THE following Address of Condolence on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort, which has been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been laid before the Queen by Sir George Grey, and has been received very graciously by Her Majesty :

To Her Most Excellent Majesty the QUEEN.

We, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the inhabitants of the County of Cork, humbly beg to approach your Majesty with the expression of our most sincere sympathy and condolence on the great calamity with which it has pleased Providence to afflict your Majesty and the nation.

Irreparable as your Majesty's loss may be in the death of your devoted Consort, we are sure that your Majesty will find lasting consolation in the reflection that throughout your vast realms your grief is universally shared, and that, on its own part, the empire has to deplore the death of a Wise Counsellor and a Firm Friend.

We humbly beg to assure your Majesty that we participate as fully as any of our fellow subjects in this sorrow, and that we feel it more than ever our duty to tender to your Majesty our sympathy and devotion.

That the Almighty, who in His wisdom has visited us with this great blow, may watch over and comfort your Majesty ; that in the virtues of your Royal Children you may recognise abundantly the noble qualities of their father, and that in their love and devotion, and the affectionate loyalty of your subjects, your Majesty may find consolation for many years, will be our earnest and constant prayer.

AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 21st day of *March*, 1862,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty by Order in Council, bearing date the sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, after reciting (amongst other things), that by virtue of the fifteenth and sixteenth Articles of the General Treaty of Peace between Her Majesty, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His late Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of All the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sardinia, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, signed at Paris, on the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, a Commission was, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, established for the purposes therein mentioned, and that the said Commission under the power and authorities given to it by these said Articles or otherwise, in and by the said Treaty, had, from time to time, made and promulgated certain rules, orders, and regulations, and was authorized and empowered, from time to time, to make and promulgate further and other rules, orders, and regulations, as well concerning the navigation of the River Danube, and the conduct and government of masters, seamen, and others navigating the same, as concerning the payment of duties to be levied and taken in respect of the navigation of the said river, and the enforcing of penalties for the breach of such rules, orders, and regulations respectively, or any of them, Her Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and declare as follows ; that is to say :

I. All rules, orders, and regulations so made and to be made by the said Commission, as hereinbefore mentioned, shall, from and after the date

of these presents, or from and after the making of such rules, orders, and regulations respectively, be binding and in force, and shall have the force and effect of law upon and against all British subjects and Ionians, and other persons subject to the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

II. For all the purposes mentioned in the said 15th and 16th articles of the said Treaty, and for the purpose of enforcing, so far as Her Majesty's subjects and such other persons as aforesaid are concerned, the provisions of the said articles; and all rules, orders, and regulations made, or to be made by the said Commission, under the powers and authorities given to them by the said articles, or either of them, or otherwise in or by the said last-mentioned Treaty; and all acts, payments, matters, and things, which in and by such rules, orders, or regulations, shall have been or shall be ordered under such powers or authorities as aforesaid to be made, done, or performed, or otherwise in relation thereto, the said Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of Her Majesty within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, shall, from and after the date of these presents, have, possess, and enjoy, all and every the powers, jurisdiction, authorities, rights, privileges, and immunities which, in and by a certain Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, are or is vested in or belongs to, are or is exercisable by, the Judge of the Supreme Consular Court of Constantinople, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte. And all the clauses, articles, and provisions of the said Order in Council, so far as the same respectively are now in force and unrepealed, and so far as the same or any of them are applicable to the purposes mentioned in the said 15th and 16th articles of the said last-mentioned Treaty, or any of them, or to such rules, orders, or regulations as aforesaid, shall apply and extend to the said Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of Her Majesty, and to all acts, matters, and things, whatsoever done by, to, or in respect of them the said Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents respectively, under or by virtue of these presents.

And whereas doubts have arisen whether the language of the said Order in Council is sufficient to confirm and to give the force and effect of law to all the rules, orders, and regulations, concerning the several matters therein mentioned, which have in fact been made and promulgated by the said Commission, according to the view and construction of the authorities vested in the said Commission, which has been hitherto acted on by the said Commission; and whereas it is expedient to remove such doubts; now therefore, in pursuance of the Act of Parliament, made in the session of Parliament, holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty, within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," and in execution of the powers thereby vested in Her Majesty in Council, Her Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared as follows:

I. All rules, orders, and regulations concerning the navigation of the River Danube, or concerning the conduct and government of masters, seamen, or others navigating the same, or concerning the imposition, levying, or payment of tolls or duties

to be taken or levied in respect of the navigation of the said river, or concerning the imposition or enforcing of penalties for the breach of such rules, orders, and regulations, respectively, or any of them, which have been at any time heretofore made and promulgated by the said Commission, shall, from and after the date of this Order (except so far as the same may have been already duly confirmed by the said recited Order, so as to make the same binding from the date thereof), be binding and in full force, and shall have the force and effect of law upon and against all British subjects, and Ionians, and other persons subject to the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

II. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to have the effect of revoking or annulling the said recited Order in Council, or anything contained therein.

III. For the purpose of enforcing, so far as Her Majesty's subjects and such other persons as aforesaid are concerned, all such rules, orders, and regulations, so made as aforesaid by the said Commission, and all acts, payments, matters, and things, which in and by such rules, orders, or regulations, shall have been, or shall hereafter be, by virtue thereof ordered to be made, done, or performed, or otherwise in relation thereto, Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, exercising jurisdiction over British and Ionian subjects within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, shall, from and after the date of these presents, have, possess, and enjoy all and every the power, jurisdiction, authorities, rights, privileges, and immunities, which in and by the hereinbefore mentioned Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, are or is vested in or belong to, or are, or is exercisable by the Judge of the Supreme Consular Court of Constantinople, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte. And all the clauses, articles, and provisions of the said Order in Council, so far as the same respectively are now in force and unrepealed, and so far as the same or any of them are applicable to such rules, orders, and regulations as aforesaid, shall apply and extend to the said Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of Her Majesty, and to all acts, matters, and things whatsoever, done by, to, or in respect of them the said Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents respectively, under or by virtue of these presents.

And the Right Honourable Earl Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from

time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county riding, parts, or division, is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace of the county of Pembroke, in quarter-sessions assembled on the sixteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, and afterwards by adjournment on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the said county is insufficient, and praying that the town of Kilgerran may be a polling place for the said county, within which such place is situate:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that the said town of Kilgerran shall be a polling place for the county of Pembroke; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter-sessions, or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England," it is, among other things, enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that the said Act be put in force in such county or counties as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit, and to divide the whole or part of any such county (including all counties of cities and counties of towns, cities, boroughs, towns, ports, and places, liberties, and franchises therein contained or thereunto adjoining) into districts; and to order that the County Court should be holden for the recovery of debts and

demands, under the said Act, in each of such districts; and, from time to time, to alter such districts as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit; and, from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to declare by what name, and in what towns and places the County Court should be holden in each district:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council, of the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order that the said Act be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas by certain other Acts, made and passed in the thirteenth and fourteenth, in the sixteenth, in the twentieth, and in the twenty-second years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act, have been amended and extended:

And whereas it hath been represented, that it would be of advantage to the public, if the Court holden at Mold was ordered to be held at Flint also:

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered that, from and after the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two:

The County Court of Flintshire, holden at Mold, shall be holden at Flint as well as at Mold.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke, situate at Newton Poppleford aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it

would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Aylesbeare, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Newton Popleford.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Newton Popleford, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Aylesbeare, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter, which is comprised within the tything or chapelry of Newton Popleford."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at Newton Popleford, in the parish of Aylesbeare, in the county of Devon, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Newton Popleford," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the district of South Charlton, in the county of Northumberland, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas under and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and duly published in the London Gazette of the thirtieth day of the same month, the said district of South Charlton was duly constituted, and the right of patronage of such district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, were assigned to and vested in the Most Noble Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, his heirs and assigns, and the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Durham, and their successors, in the manner in the said Order mentioned, and hereinafter described; that is to say: so that the said Duke and his heirs and assigns should have and enjoy two nominations of a minister to the said district for every single nomination by the said dean and chapter, and their successors; and that the first two of every three nominations to such district should be vested in, and belong to, and should and might be exercised by the said Duke, his heirs and assigns; and whereas it has been agreed between the said dean and chapter, and the said Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, and it has been proposed to us by the said dean and chapter and the said Duke, and it appears to us to be expedient that the share of the patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, which now belongs to the said dean and chapter, should be assigned and transferred to the said Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas it has been also agreed that the said Duke should transfer, and he has accordingly transferred to our account and into our name in the books of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England, a sum of seven hundred and seventy-five pounds, five shillings, and seven pence, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, upon the understanding that the income of the minister of the said district, when the entire patronage thereof shall have been transferred and assigned as hereinafter set forth, should be augmented by an equivalent annual grant to be payable out of the common fund under our control, in manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and of the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Durham (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their common or capitular seal), we humbly recommend and propose that the share of the patronage of the said district of South Charlton, and of the nomination of the minister thereof, which now belongs to the Dean and Chapter of the said cathedral church of Durham, shall without any assurance in the law, other than this scheme and any duly gazetted order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, be assigned and transferred to, and be



absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Algernon, Duke of Northumberland, his heirs and assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose that, in consideration of the transfer to us of the sum of seven hundred and seventy-five pounds, five shillings, and seven pence, Three pounds per Centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, as aforesaid, there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund aforesaid in each and every year by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the said district of South Charlton, the sum of twenty-four pounds, and that in case a vacancy in the ministry of such district shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount next thereafter payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister succeeding to such district: Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the minister of the said district, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed or secured to such minister and his successors in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint James, situate at High Wych aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Sawbridgeworth, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint James, High Wych.'

"And with the like consent of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James, High Wych, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Sawbridgeworth, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester (including an isolated portion of such parish), which is situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary dividing the same parish from the parish of Harlow, in the county of Essex, and in the said diocese of Rochester, at a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the turnpike-road leading from Epping to Sawbridgeworth over the Old River Stort, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of such turnpike-road for a distance of one thousand five hundred and sixty yards, or thereabouts, to its junction with the road leading from Sawbridgeworth to High Wych, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such last-mentioned road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the road forming the south-western boundary of Manfield Common, and extending thence, still north-westward, to and along the middle of such last-described road, and along the middle of the path or road, forming the southern boundary of the allotment in Manfield Common, numbered 509 on the tithe map of the said parish of Sawbridgeworth, and upon the map hereunto annexed, to a point in the middle of the southern end of the fence which divides the allotment numbered 509 as aforesaid from the

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided

also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the sixth day of January last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventeenth day of February last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in either of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**COMBE FLOREY.**—Forthwith, beneath the church; and from and after the first July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the churchyard.

**CROYDON.**—Forthwith, in the churchyard of St. James, with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body to be buried in each grave; no grave to be re-opened, with the same exception; no grave to be dug except in earth in which no burials have hitherto been made, the grave-spaces for the burial of persons above twelve years of age to be nine feet by four feet, and for the burial of children under twelve years of age, six feet by three feet; and no coffin to be buried without a covering of four feet of earth.

**EGREMONT (CUMBERLAND).**—From and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the churchyard, with the exception of now-existing family vaults and brick graves, which can be opened without disturbing human remains, and in which each coffin shall be separately entombed in brick or stone work, properly cemented.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order,

and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the under mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, with the following modifications (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

**ST. ISSELLS, NEAR TENBY.**—Forthwith in the churchyard, except in now existing walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoai, and separately entombed in an airtight manner, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the disturbance of coffins or entire bones.

**PONTEFRAC.**—Forthwith in the burial-ground of the Independent Chapel, with the exception of now existing vaults and brick graves, and of reserved grave spaces:—the vaults and brick graves to be used on the conditions specified in the Order in Council of the twentieth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, relating to the burial-grounds of Pontefract, and in the reserved grave spaces, no body to be interred within four feet from the surface of the ground.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Christ Church, Saint Clements, Norwich, from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two,

to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, on the conditions specified in the Order in Council of the twenty-second of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

In the churchyard of Warkworth, Northumberland, from the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the tenth May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, it was directed that burials should be discontinued, with certain exceptions, in the churchyard of Warkworth, and whereas it is expedient that the said Order be varied, so as to allow, in certain instances, the burial of widowers and widows of those already interred in the churchyard. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order be now read and construed in the same manner as it would have been read and construed, if the following words, "and in other graves for the burial of widowers and widows of those buried therein," had been inserted in the said Order, after the words "the twenty-sixth of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty," in the 14th line of the paragraph relating to Warkworth Churchyard.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the thirtieth January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, it was directed that burials should be discontinued, with certain exceptions, in West Hackney Churchyard, and whereas it is expedient that the said Order be varied. Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that permission be granted for the use of now existing family earthen graves in the said churchyard, subject to the following conditions:—that the graves when required be opened without exposure of human remains; that one foot of earth be left undisturbed above the previously buried coffin; and that no coffin be buried without a covering of four feet of earth, measuring from the top of the coffin to the general level of the ground; and that the only bodies interred be those of the husbands, wives, parents, unmarried children, and brothers and sisters of persons already buried in the graves above indicated.
