WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the "laws concerning the burial of the dead in "England" it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial-grounds hereinafter mentioned from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-grounds be

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial-grounds be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Elland-cum-Greetland, and in the burial-grounds of the Wesleyan Methodist, Independent, and Unitarian Chapels, Elland, to the ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the Minster Churchyard, Beverley, from the first day of July, to the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

In the two churchyards of Saint Mary, and in the burial-grounds of Salem Chapel, the Roman Catholic Chapel, the Methodist New Connexion Chapel, and the Independent Chapel, Barnsley, in the parish of Silkstone, from the first day of August, to the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.
