IT is the Queen's wish that no celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday should take place this year.

Order regulating the use of Locomotives within the Metropolis.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of locomotives, unless restricted as hereinafter mentioned, on any highway within the limits of the metropolis, as described and defined in and by the Stat. 18 & 19 Vic., c. 120, entitled "An Act for the better Local Management of the Metropolis," is dangerous and inconvenient to the public:—I do hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever, propelled by steam or any other than animal power, on the highways, within the limits of the metropolis, as in and by the said Act first hereinbefore mentioned, described, and defined, at any time except between the hours of ten o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning.
