

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

BUXTON.

NOTICE is hereby given, that under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1858, and of the Local Government Act (1858), Amendment Act, 1861 (sec. 9, subdivision 2), a meeting was on the 31st day of October, 1861, duly convened of rate-payers of that portion of the township of Buxton, in the county of Derby, which is excluded from the district of the Local Board for Buxton (within which district the first hereinbefore recited Act has been adopted, and which district is not a corporate borough, or a town under the jurisdiction of Improvement Commissioners); and that at such meeting it was resolved, that such excluded portion of the said township should be formed into a separate highway district. In accordance with the provisions of the above-recited Acts, all that portion of the township of Buxton which is excluded from the district of the Buxton Local Board aforesaid, is in pursuance of the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Acts, formed into a separate highway district accordingly, and from and after the date of the aforesaid meeting and resolution, the said excluded portion shall, for all purposes connected with highways, surveyors of highways, and highway rates, be considered and treated as a township maintaining its own highways.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 1.)—RED SEA.—GULF OF SUEZ.

Fixed Light on Zafarana Point.

THE Egyptian Government has given notice that on and after the 1st day of January, 1862, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Zafarana point, on the western coast of the Gulf of Suez, about 52 miles to the southward of the town of that name.

The light is a fixed light, placed at an elevation of 83 feet above the level of high water, and should be seen in clear weather from the deck of a vessel at a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The tower is round, built of stone, and 82 feet from base to vane, with the keeper's dwelling to the westward. It stands on a low gravel ridge, about 14 feet above high water, in lat. 29° 6' 20" N., long. 32° 44' East of Greenwich as recently found by Captain Mansell, of H.M.S. Firefly, and which agrees with More'sby's Chart of the Red Sea of 1834, but differs from the Admiralty Chart. The exact position of this lighthouse will hereafter be determined.

The mariner is cautioned that shoal water extends about a mile from the point, having 10 fathoms close to its outer edge.
