**T**HE Remains of Her late Royal Highness The Duchess of Kent were this day removed from the entrance of the Royal Vault in Saint George's Chapel, Windsor, in which they had been temporarily placed after the Funeral of Her late Royal Highness on Monday the 25th of March last, and were deposited in the Mausoleum prepared for their reception in the grounds at Frogmore.

The Lord James Murray, Equerry to Her late Royal Highness and Groom in Waiting to The Queen, The Honourable and Very Reverend The Dean of Windsor, Resident Chaplain to Her Majesty, and The Honourable Spencer Ponsonby, Comptroller in the Lord Chamberlain's Department, were present on the occasion.

THE following Address of Condolence to the Queen, on the occasion of the death of Her late Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Cornwall Lewis, Bart., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for presentation, has been presented accordingly to Her Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously :

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Association of the Nonsubscribing Presbyterians of Ireland, assembled at our Annual Meeting, most humbly beg leave to tender to your Majesty the expression of our heartfelt sympathy and condolence with your Majesty, under the affliction occasioned by the demise of your Majesty's illustrious Mother, Her late Royal Highness the Duchess of Kent.

The christian graces which, in every part of her varied history, Her Royal Highness was enabled to manifest, endeared her to all ranks and classes of your Majesty's subjects, and will long live in their memories. From your Majesty's filial heart, the love and reverence which you ever cherished for the Mother who watched over

your early years with more than maternal solicitude, will never be effaced. But while the memory of those gentle virtues which adorned Her Royal Highness' character now renders your Majesty's grief more poignant,—it affords the surest ground of comfort under her removal ; and we trust that your Majesty will, under this trial, experience the consolation which the Gospel of Christ affords to those who mourn for loved ones departed "who have died in the Lord."

It is our fervent prayer to Almighty God that as He hath subjected your Majesty to this severe affliction, so He may be pleased to vouchsafe unto your Majesty grace to bear it with christian fortitude ; looking to the example of patience displayed by the blessed Saviour ; and fixing your thoughts "not on the things which are seen and temporal, but on the things which are unseen and eternal."

May the Great King of Kings guide, sustain and bless your Majesty, amidst all the changes and vicissitudes of this earthly scene. May he enrich your Majesty with all temporal felicity ; and crown you with all spiritual mercies in Christ Jesus, in this world and in the world to come.

An Act to facilitate the formation, management, and maintenance of piers and harbours in Great Britain and Ireland.

An Act to confirm certain Provisional Orders made under an Act of the fifteenth year of Her present Majesty, to facilitate arrangements for the relief of turnpike trusts, and to extend the provisions of the said Act.

An Act to facilitate the construction and improvement of harbours by authorizing loans to harbour authorities; to abolish passing tolls; and for other purposes.
