agencies of the open sea can be developed in a confined space, and how the large numbers of fish enclosed in it live and thrive. The assistance lent me by the pilot Guilloire in this undertaking will enable me to show, by a striking example, the importance, in a commercial point of view, of similar establishments. Salt-water tanks of a like character can easily be constructed in the interior of the country, provided that a free circulation and change of water is properly attended to.

When, in consequence of the establishment of these marine pens, and these fields of shell fish, the maritime population is established in farms of cultivation, they will raise by degrees their branch of industry from the narrow bounds within which their actual condition confines it, and their homes will become at the same time the depôts for preserving fish and the manufacture of fertilizing manures.

They will salt or smoke all the fish they cannot bring to market fresh or alive, that none of the produce of their fishing may be lost: all that is not fit for man's food, or is detrimental to the breeding of the edible species, will form a source of concentrated manure; and the labourer who makes use of it will be astonished at the fertility of his land,

Star-fish dried and reduced to powder; mud formed of organic remains; the bed of the ocean, periodically removed; fish of an oily nature; the heads of cods and sardines; banks of marl (maërlé?), and sand will furnish elements capable of sufficing for all the requirements of the land, to whatever degree of perfection we suppose its cultivation to be brought, over whatever extent its clearing may be carried.

The separate employment of each of these agents; their united action; their combination in different proportions, will enable the soil to be submitted to various treatments, which will supply it with more strength than it can lose by the production of crops, and will preserve its fruits from the destructive influences consequent upon a want of equilibrium between the different elements of nutrition.

England in vain looks to the guano of the islands of the Pacific, and to the bones of the battle-field for the phosphorus, which science tells her the soil has been deprived of.

Sicily, worn out by over-forcing its crops, which for many ages made it the granary of the Roman Empire, has lost, through this excessive production, the fertilising salts which man's improvidence has neglected to return in the same proportions as those in which they have been abstracted.

In many parts of the world the crops, not being indigenous, are not suited to the conditions of local vegetation, and, in consequence, corrupt the land; where microscopic animalculæ or infusoria are propagated, like a deadly blight, capable of endangering the existence of nations when they attack the potato, the vine, wheat, or even man himself.

A single one of these invisible animalculæ, which fill the universe, and the accumulation of whose dead bodies form the soil of whole provinces, is capable of producing in four days as many as a hundred and forty billion living creatures. Their minuteness is such, that, according to the calculations of an eminent *savant* at Berlin, no fewer than one billion seven hundred and fifty millions are required to make up the contents of one cubic inch.

In the general economy of nature, there are perpetual multipliers of the living element destined to form the food of the species, a little larger than themselves, which again, absorbed in their turn by other species, distinguishable to the eye, establish a manifest and fundamental link between the visible and invisible world. But this harmony is preserved only on the condition of an antagonism, always ready to turn to the injury of the visible world when any weakness opens the way to its devastating attacks.

In the face, then, of this conflict, at once beneficial and menacing, the chief ambition of science should be to obtain the healthy spread of the useful species, without allowing these invisible blights to become victorious parasites or disturbing agents. Now, as parasites never get the upper hand, except over diseased organizations, it follows that a good rotation of crops will act as a preservative against these destructive epidemics, for the development of an indigenous vegetation will be the means of supplying animals that feed upon it with a wholesome nourishment.

The depths of the ocean contain and develop the endlessly renewed elements of this rotation. All the organic remains formed of the drainage of large cities and the filtrations of the earth, carried by the medium of rivers into this vast receptacle, mingle with the nutritive properties so largely

contained in it. The submarine world, animal and vegetable, convert the parts that will assimilate, *here* into food for man, *there* into a substance adapted for manure.

We have only to draw from this inexhaustible source, and in proportion as we purify the sea from the destructive species which encumber it, to fertilize the earth, in the same proportion the useful races will propagate there,—like a new harvest on soil where pernicious weeds have ceased to choke good wheat.

The increase of the element adapted to man's food in proportion to the extent of ground devoted to its development, will be the means of adding to the natural wealth of a country a much larger amount than that artificially created.

But, for the accomplishment of such a design, a liberal capital is required to induce the maritime population to share in the advantages of the Association, and to place in the hands of the fishermen materials for working, suitable to the perilous nature of their calling. In want of these means these fearless labourers are exhausting our shores in gaining a miserable subsistence, whilst, in their very faces, English fishermen, in vessels enabling them to remain at sea in all weathers, and furnished with the most complete appliances, succeed in making enormous hauls in the deep sea, where fish of large size are most abundant.

No class of men has the same claim on the liberality of Government, for by one of those wonderful combinations which are only met with at certain stages in the progress of social development, the genius of Colbert, in his organization of France, has allotted to them the task of defending our flag. A happy idea, containing in itself the germ of maritime predominancy.

No class of men is so well situated to derive advantage from this country, since the sea, the monopoly of which that great minister granted to them, in return for their noble and uncompulsory obedience, is in fact the property of a community. The spirit of partnership would not, in this case, be fettered by the limits of individual property as it would be on land; and when loans of money have given it the opportunity of extending itself without restraint, its administrative organization will be found to be wonderfully adapted to its wants, because founded on natural conditions.

In each locality the commissioner of maritime inscription lives, as a father of a family, in the midst of the population under his jurisdiction. He keeps a register of the names and services of every one, to enable him to recruit for the navy, and to regulate the superannuation pensions. Merits or demerits, intellectual capacity or the contrary, poverty or easy circumstances, he allows nothing to escape his eye, and is always prepared to advise the Government as to the best application of these resources, without having recourse to endless and expensive inquiries.

The paymasters of pensions, the originators of the first saving banks, will act as disinterested bankers in this work of social regeneration. They will see that the fishermen receive directly the loans destined to assist them, either in their associated or private undertakings, without paying a percentage to rapacious agents.

When the maritime population has placed its working apparatus on a footing to meet all the new demands on its industry, it will begin to repay the Government loans in a way long known to it, and through the same hands that transmitted them to it.

Instead of placing to the superannuation fund, as in times past, only 3 per cent. monthly on the produce of their fishing, it will place 6, and in proportion as the payment of this periodical deposit imperceptibly discharges the debt, the hired labourer will become a free proprietor. The admirable machinery of our maritime inscription has only to be brought into play, to be the means of producing both wealth and strength.

In France railways destroy the coasting trade, the natural nursery for the navy, because everything is carried direct into the interior. In England they are its life and development, because all traffic must end in carriage by sea. The progress of civilization proves clearly, by a striking opposition, how much Colbert's scheme is in harmony with the destinies of the nation.

The idea of devoting a sum of money to the sea-fisheries is not a novelty, since several millions figure every year in the Budget for those of Newfoundland.

If a similar loan had been devoted to the development of the coast-fishery, it would doubtless long since have been placed above all contingencies, for it is to this branch of industry that France must henceforth look for the true elements of her naval force. It offers a sufficient amount of danger and toil to train the hereditary defenders of our flag, to the bold calling of the sea. It would take large enough proportions to increase their number beyond all conception, if the maritime population should find in it a source of prosperity for their children. The financial combination which would enable this end to be attained, would not only enlarge the navy recruitment list, but also form, by the collection of families round the scene of their labours, colonies both industrial and military, the members of which, after contributing to the naval force, would probably be usefully employed in the stationary service of the sea-coast batteries. The defence of the coast would be synonymous with that of the hearth, and would be located at the very seat of the wealth, towards the creation of which the generous intervention of Government would have contributed. It would open the door to feelings of patriotism, which Government might encourage by making grants of small tracts of land.

Captains of vessels charged with enforcing the regulations for this cultivation of the sea, would also be the instructors of these colonies, organised with the double view of fishing and defence. They would follow them to the open sea, as the engineers superintending a great manufacture; they would direct them in the application of new improvements, and would take them in tow, if necessary, from bad weather, rendering their return to port a matter of difficulty or danger. On land also they would put them through their manœuvres on non-working days, in order to avoid interfering with their calling.

Such, Sir, in the most general terms are the ideas relative to the organization of fisheries, which I have the honour to submit to your Majesty's consideration.

And whereas at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Town-hall, Great Yarmouth, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Friday, the fifteenth day of February last, it was resolved,—

“That it will be highly desirable and beneficial that the Act of Parliament, made and passed in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter 57, intituled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ should be adopted and applied to and put in force within this parish.”

ART. II.—That an annual salary of one hundred pounds shall be paid to the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and this Order, by the Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ART. 2. To assist the Overseers in examining the Rate Receipt Check Books, and in comparing them with the rate to which they relate.
3. To enter up the sums collected by the several Collectors in the Rate Book, weekly from the books of the Collectors, and examine such books weekly, and ascertain that all monies received have been duly paid over to the Overseers or to their banker.
