WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate in the parish of Handsworth, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Michael, situate at Handsworth aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Handsworth, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Handsworth.'

"And with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be

expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Handsworth, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Handsworth, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, wherein the present Incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is situate to the south-west of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Handsworth, from the new parish of Saint James, Handsworth, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Grove-lane, opposite to the middle of the western extremity of the New-road, and extending thence in a direction generally eastward to, and along the middle of, such road, and along the middle of Crick-lane, to the junction of the last-named lane, with the turnpike-road leading from Walsall to Handsworth, and extending thence southward along the middle of such turnpike road to its junction with Villa-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road to the boundary which divides the said parish of Handsworth from the particular district of Saint Silas Lozells (heretofore part of the parish of Aston-juxta-Birmingham), in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, situate in the parish of Handsworth, in the county of Stafford, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Michael, Handsworth," be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication

of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church; and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the vicarage of Witham, in the county of Essex, and diocese of Rochester, for the patronage of the rectory of Paglesham, in the same county and diocese.

"Whereas the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Peterborough, is seized in fee, in right of his see, of the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the said vicarage of Witham.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, is seized in fee, in right of his see, of the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the said Rectory of Paglesham.

"And whereas the said George, Bishop of Peterborough, and the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said benefices may be exchanged, as is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty, that after making all proper deductions and allowances, the value of the said vicarage of Witham, is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the said rectory of Paglesham, and that the particulars of the said benefices are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said George, Bishop of Peterborough, and of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, in testimony whereof, they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the said vicarage of Witham, shall be assigned and transferred from the said George, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors, in the see of Peterborough, and shall become and be vested in, and shall and may be exercised by the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, and his successors in the see of Rochester for ever, and that in exchange for the same, the patronage of, or perpetual right of nomination to, the said Rectory of Paglesham, shall in like manner be assigned and transferred from the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, and his successors in the said see of Rochester, and shall and may be exercised by the said George, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the said see of Peterborough for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the said Act, or any other Act of Parliament."

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is

enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval; or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications.:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eleventh day of October last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-ninth day of November last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the under mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**CROWLE, LINCOLNSHIRE.**—In the church forthwith, and in the churchyard, from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, except in vaults and walled graves which are free from water and can be opened without disturbance of remains, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner:

**OVER DARWEN.**—In Holy Trinity churchyard, and in the Independent, the Wesleyan, the Wesleyan Association, the Primitive Methodist, and the Independent Lower Chapel yards; except in family vaults and graves which were existing on the fifteenth of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, which are free from water and can be opened without disturbance of remains; every coffin buried in a vault or walled grave to be embedded in charcoal and entombed in an air-tight manner, and every coffin buried in the earth to be at least four feet beneath the surface. Also interments in the new part of St. James's churchyard to be discontinued with the like exception, and except for the burial of those dying in the townships of Eccleshill, and Yate and Pickup Bank.

**WHITBY.**—In Whitby churchyard on and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, except in vaults and walled graves existing on the twentieth of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in an air-tight manner.

**LLANELLY.**—In the church forthwith, and in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, existing on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, which are free from water; each coffin to be embedded in charcoal and entombed in an air-tight manner.

**RAMSEY, HUNTS.**—In the parish church forthwith; and also beneath the Baptist Chapel, and from and after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the churchyard, with the exception of existing family vaults, family graves, and reserved grave spaces, which shall be used on the following conditions: that the vaults, family graves, and reserved grave spaces, when required, be opened without exposing remains, and in all vaults and brick graves, each coffin to be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.

*Board of Trade, Whitehall,

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, with reference to the notices inserted in the London Gazette of the 3rd of August, 1860, and the 10th of May, 1861, a copy of a Despatch from the British Member of the European Commission of the Danube, enclosing copies of certain provisional regulations which have been adopted by the Commission, with reference to the Police of the Port of Toultscha and the general inspection of the navigation of the Lower Danube, of which the following are translations :—

I.

*Police of the Port of Toultscha.*

ART. 1.—Every vessel passing in sight of Toultscha, or stopping in the port, is required to hoist her flag, and to comply with the orders of the Captain of the Port in all matters relating to the navigation regulations.

ART. 2.—Every vessel intending to make a stay at Toultscha, must be moored on the right bank; and under no circumstances may more than three vessels moor alongside of each other.

ART. 3.—No vessel will be permitted to cast anchor in the navigable channel before Toultscha, to the right of the moorings and the red buoys stationed along the left bank of the river.

ART. 4.—Vessels will be allowed to warp round the Toultscha bend by means of the buoys and mooring beams, but are prohibited, under any circumstances, from being made fast to them.

It is also forbidden for two or more vessels to warp at the same time, by means of the same buoy.

ART. 5.—Every infringement of the present regulations will be punished by a fine of from two to ten Dutch ducats.

ART. 6.—The Captain of the Port of Toultscha and ultimately the Inspector-General of the navigation of that part of the Lower Danube below Isaktcha, are charged respectively, to enforce the

execution of these regulations, which will come into operation immediately after their publication in the port of Toultscha.

II.

*Provisional Regulations for establishing a General Inspection of the Navigation of that part of the Danube below Isaktcha.*

The European Commission of the Danube, with the view of thoroughly enforcing the execution of the provisional regulations relative to police and navigation already adopted, and having reference to Article 16 of the Treaty of Paris, dated 30th March, 1856, further promulgates the subjoined provisional regulations.

ART. 1.—An Inspector-General, invested with international powers as representing the European Commission, shall be appointed to enforce on that part of the Danube below Isaktcha, a strict compliance with the regulations enumerated below :—

- (a) The provisional regulation relative to the police and navigation of the Lower Danube between Isaktcha and Sulina, dated 27th June, 1860.
- (b) The provisional regulation relative to the discharge of ballast, dated 29th April, 1858, but so far only as this regulation affects the river, exclusive of the port and roadstead of Sulina.
- (c) The provisional regulation relative to the pilotage of the Lower Danube, dated 9th July, 1860, but so far only as the pilotage on the river proper is concerned. (Section II of the Regulation).
- (d) The provisional regulation relative to the lighter service on the Lower Danube, dated 26th July, 1860, but so far only as lighter operations on the river are concerned, exclusive of the port and roadstead of Sulina.
- (e) The provisional regulation relating to the police of the port of Toultscha, dated 9th September, 1861.

ART. 2.—The Inspector-General will establish himself at Toultscha. He will have under his directions four superintendents, nominated by him, with the sanction of the authority which he represents, who will have assigned to them portions of the river in the following order, viz.:

1st Division.

From Isaktcha to Tchatal de St. Georges.

2nd Division.

From Tchatal de St. Georges to the lower mouth of the Papadia, in the Sulina Channel, inclusive.

3rd Division.

From the lower mouth of the Papadia, to the Guard House No. 14.

4th Division.

From the Guard House No. 14, to the limits of the port of Sulina, on the river side (Article I of the regulation respecting the police of the port, dated 9th July, 1860).

ART. 3.—The duties of the Inspector-General will consist :—

- (1) In superintending the execution of the regulations enumerated in Article I, in proving the infringement of the provisions contained in those regulations, and in enforcing the prescribed penalties against delinquents.

(2). In preparing, after a personal inspection of the localities, in cases of stranding or shipwreck, a circumstantial procès-verbal as to the casualty, to be communicated to the competent authority. The Inspector-General will, moreover, provisionally possess the powers conferred on the Inspector of Technical Works, by Articles 37, 38, and 39 of the regulation relating to the river police, dated 27th June, 1860.

In cases of average, especially if arising out of collision, the Inspector-General, if able to state the facts, and if requested by one of the parties interested, will prepare a circumstantial procès-verbal, to be in like manner transmitted to the competent authority.

He will not be concerned with questions of a purely technical character relating to the improvement of the river; though he will be at liberty to suggest to the Commission any improvements likely to facilitate the navigation of the river.

ART. 4.—The Superintendents will look exclusively for directions to the Inspector-General, and will be bound to report to him any facts of interest occurring in their respective limits, as laid down in the preceding Article.

ART. 5.—The Inspector-General will be subject exclusively to the European Commission, to whom he will transmit every month, independently of ordinary communications, a general and succinct report upon the working of the regulations.

ART. 6.—The Inspector-General will make every month at least two tours of inspection from Toulcha to Sulina, independently of the more frequent trips he may be compelled to take in the ordinary execution of his duties. One of the regular tours he will make in a boat.

The Superintendents will be required to traverse once daily, either by land or water, and alternately, half the divisions respectively allotted to them.

ART. 7.—The Inspector-General and his Assistants, will be expected to be acquainted with several of the languages in use on the Lower Danube.

ART. 8.—The Salary of the Inspector-General, will be 1,000 Dutch ducats per annum, without any allowance for office or travelling expences; it is, however, to be understood, that the European Commission will provide for the appointment and remuneration of a clerk, and will furnish the Inspector with a boat, fully equipped for his tours of inspection.

The salary of the four Superintendents, will be 300 Dutch ducats each, without any additional allowance. A boat will be provided for them, which they will be expected to keep in an efficient state.

The salaries of the Inspector-General and his clerk, as also those of the Superintendents, will be a charge paid out of the Navigation Chest at Sulina.

ART. 9.—The present regulations will not in any way affect the relations subsisting between the European Commission and the Captain of the port of Sulina.

ART. 10.—The Inspector-General will receive from the European Commission of the Danube, special instructions, determining more precisely the nature of his duties.

He will be furnished, as well as his superintendents, with a warrant from the Commission to establish their authority, and with a signal flag of several colours.
