TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

THE Queen, being desirous of affording to the Princes, Chiefs, and People, of the Indian Empire, a public and signal testimony of Her regard, by the Institution of an Order of Knighthood, whereby Her resolution to take upon Herself the Government of the Territories in India may be commemorated, and by which Her Majesty may be enabled to reward conspicuous merit and loyalty, has been graciously pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to institute, erect, constitute, and create, an Order of Knighthood, to be known by, and have for ever hereafter, the name, style, and designation, of "The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India."

And to ordain, direct, and appoint, that the said Order shall consist of The Sovereign, a Grand Master, and twenty-five Knights, together with such Extra and Honorary Knights as Her Majesty, Her Heirs, and Successors, shall from time to time appoint.

And to ordain, direct, and appoint, that Her Majesty, Her Heirs, and Successors, Kings and Queens Regnant of the said United Kingdom, shall be Sovereigns of the said Most Exalted Order.

And that the Viceroy and Governor-General of India for the time being shall be Grand Master of the said Order, and that he shall, in virtue thereof, be the first and principal Knight of the Order.

And that the said Most Exalted Order shall be governed by Statutes and Ordinances, to be from time to time made and ordained by Her Majesty, Her Heirs, and Successors, Sovereigns of the said Order.

And to ordain and direct that it shall be competent for the Sovereign of the said Order to confer the dignity of a Knight of the Order upon such Native Princes and Chiefs of India as shall have entitled themselves to Her Majesty's favour, and upon such of Her Majesty's British subjects

as have, by important and loyal services rendered by them to the Indian Empire, merited Her Majesty's favour.

The Queen has been further pleased to ordain, constitute, and appoint the Right Honourable Charles John, Earl Canning, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Her Majesty's Viceroy and Governor-General of India, to be the first Grand Master of the said Most Exalted Order of the Star of India;

Board of Trade, Whitehall, June 25, 1861.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade hereby give notice, that, by virtue of a Treaty, signed on the 22nd instant, between Great Britain, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Denmark, Spain, France, Mecklenburg Schwerin, the Netherlands, Portugal, Prussia, Russia, Sweden, and Norway, and the Hanse Towns, on the one part, and Hanover, on the other part, Hanover has engaged to discontinue the levying of the Stade Toll from and after the 1st of July next.

Until, however, certain engagements of the Treaty towards Hanover shall have been fulfilled by the Contracting Parties, it has been agreed that the Hanoverian Government shall have the right to maintain a provisional state of things on the Elbe, by taking from vessels ascending that river, security for the payment of the toll intended to be abolished, such security to be cancelled and discharged as soon as the country by whose vessels it has been given shall have fulfilled the said engagements.

The owners and masters of British vessels are therefore apprised that, although actual payment of the Stade Toll will not be required after the 30th instant, yet, until further notice, it will be necessary for them to give security for the amount of the toll.

For this purpose the Hanoverian Government leaves to the parties the option either of making the deposit in cash, or of giving security through a broker resident at the port of destination whose solvency is known to the Toll Office, and who, instead of (*contre*) the papers and documents specified in § 8 of the Regulation of April 13, 1844 (relative to the Stade Toll), will only have to deliver a simple note of hand (*cédule*) retaining his remedy against the proper person in regard to the sums therein specified.

River Medway and Harbours of Chatham and Sheerness.

RULES, ORDERS, and REGULATIONS for the preservation of Her Majesty's moorings, and for the mooring, anchoring, and placing all private ships, vessels, and craft, within the ports, river, harbours, and limits herein-after mentioned, made pursuant to the Act of Parliament 54th, Geo. III, chapter 159, and other the Acts concerning the same, with a notice of penalties for every offence in breach of the same rules, orders, and regulations.

Appointment of Queen's Harbour Master.

1. The Master Attendant of Chatham Dockyard for the time being is hereby appointed the Queen's Harbour Master, to superintend the River Medway, and his control shall extend from the Great Nore so far as the tide flows and reflows; that is to say, to the first Lock on the said river, situate between Aylesford-bridge and Allington-castle; and he is hereby authorized and directed to carry out fully the provisions of the Acts in force for the above-mentioned purposes.

Against encroachments on the shores.

2. No person or persons shall make, construct, or erect any pier, quay, wharf, jetty, breast, or embankment in or adjoining to the said river, or the public harbours or harbour within the limits aforesaid, without giving at least one month's notice to the Secretary of the Admiralty. 46 Geo. III, c. 153.—Penalty, two hundred pounds.

Preservation of Her Majesty's moorings, &c.

3. No private ship, vessel, barge, boat, or other craft shall, without license in writing from the Port Admiral, Captain Superintendent, or Harbour Master as aforesaid, be moored or fastened to any of Her Majesty's moorings, buoys, piles, or ships, within the limits aforesaid, unless forced thereto by stress of weather or unavoidable accident. 54 George III, c. 159, s. 3.—Penalty, ten pounds for every tide, such ship, &c., shall remain so moored, &c.

Places where private ships, &c., may not anchor or lie.

4. No private ship, vessel, barge, boat, or other craft shall be moored, anchored, or placed within 100 yards of any part of the moorings for Her Majesty's ships or vessels in the said river and harbours, nor within the like distance from Her Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, ships, or hulks, nor in the fair-way or channel, or across the stream of the said river or harbours so as to obstruct the passage or entrance into the same (unless licensed or forced thereto, as set forth in the foregoing Rule 3). 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 3.—Penalty, ten pounds for every tide such ship shall remain within, &c.

Immediate removal of ships, &c., contravening Rule 3 or Rule 4.

5. The person in charge of every private ship, vessel, barge, boat, or other craft, which shall be at any time moored, fastened, or placed, contrary to the foregoing Rules 3 and 4, or either of them, shall remove the same within one hour after notice in writing by any of Her Majesty's naval or dockyard officers. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 4.—Penalty, a further sum of ten pounds.

But ships, &c., not to be unhooked from said moorings without aid from dockyard.

6. Nevertheless, whenever any private ship or vessel shall by accident, or otherwise, hook any of Her Majesty's moorings, no person having charge of such ship or vessel shall proceed to unhook the same; but shall forthwith give notice to the said Harbour Master, or to the chief officer of the nearest of Her Majesty's dockyards, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings without damage. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 5.—Penalty, ten pounds.

Precautionary Rule as to gunpowder on board. As to safety of magazines, see Rule 18.

7. No private ship of war, transport, private, or merchant-ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, having on board any gunpowder, exceeding five pounds' weight in the whole, shall come, or be laden, or take on board such gunpowder within the limits specified in Rule 1, under the control of the said Harbour Master, or having so come in there under stress of weather, the pilot or person having charge of such ship or craft shall unship and deliver the same gunpowder within twenty-four hours after the ceasing of such weather, and give notice at the nearest custom-house. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 6.—Penalty, five pounds for every five pounds of gunpowder, and every pilot, knowingly offending, to be for ever incapable of acting as a pilot.

Rule to prevent breaming in improper places.

8. No private ship, vessel, barge, boat, or craft shall be breamed afloat in the said river or harbours, nor at any place within 120 yards from any part of the powder magazines at Upnor, or 100 yards from the said docks, dock yards, arsenals, wharfs, ships or hulks. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 7.—Penalty, five pounds.

Prohibition of fires on board during the night.

9. No fire shall be kept on board any private ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft (except steam vessels), in the said river or harbours, between eleven o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, from the 1st of October to the 31st of March inclusive, nor between eleven o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning, from the 1st of April to the 30th of September inclusive. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 7.—Penalty, five pounds.

Regulation as to heating of pitch, tar, &c.

10. No pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, or other combustible matter shall be boiled or heated on board any private ship, vessel, barge, lighter, boat, or other craft, within the distance of 250 yards from any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels, or hired armed ships in Her Majesty's service, in the said river or harbours, nor within the distance of 250 yards from any of Her Majesty's docks, dock-yards, arsenals, or wharfs. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 7.—Penalty, five pounds.

Against keeping guns shotted &c, and firing guns in the night.

11. No gun or guns belonging to any private ship or vessel lying in the said river or harbours shall be kept shotted or loaded with ball, nor shall any gun on board such ship or vessel lying there be fired or discharged before sun rising, or after sun setting. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 8.—Penalty, five shillings for every gun kept shotted; ten shillings for every gun fired.

Authority for Her Majesty's officers to board ships in day time, to discover infraction of Rules 10 and 11.

12. No person in charge of any private ship or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, shall refuse to permit the said Harbour Master, or any officer of Her Majesty's ships of war, dock-yards, or arsenals, at any hour between sun rising and sun setting, upon demand made, to go on board such ship or other craft to search for gunpowder, guns shotted, and the heating and melting such combustible matters within the limits by these Rules prohibited respectively. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 9.—Penalty, ten pounds.

Against creeping &c., for lost stores within prohibited distances.

13. No person, not being in Her Majesty's service, shall without license, under the hand of a captain, superintendent of one of Her Majesty's said dock yards, creep or sweep for anchors, cables, ropes, or other stores, lost or supposed to be lost in the said river or harbours, within 100 yards from any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels of war, or hired ships or vessels in Her Majesty's service, or from moorings belonging to Her Majesty, or from Her Majesty's docks, dock-yards, arsenals, or wharfs. 54 Geo. III, c. 159, s. 10.—Penalty, ten pounds.

Against unduly emptying ballast, rubbish, or filth, so as to injure the river, &c.

14. No person whatsoever (but especially no person having charge of any private ship of war, or other private or merchant-ship or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, and no person working any quarry, mine, or pit near the said river and harbours), shall cast, empty, or unload, or cause to be cast, emptied, or unladen from any such ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or craft, or from the shore, any ballast, stone, gravel, earth, rubbish, wreck, or filth, into the said river or harbours, so as to tend to the injury or obstruction of the navigation thereof, or in any place or shore where the same shall be liable to be washed into the said river or harbours, or either of them, either by tides, storms, or land floods.

Proviso. Except as to materials to be used in building or repairing any wharf, bridge, or other building on the banks of the said river or hardway, or for repairing any highway.

54 George III, c. 159, s. 11.—Penalty, ten pounds, and all expenses of removing such matter to a proper place.

Manner in which ballast may be unladen.

15. And for more effectually preventing such injuries, no ship or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or craft whatsoever, shall unlade on any part of the shore of the said river or harbours (except on some properly constructed wharf), any ballast, stone, slate, gravel, earth, rubbish, wreck, or filth, except at the time of high water, or within two hours before or after high water, and such ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, shall approach the shore, as far as the tide and her draught of water will admit, and shall under no circumstances, and in no situation, deposit any of the said matters below low water-mark at neap tides; and every vessel drawing above eleven feet of water at the stern shall unlade all such materials into some lighter, barge, or boat, to be conveyed as near the shore as possible at the time of high water, and all such ballast and other matter shall in all cases be cast on shore from the side of the ship, lighter, or other craft which shall be

nearest the land. 54 George III. c. 159, ss. 12, 13.—Penalty, ten pounds, and all expenses of removing such matters to a proper place.

Against taking ballast &c., from prohibited shores.

16. No person shall take any ballast or shingle from any portion of the shores or banks of the said harbours, from which such taking has been or shall be prohibited by order of the said Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. 54 George III, c. 159, s. 14.—Penalty, ten pounds.

Tarpaulins to be used in ballasting, &c., ships, &c.

17. No person shall take any ballast into any ship or vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, or discharge the same from any ship or vessel, into any lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, without providing and using sufficient tarpaulin or tarpaulins, properly stretched and spread, to prevent any of such ballast falling into the said river or harbours. 54 George III, c. 159, s. 15.—Penalty, five pounds.

Protection of Her Majesty's magazines at Upnor.

18. And for the especial prevention of danger to and from Her Majesty's powder magazines at Upnor, on the left bank of the said river, no person shall moor, anchor, or place, or cause to be moored, anchored, or placed, any private ship of war, transport, or other private ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat, or other craft, within the distance of 120 yards from any or either of the wharfs on the said river, belonging or attached to Upnor Castle, or from any part of the said magazines there situate. 54 George III, c. 159, ss. 2 and 3.—Penalty, ten pounds for every tide such ship, &c., shall so remain.

N.B.—These rules, orders, and regulations are not intended to prejudice, alter, or take away any such right of property, privilege, or jurisdiction, held or enjoyed by any Body Corporate, Lord or Lady of any Manor, or any person whatsoever, within the limits of the superintendence of the said Harbour Master as is reserved or saved to them in and by the first-mentioned Act.

shores or banks, of any part, harbour, or haven of this Kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by order, under their hands, or the hand of their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds.

And whereas we, as Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, have found it necessary, for the protection of the harbour and port of South Yarmouth, in the Isle of Wight, in the county of Southampton, to prohibit the taking or removing of any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks, between the east side of the entrance of the said harbour and the Yarmouth turnpike or toll-gate, half a mile eastward therefrom. And we do hereby order that no person or persons shall take or remove any ballast or shingle from such shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks, aforesaid.
