THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, enclosing a copy of a notice issued by the Portuguese Board of Health, declaring the Port of St. Nazaire to be considered free from infection with yellow fever since the 24th August last.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, September 17, 1861.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade hereby give notice that the Moniteur, of the 14th instant, contains a French Imperial Decree permitting the admission through the Custom House at Dieppe, of cotton yarns of No. 143 (No. 170, English) and upwards, as well as of long, twisted, and baked woollen yarns.

The same Decree throws open the Ports of Marseilles, Bordeaux, Nantes, Rouen, and Havre, and the Custom Houses of Lille, Mulhouse, and Lyons, equally with the Custom House of Paris, for the direct importation of English and Belgian tissues paying ad valorem duties.

The other ports of France and the other custom houses on the Belgian frontier, which are already open for the transit of unprohibited goods, may receive the same British and Belgian goods, but only in transit, or for the purpose of being despatched under seal and security to one of the above-named custom houses, which alone are authorized to verify the merchandize and to receive the duties payable.

The payment of the import duties on English and Belgian tissues imported into Algeria can only be made at the port of Algiers.
