Instead of placing to the superannuation fund, as in times past, only 3 per cent. monthly on the produce of their fishing, it will place 6, and in proportion as the payment of this periodical deposit imperceptibly discharges the debt, the hired labourer will become a free proprietor. The admirable machinery of our maritime inscription has only to be brought into play, to be the means of producing both wealth and strength.

In France railways destroy the coasting trade, the natural nursery for the navy, because everything is carried direct into the interior. In England they are its life and development, because all traffic must end in carriage by sea. The progress of civilization proves clearly, by a striking opposition, how much Colbert's scheme is in harmony with the destinies of the nation.

The idea of devoting a sum of money to the sea-fisheries is not a novelty, since several millions figure every year in the Budget for those of Newfoundland.

If a similar loan had been devoted to the development of the coast-fishery, it would doubtless long since have been placed above all contingencies, for it is to this branch of industry that France must henceforth look for the true elements of her naval force. It offers a sufficient amount of danger and toil to train the hereditary defenders of our flag, to the bold calling of the sea. It would take large enough proportions to increase their number beyond all conception, if the maritime population should find in it a source of prosperity for their children. The financial combination which would enable this end to be attained, would not only enlarge the navy recruitment list, but also form, by the collection of families round the scene of their labours, colonies both industrial and military, the members of which, after contributing to the naval force, would probably be usefully employed in the stationary service of the sea-coast batteries. The defence of the coast would be synonymous with that of the hearth, and would be located at the very seat of the wealth, towards the creation of which the generous intervention of Government would have contributed. It would open the door to feelings of patriotism, which Government might encourage by making grants of small tracts of land.

Captains of vessels charged with enforcing the regulations for this cultivation of the sea, would also be the instructors of these colonies, organised with the double view of fishing and defence. They would follow them to the open sea, as the engineers superintending a great manufacture; they would direct them in the application of new improvements, and would take them in tow, if necessary, from bad weather, rendering their return to port a matter of difficulty or danger. On land also they would put them through their manœuvres on non-working days, in order to avoid interfering with their calling.

Such, Sire, in the most general terms are the ideas relative to the orgazniation of fisheries, which I have the honour to submit to your Majesty's consideration.
