*The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both  
Houses of Parliament, on Thursday, February 6,  
1862.*

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

WE are commanded by Her Majesty to assure you that Her Majesty, is persuaded that you will deeply participate in the affliction by which Her Majesty has been overwhelmed by the calamitous, untimely, and irreparable loss of Her beloved Consort, who has been Her comfort and support.

It has been, however, soothing to Her Majesty, while suffering most acutely under this awful dispensation of Providence, to receive from all classes of Her subjects the most cordial assurances of their sympathy with Her sorrow, as well as of their appreciation of the noble character of him the greatness of whose loss to Her Majesty and to the nation is so justly and so universally felt and lamented.

We are commanded by Her Majesty to assure you that she recurs with confidence to your assistance and advice.

Her Majesty's relations with all the European Powers continue to be friendly and satisfactory, and Her Majesty trusts there is no reason to apprehend any disturbance of the peace of Europe.

A question of great importance, and which might have led to very serious consequences, arose between Her Majesty and the Government of the United States of North America, owing to the seizure and forcible removal of four passengers from on board a British mail-packet by the commander of a ship-of-war of the United States; but that question has been satisfactorily settled by the restoration of the passengers to British protection, and by the disavowal by the United States Government of the act of violence committed by their naval officer.

The friendly relations between Her Majesty and the President of the United States have, therefore, remained unimpaired.

Her Majesty warmly appreciates the loyalty and patriotic spirit which have been manifested on this occasion by Her North American subjects.

The wrongs committed by various parties and by successive Governments in Mexico upon foreigners resident within the Mexican territory, and for which no satisfactory redress could be obtained, have led to the conclusion of a convention between Her Majesty, the Emperor of the French, and the Queen of Spain, for the purpose of regulating a combined operation on the coast of Mexico, with a view to obtain that redress which has hitherto been withheld.

That Convention, and papers relating to that subject will be laid before you.

The improvement which has taken place in the relations between Her Majesty's Government and that of the Emperor of China, and the good faith with which the Chinese Government have continued to fulfil the engagements of the Treaty of Tien-tsin, have enabled Her Majesty to withdraw Her troops from the city of Canton, and to reduce the amount of Her force on the coast and in the seas of China.

Her Majesty, always anxious to exert Her influence for the preservation of peace, has concluded a Convention with the Sultan of Morocco, by means of which the Sultan has been enabled to raise the amount necessary for the fulfilment of certain treaty engagements which he had contracted towards Spain, and thus to avoid the risk of a renewal of hostilities with that Power. That Convention, and papers connected with it, will be laid before you.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that She has directed the Estimates for the ensuing year to be laid before you. They have been framed with a due regard to prudent economy and to the efficiency of the public service.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that measures for the improvement of the Law will be laid before you, and among them will be a Bill for rendering the title to land more simple, and its transfer more easy.

Other measures of public usefulness relating to Great Britain and to Ireland will be submitted for your consideration.

Her Majesty regrets that in some parts of the United Kingdom, and in certain branches of industry, temporary causes have produced considerable pressure and privation; but Her Majesty has reason to believe that the general condition of the country is sound and satisfactory.

Her Majesty confidently recommends the general interests of the nation to your wisdom and your care; and she fervently prays that the blessing of Almighty God may attend your deliberations, and may guide them to the promotion of the welfare and happiness of Her people.

**W**HEREAS under or by virtue of a Convention for the reciprocal protection of Copyright, concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty, the King of Prussia, on the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and a Convention, additional thereto, concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty, the King of Prussia, on the fourteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and an Act of Accession to the said two Conventions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse, dated the nineteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, due protection has been secured within the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse, for the authors of books, dramatic works, or musical compositions, and the inventors, designers, or engravers of prints and articles of sculpture, and the authors, inventors, designers, or engravers of any other works whatsoever, of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain, and of the Grand Duchy of Hesse, do now or may hereafter give their respective subjects the privilege of copyright, and for the lawful representatives or assigns of any such authors, inventors, designers, or engravers, with regard to any such works first published within the dominions of Her Majesty, and with regard to translations. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the 7th and 8th years of Her reign, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to International Copyright," and by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the 15th and 16th years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to carry into effect a Convention with France

on the subject of Copyright, to explain and extend the International Copyright Acts, and to explain the Acts relating to Copyright in Engravings," doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of any of the following works (that is to say), books, prints, articles of sculpture, dramatic works, musical compositions, and any other works of literature and the fine arts, in which the laws of Great Britain give to British subjects the privilege of copyright; and the executors, administrators, and assigns of such authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers respectively, shall, as respects works first published within the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse, on and after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, have the privilege of copyright therein, for a period equal to the term of copyright which authors, inventors, designers, engravers, and makers of the like works respectively, first published in the United Kingdom, are by law entitled to, provided such books, dramatic pieces, musical compositions, prints, articles of sculpture, or other works of art, have been registered, and copies thereof have been delivered, according to the requirements of the said recited Acts, within twelve months after the first publication thereof, in any part of the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse. And it is hereby further ordered, that the authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions which shall, on or after the said first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, be first publicly represented or performed within the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse, shall have the sole liberty of representing or performing, in any part of the British dominions, such dramatic pieces or musical compositions, during a period equal to the period during which authors of dramatic pieces and musical compositions, first publicly represented or performed in the United Kingdom, are entitled by law to the sole liberty of representing or performing the same; provided such dramatic pieces or musical compositions have been registered, and copies thereof have been delivered, according to the requirements of the said recited Acts, within twelve calendar months after the time of their being first represented or performed in any part of the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse. And it is hereby further ordered, that the authors of any works published, or of any dramatic pieces first publicly represented, within the dominions of His Royal Highness the Grand Duke of Hesse, on or after the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, who may choose to reserve the right of translating such works or dramatic pieces, their executors, administrators, and assigns, shall, until the expiration of five years from the date of the first publication of the translations authorized by them respectively of such works, or from the time at which the translations authorized by them of such dramatic pieces are first published or publicly represented, be entitled, subject to the provisions mentioned in the said secondly recited Act, to prevent the publication in the British dominions of any translation of such works or dramatic pieces, and the representation therein, of any translation of such dramatic pieces not so respectively authorised by them.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Jackfield, in the parish of Broseley, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Hereford.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Jackfield aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Renn Dickson, Bishop of Hereford, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Broseley, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Jackfield.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Renn Dickson, Bishop of Hereford, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Jackfield, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Broseley, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Hereford, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Benthall, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the fence which divides the close numbered 430 on the title commutation map of the said parish of Broseley, and on the map hereunto annexed from

the close numbered 428 on the same maps, near to a boundary stone inscribed 'J.S.M.D.C. 1861, No. 1,' placed on the northern side of such fence, and extending thence in a direction generally either south-eastward or north-eastward along the middle of the same fence, and along the middle of the fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 433, 432, 434, 554a, 553, the roadway numbered 551d, and the closes numbered respectively 551b, 547a, 546, and 542 on the said maps from the aforesaid close numbered 428, and from the closes numbered respectively 435, 436, 437, 438a, 440, 442, 441, and 544 on the same maps to a point in the middle of the road leading from Woodlands-green to Calcutts, opposite to the middle of the south-eastern extremity of the fence, dividing the close numbered 542 from the close numbered 544 as aforesaid, and extending thence northward along the middle of such road to its junction with the road leading from Calcutts to Broseley, and extending thence first south-eastward and then southward along the middle of the last described road, for a distance of 400 yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern extremity of the footpath leading to Saint Mary's church and churchyard, at Jackfield, and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of such footpath as far as a point opposite to the eastern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 539 upon the said maps from the close numbered 501 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last described fence to its junction with the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of the said church and churchyard, and extending thence first westward to and along the middle of the said wall or fence, and thence southward, and then eastward along the middle of the walls or fences forming respectively the western and southern boundaries of such church and churchyard to the extremity of the last-mentioned wall or fence, and continuing thence in the last-named direction, and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the before-mentioned footpath, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the same footpath as far as a point opposite to the north-western extremity of the fence, dividing the close numbered 536 upon the said maps from the close numbered 506 upon the same maps, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-described fence and of the fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 535 and 534 upon the said maps from the close numbered 506 as aforesaid to a point in the middle of the cross road leading from Calcutts to Delph, opposite to the south-eastern extremity of the fence dividing the said close numbered 534 from the said close numbered 506, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last described road for a distance of fifty yards, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-western extremity of the fence which divides the close numbered 533 on the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 531a and 532 on the same maps, and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last described fence to its extremity, and continuing thence eastward across the road leading from Calcutts to Broseley aforesaid to a point in the middle of the western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 652 upon the said maps from the close numbered 821 upon the same maps, and extending thence in the last-named direction along the middle of the last mentioned fence to its extremity, and extending thence, in a direct line, due east across a certain small stream or brook, commonly called

of the North-Eastern Railway, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said branch railway as far as a point in the centre of the bridge which carries such branch railway over the Setting Dike, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such dike as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1242 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Cottingham, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 1223 upon the same maps, and extending thence first northward to and along the middle of such fence, and then westward along the middle of the same fence to a point in the middle of the southern end of the lane called 'Near Salt Ings-lane,' and extending thence northward along the middle of such lane to a point in the middle of the Cottingham Branch of the Hull and Beverley Trust Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such branch road to a point in the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries the same road over the Cottingham Drain, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such drain (crossing the lanes called respectively Igglemire-lane and Eudike-lane) to the junction of the said drain with the drain called Nine Foot Drain, and extending thence northward or westward along the middle of the last-named drain (crossing North Carr-lane) to the junction of such drain with Moor Dike, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named dike to its junction with Panbottom Drain, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named drain to the northern extremity of such drain, and continuing thence in the last-mentioned direction and in a straight line across Dunswell-lane to the boundary dividing the said parish of Cottingham from a certain detached part of the parish of Skidby, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and also all that portion of the detached part of the parish of Skidby aforesaid which is situate to the east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said detached part of the parish of Skidby from the parish of Cottingham before-mentioned, at a point on the southern side of Skidby Carr-lane, opposite to the middle of the southern end of a certain occupation road or lane leading past the western side of the close in which Skidby Carr-cottage is situate to lands in the parish of Saint John, Beverley, and extending thence north-westward, across Skidby Carr-lane aforesaid, to and along the middle of the occupation road or lane leading past the western side of the close in which Skidby Carr-cottage is situate as aforesaid, to the boundary dividing the said detached part of the parish of Skidby from the parish of Saint John, Beverley, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and which said portion of the detached part of the parish of Skidby aforesaid is bounded on the south by the said parish of Cottingham, on the north by the said parish of Saint John, Beverley, and on the east by the parish of Wawne, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Newland, in the parish of Cottingham, in the county of York, be accordingly formed; and that the agreement, mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation



and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve such church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Reverend Charles Overton, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Cottingham, so long as he shall remain such vicar or incumbent, and that upon and from the next avoidance of the incumbency of the same vicarage, such right of presentation and appointment shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Chester, and his successors, Bishops of the same see, for ever; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of York.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the ninth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of certain benefices between your Majesty and the Bishop of Llandaff.

"Whereas your Majesty is seized in fee in right of the Crown, of the patronage of the several benefices specified in the first part of the schedule hereto annexed.

"And whereas the several benefices so specified in the first part of the said schedule, do not respectively exceed the value of twenty pounds in the King's book.

"And whereas the Bishop of Llandaff is seized in fee, in right of his see, of the patronage of the several benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule.

"And whereas by the third section of the above-recited Act, it is enacted, that the word 'person' shall include any corporation, and the master, provost, warden, or head of any college or collegiate establishment, and the master, guardian, or head of any hospital, and the governing body respectively entitled in his or their corporate capacity to any such patronage, and shall also extend to and include the Queen's Majesty, as well in respect of patronage vested, or to be vested, in or exercised by Her Majesty, in right of the Crown as in right of the Duchy of Lancaster, or

of the Duchy of Cornwall; and in every case of exchange, in right of the Crown where the benefice is above the yearly value of twenty pounds in the Queen's books, the assent of Her Majesty shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Treasurer or First Commissioner of the Treasury, for the time being; and when such yearly value shall be twenty pounds or under, such assent shall be testified by the signature of the Lord High Chancellor; and the assent of Her Majesty, when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Lancaster, shall be testified by the signature of the Chancellor of the Duchy; and when the patronage is in respect of the Duchy of Cornwall, such assent shall be testified by two or more of the principal officers of the said Duchy, to be appointed in manner provided for appointment of officers, to grant leases under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session held in the first and second years of the reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, chapter five, which assent they are hereby authorized and empowered to give; and in every case of exchange, in right of the Duchy of Cornwall, when there is a Duke of Cornwall, the assent of the said Duke shall be testified, in writing, under the privy seal of the said Duke, first had and obtained for that purpose.

"And whereas the Right Honourable Richard, Baron Westbury, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the Right Reverend Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said several benefices may be exchanged, as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange and the relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty, that after making all proper deductions and allowances, the value of the benefices, specified in the first part of the said schedule, and of the patronage thereof, is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the benefices specified in the second part of the said schedule, and of the patronage thereof, and that the particulars of such benefices are as set forth in such schedule.

"Now, therefore, with the assent of the said Richard, Baron Westbury, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as patron in right of the Crown, of the several benefices set forth in the first part of the said schedule, and of the said Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, as patron in right of his see, of the several benefices set forth in the second part of the said schedule, in testimony whereof, the said Richard, Baron Westbury, has signed, and the said Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, has signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication, in the London Gazette, of any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than such duly gazetted Order, the patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the said several benefices specified in the said first part of the schedule hereto annexed, shall be assigned and transferred from your Majesty and your successors, and shall become and be vested in and may from time to time be exercised by the said Alfred, Bishop of Llandaff, and his successors, in the said see for ever, and that in exchange for the same, the patronage of or perpetual right of nomination to the benefices specified in the second part

of the said schedule, hereto annexed, shall be assigned and transferred from the said Bishop and his successors, and shall in like manner become and be vested in, and may from time to time be exercised by your Majesty and your successors for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church, called Emmanuel Church, situate at Sidlow Bridge, in the parish of Horley, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Horley, and of the several parishes of Charlwood, Buckland, Leigh, and Reigate, in the said county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of Horley, Charlwood, Buckland, Leigh, and Reigate, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Emmanuel, situate at Sidlow Bridge aforesaid.

"And whereas the major part in number of the patrons of the respective parishes out of which such consolidated chapelry is proposed to be formed as aforesaid, by virtue of the herein-before-mentioned Acts, concur as to the formation of such consolidated chapelry, and as to the persons to whom the right of patronage of the church of such consolidated chapelry shall belong.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester, in testimony whereof he hath signed and sealed this representation, and with the consents of Henry Christopher Wise of Woodcote, in the county of Warwick, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Charlwood; of Elizabeth Dendy, of Sandfels, near Reigate, in the said county of Surrey, Widow; and of John Sanders, of Bansted, in the same county, Esquire, and of John Wood, of Bansted aforesaid, Esquire the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Leigh; and of John Newman Harrison, of No. 7, Bolton-place, Upper Church-street, Chelsea, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Reigate; the said Henry Christopher Wise, Elizabeth Dendy, John Sanders, John Wood, and John Newman Harrison, being the major part in number of the patrons of the

respective parishes aforesaid (in testimony of which consent they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Horley, Charlwood, Buckland, Leigh, and Reigate, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Emmanuel, situate at Sidlow Bridge aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Emmanuel, Sidlow Bridge.'

"And we further represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said Henry Christopher Wise, Elizabeth Dendy, John Sanders, John Wood, and John Newman Harrison, (testified as aforesaid,) that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Emmanuel, Sidlow Bridge, shall be vested in and be exercised by Robert Clutton, of Hartswood, near Reigate aforesaid, Esquire, and James Corry Sherrard, of Kinnersley Manor, Reigate, in the said county of Surrey, Esquire, their heirs and assigns, as tenants in common, and not as joint tenants.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Emmanuel, Sidlow Bridge, being:—

"All those portions of the several parishes of Horley, Charlwood, Buckland, Leigh and Reigate, in the county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester, wherein the respective incumbents of such parishes now possess the exclusive cure of souls, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Horley from the said parish of Charlwood, at a point in the middle of the road leading from Sidlow Bridge by Wolver's Farm and Horsehill to Charlwood, and extending thence first north-eastward then north-westward and then again north-eastward along the said boundary as far as a point in the middle of the River Mole, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said river as far as the boundary (in the centre of such river) which again divides the two last-named parishes, and extending thence in a direction generally north-eastward along such boundary as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-western extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 1044 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Horley, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 1043 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said fence to its extremity, and continuing thence in the last-mentioned direction, and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the road leading from Horley to Salmon's Cross, and extending thence north-westward for a distance of seven hundred and thirty three yards or thereabouts along the middle of the last described road, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-western end of a cross-road leading into the Brighton-road, near Red Hill, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be pub-

lished in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the under mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**ARBORFIELD, BERKSHIRE.**—Forthwith beneath the parish church, and from and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the churchyard, with the exception of now existing family vaults and brick graves which can be opened without the disturbance of human remains, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in brick, or stonework properly cemented.

**TONG.**—Forthwith in Tong Churchyard, in the parish of Birstall, except for the interment of the widowers, widows, or parents of those already buried therein, and of the inhabitants of the village of Tong, and of the farms adjoining; viz.: Scholebrooke, Gib-stubbing, Calverley, Clough, and Shawfield, and except in now existing family vaults and walled graves, which can be opened without the disturbance of human remains, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work properly cemented.
