Board of Trade, Whitehall, September 24, 1861.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Naples, enclosing the following translation of a Decree, published in the official journal of Naples, declaring the commerce of grain, between Italy and foreign countries, free in the whole kingdom as regards exportation and importation.

VICTOR EMMANUEL II, KING OF ITALY,

Having considered the Decree of 12th March, 1861, of the late Neapolitan Government, by which the exportation of grain was prohibited;

Having considered the prodictatorial Decree of 18th October last, by which the exportation of grain from the Neapolitan provinces to other Italian provinces was prohibited;

We Decree as follows:-

ART. 1. The prohibition of the exportation of grain from the Neapolitan provinces to the other provinces of the kingdom, and that of grain, indian corn, oats, barley, potatoes, kidney beans, chickpeas, beans, and lentils, from the same Neapolitan provinces to foreign countries, will cease from the day of the publication of the present Decree.

The commerce of grain with foreign countries is declared free in the whole kingdom as regards the exportation and importation according to the

terms of the Tariff of 9th July, 1859, published in Naples with the Decree of 24th September, 1860.

ART. 2. The present Decree shall be submitted to the approval of the Legislative Chambers to be carried into law.

We command that the present Decree, furnished with the Seal of State, shall be put amongst the official collection of the laws and decrees of the Kingdom of Italy, and sent to whoever it behoves to observe it, and cause the same to be observed.
