And whereas by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the Duties of Postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office," further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and power is also given to the Postmaster-General (amongst other things) to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to require the postage, British, Colonial, or Foreign, of any letters sent by the post to be pre-paid, either in money or in stamps, as he might think fit, on the same being put into the post-office, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the pre-payment thereof to be in stamps, and also to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made and power is also given to the Postmaster-General, and any officer of the Post-Office to detain any letters which should be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations therein mentioned, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged, in either case, with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, should from time to time direct;

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by a certain Warrant, under their hands, bearing date the 19th day of May, 1857, did direct that in every letter, not exceeding half-an-ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between any place in the United Kingdom, and (among other colonies) Natal, there should be charged and taken in lieu of any rates of British postage, then payable by law, on such letters an uniform British rate of sixpence, and it is expedient to make regulations for the pre-payment of the several rates of postage payable on the letters hereinafter mentioned;

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this present Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners (by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. On every letter posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Natal, and transmitted by the post from any place in the United Kingdom to Natal, by British or Colonial packet-boat, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

2. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Natal, without any postage having been paid thereon, every such letter

shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

3. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Natal, and the postage paid thereon shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable, under or by virtue of the regulations in force relating thereto, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the postage paid thereon, and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

4. Nothing hereinbefore contained shall, in anywise, prejudice or affect the privilege granted by the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign Her present Majesty, in favour of Petitions and Addresses forwarded to Her Majesty by the post, nor the privilege granted by the same Act, to Members of each House of Parliament, to receive by the post Petitions and Addresses to Her Majesty, and Petitions addressed to either House of Parliament, not exceeding thirty-two ounces in weight; nor the privilege granted to printed Votes or Proceedings of Parliament; nor shall anything in this Warrant contained in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which seamen and soldiers, employed in Her Majesty's service, now by law enjoy of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

5. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

6. The Commissioners, for the time being, of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders, directions, or regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations in lieu thereof.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1862.

Mersey, Weaver, Irwell, and Tributary Rivers, &c.

(Protection from Rubbish, &c.)

APPPLICATION is intended to be made to Parliament in the next session thereof for leave to bring in a Bill for protecting, within the counties of Lancaster, York, Chester, and Derby, the beds and waters of the rivers hereinafter mentioned, and of the rivers and streams tributary to such rivers, from the deposit or the casting therein of rubbish or the solid refuse of manufactures or any other solid matter, whether floating or otherwise, whereby the bed of the said rivers and streams may be diminished or altered, or the flow of the waters therein encumbered or obstructed.

To give to the justices having jurisdiction within the respective places through which any such rivers or streams flow, or of which the same, or any of them, or any part thereof respectively form the boundary, summary jurisdiction for the prevention of any such deposit or casting in; and to enable them to impose fines and other penalties for any violation of the enactments in the said bill for the purposes aforesaid.

To authorize any of Her Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, or any of the judges thereof, to grant injunctions or make other orders restraining the commission of any of the offences defined by the Bill with respect to the matters aforesaid: and to enable the said Courts and the Judges thereof to enforce such injunctions or orders by the ordinary processes of such Courts.

The rivers and streams to which the Bill will relate, are the River Irwell, the River Mersey, above Warrington-bridge, and the River Weaver, above Frodsham-bridge; and all rivers, brooks, and streams in the counties of Lancaster, York, Chester, and Derby tributary to the River Irwell, or to the Rivers Mersey and Weaver, above the said bridges respectively.

Printed copies of the Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, on or before the 23rd day of December next.

(Works in the Third District, between Guyhirn and Peterborough; Provisions as to Fresh Water and Navigation Works; Repeal of previous enactments; Additional contributions on the several Contributors, to the Works in the Third District; Provisions as to unpaid contributions, and as to Outfall Tax on First and Second Districts; Taxes on Wash Lands; Contributions by Corporation of Wisbeach, Bedford Level Corporation, Waldersea Drainage Commissioners, Wisbeach Sewers Commissioners, North Level Commissioners, Peterborough Improvement Commissioners, Dean and Chapter of Peterborough, and other parties; Confirmation of Awards; Payment by Wisbeach Sewers' Commissioners; Inclusion of certain Lands; Separation of Districts; Incorporation of Commissioners for First and Second Districts; Constitution and Incorporation of Commissioners for Wash Lands, and Navigation Commissioners; Their Election, Powers, and Duties; Provisions as to future Maintenance of Banks, Bridges, and Navigations in Third District; Transfer of Tolls, Dues, and Taxes; Alteration of Tolls and Taxes; Amendment of Acts, &c.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing session, for leave to bring in a Bill for the following purposes, or any of them (that is to say):—

To alter, amend, enlarge, and repeal, some of the powers and provisions of "The Nene Valley Drainage and Navigation Improvement Act, 1852,"

in this notice called the Act of 1852, and "The Nene Valley Drainage and Navigation Improvement (Amendment) Act, 1854," in this notice called the Act of 1854.

To authorize the Nene Valley Drainage and Navigation Improvement Commissioners, in the said Acts, and in this notice referred to as the Incorporated Commissioners, to execute all or any of the following works (that is to say) :—

A submerged weir, dam, or other works, in the bed or channel of the River Nene, with opening gates, a sluice or lock, or sluices and locks, and other works, such works to be situated at or near the bridge called the Dog-in-a-Doublet Bridge, in the parishes of Whittlesea Saint Mary, and Whittlesea Saint Andrew, or one of them, also a sluice or sluices, lock or locks, into Moreton's Leam, at or near Standground sluice, in the parish of Standground, between the Broadwater and Moreton's Leam, also a sluice or sluices, lock or locks, at the Dog-in-a-Doublet, in the parishes of Whittlesea Saint Mary and Whittlesea Saint Andrew, or one of them, for the regulation of the navigation of Whittlesea Delph, and which submerged weir, sluices, and other works before described, are in this notice referred to as the Fresh Water and Navigation Works.

A bank for the Wash lands in continuation and completion of the bank newly formed, commencing at or near Guyhirn, in the parishes of Wisbeach Saint Mary and Wisbeach Saint Peter, or one of them, passing on the north side of the Wash lands along the River Nene, or the part of the river called Smith's Leam, and along the Broadwater, and terminating at or near to Standground Sluice, in the parish of Standground.

The making navigable the portion of Moreton's Leam, between the Gravel Dyke, in the parishes of Whittlesea Saint Mary and Whittlesea Saint Andrew, or one of them, in the Isle of Ely and county of Cambridge, and Whittlesea Delph, in the said parishes, or one of them; and the stopping up of the part of the Gravel Dyke between Moreton's Leam and the River Nene, rendered unnecessary by reason of the making navigable the portion of Moreton's Leam, before described, and the construction of a permanent bridge over Moreton's Leam in the said parishes, or one of them, for the purposes of the road from Whittlesey to Thorney.

In connection with the above works, or any of them, the construction of sluices, staunches, gates, locks, embankments, cuts, drains, bridges, roads, approaches, dams, and weirs, and the removal of, or stopping up, of any such existing works.

All the above works will be situated in, or pass from, in, through, and into, the several parishes, townships, and extra-parochial places of Standground and Fletton, in the county of Huntingdon, and Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough, and Minster Precincts, in the county of Northampton, and Standground, Whittlesea Saint Mary, Whittlesea Saint Andrew, Wisbeach Saint Mary, and Wisbeach Saint Peter, in the Isle of Ely, and county of Cambridge, or some of them.

The Bill will confer the following powers, or some of them, upon the Incorporated Commissioners, and will comprise provisions for the following objects, or some of them.

To purchase lands and houses by compulsion for the purposes of the before-mentioned new works; and to purchase by compulsion or agreement, easements, in or over any lands, for the purpose of forming banks or other works, or for enabling the Incorporated Commissioners to acquire any partial or limited interest in any lands under such provisions, as may be contained in the Bill.

To authorize the relinquishment of any contract or notice for the purchase of lands in the third district, upon such terms as may be prescribed in the Bill.

To provide that no further works than such as are authorized by the Bill shall be executed by the Incorporated Commissioners in the third district, and to repeal all such provisions of the said Acts as relate to, or require the execution of any other works in the third district, or as prescribe the order in which works shall be commenced or carried on, or as require any consent to the execution of works, from any Corporations, Commissioners or person, or as require arbitrations as to certain works for securing the fresh-water supply, continuous navigation, or otherwise, with the Duke of Bedford, his heirs or assigns, the Middle Level Commissioners or any Commissioners of districts between Guyhirn and Wisbeach-bridge, or any other parties, and either wholly to repeal, or to alter and modify all such provisions.

To make provisions for the maintenance of the fresh water supply in the River Nene, and in and to the Middle Level, North Level, and Wash Lands, or any other districts drawing water directly or indirectly from the River Nene; and to restrict and prevent the drawing of fresh water into any of those levels, lands, or districts, or its passage down the river, so long as the water in the river at Dog-in-a-Doublet Bridge is below a certain level to be prescribed in the Bill; or to make other provisions for preserving the fresh water supply, and the navigation of the river, and to provide for the proper superintendence and maintenance of the fresh water and navigation works.

To require the payment of all contributions under the said Acts, or either of them, whether annual, contingent, or deferred, in manner, and within a time prescribed by the Bill, and without reference to completion of works or otherwise, to require the commutation of annual payments for gross sums, to confirm the awards under the Act of 1854, and to enable and require the Commissioners of Sewers for the Hundred of Wisbeach and parts adjacent, and all other parties to pay their contributions under those awards, or any of them.

To charge the amount to be raised and apportioned by or in pursuance of the Bill upon the several parties hereinafter referred to as the contributors, and to require payment from them of gross or annual sums, or additional rates, tolls, or taxes (that is to say): The Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Wisbeach, the governor,

bailiffs, and commonalty of the Company of Conservators of the Great Level of the Fens called Bedford Level, the North Level Commissioners, the Waldersey Drainage Commissioners, the Commissioners of Sewers for the Hundred of Wisbeach, and parts adjacent, the Peterborough Improvement Commissioners acting under "The Peterborough Improvement, Police, and Cemetery Act, 1850," the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, the owners and occupiers of meadows and lands, and the flooded lands in Standground, subject to the outfall tax in the first, second, and third districts, the owners and occupiers of the lands called the Wash Lands, in the third district, and all other parties subject or liable to contribution or taxation under the provisions of the said Acts, and to enable and require the Corporations or Commissioners being contributors, and the Incorporated Commissioners respectively, to raise money on mortgage, or otherwise, for the purposes of the additional contributions and payments under the intended Bill, and for the purposes of their contribution, or any annual payment in lieu thereof, to charge their existing rates and taxes, and the additional rates and taxes herein mentioned, and to levy and collect additional rates and taxes upon the owners and occupiers of property within the borough, city, limits, and districts under their respective control and jurisdiction, and also to levy additional tolls, tonnage dues, or other rates, on vessels, goods, or merchandize, or to continue the existing tolls, tonnage dues, or other rates, for a further period; to alter existing tolls, rates, and duties under the several Acts relating to such Corporations, Commissioners, and parties respectively, and to put in force the powers of their several Acts, or of the intended Bill, relating thereto, or in case of default of any such parties, to enable the Incorporated Commissioners to execute any such powers, whether of mortgaging or levying, or raising tolls, rates, and duties, or otherwise.

To authorize the Incorporated Commissioners to impose a new annual tax on the first and second districts, and on the flooded lands in Standground, and an increased tax on the Wash lands, and to provide that the flooded lands in Standground shall form part of the second district.

III, cap. 73; 4 James I, and 9 Geo. IV, cap. 89, relating to the drainage of Great and Little Waldersea; 7 and 8 Geo. IV, cap. 85; 10 Geo. IV, cap. 104; 6 and 7 Wm. IV, cap. 92; 11 and 12 Vic. cap. 143; 15 Chas. II, cap. 17; 20 Chas. II, cap. 8; 27 Geo. II, cap. 19; 29 Geo. II, cap. 9; 11 Geo. III, cap. 78; 13 Geo. III, cap. 60; 36 Geo. III, cap. 73; 52 Geo. III, cap. 143; 7 Geo. IV, cap. 106; 10 Geo. IV, cap. 104; 11 Geo. IV, cap. 53; 1 Wm. IV, cap. 27; 3 Wm. IV, cap. 72; 50 Geo. (Continuation of Term; Repeal or Amendment of Act; Defining and Regulating Securities, and Providing for the payment of Debt and Interest.)
