A DESPATCH, of which the following is an Extract, has been received, with its Enclosures, from Major-General Pratt, K.C.B.:

Head Quarters, Camp, Waitara,
Sir, April 2, 1861.

REFERRING to my despatch of the 11th and 12th ultimo, I have the honour to enclose, for the information of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-Chief, documents as per annexed list, by which it will be seen that the truce with Wiremu Tamehana up to the 15th March led to no result, beyond the transmission of letters from Tamehana to the Governor, the Bishop of New Zealand and to Sir W. Martin, with a request that they should be forwarded by me, and that I acquainted him that if he did not agree to the terms I had offered to him, by the afternoon of the 14th March, I should recommence hostilities; accordingly, the long expected Armstrong guns and mortars having in the interim reached me, on the morning of the 15th March, I had them placed in position and commenced the advance and attack more vigorously than ever. The sap was pushed forward and the guns and mortars made excellent play on the various positions.

During the night of the 16th March, the enemy attempted to take away the sap-roller but were stopped, with loss, by the explosion of a shell which had been purposely placed in it.

On the morning of the 18th, the Native Secretary Mr. McLean duly accredited by the Governor, and accompanied by several influential chiefs, arrived in my camp, and a letter to Tamehana was sent by Mr. McLean to the effect that if a white flag was hoisted, operations would be suspended and that at a conference the Governor's reply to his letter would be communicated to him. During the whole day, however, the works were carried on, and about 5 p.m. a very brisk fire was opened on the skirmishers on the right flank, promptly replied to by us, in which the enemy owns to have met with severe loss, while we had three men killed, and two officers and four men wounded.

At daylight on the 19th March, a white flag was hoisted and operations were suspended, the enemy were evidently thoroughly sickened of the war. Mr. McLean had an interview with the insurgent chiefs, and on his return he informed me that the Waikato, the men from Wanganui, and the Nestinganuis, would return to their

respective homes, and William King to Mataitawa to await terms of peace; and next morning there was not an insurgent in my front, all having gone. When about to send a few men to occupy the position, Mr. McLean told me, that in native opinion, they having retired from my front was submission, and that to occupy the position would now be considered somewhat unfair and would retard negociations. I stipulated, however, that whilst we should keep our advanced positions, the pals and positions before me should be vacated and that no one should remain in or near them during the cessation of hostilities and pending the arrival of the Governor.

His Excellency arrived on the 27th March, and negociations are now going on which I trust will terminate in an honourable and lasting peace.

On the 30th, when being sworn in as a Member of the Executive Council of the Colony, the English mail arrived, and Lieutenant-General Cameron, C.B., reached my camp with orders to assume the command of the forces in New Zealand, which was to be separated from the Australian colonies, while I was directed to return to my command in Melbourne.

I enclose a list of casualties since the 11th March, until the cessation of hostilities, amongst which will be found the name of Lieutenant Macnaghten, Royal Artillery, who fell at the head of the advanced demi-parallel whilst serving a Cochorn mortar. The gallantry and coolness of this young officer during the whole of this war had rendered him a general favourite, and his untimely fate has been deeply felt in the force from the general to the private.

I have now to bring to the notice of His Royal Highness the services of Commodore Seymour and the Naval Brigade. The cordial co-operation which I have experienced from this gallant officer has been uninterrupted during the whole period in which we have served together.

Lieutenant Battiscombe, of Her Majesty's ship Pelorus, has rendered valuable assistance, not only with the Naval Brigade, but also with the Royal Engineer Department, to which he was attached; and Midshipmen Hotham and Wadlow had opportunity of showing their gallantry and good service whilst working the heavy guns.

It is my duty to bring to notice the very valuable services of Colonel Mould, commanding Royal Engineers, assisted by Captain Mould and Lieutenant Warburton, R.E. The document from Colonel Mould, which accompanies this despatch, will show how gigantic were the works designed and superintended by him, and the arduous labours of the troops who constructed them for so long a period under daily fire.

The Royal Artillery, under Captain Strover, have, as they always do, rendered most valuable service during the campaign. Latterly the Armstrong Battery, under Captain Mercer and Lieutenant Pickard, showed the power and precision of that arm, though attack on mountains and forest, and an unseen foe, is not the position which shows this powerful weapon to its full advantage. A valuable report on this arm, by Captain Mercer, accompanies this.

I also beg to bring prominently before His Royal Highness the services of the following officers commanding corps and detachments, many of whom have been named before in various actions; and they have one and all done a duty, sometimes very severe, with cheerfulness and alacrity; namely:

There is one staff-officer, however (Lieutenant-Colonel Carey, D.A.G.), who I-venture to bring to His Royal Highness's notice as being worthy of some special mark of Her Majesty's approbation. His gallantry and unremitting exertions during the whole of the war have been singularly conspicuous, and have been remarked, not only by myself, but by every member of this force.

And with regard to the soldiery of all arms, it is my bounden duty to point out their arduous and unceasing labour in erecting strong redoubts and pushing forward the sap, always under heavy fire, and driving the enemy from his lines of riflepits and strong positions with a loss to us indescribably small, thus showing this wily, brave, and skilful foe that all was unavailing against scientific works carried on by gallant men.

Royal Engineer Office, Taranaki, March 30, 1861. SIR,

I HAVE the honour to submit, for the information of the Major-General Commanding, the following Report, accompanied by a sketch, of the Engineer operations carried on for the attack of the pah on Matarikoriko, the entrenched position at and about Huirangi, and the Te Arei Pah.

The Major-General having resolved on the reduction of the pah on the strong and commanding position of Matarikoriko, and to entrench the troops in a suitable position to carry on that as well as other subsequent operations, a redoubt, No. 1, having a perimeter (interior) of 266 yards, and an area of 2,560 square yards, capable of accommodating 450 men, with four guns, was traced out on the morning of the 29th December last, on the site of the old Kairau Pah, about 1,100 yards distant from Matarikoriko, and commenced under cover of a line of skirmishers, and was carried on without molestation for upwards of two hours, with a working party of 100 men, superintended by a detail of Royal Engineers, About 9 A.M. a sharp fire of musketry was opened by the enemy from lines of rifle pits, previously unseen, situated on the left and left front of the redoubt, some only 140 yards distant on the edge of a very steep wooded and swampy gulley. Nevertheless the work was continued without interruption, though there was but little intermission in the enemy's fire, good cover was obtained by 6 P.M., and 480 men occupied it during the night. On the 30th December platforms were laid on the left face of the redoubt, and two 8-inch guns mounted to breach the pali, and the parapets were heightened in parts so that the interior of the redoubt might be more thoroughly defiladed. On the 31st December, it having been ascertained that the Matarikoriko Pah had been evacuated by the enemy, it was taken possession of, 100 men, with one 24-pounder howitzer, and a detail of Royal Engineers, encamped inside, and the construction of a stockade to accommodate 60 men, was immediately commenced within the pah, and carried on day by day briskly to completion.

It being known that the enemy had strong entrenched lines at Huirangi, in difficult positions on the edges of gullies, with bush and scrub in their rear, the Major-General approved of a plan to establish redoubts, one in advance of another, and then to form approaches towards the position.

In accordance with this arrangement a redoubt, No. 2, 26 yards square, was established on the 14th January, about 600 yards in front of No. 1, and occupied the same night by 120 men and one 24-pounder howitzer, mounted en barbette.

On the 18th January redoubt No. 3, 30 yards square interiorly, was established about 400 yards in front of No. 2, and occupied that night by 100 men, with one howitzer. The fire from the enemy's position was in the early part of the day very brisk, and at intervals heavy volleys were fired; but the fire was materially kept down by that of the Artillery and skirmishers, so that the casualties were small,—only two in number.

On the 19th January and the two following days additions were made as wings to the redoubt, so as to increase the accommodation and to afford flanking defence, and an 8-inch gun was mounted lintervals between, and the redoubt was enlarged

area of 1,900 square yards, and accommodated about 450 men in tents.

On the 22nd January a double sap, directed towards the centre of the enemy's position, was commenced and carried on, without intermission, day by day, until the 2nd February, when it reached their rifle pits. The daring attack of the enemy on the left wing of No. 3 redoubt, on the morning of the 23rd January, not being connected with the Engineer operations, is only thus alluded to. The sap, except for the first 120 yards, when it was only 12 feet in width, was fifteen feet wide in the clear of the gabions, and was substantially traversed at intervals of from 35 to 40 feet. The whole distance sapped was 768 yards, thus averaging 64 yards a day, and was executed without a single casualty, notwithstanding frequent daily volleys of musketry and dropping fire from various parts of the ememy's position, all concentrated on the head of the sap. During its progress, redoubt, No. 4, 13 yards square interiorly, to hold a guard of 50 men, was established on the 27th January on the right, and on the 29th January redoubt No. 5, 24 yards square, was constructed on the left, about 250 yards from the rifle pits, for a garrison of 100 men. From the date of the formation of this last redoubt, the enemy had not fired upon the working parties, having evacuated their whole line, which was about 1500 yards in length from extreme right to left, and had retired down the gullies into the bush, and broken country in their rear. Thus the first objective point aimed at by the Major-General was sat sfactorily attained.

Redoubt No. 6, was commenced on the line of the enemy's position, near the centre thereof, on the 2nd February, completed on the 3rd, and occupied the same date, with 450 men, with two 24-pounder howitzers, and an 8-inch gun was mounted on the 4th February, in the right half There being a bush, bastion of the redoubt. with dense undergrowth close to the left front of the redoubt, which might give cover to the enemy to advance, and attempt a surprise, it was resolved to destroy it, and working parties were employed in cutting it down on the 3rd February, and several following days.

From No. 6 Redoubt, the strong position of Puke rangiora, situated upon the brink of a steep cliff, about 300 feet high, falling to the Waitara River, backed by a thick bush and occupied in part by Te Arei Pah, was observed through an avenue in the bush, and presumed to be at a distance of about 2,000 yards. After a careful reconnaissance, the Major-General determined to attack it in a mode similar to that proposed for the reduction of the Matarikoriko Pah, and carried out in the capture of the Huirangi position; accordingly on the 10th February, a force moved by two roads towards the position, and when within \$50 yards of Te Arei, the enemy opened a well sustained fire from the pah, and from unseen lines of rifle pits of considerable extent, right and left and in advance thereof. A Redoubt, No. 7, having a perimeter of 240 yards, and an area of 1,650 superficial yards, was immediately traced ont, carried on under a very heavy fire to completion, and occupied that night by 400 men.

· As the enemy's position commanded the redoubt, the 11th February was occupied in raising portions of the parapets, and surmounting them with gabions, with sand-bag loop-holes at

A single sap, defiladed in directions from the enemy's position, but with traverses at intervals, to secure it from an oblique plunging fire, was commenced on the 16th February, and was carried on with occasional interruptions from the weather, and under a heavy fire from the enemy at uncertain periods, during each day, until the 24th February, when it became necessary to change its direction, and to resort to the double sap. The progress during the above period was 432 yards. On the 25th and 26th the double sap was proecceded with to the extent of 65 yards, and a short demi-parallel to the left was, during the same time, executed to afford cover for men to protect its further progress. During the night of the 26th the enemy had crept quietly to the sap, had destroyed the whole of the double sap, more or less injured about 130 yards of the single sap, and the whole of the demi-parallel, moving away into the pah 3 heavy sap rollers and 40 or 50 gabious, a d before retiring burning some of the latter in the sap, which was the first intimation that the enemy had given of their secret movement. 27th and 28th February, and part of the 1st March, was occupied in making good the damage done to the sap and in constructing a Redoubt (No. 8) 16 yards square, to contain a guard of 80 men. In the afternoon of the 1st March the sap was recommenced in front of No. 8 Redoubt, and continued until the afternoon of the 3rd, when in consequence of a depression in the ground, it became so exposed to a plunging fire from the pah, that it became necessary to suspend it. On this day the only sapper who had been hit during the progress of the sap, was severely wounded in the back. To keep down the fire of the enemy a demi-parallel, to afford cover for marksmen and for a howitzer and a Cohorn mortar, was commenced on the last-mentioned date, on the left of the sap, and 50 yards in front of No. 8 Redoubt, and completed on the 4th, on the morning of which day the sap was proceeded with, and continued with the intermission of one-half of the 6th, and the whole of the 7th and 8th, until the evening of the 11th, though exposed daily to a heavy fire from the enemy, especially on the afternoon of the 5th, when they opened from their whole line, commencing on their extreme left in a bush to the right rear of No. 7 Redoubt, doubtless to draw attention from the sap, into which a sharp fire was subsequently poured from a scrub on the edge of a precipice, about 25 yards to the left of the head of the sap.

Hostilities which had been suspended on the 12th, 13th, and 14th March, were recommenced on the morning of the 15th, and the sap being then in close proximity to a line of rifle pits on the edge of the precipice above alluded to, a demipirallel was commenced by the sap on the left of the main approach, and continued on that and the two following days, when it attained the edge of the precipice at one of the enemy's rifle pits, several of which immediately in front, as far as a bend in the line of the precipice, were thus exposed to view, and were necessarily abandoned by the enemy. At the same time on the 15th and 16th, No. 7 Redoubt was further enlarged to contain a half battery of Armstrong guns and the Artillery men attached; platforms for two 10-inch mortars were laid on the right of the redoubt, and a parapet to cover them, two 8-inch mortars, and one Armstrong gun, thrown up. On the 18th March, the sap was proceeded with and 27 head occasionally only being raised above the

yards of single sap, and 412 yards of double sap, executed in 24 working days of 12 hours each, and bringing the approach to within about 90 yards of Te Arei Pah, when hostilities were again suspended with the view to the commencement of negociations for peace.

Having thus detailed the operations, I would beg to submit that an attack conducted as described was the only one which under the circumstances was likely to be effectual in reducing the enemy to submission. Looking to the difficult nature of the country, the admirable positions taken up by the enemy, their peculiar mode of warfare, their character and disposition, attacks by "vive force" on their positions would not have had any moral effect on them, whilst on the other hand they would probably be elated and their courage raised by the mischief they had done. The enemy themselves unseen in their rifle pits would have an attacking force in full view during their advance, would by a dropping fire have harassed the columns in their approach, and when the troops were sufficiently close would have poured in a deadly volley and slunk with little loss into the bush, scrub, and impracticable swamps and gullies in their rear, leaving nothing but empty rifle pits as a barren conquest gained at considerable loss, and giving the savage enemy, what would be in their eyes a victory, increasing their audacity, and placing a peaceable solution at a greater distance. Position after position might be attacked and taken in this way until the enemy retired into their fastnesses, where it would be destruction to follow them, and from which they would emerge on the retirement of their assailants. The Maoris having their scouts constantly on the watch for every movement of their enemy, would, in anticipation of an attack, according to their customs, inflame their passions and excite their courage to make a determined resistance on the advance of the columns, but when driven out of their position, and having retired to their next line or to their bush and fastnesses, the excitement for the time subsides until they again arouse it to resist farther assaults. But this excitement they cannot sustain, and when a patient though determined advance is made day by day and they are incessanily harassed, they lose heart in proportion as they lose ground and men, their casualties becoming infinitely greater, whilst those of the attacking party are in proportion diminished as they are under cover, they become wearied and depressed, are confounded by a mode of attack so novel and so pertinaciously persisted in, and desirous of peace and rest. I would respectfully submit that the mode of procedure described, adopted by the Major-General, has been the cause of the present cessation of hostilities, and the evident desire for peace evinced by the Waikato Natives, the real principals in the war, as shewn by their rapid retirement from the recent scene of operations.

The sketch does not, and could not, give a precise idea of the difficult nature of the ground and the strength of the positions, especially the last, so admirably selected and occupied by the natives, nor can verbal description give a knowledge of the nature of the defences constructed by them. Their sites are at the best but barely indicated by a narrow line of newly-moved earth carefully spread, not exceeding six inches above the general surface of the ground, whilst for the most part they as well as the defenders are invisible, a

level of the ground to reconnoitre, though the line may be thickly occupied; in the recent case it is presumed by a force at first amounting to nearly 1,200 men.

I would, in conclusion, beg to bring to your notice the officers of Royal Engineers under my Captain Mould, as senior, was the chief executive officer, and I believe I may without partiality declare that to his courage, energy, perseverance, and skill, added to his personal example, even of affording manual labour at the head of the sap, much of the success of the operation, and comparative absence of loss, was owing. Lieut. Warburton afforded me every assistance, and had especial charge of one of the Brigades of Engineers and the accompanying working parties, which he also incited by his example. In consequence of the deficiency of Officers of Royal Engineers the Major-General was pleased, upon my application and with the concurrence of Commodore Seymour, to place Lieut. Battiscombe, R.N., at my disposal as Assistant-Engineer, and that officer gave most valuable and efficient aid, not only in the occasional superintendence of the working parties in the trenches and at the construction of the redoubts, but in superintending the preparation of "materiel" at the Waitara Camp and overlooking other works both of defence and civil buildings.

Colour-Serjeants Porter and Morant, each in their turn in charge of brigades and working parties, were most zealous and effective.

Considering how closely the late Lieut. Macnaghten, Royal Artillery, was connected with the Engineer operations, the advance of which was materially aided by his constant presence at and near the head of the sap effectively working a howitzer and Coehorn mortar, I beg to be permitted to pay a tribute to his memory as a cool, courageous, zealous, and highly-talented officer, and withal most unpretending, one who was warmly regarded and respected by his men, and admired and beloved by the officers of all arms of the service who had the advantage of his acquaintance, and by whom his loss is deeply deplored.

From Captain Mercer, Commanding Royal Artillery, New Zealand.

> Camp, No. 7 Redoubt. March 30, 1861.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to report, for your information, the operations of the Royal Artillery under my command, from the 13th March to the 19th March, 1861. The half battery of Armstrong guns arrived at the Waitera, from Auckland, at 9 a.m. on the 13th March. We commenced disembarking in surf-boats, and by the same afternoon they were ready for service. The guns were taken out of their cases, cleaned and mounted, the ammunition, &c., examined, and the whole was found to be complete and in perfect order. The next day, the 14th, according to your directions I rode with Mr. Parris to select a

favourable position for shelling "Mataitawa," the stronghold of Wiremu Kingi; but the distance of the nearest spot from which it spot from which it could be seen, over the tops of the trees, was beyond the range of the 12-pounder Armstrong gun. Whilst away on this duty Lieutenant Pichard, with Sergeant-Major R. Hayes, had the men drilled and exercised in laying the guns, so as to be satisfied that they had not forgotten what they had learnt in England. The artificers at the same time were busily employed in making poles, &c., for bullock draught. Three poles were completed during the day, thus enabling the guns to start for the front at 6 a.m. the next morning, Friday 15th March. When the half battery arrived at No. 7 Redoubt the white flag was flying on the pah, but about the middle of the day it was hauled down, and the red war flag was hoisted instead, this was immediately followed by volleys from the natives. I was speaking with the late Lieutenant Macnaghten, R. A., at the time in the advance parallel, but returned to No. 7 Redoubt when the Armstrong guns, and 8-inch and 10-inch mortars were opened on the rifle pits of the enemy's position, at distances varying from 820 to 900 yards. The whole position from left to extreme right forms a curve about a mile in extent, and is naturally a strong one, from being situated on the edge of the forest, as well as from the nature of the ground: it consists of the "Te Arei" Pah which is a mass of rifle pits, with a dense bush in the rear for escape; on the right of the pah is a precipice overhanging the River Waitara, and on the left of the pah extends a range of hills commanding the approach to it, having a deep gulley and bush in front of them, and the forest in their rear. The slopes of these hills as well as their steep declivities are full of ingeniously constructed rifle pits; many of these pits are concealed by a stunted growth of bush, so that the presence of our all but invisible enemy is often only known by the puffs of smoke from the rifles or guns, or occasionally a few heads appear above the crest of their line of pits for a moment or so, and then as suddenly disappear; they lie concealed for hours, and now and then by single shots, and sometimes by volleys, they endeavour to do all the mischief they can. I have been particular in describing the position and mode of warfare of these natives, as it appeared to me at the time in order the more fully to explain the method I adopted to use the Armstrong gun with the best effect against them. After a trial shell on each of their positions, and the range having been accurately obtained, the guns were laid just below the crest of the line of their rifle pits, so that the shells when discharged should penetrate some three or four feet of earth, and fixed with the concussion fuse only, should burst inside their pits, when they retired, after delivering their fire. The guns were loaded and laid, the gunners, with lanyard in hand, waited for the word from the officer who was watching until some heads appeared above in that direction, or a puff of smoke revealed their presence, when the gun was instantly fired, and the shell entering just below the crest of the pits burst inside. The natives were in the habit of firing volleys in the morning and evening, whilst our working parties were going to or returning from the head of the sap, on these occasions the Armstrong guns were laid upon the lines of the pits, the shells fixed with time and concussion fuses, and before the working parties marched the gunners were ready waiting for the word, which was given directly the natives opened fire, and the shells almost at the same instant burst amongst them.

Lieutenant Pichard made some excellent shell practice from the Armstrong guns, and also Sergeant-Major R. Hayes. The mortar battery was situated outside, on the right of No. 7 Redoubt, and in order to harass the enemy as much as possible, firing was carried on during the night, at uncertain hours, and the mortars were laid on different positions, so that they could never tell when and where the shell was coming. The practice of the mortars was very good, the shells dropping in their pits both in the pah, and on the hills to the right, burying and destroying everything near them. Captain Strover had command of the mortar battery, the mortars were fired, at intervals, during the whole day, whenever there were any signs of the presence of the natives in their pits. On Saturday an attack was made on the extreme right, and a 9-pounder gun accompanied a detachment of the 40th Regiment, and began by firing some rounds of common case into the bush, and subsequently, on the natives retiring to their rifle pits on the edge of the wood to the right, some shrapnel shells were sent amongst them; some time after the firing ceased on the part of the enemy.

On Sunday afternoon, I deeply regret to say, Lieutenant E. C. Macnaghten, R.A., was killed whilst laying a cohorn mortar in the extremity of the advance parallel, the ball passing through the wrist and entering the chest; he died almost immediately, firing his last shot on the anniversary of his firing the first one in this war; he had ably conducted the firing of the cohorn mortars, since the advance of the sap from No. 8 Redoubt, and had been in every engagement throughout the whole war. We were deprived of his most valuable assistance, and the Service has lost in him a most brave, efficient, and able officer; he was beloved by all.

Sergeant J. Christie, R.A., a first-rate noncommissioned officer, was wounded in the shoulder in the advance parallel, early on Monday morning, whilst I was arranging with him about carrying on the practice. Some time afterwards, observing a "red war flag" hoisted on a hill to the rear of the pah, some 1900 yards distant, and also perceiving some natives working as if they intended to occupy a new position of rifle pits, when they would be obliged to retreat from the pah, the guns were laid, and some Armstrong shells, with time and concussion fuzes were sent amongst them; one of these shells burst at the foot of the flagstaff, when they immediately hauled down "their flag," and it was not hoisted again. This is the only occasion I fairly got a good sight of the enemy. I could see them in relief against the sky on the crest of the hill. I suppose they imagined they were out of range; but when they found the shell dropping amongst them they disappeared, and I saw them no more in that direction. The firing from the Armstrong guns and mortars commenced at 6A.M., and continued whenever a favourable opportunity offered until dusk.

The following evidence has been given concerning the action of the Armstrong shell with the concussion fuze only. Colour-Serjeant J. Morant, R.E. was at the head of the sap, and saw an Armstrong shell go through a rifle-pit, about four feet of earth, and burst inside, and heard the enemy shout as in pain. He also observed that the shell of the Armstrong gun entered the rifle-pits as soon or sooner, than the report was heard, so that the natives had not time to get out of the way. Bombardier J. Linger, No. 3 battalion, 12th

brigade, R.A., was at the head of the sap, and in the advance parallel, working the coehorn mortars, when he saw several shells from the Armstrong guns go through the enemy's rifle-pits and burst inside. After the cessation of hostilities, one of the natives told my sergeant-major that they were sometimes able to get out of the way of the mortar or the large shells, but never out of the way of the shell* from the gun "all the same as rifle,"—meaning the Armstrong gun. As the shell was amongst them as soon as they heard the report, these natives have designated the Armstrong shell "the quick shell."

I found it had been the practice of placing every night in the sap-roller an 8-inch naval shell with a friction-tube fixed through the fuze, and a cord attached to it and passing through a hole in the side of the wooden box, and the end of the cord attached to the sap-roller (this was suggested by the Royal Engineers and carried out at their request by the Naval Brigade), so that if the natives attempted to capture the sap-roller, in rolling it, the shell would explode. In the event of their trying to take the sap-roller, I calculated that, in all probability, the main rifle-pits in front of the pah, about fifty yards from the sap-roller, would be lined with natives watching the operation, or at hand to give help to secure the roller if they required more assistance. The trap of the shell succeeded, the natives endeavouring to capture the roller on Saturday night; the shell exploded, on hearing which I left my tent and sent the Armstrong shell amongst them. The Armstrong guns had been loaded and laid on their pits the last thing before dark every night. I also fired the mortars which had been laid on the pah, the shell bursting with good effect. Notwithstanding the skilfully constructed underground works of these natives, I feel certain that the Armstrong shell has searched them out and done execution,-to what extent, of course, I cannot tell. The natives themselves alone know; I have no means of actually deciding. They are very jealous of our knowing any loss they may sustain. The different statements made both by those who were in the sap, as well as by the natives themselves, corroborate the observations taken from the battery; viz., that the Armstrong shell, with concussion fuze only, entered the crest of the enemy's rifle-pits and burst inside. Whether there are few or many natives in the pits at the time cannot be ascertained. On Monday afternoon, an attack was made on our extreme right in the wood. A 9-pounder gun and a 24-pounder howitzer were taken down towards the wood; the former under Captain Strover, R.A., and the latter under Lieutenant Pichard, R.A. The practice with common and shrapnel shell was with good effect after the natives had been driven from the bush to their rifle-pits by a few rounds of common These pits formed a continuation of cover from the Flagstaff Hill to the edge of the wood. Gunner J. Talford was wounded in the leg. He was one of the men serving the 9-pounder gun. During this attack the Armstrong guns were used against the main rifle-pits just in front of the pah to keep down the fire of the enemy on the head of the sap.

At 4 o'clock on the morning of the 19th March, I left the redoubt with an escort of the guard, and fired the two cast mortars at the pah, and two hours afterwards the white flag was flying from it. There can be no doubt of the superiority of the

THE following despatches have been received by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty from Commodore Seymour, C.B., the Senior Officer of Her Majesty's ships and vessels on the Australian station:

> Pelorus, Auckland. April 2, 1861.

THE Naval Brigade under my command having this day returned to the "Pelorus," I beg to lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty a statement of the services rendered by Lieut. A. H. W. Battiscombe, Senior Lieutenant of this ship, prior and subsequent to his joining Her Majesty's ship bearing my broad pendant, and I most carnesily hope that their Lordships will deem them sufficient to entire him to his promotion. His conduct on all occasions has been most gallant and meritorious, particularly at the disastrous affair near Puketakanere on the 27th of June, 1860, (when, after I was wounded, he succeeded to the command of the seamen and marines), at Kahihi in October, 1860, and during the operations in the Valley of the Waitara, between the 29th December, 1860 and the 19th March, 1861. His name was brought forward in the general order issued by General Pratt, C.B., on that officer resigning the command to Lient-General Cameron, C.B., and his qualifications as an Engineer recognized by Colonel Mould, Commanding Royal Engineers, in his report.

Before concluding this letter I wish also to recommend to their Lordships' favourable notice the Assistant-Surgeon of this ship, Mr. Robert Edwardes, who had medical charge of the Naval Brigade from the time of its landing to its re-embarkation.

He attended the wounded with the advanced skirmishers, under a heavy fire, on the 27th June, and his unremitting attention at all times, both in the field and in quarters, attracted the particular attention both of myself and of Mr. Mouat, C.B.,

Extract from a despatch of Commodore Beauchamp Seymour, dated H.M.S. Pelorus, Auckland, New Zealand, 6th April, 1861, addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty.

"ON the afternoon of the 1st instant, the Naval Brigade embarked on board the "Niger." We reached the "Pelorus" on the afternoon of the 2nd instant; and it will be my duty to lay before their Lordships, in a separate communication, a statement of the services rendered by various officers of the Brigade during the last eleven The conduct of all has been most exemplary, and I have much pleasure in stating that that of the seamen and marines, as a body, has been remarkably good: of course there were exceptions, but they were comparatively few in number, and the good example set by the petty officers, especially by John Gibson, gunner's mate, Thomas Avent, supernumerary captain of the afterguard, and James Veale, boatswain's mate, had a beneficial effect on all.

"I should feel deeply gratified were their Lordships pleased to permit me to express their approval of these men's conduct; and also I beg to bring to their notice the names of John P. Fisher, captain of the maintop, seaman gunner (who has lost a leg in action, and will be sent to England by the carliest opportunity after he is in a fit state to be moved), and of James Costelle, coxswain of the launch, seaman gunner, who were the captains of the 8-inch guns in the advanced redoubts, and who invariably conducted themselves very much to my satisfaction."

TREATY of Commerce and Navigation between Her Majesty and the Sultan.

Signed at Kanlidja, April 29, 1861.

[Ratifications exchanged at Constantinople, July 9, 1861.]

TER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on the one part, and His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, on the other part, being equally animated by the desire of extending the commercial relations between their respective dominions, have agreed, for this purpose, to conclude a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, and have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Sir Henry Lytton Bulwer, a Member of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, and Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Sublime Porte;

And His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, His Highness Mehemed Emin Aali Pasha, President of the Council of the Tanzimat, and Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs, decorated with the Orders of the Medjidie and Merit of the First Class, Grand Cross of the Imperial Order of the Legion of Honour, of Saint Stephen of Austria, of the Red Eagle of Prussia, of Saint Alexander Newsky of Russia, and several other Foreign Orders;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE L

All rights, privileges, and immunities which have been conferred on the subjects or ships of Great Britain by the existing Capitulations and Treaties, are confirmed now and for ever, with the exception of those clauses of the said Capitulations which it is the object of the present Treaty to modify; and it is moreover expressly stipulated, that all rights, privileges, or immunities which the Sublime Porte now grants or may hereafter grant to, or suffer to be enjoyed by, the subjects, ships, commerce, or navigation of any other foreign Power, shall be equally granted to, and exercised and enjoyed by, the subjects, ships, commerce, and navigation of Great Britain.

ARTICLE II.

The subjects of Her Britannic Majesty, or their agents, shall be permitted to purchase, at all places in the Ottoman dominions and possessions (whether for the purposes of internal trade or of exportation) all articles, without any exception whatsoever, the produce or manufacture of the said dominions and possessions; and the Sublime Porte having, in virtue of the Second Article of the Convention of Commerce of the 16th of August, 1838, formally engaged to abolish all monopolies of agricultural produce or of any other articles whatsoever, as well as all permits (teskérés) from the local Governors, either for the purchase of any article, or for its removal from one place to another, when purchased, any attempt to compel the subjects of Her Britannic Majesty to receive such permits from the local Governors shall be considered as an infraction of Treaties, and the

Lesquels, après s'être communiqué leurs pleins pouvoirs respectifs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, sont convenus des Articles suivants:—

ARTICLE 1.

ARTICLE II.

Sublime Porte shall immediately punish with severity any Viziers or other officers who shall have been guilty of such misconduct, and shall render full justice to British subjects for all injuries or losses which they may duly prove themselves to have suffered thereby.

ARTICLE III.

If any article of Turkish produce or manufacture be purchased by British merchants or their agents, for the purpose of selling the same for internal consumption in Turkey, the said British merchants or their agents shall pay, at the purchase and sale of such articles, and in any manner of trade therein, the same duties that are paid in similar circumstances by the most favoured class of Ottoman subjects, or of foreigners engaged in the internal trade of Turkey.

ARTICLE IV.

No other or higher duties or charges shall be imposed in the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, on the exportation of any article to the dominions and possessions of the other, than such as are or may be payable on the exportation of the like article to any other foreign country; nor shall any prohibition be imposed on the exportation of any article from the dominions and possessions of either of the two Contracting Parties to the dominions and possessions of the other, which shall not equally extend to the exportation of the like article to any other country.

No charge or duty whatsoever will be demanded on any article of Turkish produce or manufacture purchased by British subjects or their agents, either at the place where such article is purchased, or in its transit from that place to the place whence it is exported, at which it will be subject to an export duty not exceeding eight per cent. calculated on the value at the place of shipment, and payable on exportation; and all articles which shall once have paid this duty shall not again be liable to the same duty, however they may have changed hands, within any part of the Ottoman dominions.

It is furthermore agreed that the duty of eight per cent. above mentioned will be annually reduced by one (1) per cent., until it shall be in this manner finally reduced to a fixed duty of one (1) per cent. ad valorem, destined to cover the general expenses of administration and control.

ARTICLE V.

No other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, from whatever place arriving, whether by sea or by land, and no other or higher duties shall be imposed on the importation into the dominions and possessions of His Imperial Majesty, of any article the produce or manufacture of Her Britannic Majesty's dominions and possessions, from whatever place arriving, than are or may be payable on the like article the produce or manufacture of any other foreign country; nor shall any prohibition be maintained or imposed on the importation of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties into the dominions and pospermis sera considérée comme une infraction aux Traités, et la Sublime Porte punira immédiatement avec sévérité tout Vizir ou autre fonctionnaire qui se sera rendu coupable de cette infraction, et rendra pleine justice aux sujets de la Grande Bretagne pour tout préjudice ou toute perte qu'ils pourront dûment prouver avoir subi pour cette cause.

His Imperial Majesty further engages that, save as hereinafter excepted, he will not prohibit the importation into his dominions and possessions of any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, from whatever place arriving; and that the duties to be imposed on any article the produce or manufacture of the dominions or possessions of Her Britannic Majesty imported into the dominions or possessions of His Imperial Majesty, shall in no case exceed one fixed rate of eight (8) per cent. ad valorem, or a specific duty, fixed by common assent, equivalent thereto.

Such rate shall be calculated upon the value of such articles at the wharf, and shall be payable at the time of their being landed, if brought by sea, or at the first Custom-house they may reach,

if brought by land.

If these articles, after having paid the import duty of eight (8) per cent., are sold either at the place of their arrival or in the interior of the country, neither the buyer nor the seller shall be charged with any further duty in respect to them; and if such articles should not be sold for consumption in Turkey, but should be re-exported within the space of six months, the same shall be considered as merchandize in transit by land, and be treated as is stated in Article XII; the Administration of the Customs being bound to restore at the time of their re-exportation to the merchant, who shall be required to furnish proof that the goods in question have paid the import duty of eight (8) per cent., the difference between that duty and the duty levied on goods in transit by land, as set forth in the Article above cited.

ARTICLE VI.

It is understood that any article, the produce or manufacture of a foreign country, intended for importation into the United Principalities of Moldo-Wallachia, or into the Principality of Servia, which shall pass through any other part of the Ottoman dominions, will not be liable to the payment of Customs duty until it reaches those Principalities; and, on the other hand, that any article of foreign produce or manufacture passing through those Principalities, but destined for some other part of the Ottoman dominions, will not be liable to the payment of Customs duty until such article reaches the first Custom-house under the direct administration of the Sublime Porte.

The same course shall be followed with respect to any article the produce or manufacture of those Principalities, as well as with respect to any article the produce or manufacture of any other portion of the Ottoman dominions, intended for exportation: such articles will be liable to the payment of Customs duties, the former to the Custom-house of the aforesaid Principalities, and the latter to the Ottoman Custom-house, the object being, that neither import nor export duties shall in any case be payable more than once.

ARTICLE VII.

The subjects of one of the Contracting Parties shall enjoy, in the dominions and possessions of the other, equality of treatment with native subjects in regard to warehousing, and also in regard to bounties, facilities, and drawbacks.

Sa Majesté Impériale s'engage en outre, sauf les exceptions ci-après, à ne pas prohiber l'importation dans ses états et possessions d'aucun article produit du sol ou de l'industrie des états ou possessions de Sa Majesté Britannique, de quelque lieu qu'il arrive; et à ce que les droits à percevoir sur les produits du sol ou de l'industrie des états et possessions de Sa Majesté Britannique importés dans les états et possessions de Sa Majesté Impériale n'excèdent en aucun cas un taux fixe de 8 pour cent (ad valorem), ou une tarification équivalente fixée de commun accord.

Ce taux sera calculé sur la valeur des articles à l'échelle, et payable au moment de leur débarquement s'ils arrivent par mer, ou à la première Douane, s'ils arrivent par terre.

Si ces articles, après avoir payé de droit d'importation de huit (8) pour cent, sont vendus, soit au lieu où ils arrivent, soit dans l'intérieur du pays, ni l'acheteur ni le vendeur ne pourront être ensuite soumis à aucun autre droit relativement à ces objets; et si ces articles ne doivent pas être vendus pour la consommation en Turquie, mais qu'ils doivent être exportés de nouveau dans le délai de six mois, ils seront considérés comme marchandises de transit par terre et traités comme il est dit dans Article XII; l'administration des Douanes étant alors tenue de restituer au moment de leur réexportation, au négociant (qui sera requis de fournir la preuve que le droit d'importation de huit (8) pour cent a été acquitté), la différence entre ce droit et le droit de transit spécifié dans l'Article précité.

ARTICLE VI.

Il est'entendu que les articles d'importation étrangère destinés aux Principautés Unies de Moldo-Valachie et à celle de Servie, et traversant les autres parties de l'Empire Ottoman, n'acquitteront les droits de douane qu'à leur arrivée dans ces Principautés; et réciproquement, que les marchandises d'importation étrangère traversant ces Principautés pour se rendre dans les autres parties de l'Empire Ottoman, ne devront acquitter les droits de douane qu'au premier bureau des douanes administrées directement par la Sublime Porte.

Il en sera de même pour les produits du sol ou de l'industrie de ces Principautés, aussi bien que pour ceux du reste de l'Empire Ottoman, destinés à l'exportation dans les pays étrangers, qui devront payer les droits de douane les premiers entre les mains de l'administration douanière de ces Principautés, et les derniers au fisc Ottoman, de telle sorte que les droits d'importation et d'exportation ne pourront en tous les cas être perçus qu'une fois.

ARTICLE VII.

Les sujets de chacune des Parties Contractantes seront traités dans les états et possessions de l'autre sur le même pied que les sujets indigènes, relativement aux droits d'emmagasinage, ainsi qu'à l'égard des primes, facilités, et remboursement de droits.

ARTICLE VIII.

All articles which are or may be legally importable into the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, in British vessels, may likewise be imported in Ottoman vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges, of whatever denomination, than if such articles were imported in British vessels; and reciprocally, all articles which are or may be legally importable into the dominions and possessions of His Imperial Majesty the Sultan in Ottoman vessels, may likewise be imported in British vessels, without being liable to any other or higher duties or charges, of whatever denomination, than if such articles were imported in Ottoman vessels. Such reciprocal equality of treatment shall take effect without distinction, whether such articles come directly from the place of origin or from any other country.

In the same manner, there shall be perfect equality of treatment in regard to exportation, so that the same export duties shall be paid, and the same bounties and drawbacks allowed, in the dominions and possessions of either of the Contracting Parties, on the exportation of any article which is or may be legally exportable therefrom, whether such exportation shall take place in Ottoman or in British vessels, and whatever may be the place of destination, whether a port of either of the Contracting Parties or of any third Power.

ARTICLE IX.

No duties of tonnage, harbour, pilotage, lighthouse, quarantine, or other similar or corresponding duties, of whatever nature, or under whatever denomination, levied in the name or for the profit of Government, public functionaries, private individuals, corporations, or establishments of any kind, shall be imposed in the ports of the dominions and possessions of either country upon the vessels of the other country, which shall not equally and under the same conditions be imposed in the like cases on national vessels in general. Such equality of treatment shall apply reciprocally to the respective vessels, from whatever port or place they may arrive, and whatever may be their place of destination.

ARTICLE X.

All vessels which according to British law are to be deemed British vessels, and all vessels which according to Ottoman law are to be deemed Ottoman vessels, shall, for the purposes of this Treaty, be deemed British and Ottoman vessels respectively.

ARTICLE XI.

No charge whatsoever shall be made upon British goods being the produce or manufacture of the British dominions or possessions, whether in British or other ships, nor upon any goods the produce or manufacture of any other foreign country carried in British ships, when the same shall pass through the Straits of the Dardanelles or of the Bosphorus, whether such goods shall pass through those Straits in the ships that brought them, or shall have been transshipped to other vessels; or whether, after having been sold for exportation, they shall, for a certain limited time, be landed in order to be placed in other vessels for the continuance of their voyage.

ARTICLE VIIL

Tout article étant ou pouvant être légalement importable dans les états et possessions de Sa Majesté Britannique sur des bâtiments Anglais, peut de même être importé sur des bâtiments Turcs, sans être soumis à aucun droit ni charge (quelle qu'en soit la dénomination) autre ou plus élevé que si cet article était importé sur un bâtiment Anglais; et réciproquement, tout article étant ou pouvant être légalement importable dans les états et possessions de Sa Majesté Impériale le Sultan sur des bâtiments Turcs, pourra de même être importé sur des bâtiments Anglais, sans être soumis à aucun droit ou charge (quelle qu'en soit la dénomination) autre ou plus élevé que s'il était importé sur des bâtiments Turcs. Cette mesure réciproque sera appliquée également et sans distinction, soit aux articles arrivant directement du lieu de leur origine, soit à ceux arrivant de tout autre pays étranger.

De même, il y aura parfaite réciprocité en ce qui concerne l'exportation. Ainsi les mêmes droits d'exportation seront payés, et les mêmes primes et les mêmes remboursements de droits seront accordés, dans les états et possessions de l'une ou l'autre des Parties Contractantes, sur l'exportation d'un article quelconque qui est ou pourra être légalement susceptible d'en être exporté, soit que l'exportation ait lieu sur un bâtiment Ottoman ou Anglais, soit que le lieu de destination se trouve être un port de l'une des Parties Contractantes ou d'une Puissance tierce quelconque.

ARTICLE IX.

Aucun droit de tonnage, de port, de pilotage, phare, quarantaine, ou autres semblables ou analogues (quelle qu'en soit la nature ou la dénomination) levé au nom ou au profit du Gouvernement, de fonctionnaires publics, de particuliers, de corporations ou d'établissement d'aucune sorte, ne sera imposé dans les ports des états et possessions de l'un des deux pays sur les navires de l'autre dans des conditions différentes de celles relatives à tout bâtiment national en général se trouvant dans le même cas. Cette réciprocité s'appliquera aux bâtiments respectifs des deux Puissances, de quelque port ou endroit qu'ils viennent, et quelque soit le lieu de leur destination.

ARTICLE X.

Tout bâtiment considéré comme Anglais par la loi Britannique, et tout bâtiment considéré comme Turc par la loi Ottomane, sera, pour ce qui concerne ce Traité, considéré respectivement comme bâtiment Anglais ou bâtiment Turc.

ARTICLE XI.

Aucun droit quelconque ne sera prélevé sur les marchandises, produits du sol ou de l'industrie de la Grande Bretagne et de ses possessions, soit qu'elles arrivent sur des bâtiments Anglais ou d'autres, ni sur les marchandises provenant des produits du sol et de l'industrie de tout autre pays étranger, chargées sur des bâtiments Anglais, quand ces marchandises passeront les Détroits des Dardanelles et du Bosphore, soit qu'elles traversent ces Détroits sur les bâtiments qui les ont apportées, ou qu'elles aient été transbordées sur d'autres bâtiments, ou que, vendues pour l'exportation, elles soient débarquées pour un temps limité, pour être mises à bord d'autres bâtiments et continuer leur voyage.

In the latter case the goods in question shall be deposited at Constantinople in the magazines of the Custom-house, called *Transit* magazines; and in any other places where there is no *entrepôt*, they shall be placed under the charge of the Administration of the Customs.

ARTICLE XII.

The Sublime Porte desiring to grant by means of gradual concessions all facilities in its power to transit by land, it is stipulated and agreed that the duty of three (3) per cent. levied up to this time on articles imported into Turkey, in their passage through Turkey to other countries, shall be reduced to two (2) per cent. payable, as the duty of three per cent. has been paid hitherto, on arriving in the Ottoman dominions; and at the end of eight years, to be reckoned from the day of the exchange of the ratifications of the present Treaty, to a fixed and definite tax of one (1) per cent., which shall be levied, as is to be the case with respect to Turkish produce exported, to defray the expense of registration.

The Sublime Porte at the same time declares that it reserves to itself the right to establish, by a special enactment, the measures to be adopted for the prevention of fraud.

ARTICLE XIII.

Her Britannic Majesty's subjects, or their agents, trading in goods the produce or manufacture of foreign countries, shall be subject to the same taxes, and enjoy the same rights, privileges, and immunities as foreign subjects dealing in goods, the produce or manufacture of their own country.

ARTICLE XIV.

An exception to the stipulations laid down in the Vth Article shall be made in regard to tobacco, in any shape whatsoever, and also in regard to salt, which two articles shall cease to be included among those which the subjects of Her Britannic Majesty are permitted to import into the Ottoman dominions

British subjects, however, or their agents, buying or selling tobacco or salt for consumption in Turkey, shall be subject to the same regulations, and shall pay the same duties, as the most favoured Ottoman subjects trading in the two articles aforesaid; and furthermore, as a compensation for the prohibition of the two articles above-mentioned, no duty whatsoever shall in future be levied on those articles when exported from Turkey by the subjects of Her Britannic Majesty.

British subjects shall, nevertheless, be bound to declare the quantity of tobacco and salt thus exported, to the proper Custom-house authorities, who shall, as heretofore, have the right to watch over the export of these articles, without thereby being entitled to levy any tax thereon on any pretence whatsoever.

ARTICLE XV.

It is understood between the two High Contracting Parties, that the Sublime Porte reserves to itself the faculty and right of issuing a general prohibition against the importation into the Ottoman dominions of gunpowder, cannon, arms of war, or military stores; but such prohibition will not come into operation until it shall have been officially notified, and will apply only to the articles mentioned in the decree enacting the prohibition. Any of these articles which have not been so specifically prohibited, shall, on being

ARTICLE XII.

La Sublime Porte désirant accorder, au moyen de concessions graduelles, toutes les facilités en son pouvoir au transit par terre, il a été stipulé et convenu que le droit de trois (3) pour cent prélevé jusqu'à ce jour sur les marchandises importées en Turquie pour en être expédiées dans d'autres pays, sera réduit à deux (2) pour cent payable (comme le droit de trois (3) pour cent a été payé jusqu'ici) à leur arrivée dans les états Ottomans, et au bout de huit ans, à compter du jour où les ratifications du présent Traité auront été échangées, à une taxe fixe et définie d'un (1) pour cent, qui sera prélevée (comme ce sera également le cas pour l'exportation des produits Turcs) pour couvrir les frais d'enregistrement.

ARTICLE XIII.

Les sujets de Sa Majesté Britannique ou leurs ayant-cause, se livrant dans l'Empire Ottoman au commerce des articles, produits du sol ou de l'industrie de pays étrangers, acquitteront les mêmes taxes et jouiront des mêmes droits, privilèges, et immunités que les sujets étrangers trafiquant des marchandises provenant des produits du sol ou de l'industrie de leur propre pays.

ARTICLE XIV.

Par exception aux stipulations de l'Article V, le tabac, sous toutes ses formes, et le sel, cessent d'être compris au nombre des articles que les sujets de Sa Majesté Britannique ont la faculté d'importer dans l'Empire Ottoman; cependant les sujets de la Grande Bretagne ou leurs ayantcause, qui achèteront ou vendront du tabac ou du sel pour la consommation de la Turquie, seront soumis aux mêmes réglements et paieront les mêmes droits que les sujets Ottomans les plus favorisés parmi ceux qui se livreront au commerce de ces deux articles; et en outre, comme compensation de cette prohibition des deux articles susmentionnés, aucun droit ne sera perçu à l'avenir sur ces articles, quand ils seront exportés de la Turquie par des sujets de Sa Majesté Britannique.

Les sujets Britanniques seront néanmoins tenus de déclarer aux autorités de la douane la quantité de tabac et de sel exportée, et les dites autorités conserveront, comme par le passé, le droit de surveiller l'exportation de ces articles, sans pouvoir pour cela être autorisées à les frapper d'aucune taxe sous un prétexte quelconque.

ARTICLE XV.

Il est entendu entre les deux Hautes Parties Contractantes, que la Sublime Porte se réserve la faculté et le droit de frapper d'une prohibition générale l'importation de la poudre, des canons, armes de guerre, ou munitions militaires, dans les états de l'Empire Ottoman.

Cette prohibition ne pourra être en vigueur qu'autant qu'elle sera officiellement notifiée, et ne pourra s'étendre que sur les articles spécifiés dans le décret qui les interdit. Celui de ces articles qui ne sera pas ainsi prohibé, sera assujetti à son imported into the Ottoman dominions, be subject to the local regulations, unless Her Britannic Majesty's Embassy shall think fit to apply for a special license, which license will in that case be granted, provided no valid objection thereto can be alleged.

Gunpowder, in particular, when allowed to be imported, will be liable to the following stipula-

tions:

1st. It shall not be sold by subjects of Her Britannic Majesty in quantities exceeding the quantities prescribed by the local regulations.

quantities prescribed by the local regulations.

2ndly. When a cargo or a large quantity of gunpowder arrives in an Ottoman port on board a British vessel, such vessel shall be anchored at a particular spot to be designated by the local authorities, and the gunpowder shall thence be conveyed, under the inspection of such authorities, to depôts or fitting places designated by the Government, to which the parties interested shall have access under due regulations.

Fowling-pieces, pistols, and ornamental or fancy weapons, as also small quantities of gunpowder for sporting, reserved for private use, shall not be subject to the stipulations of the present Article.

ARTICLE XVI.

The firmans required for British merchantvessels, on passing through the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus, shall always be delivered in such manner as to occasion to such vessels the least possible delay.

ARTICLE XVIL

The captains of British merchant-vessels, with goods on board destined for the Ottoman Empire, shall be obliged, immediately on their arrival at the port to which they are bound, to deposit in the Custom-house of the said port a true copy of their manifest.

ARTICLE XVIII.

Contraband goods will be liable to confiscation by the Ottoman Treasury; but a report or procesverbal of the alleged act of contraband must, as soon as the said goods are seized by the authorities, be drawn up and communicated to the Consular authority of the foreign subject to whom the goods said to be contraband shall belong; and no goods can be confiscated as contraband, unless the fraud with regard to them shall be duly and legally proved.

ARTICLE XIX.

All merchandize, the produce or manufacture of the Ottoman dominions and possessions, imported into the dominions and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, shall be treated in the same manner as the like merchandize the produce or manufacture of the most favoured nation.

All rights, privileges, or immunities which are now or may hereafter be granted to, or suffered to be enjoyed by, the subjects, ships, commerce, or navigation of any foreign Power in the British dominions or possessions, shall be equally granted to, and exercised and enjoyed by, the subjects, ships, commerce, and navigation of the Ottoman Porte.

ARTICLE XX.

The present Treaty, when ratified, shall be substituted for the Convention concluded between the two High Contracting Parties on the 16th of August, 1838, and shall remain in force for

La poudre en particulier, si son introduction est permise, sera assujettie aux obligations suivantes:

ARTICLE XVI.

Les firmans exigés des bâtiments marchands Britanniques à leur passage par les Dardanelles et le Bosphore, leur seront toujours délivrés de manière à leur occasionner le moins de retard possible.

ARTICLE XVII.

Les capitaines des bâtiments de commerce Britanniques ayant à bord des marchandises à destination de l'Empire Ottoman, seront tenus, immédiatement après leur arrivée au port de destination, de déposer à la Douane une copie exacte de leur manifeste.

ARTICLE XVIII.

Les marchandises introduites en contrebande seront passibles de confiscation au profit du Trésor Ottoman; mais un rapport ou procèsverbal du fait de contrebande allégué devra, aussitôt que les marchandises seront saisies par les autorités, être dressé et communiqué à l'autorité Consulaire du sujet étranger auquel appartiendraient les objets réputés de contrebande; et aucune marchandise ne pourra être confisquée comme contrebande, tant que la fraude n'aura pas été dûment et légalement prouvée.

ARTICLE XIX.

Toute marchandise, produit du sol ou de l'industrie Ottomane, soit de l'Empire soit de ses dépendances, importée dans les états et possessions de Sa Majesté Britannique, sera traitée sur le même pied que la même marchandise produit du sol ou de l'industrie de la nation la plus favorisée.

Tous les droits, privilèges, ou immunités accordés maintenant ou pouvant être accordés plus tard aux sujets, bâtiments, commerce, ou navigation de toute Puissance étrangère dans les états ou les possessions de la Grande Bretagne, ou dont la jouissance pourra y être tolérée, seront également accordés aux sujets, bâtiments, commerce, et navigation de la Porte Ottomane, et l'exercice et la jouissance leur en seront laissés.

ARTICLE XX.

Le présent Traité une fois ratifié, sera substitué à la Convention conclue entre les deux Hautes Parties Contractantes le 16 Août, 1838, et il sera en vigueur pour vingt-huit ans à partir du jour twenty-eight years from the day of the exchange of the ratifications; each of the High Contracting Parties being, however, at liberty to give to the other, at the end of fourteen years (that time being fixed, as the provisions of this Treaty will then have come into full force), notice for its revision, or for its determination at the expiration of a year from the date of that notice, and so again at the end of twenty-one years.

The present Treaty shall receive its execution in all and every one of the provinces of the Ottoman Empire, that is to say, in all the possessions of His Imperial Majesty the Sultan situated in Europe or in Asia, in Egypt and in the other parts of Africa belonging to the Sublime Porte, in Servia, and in the United Principalities of

Moldavia and Wallachia.

The Sublime Porte declares that she is ready to grant to other foreign Powers who may seek to obtain them, the commercial advantages contained in the stipulations of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XXI.

It is always understood that Her Britannic Majesty does not pretend, by any Article in the present Treaty, to stipulate for more than the plain and fair construction of the terms employed, nor to preclude in any manner the Ottoman Government from the exercise of its rights of internal administration, where the exercise of those rights does not evidently infringe upon the privileges accorded by ancient Treaties, or by the present Treaty, to British subjects or British merchandize.

ARTICLE XXII.

The High Contracting Parties have agreed to appoint, jointly, Commissioners for the settlement of a Tariff of Custom-house duties, to be levied in conformity with the stipulations of the present Treaty, as well upon merchandize of every description being the produce or manufacture of the British dominions and possessions imported into the Sultan's dominions and possessions, as upon articles of every description the produce or manufacture of the dominions and possessions of the Sultan, which British subjects or their agents are free to purchase in any part of the Ottoman dominions and possessions for exportation to Great Britain or to any other country.

The new Tariff to be so concluded shall remain in force during seven years, dating from the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixtyone.

Each of the Contracting Parties shall have the right, a year before the expiration of that term, to demand the revision of the Tariff. But if, during the seventh year, neither the one nor the other of the Contracting Parties shall avail itself of this right, the Tariff then existing shall continue to have the force of law for seven more years, dating from the day of the expiration of the seven preceding years; and the same shall be the case with respect to every successive period of seven years.

ARTICLE XXIII.

The present Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Constantinople in two calendar months, or sooner if possible, and shall be carried into execution from the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixtyone.

Done at Kanlidja, on the twenty-ninth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

ARTICLE XXII.

And whereas the Justices of the county of Somerset in quarter sessions assembled on the second day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the western division of the said county of Somerset is insufficient, and praying that Dulverton may be a polling place for the said division, within which such place is situate;

"That all ships navigating in ballast from any port or place in the United Kingdom, to any other port or place in the United Kingdom shall, when not carrying passengers, be exempt from compulsory pilotage within the pilotage jurisdiction of the said Trinity House."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said bye-law into consideration is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act to declare Her consent to the same, and the said bye-law is hereby approved accordingly.

thereunder or thereupon, and all mineral and wayleave rights in, over, or under the same,) now belong to the said Bishop and his successors in the said See; the lands, tenements, and hereditaments so specified in the said two parts of the Schedule aforesaid, being in the opinion of our Estates Committee, convenient to be held as the endowment of the See, and calculated to secure to the holder thereof, as nearly as may be (after deducting costs of management), a net annual income of eight thousand pounds per annum, and no more; and that such assignment of lands and hereditaments as is hereinafter recommended and proposed, should be made so that all the lands and hereditaments not so assigned, which now form part of the endowment of the said See, may thereupon become vested in us, and applicable to the purposes of our common fund.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Henry Montagu, Bishop of Durham, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, we humbly recommend and propose that, upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the two parts of the Schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all the right, title, estate, and interest therein (save and except, and always reserved unto us, our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns, all and singular, the mines, quarries, and bedsof coal, stone, clay, sand, minerals, and metalliferous substances of all descriptions therein or thereunder, with full and exclusive authority to sink, win, work, get up, and carry away the same, in, under, out of, and from, the said lands, hereditaments, and premises, or any other lands, hereditaments, and premises, according to the course and practice at present, or hereafter to be used or adopted in the county of Durham, or according to the most approved mode which may, from time to time, be used or invented. and to enter upon, take, use, and occupy, from time to time, and for such time, and in such manner as we, our successors, lessees, tenants, and assigns shall think fit, so much of the said lands, hereditaments, and premises, as we shall deem necessary, proper, or convenient, for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, making full compensation for any injury thereby occasioned, and save and except, and always reserved, full and exclusive authority for us, our successors, lessees, tenants, and assigns, or persons acting under our authority, and whether in reference or respect to lands held by or under us, or any other property, to make, grant, and use, any way or ways, upon, across, under, or through the said lands, hereditaments, and premises, for the purposes aforesaid) together with all tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, arising thereout or charged thereupon, and the benefit of the perpetual land tax (if any) charged upon the same premises, shall be assigned as the endowment of the Bishopric of Durham, and shall, as from and after the thirtieth day of June next, become and be absolutely vested in the said Bishop in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the same See.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act, or of

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, four, and seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, sections two, three, four, and seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for assigning certain lands and hereditaments as the endowment of the See of York.

"Whereas the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of York, succeeded to the See of York on an avoidance which happened before the passing of the hereinbefore-mentioned Act, and is in receipt of the annual amount named by Act of Parliament as the income of the Archbishops of York, videlicet, ten thousand pounds per annum; and the said Charles Thomas, Archbishop of York, has signified to us his willingness to accept, as the endowment for his see, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly described in the two parts of the schedule hereto annexed, whereof those portions which are specified in the first part of the schedule are vested in us, and the portions specified in the second part of the same schedule now belong to the said archbishop and his successors in the said See; the lands, tenements, and hereditaments so specified in the said two parts of the schedule aforesaid, being in the opinion of our Estates Committee convenient to be held as the endowment of the see, and calculated to secure to the holder thereof, as nearly as may be (after deducting costs of management) a net annual income of ten thousand pounds, and no more; and that such assignment of lands and hereditaments as is hereinafter recommended and proposed should be made so that all the lands and hereditaments not so assigned, which now form part of the endowment of the said See, may thereupon become vested in us, and applicable to the purposes of our Common Fund.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Thomas, Archbishop of York (testified by his having signed this scheme, and sealed the same with his archiepiscopal seal), we humbly recommend and propose, that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of yonr Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the two parts of the schedule hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, and all the right, title, estate and interest therein (save and except and always reserved unto us, our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns, all and singular the mines, quarries, and beds of coal, stone, clay, sand, minerals, and metalliferous substances of all descriptions therein or thereunder, with full and exclusive authority to sink, win, work, get up, and carry away the same, in, under, out of, and from the said lands, hereditaments and premises, or any other lands, hereditaments, and premises according to the course and practice at present or hereafter to be used or adopted, in the county of York, or according to the most approved mode which may from time to time be used or invented, and to enter upon, take, use, and occupy from time to time, and for such time and in such manner, as we, our successors, lessees, tenants, and assigns shall think fit, so much of the said lands, hereditaments, and premises as we shall deem necessary, proper, or convenient for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, making full compensation for any injury thereby occasioned; and save and except and always reserved full and exclusive authority for us, our successors, lessees, tenants. and assigns, or persons acting under our authority, and whether in reference or respect to lands held by or under us or any other property, to make, grant, and use any way or ways upon, across, under, or through the said lands, hereditaments, and premises for the purposes aforesaid), together with all tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising thereout or charged thereupon, and the benefit of the perpetual land-tax (if any) charged upon the same premises shall be assigned as the endowment of the Archbishoprick of York, and shall, as from the thirtieth day of June instant, become and be absolutely vested in the said Archbishop, in as full and ample a manner as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the same

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the

thirteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making certain alterations in the apportionment of episcopal patronage.

"Whereas by the above-mentioned Act it is provided that by the authority therein specified (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and duly gazetted), such alterations in the exercise of ecclesiastical patronage among the several Archbishops and Bishops of England and Wales shall be made as shall be consistent with the relative magnitude and importance of their dioceses, when newly arranged, but that no such alteration of the patronage of benefices with cure of souls belonging to any See, the Bishop of which was in possession on the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty six, should take effect until the avoidance of such See without the consent of such Bishop.

"And whereas all the Bishops affected by this scheme have succeeded to their Sees upon avoidances thereof, which happened subsequently to the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that such alterations be made in the exercise of the patronage of the several benefices and churches among the several Bishops hereinafter mentioned, as are hereinafter particularly set forth and specified; that is to say:

"The patronage of the several benefices comprised in the Table I, hereinafter set forth, and which said patronage is now vested in the Bishop of Saint Asaph, shall be transferred unto, and henceforth be and remain vested in, the Bishop of Llandaff and his successors.

and figures following; that is to say:

"Wc, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate at Winterbourn Down, in the parish of Winterbourn, in the county of Gloucester and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas, at certain extremities of the said parish of Winterbourn and of the parish of Saint John the Baptist, Frenchay, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of Winterbourn and Saint John the Baptist, Frenchay, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate at Winterbourn Down aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), and of the president and scholars of Saint John Baptist College, in the University of Oxford, the patrons of the rectories of the said parishes of Winterbourn and Saint ward along the middle of the last-mentioned road,
