The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Belmont, in the parish of Bolton-le-Moors, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter, situate at Belmont aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those parts of the said parish of Bolton-le-Moors described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which parts, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Belmont.'

"And, with the like consent of the said James Prince, Bishop of Manchester, testified as aforesaid,

we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Belmont, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Bolton-le-Moors, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is comprised within that portion of the township of Longworth, which is not included within the district chapelry of Walmsley, heretofore severed from the said parish of Bolton-le-Moors; and also all that part of the same parish which is comprised within that portion of the township of Sharples, which is not included within the district chapelry of Walmsley aforesaid, or within the new parish of Astley Bridge (also heretofore severed from the said parish of Bolton-le-Moors); and also all that part of the same parish which is comprised within that portion of the township of Little Bolton, which is called or known as Horrock's Moor, and is situate to the north-west and west of the Little Bolton branch of the Bolton and Nightingale Trust Road."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter, situate at Belmont, in the parish of Bolton-le-Moors, in the county of Lancaster, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Belmont," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions

of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Manchester.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Elland-cum-Greetland, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan Methodist, Independent, and Unitarian Chapels, Elland, to the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the Minster Churchyard, Beverley, from the first day of July, to the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the two churchyards of Saint Mary, and in the burial-grounds of Salem Chapel, the Roman Catholic Chapel, the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, and the Independent Chapel, Barnsley, in the parish of Silkstone, from the first day of August, to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, it was ordered that burials should be discontinued after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, in the burial-ground of the Primitive Methodist Chapel, Dukinfield, which Order has since been varied; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to grant permission for the use of the said Primitive Methodist Burial-ground, Dukinfield, until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the Duties of Postage," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, and at any time after the passing of that Act, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law, on the transmission by the Post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the Post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:

1. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the Post between the United Kingdom and Penang, Singapore, Hong Kong, or China, there shall be charged and taken a uniform British rate of one shilling.

2. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the Post between Penang,

Singapore, Hong Kong, or China, and any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken a uniform British rate of one shilling for the conveyance of every such letter between Penang, Singapore, Hong Kong, or China, and any part of the United Kingdom; and for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, such a further or additional rate of postage as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country, provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted from the said rate of one shilling the sum of one penny, in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

3. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to Penang, Singapore, Hong Kong, or China, transmitted by the post between Penang, Singapore, Hong Kong, or China, and any of Her Majesty's Australian colonies or New Zealand, without passing through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken a uniform British rate of one shilling.

4. On every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding half an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding three ounces, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage; and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces, shall be charged as an additional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

5. On any letters posted under this Warrant, addressed to China, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, and if not every such letter shall be detained and opened, and shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof.

6. On every letter posted under this Warrant, addressed to Penang, Singapore, or Hong Kong, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, and if any such letter shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the postage to which

it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of postage of one shilling; and if any such letter shall be posted, having thereon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under the regulations in force relating thereto, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of postage of one shilling.

7. Any letter which under the regulations of this Warrant shall be forwarded through France, shall be chargeable in addition to the British postage to any French transit rate which may be chargeable thereon.

8. The rates of postage chargeable on letters and packets under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.

9. All letters transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

10. Nothing in this Warrant contained shall in anywise alter, prejudice, or affect the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, nor in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which officers, seamen, and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service now by law enjoy of sending and receiving letters by the post, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

11. The British postage payable under or by virtue of this Warrant shall include any British colonial postage that may be payable.

12. The term "weight" used in this Warrant shall mean British weight, and the term "by the post" shall include the conveyance through Egypt; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

13. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, may by Warrant, under their hands or the hands of any two of them, at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.
