The Grateful Acknowledgment of the People called Quakers of Scotland, for his Declaration of Liberty of Conscience.

THE Obligations which we the Kings Peaceable Subjects called Quakers in Scotland owe to him, for the quiet Enjoyment of the Liberty of our Consciences, are of so old a date, that we may seem to have been wanting in our duty, in not having given him sooner our Publick Thanks; yet we hope he bears in mind our readiness to testify the Resentment we had of his Favour, in so far as we understood was proper to the circumstance of his Affairs, which both will plead with him for a favorable Character of our delay, and a benign Acceptance of our present Publick Acknowledgment.

We cannot but with grateful Hearts both admire and acknowledge the good Providence of God, that made the King's Retiring into our Country, give a happy turn to his Affairs, to the defeating and disappointing of the Designs of his Enemies: And since at the same time, viz. in the year 1679. his Influence upon the Government there, opened our Prison Doors, where many of us had lain several years in most noisome Holes, and ever since protected us in an uninterrupted Exercise of our Religion, even

against the Attempts not only of our immediate Persecutors, but of some of more Eminent Characters, who envied our quiet: We do justly conceive our selves obliged by a speculative re, to praise God for his Goodness in preserving and carrying the King thorow and over all his Troubles, since by the same Providence, and at the same time, by which the Lord began in that more observable manner to evidence his Care of him, he made him the happy Instrument to deliver us from our Troubles, so that the prosperity of his Affairs and our peaceable fruition of the Exercise of our Consciences, be, both the same date, and gave us ground to rejoice in the one, as that which brought us the other, and as we praise God for the First, so we acknowledge the Kings Favour and Kindness in the Last: And though the particular care be expressed of us in his Declaration, in allowing us our Liberty without any other condition that could straiten our Consciences, doth oblige us to give him in a more particular manner, our hearty and open Thanks, yet we must needs own that his Conduct in that matter was no surprize upon us, having been so long, by a sensible Experience, convinced both of his Principle and Inclination in that matter, which as it prevented the evil Contagion of Jealousie, from taking place in our Hearts, so we hope it will root it out of all those where the Malice of ill Men hath sowed it.

Gibraltar, May 13. Yesterday returned into this Port, his Majesties Ship the *Dragon*, Captain *Killigrew* Commander, with the rest of the Squadron, which his Majesty had ordered to go in search of the *Marquis de Fleury* the *Pyrate*; who, among other depredations, had seized the *Jerusalem*, *Thomas Daniel* Matter in her Voyage from *Alexandria* to *Tripoli* in *Barbary*, having on Board a *Bashaw*, (who was going to that Government,) and carried her to *Malta*, where leaving the Turkish Passengers under the Protection of the Great Master, he released the Ship, and himself presently departed thence, after having agreed with the *Bashaw* for Thirty thousand Pieces of Eight for his own Ransom, and six thousand more to be paid yearly during his *Bashawship*. In some little time after his departure, Captain *Killigrew* came to that place, and upon the instances he made in His Majesties Name to the Great-Master, obtained the Liberty of the *Bashaws* Wives, and the other Passengers, being in all 62 persons, Men and Women, who had not yet agreed their Ransoms, which would have amounted to great Sums of Money; all which, with their Goods, Captain *Killigrew* received on board His Majesties Ships, and afterwards put on shoar at *Tripoli*, to the no less satisfaction of that Government in this instance of His Majesties extraordinary Kindness and Generosity to them, than to the Honor and Encouragement of the Navigation and Trade of His Majesties Subjects in those parts. From *Tripoli* Captain *Killigrew* proceeded in the farther search of the *Pyrate*, and understanding he was gone to *Villa Franca*, he put in there, and found his Ship carried into the Mole, and wholly unrigged and disarmed, and the *Marquis de Fleury* himself fled, without being ever likely to go to Sea again; upon which Captain *Killigrew* returned hither, in order to repair to his station on the Coast of *Silly*.

Lemberg, June 5. The King of *Poland* continues still at *Zawarow*. Our last advices are, that the *Moscovite* Army is near *Kiovia*, on the *Boristhenes*; That the Forces of this Crown are encamped at *Farnopol*, under the Command of the *Crown-Generall*; and that 6000 *Tatars* have brought a great Convoy of Provisions into *Camimec*.

Vienna, June 8. The *Electer of Bavaria* arrived here the 5th Instant, and intends within few days to joyn the Army in *Hungary*, which is rendezvoused at *Barkan*, consisting of 24 Regiments, with 54 pieces of Cannon, *General Dumeua* d is with

the Duke of *Lorraine* to receive his Orders before he goes to the Army in *Croatia*, which is in the mean time upon their march towards *Darda*, under the Command of Count *Scherfenberg*. The Grand Visier we hear is still at *Belgrade*, and the Ottoman Troops encamped at *Peter Waradin*; And therefore General *Hausler* continues at *Segedin*, with the Detachment from the Body of the Imperial Troops, encamped near *Zolnock* under the Orders of General *Caraffa*, to prevent any designs the Enemy may have either of attempting upon that place, or of sending relief into *Agria*, which is in great want of it. The Letters from *Segedin* of the 21th past give an Account, that several of our Wagons laden with Bread and Corn, had been set upon not far from that place, by a Party of 100 Turks and Tartars, which were vigorously defended by 30 Ruffians, and brought safe thither. And that the Heydukes of *Chonod* meeting with a Party of 1000 Turks sent from the Garrison of *Lippa* to intercept some of our Convoys, they had routed them, killing 200 upon the place, and pursuing the rest even to the Town of *Lippa*, which they entered, and set fire to it, and had like to have taken *Teckelej* himself (40 Heydukes having broke into the house where he was) but that two Turks by a private way conveyed him into the Castle; They took one of his Domestick Servants, who is brought Prisoner to *Segedin*, with 100 Turks besides. The Answer to the Solicitations made by the Princeps *Ragotzi* that she may have Passports to send hither her Deputies, is, That in case she delivers up *Mongatz* without delay, The may hope to find Favour from his Imperial Majesty, withou which, no Propositions she can make will be accepted of.

Vienna, June 12. The 9th instant being the Emperors Birth day (on which His Imperial Majesty entered into the 47th year of his age) was observed here with great Solemnity. The Elector of *Bavaria* will part from hence in few days for *Hungary*. We have Advice by Letters of the 8th Instant from the Imperial Army, of their march that day towards the River *Sarwitz*; And that part of the Artillery was sent down the *Danube* towards *Darda*. They write from *Zolnock*, that Colonel *Sempell* who commands a Regiment of Hussars, marching with a Party of 300 Horse towards *Agria*, had drawn part of that Garrison into an Ambuscade, by sending 50 of his Men to drive away some Cattle from under their Walls, and that the Turks pursuing them in their Retreat, fell among the rest of the Hussars, who were in a readiness to receive them, and killed 174 of the Turks, and brought away with them 37 Prisoners besides Cattle. And that a Letter had been intercepted written by the Bassa of *Agria* to the Grand Visier, giving him an Account, that that place was in so ill a Condition through the want of Provisions, that he should not be able to defend it long in case of a Siege; And the same is confirmed by the report of the Prisoners lately taken.

Brussels, June 24. Our Governor-General who parted from hence the 15th Instant for *Flanders*, to visit the several Garrisons of that Province, returned hither on Saturday last. They write from *Buda*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* was encamped the 8th Instant with 18 Regiments near the Old Town, and after he had visited the Magazines, and given Orders about the Fortifications of *Buda*, intended to march with the Army, and 24 pieces of Cannon towards *Five Churches*, having ordered the rest of the Artillery, with the Ammunition, and all things necessary for a Siege, to pass down the *Danube* towards *Darda*.

Hague, June 22. The States of *Holland* and *West Frisland* are Adjourned to the 16th of the next Month. The Sieur *Hop*, Pensionary of *Amsterdam*, appointed by the States-General to go their Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to

Thank his Electoral Highness for his offer'd Mediation in the differences arisen between the King of *Denmark* and this State; and to endeavour to adjust the same with the Danish Minister at *Berlin*, is preparing for his Journey to that Court.

Witchal, June 17. This day his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark* Embarked with his Retinue on two of His Majesties Yachts, appointed to attend him, in order to their passing to *Denmark*, where his R. H. intends to stay about a Month.
