WHEREAS by an Order, made by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, on the twenty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, did order that the Right Honourable Sir Edward Ryan, John George Shaw Lefevre, Esquire (now Sir John George Shaw Lefevre, Knight Commander of the Bath), and Edward Romilly, Esquire, or such other persons as Her Majesty should from time to time approve in the stead of them, or any of them, should be Commissioners for conducting the examination of the young men proposed to be appointed to any of the junior situations in Her Majesty's Civil Establishments, and should hold their offices at the pleasure of Her Majesty, and should have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time such Assistant Examiners and others as might be required to assist them in the performance of the duties by the said Order assigned to them.

And whereas since the date of the said Order, the said Edward Romilly and Sir John George Shaw Lefevre, have severally resigned their said offices of Commissioners to which they were so appointed as aforesaid: and whereas it is deemed expedient that the said Sir Edward Ryan should be appointed First Commissioner for the purpose aforesaid, and that the Right Honourable Sir Edmund Walker Head, Baronet, Knight Commander of the Bath, and the Honourable Edward Turner Boyd Twistleton, should be appointed Commissioners in the place and stead of the said

Sir John George Shaw Lefevre and Edward Romilly, Esquire; and further, that the said Commissioners should have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time a Secretary and such Assistant Examiners and others, as may be required to assist them in the performance of their duties.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Sir Edward Ryan, Sir Edmund Walker Head, and the Honourable Edward Turner Boyd Twistleton, or such other persons as Her Majesty may from time to time approve in the stead of them, or any of them, shall be Commissioners, and shall hold their offices during the pleasure of Her Majesty for the purpose aforesaid—the said Sir Edward Ryan being the First Commissioner. And that the said Sir Edward Ryan, Sir Edmund Walker Head, and the Honourable Edward Turner Boyd Twistleton, shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to appoint from time to time a Secretary and such Assistant Examiners and others, as may be required to assist them in the performance of their duties; and further, shall have all powers and authorities given by the said Order.

And it is hereby further ordered, that the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury do prepare and submit to Parliament an estimate for the remuneration of the First Commissioner aforesaid.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, doth confirm the said Order in all respects so far as the same is not hereby altered.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a scheme, bearing date the thirteenth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty two, in the words and figures following, that is to say :

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that the rent-charges, messuages, lands, and premises, and other hereditaments particularly described in the first and eight following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly Gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons respectively hereinafter mentioned, and their respective successors for the time being, that is to say ; that all our leasehold estate and interest in the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the several townships of Bossall, Buttercrambe, Claxton, and Harton, in the parish of Bossall, in the county and diocese of York, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Bossall, in whom is now vested the fee simple in reversion expectant on the determination of our said leasehold estate ; that all our leasehold estate and interest in the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the township of Flaxton, in the said parish of Bossall, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Flaxton, in the same county and diocese of York, in whom is now vested the fee simple in reversion expectant on the determination of our said last-mentioned leasehold estate ; that all our leasehold estate and interest in the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the first part of the third schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the township of Sandhutton, in the said parish of Bossall, and also all our leasehold estate and interest in the lands and hereditaments described in the second part of the same schedule, situate within the township of Claxton, in the said parish of Bossall, together with the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising thereon, as also set forth in the same schedule, shall be transferred to and become

absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Sandhutton, in the same county and diocese of York, in whom is now vested the fee simple in reversion expectant on the determination of our said last-mentioned leasehold estate ; that all our estate and interest in the lands and hereditaments described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the district of Saint David's, Carmarthen, in the county of Carmarthen and diocese of Saint David's, formerly belonging to the Archdeaconry of Carmarthen, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint David, Carmarthen ; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Chigwell, in the county of Essex and diocese of Rochester, formerly belonging to the prebend of Saint Pancras, in the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul, London, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint John, Chigwell, in the same county and diocese ; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands now belonging to the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the parish of Felpham, in the county of Sussex and diocese of Chichester, formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Felpham, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the said vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Felpham ; that the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the seventh schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Pickering, in the county and diocese of York, formerly belonging to the deanery of the Cathedral Church of York, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Pickering, with the perpetual curacy of Newton annexed ; that the lands and hereditaments described in the eighth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Denbigh, in the county of Denbigh and diocese of Saint Asaph, now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of Denbigh ; that the messuages, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the ninth schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Sydenham, in the parish of Lewisham, in the county of Kent, now vested in us, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Paul, Southwark, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Winchester ; that the whole of the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes arising out of or upon lands situate within the parishes of Llanvihangel y Traethan and Llandecwyn, in the county of Merioneth and diocese of Bangor, formerly belonging to the treasurer'ship of the Cathedral Church of Bangor, and now vested in us and all our estate and interest therein, shall be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Llanvihangel y Traethan, with the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Llandecwyn annexed.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Francis Wilson,

Clerk, the present perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Armitage, in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the tenth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Armitage, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Hansacre, in the Cathedral Church of Lichfield, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein shall in like manner, and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the said perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Armitage, in lieu of and full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of twenty pounds now payable by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said prebend of Hansacre, and also of the annual sum or stipend of six pounds now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and of the annual sum or stipend of ten pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and provided also that the same tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes to be so vested as aforesaid, shall likewise be, and be held to be, charged and chargeable at all times for ever hereafter, exclusively and in exoneration of all other tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes or lands or other hereditaments and premises formerly belonging to the said prebend of Hansacre, with the liability to repair and maintain the chancel of the church of the said parish of Armitage.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Shepherd, Clerk, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Wellington, in the county and diocese of Hereford, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the eleventh schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Wellington, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Wellington, in the Cathedral Church of Hereford, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Wellington, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of sixteen pounds now payable by us to the said vicar or incumbent, in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said prebend of Wellington.

"And whereas it was agreed with the perpetual curate or incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of Saint John, Chigwell, that in consideration of a certain sum of money (provided by him for that purpose) to be paid by him to us for the purposes of our acts, we would submit to your Majesty in Council, a scheme for annexing to such benefice or church, the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, which are particularly described in the said fifth schedule hereunto annexed, and which are hereinbefore proposed to be annexed to the same benefice or church accordingly.

"And whereas such sum of money has been paid to us with interest thereon, as from the second day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"We humbly recommend and propose, that the hereinbefore recommended grant of tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes to the said benefice or church of Saint John, Chigwell, shall commence and take effect as from the last-mentioned date.

"And whereas the tithes or rent charges in lieu of tithes, which are hereinbefore recommended to be granted to the vicar of the said vicarage of Felpham, arise mainly upon and from certain lands and premises formerly vested in us, which were annexed to the said vicarage by virtue of another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one ;

"And whereas the vicar of the said vicarage of Felpham, has been placed in possession of the rents and profits of the land and premises above-mentioned, as from the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty ;

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the said grant of tithes or rent charges in lieu of tithes, hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said vicarage of Felpham, shall also commence and take effect as from the last-mentioned date.

"And whereas each of the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches enumerated in the twelfth schedule hereunto annexed, is so recommended by us in respect of property which became vested in us as reversioners on the expiration of a lease on or about the date set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule ;

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the several grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches enumerated in the said twelfth schedule hereunto annexed, shall commence and take effect in each case respectively as from the date so as aforesaid set opposite to the name of each of the said benefices.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed expedient, and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of any annual sum then in course of payment by us out of or chargeable upon our Common Fund to the incumbent of any of the said benefices or churches, or instead of any part of such annual sum, an investment of a sum in gross, or a grant or appropriation of land, or other hereditaments in fee, equivalent or superior thereto in point of net annual income, should be substituted for the benefit of the incumbent of such benefice or church and his successors (the incumbent for the time being in each case assenting to such substitution) ; nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the said benefices or churches, or to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Anne, situate at Bucks Mills, in the parish of Woolfardisworthy, in the hundred of Hartland, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Woolfardisworthy, and of the parish of Parkham, in the said county and diocese which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Woolfardisworthy, and of the said parish of Parkham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes; and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Bucks Mills aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter; of Lucy Elizabeth Hawkes, of Abbey-road, Saint John's Wood, in the county of Middlesex, Widow, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Woolfardisworthy; and of William Henry Stone, of Herne Hill, Dulwich, in the county of Surrey, Esquire, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Parkham (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Woolfardisworthy, and of the said parish of Parkham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Anne, situate at Bucks Mills aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Anne, Bucks Mills.'

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Lucy Elizabeth Hawkes and the said William Henry Stone (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry shall belong to, and be exercised by, Jane Marianne Elwes, of Walland Cary, in the said county of Devon, Widow, her heirs and assigns for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such

order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Anne, Bucks Mills, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Woolfardisworthy, in the hundred of Hartland, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Woolfardisworthy from the parish of Clovelly, in the same county and diocese, at a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. M. S. A. C. C. 1862, No. 1,' and placed at the middle of the western end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1740 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Woolfardisworthy, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the close numbered 1752 upon the same maps, and extending thence first eastward to and along the middle of such fence, and continuing first in the same direction and then southward and then again eastward along the middle of the fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 1741 and 1737 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 1752 as aforesaid, 1751, 1742 and 1736a upon the same maps, to a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Buckish Barton to Bitworthy, opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the last-described fence, dividing the close numbered 1737 from the close numbered 1736a as aforesaid; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said footpath as far as a point opposite to the middle of the western end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1735 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1736 upon the same maps, and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of the last described fence to a point in the middle of the road leading from Buckish Barton to Cranford, opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the same fence; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road to its junction with the road leading from Cranford to Buckish Cross; and extending thence first northward and then eastward along the middle of the last-described road to a point in the middle of the road leading from Buckish Cross past the house and premises formerly used as a public-house, and known as 'The Merry Harriers,' to Higher Almstone; and extending thence in a direction generally southward along the middle of the last-mentioned road to its junction with the road leading from Cranford to Way Town; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1626 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 1627 upon the same maps; and extending thence southward to and along the middle of the last-described fence, to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 1621 upon the said maps, from the close numbered 1627 as aforesaid; and extending thence first eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence and of the fences dividing the closes numbered respectively 1618 and 1617 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1627 as aforesaid, and from the closes numbered respectively 1629 and 1630 upon the same maps, to the boundary dividing the said parish of Woolfardisworthy from the parish of Parkham, in the hundred of Shebbear,

and in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the road leading from Parkham Church Town (past Walland Cottages) to Way Town opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 1617 from the close numbered 1630 as aforesaid; and also all that portion of the parish of Parkham aforesaid, which is situate to the north and west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Parkham from the said parish of Woolfardisworthy at a point in the middle of the road leading from Cranford to Way Town as aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction generally north-eastward along the middle of such road to its junction with the turnpike-road leading from Hartland to Bideford, at a point opposite to the middle of the southern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 1078 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Parkham, and upon the said map hereunto annexed from the close numbered 1042 upon the same maps; and extending thence first northward to and along the middle of such fence, and then either eastward or northward along the middle of the fences which divide the close numbered 1078 as aforesaid, and the closes numbered respectively 1239, 1240, 1237 and 1236 upon the last-mentioned maps from the closes numbered respectively 1079, 1080, 1238 and 1235 upon the same maps to the northern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 1236 from the close numbered 1235 as aforesaid; and continuing thence northward across a road leading from 'Hoops' public-house to Glover's Worthygate, and along the middle of the fence which divides the close numbered 1202 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 1203 and 1204 upon the same maps to a point in the middle of the road leading from Horns Cross to Bucks Mills opposite to the middle of the northern extremity of the fence dividing the said close numbered 1202 from the close numbered 1204 as aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the fence which divides the close numbered 1201 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1198 upon the same maps; and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the last-described fence to its junction with the fence dividing the close numbered 1199 upon the said maps from the close numbered 1192 as aforesaid; and extending thence first northward then westward and then again northward along the middle of the last-described fence to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. M. St. A. C. C. 1862, No. 2,' and placed at the northern extremity of the same fence; and extending thence in a direct line due north across the close numbered 1403 on the said maps to the northern boundary of the said parish of Parkham."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint Anne, situate at Bucks Mills, in the parish of Woolfardisworthy, in the hundred of Hartland, and in the county of Devon, be accordingly formed; and that the

agreement, mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, Jane Marianne Elwes, of Walland Cary, in the said county of Devon, Widow, her heirs and assigns for ever; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of another Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter ninety-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for augmenting the income of the archdeaconry of Essex, in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas by the first recited Act it is enacted that any archdeaconry may, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed, amongst other modes, by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as to raise the average annual income to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, provided that no archdeacon shall be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation or other emolument as such archdeacon, under the provisions of the same Act, unless he shall be resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry is situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licences for non-residence which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and the residence of the clergy in the same Act mentioned; and it is by the said first recited Act further enacted, that upon the endowment of an archdeaconry being made under the provisions thereof, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments (except any right of patronage), belonging to such archdeaconry at the time of such endowment may, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of any archdeacon in possession at the time of the passing of the same Act, and, by the authority therein provided, be vested in us for the purposes of the same Act.

"And whereas by the secondly recited Act it is declared and enacted that in the case of any archdeaconry which shall no longer be held by the archdeacon who was, at the time of the passing of the said first recited Act, in possession thereof,

the provisions of the same Act, which relate to the transfer to us of the estates of any archdeaconry upon its endowment in either of the modes therein provided, shall be construed and held to authorize such transfer with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of the archdeacon in possession of the archdeaconry at the time.

"And whereas the said archdeaconry of Essex is endowed by the annexation thereto of the manor of Senables, situate in the parish of West Ham, in the said county of Essex, and the lands, tenements, and hereditaments thereunto belonging, now demised upon a lease for lives, and it has been made to appear to us that the net average annual income of the archdeaconry arising from other sources does not exceed sixty pounds.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, and of the Venerable Carew Anthony Saint John-Mildmay, the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Essex, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, out of the said common fund, to the said Carew Anthony Saint John-Mildmay and his successors in the said archdeaconry, so long as he and they shall respectively hold the same, and shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the said first recited Act the annual sum of one hundred and forty pounds on the first day of January in every year, and every such whole yearly payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate under the hand of the bishop of the diocese for the time being, that the said Carew Anthony Saint John-Mildmay, or his successor, for the time being, in the said archdeaconry, has duly resided as aforesaid during the preceding year, or on the production to us of a licence of non-residence, and that the first such yearly payment shall be made on the first day of January next.

"And we further recommend and propose that a proportionate part of one such yearly payment, calculated in respect of the period between the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and the first day of January last, shall be made immediately upon the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and upon our being satisfied that for the last-mentioned period the said Carew Anthony Saint John-Mildmay has duly resided within the diocese of Rochester; and that all lands, tenements, and hereditaments whatsoever (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), now forming part of the endowment of the said Archdeaconry of Essex, shall forthwith be disannexed therefrom and become and be absolutely transferred to and vested in us, subject to any existing lease or leases, grant or grants thereof, for the purposes of the said Acts, and that we shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from and after the first day of July now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said

scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas the vicarage of the said parish of Dunham and the said chapelries of Darlton and Ragnall form one united benefice, and there is, in addition to the parish church of Dunham, a chapel for each of such chapelries.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that it is not expedient at present to create either of the said chapelries a separate and independent cure and benefice; but that it is desirable, in order to the due pastoral superintendence of the said parish and chapelries, that the income of the Incumbent should be augmented, and that provision should be made for the maintenance of a duly licensed Curate.

"And whereas in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, certain lands, tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithe, and other hereditaments and premises, situate or arising within the said parish of Dunham and chapelries of Darlton and Ragnall, became vested in us, under the authority and for the purposes of the herein firstly mentioned Act, subject nevertheless to a beneficial lease thereof, which expired in the month of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us, out of the common fund in the said acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the Vicar or Incumbent, for the time being, of the vicarage of the said parish

of Dunham with the chapelries of Darlton and Ragnall annexed, the sum of eighteen pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year; and that on the first day of May next there shall, in respect of the time which has elapsed since the determination of the hereinbefore mentioned lease, be paid by us, to such vicar or incumbent, three such half-yearly payments.

"And we further recommend and propose that there shall also be paid by us, out of the common fund aforesaid, in each and every year, to the said vicar or incumbent, the sum of one hundred pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year: provided always that the said half yearly payment in respect of the last-mentioned sum of one hundred pounds shall be made only upon the production to us, on or before the first day of May and the first day of November aforesaid, of a certificate, under the hand of the Bishop of the diocese, that a Curate, duly licensed by such Bishop, has been employed within the said parish of Dunham, or within one or other of the said chapelries of Darlton and Ragnall, during the preceding half year.

"And we further recommend and propose that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum of eighteen pounds, hereinbefore recommended to be paid by us to the Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Dunham with the chapelries of Darlton and Ragnall annexed, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditaments should be conveyed or assigned to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the twenty-third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and made or expressed to be made between the Reverend William Clement Bowen, Perpetual Curate of the perpetual curacy of Llanstinan, in the county of Pembroke, and in the diocese of Saint David's, of the first part; the Reverend James Propert Williams, Clerk, Subchanter of the cathedral church of Saint David's, Patron of the said perpetual curacy, of the second part; the Right Reverend Connop, Lord Bishop of Saint David's, Ordinary of the said perpetual curacy, of the third part; and us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the fourth part; certain lands and hereditaments, situate in the parish of Llanarth, in the county of Cardigan, and in the parish of Fishguard, in the county of Pembroke, and particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, became, and are now, vested in us, in fee simple for the purposes, and subject to the provisions, applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

county of Worcester, particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, became vested in us for an estate of inheritance, in fee-simple in possession, except a small portion thereof containing one acre or thereabouts, which became vested in us for the residue of a leasehold term of two thousand years, created by an indenture, bearing date the tenth day of August, in the year one thousand seven hundred and twenty-five.

"And whereas some portions of the said lands, hereditaments, and premises, on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, hereditaments, and premises, so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of an Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one

hundred and thirteen, and of an Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the Dean and Chapter of the collegiate church at Westminster.

"Whereas it is by the said recited Acts enacted that, by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, any arrangements might from time to time be made, with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments.

"And whereas the said Dean and Chapter of Westminster are seised in fee of certain lands, tithes, and hereditaments, situate in the parish of Castle Morton, in the county of Worcester, and particularly described in the Schedule hereto annexed, subject, nevertheless, to a subsisting lease thereof, bearing date the thirteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, granted for three lives, then aged respectively fourteen, fifteen, and twelve years, of whom only two now survive, at an annual reserved rent of ten pounds and ten shillings.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter are now entitled to grant a renewal of the said lease by the insertion therein of a best life, and it has been represented to us by the said dean and chapter that the lessee is desirous of taking such renewal, but that it is not expedient to grant the same.

"And whereas after full enquiry and calculation, we have estimated the fine which ought to be paid for such renewal at the sum of one thousand five hundred and twenty-five pounds, and the sums which, after full stating the existing lease the dean and chapter might have expected to have derived from the before-mentioned annual reserved rent, and from future fines upon renewals, as equivalent to an annuity of fifty pounds.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund that the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments should be transferred from the said dean and chapter to us, and that a money payment to the said dean and chapter should forthwith be substituted for their interest in the same.

"And whereas the said dean and chapter have consented to accept a money payment accordingly, and that the same shall be the sum of one thousand five hundred and twenty-five pounds, being the amount of such fine as aforesaid, and also a perpetual annual payment of fifty pounds in respect of the sums which they might have expected to have received from fines on future renewals, and from the reserved rent hereinbefore mentioned, and thereupon to relinquish all further benefit by renewal of the said lease, or otherwise, in respect of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of the collegiate church of Westminster testified by their having hereunto affixed their corporate seal, that the lands, tithes, and hereditaments, situate at Castle Morton aforesaid, and particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, and all the estate and interest of the said Dean and Chapter therein shall, immediately upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, become and be transferred to, and absolutely vested in us and our successors, subject to the now subsisting lease thereof, for the purposes of the said hereinbefore recited Acts, and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seised of the same, in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

"And we further recommend and propose, that as part consideration for the transfer to us of such lands, tithes, and hereditaments as aforesaid, there shall, at the same time, be paid by us to the said Dean and Chapter the aforesaid sum of one thousand five hundred and twenty-five pounds, and that there shall, as a further consideration, be paid by us to the said Dean and Chapter the said perpetual annual sum of fifty pounds, by equal half yearly payments, the first of such half yearly payments to be made on the twenty-ninth day of September next ensuing.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

SCHEDULE.

"All that part of the inappropriate rectory or parsonage of Longdon, lying and being within the parish of Morton Castle, otherwise Castle Morton, in the county of Worcester, together with all such part or parts of the glebe lands thereto belonging as lie within such parish; and also all that the tithe commutation, rent charge, or annual sum of three hundred and fifty pounds, six shillings, and eight pence, arising within the said parish of Morton Castle, otherwise Castle Morton, which, on the commutation of the tithes within such parish, was assigned and allotted in lieu of the tithes belonging to the said rectory or parsonage arising therein; all which said lands, tithes, and hereditaments are now in the possession of John Wedgwood, his heirs, undertenants, or assigns, by virtue of a lease thereof granted on the thirteenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, by the Dean and Chapter of the collegiate church of Saint Peter, Westminster, to the said John Wedgwood, for three lives, then aged respectively fourteen, fifteen, and twelve years, subject to an annual reserved rent of ten pounds and ten shillings, and to the covenants contained in the said lease."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of London.

WHEREAS by the 410th section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted, that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected. And whereas the Commissioners of northern lighthouses are erecting, and about to light, certain new lighthouses at the undermentioned places, viz., on Holborn Head, Scrabster, County Caithness, on the Butt of the Lewis Hebrides:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that upon the completion and lighting of the said lights respectively, there shall be paid in respect of each of the said lights, for every vessel, whether British or Foreign, which may pass or derive benefit from such light, the toll of eight sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if

on an oversea voyage; and one sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on a coasting voyage. And that the said tolls, in respect of each of the said lighthouses, shall be levied by the Commissioners of northern lighthouses, subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent. on vessels engaged in oversea voyages, and of sixty per cent. on vessels engaged in coasting voyages, mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the consolidated tables of light duties, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption, sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the seventh and eight years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the office of County Coroner," it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration a petition presented to Her as directed by the said Act, by the Justices of any county in General or Quarter Sessions assembled (and in the counties of York and Lincoln in General Gaol Sessions assembled), praying the division of such county into two or more districts, for the purposes of the said Act, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts, for the purposes of the said Act, as to Her Majesty with the advice aforesaid shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and to determine at what place within each district the court for the election of Coroner for such district shall be holden, as in the said Act is provided.

And whereas in and by the twenty-seventh section of the said Act, it was, and is provided, "That nothing in the said Act contained touching the divisions of counties into districts, or the appointment or election of Coroners, should extend to the county of Chester, or any county palatine, city, borough, town, liberty, franchise, part or place the appointment or election of Coroner whereof, takes place by law otherwise than under the writ *De Coronatore eligendo*." And whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to the Election Duties and Payment of County Coroners," various provisions were and are made with reference to the election and remuneration of Coroners, and other matters relating to the exercise of the office of Coroner.

And whereas Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in and for the three Ridings of the county of York, in General Gaol Sessions assembled, on the sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, in accordance with the provisions of the said first-mentioned Act, duly certified under the hands and seals of two of the said Justices present when such petition was

agreed to, setting forth that the said Justices had had under consideration the said several Acts: That at a General Gaol Sessions of the said Justices, held at the Castle of York, in the said county of York, on the tenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, it was resolved by the Justices then and there assembled, that for the purposes of the said two several Acts of Parliament, it was expedient that such parts of the county of York as were not excepted by the operation of the twenty-seventh section of the said first-mentioned Act, should be divided into the districts set forth in a certain schedule thereunder written: that the same districts should be designated by the several names also specified in the said schedule: that the places mentioned in the second column of the said schedule, should be those within each district at which the courts for the election of Coroners for each such districts should be holden, and that a petition should be presented to Her Majesty, praying that such division, and the appointment of such places for the holding of the said courts should be made accordingly: that, thereupon, the consideration of the said petition was adjourned until the said sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and notice thereof was duly given to all the Coroners of the said county, according to the provisions of the said first-mentioned Act, and the petitioners had conferred with every Coroner who had attended that meeting of the petitioners, touching such petition. The petitioners accordingly humbly prayed Her Majesty, that with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, Her Majesty would be graciously pleased to order and direct, that, for the purposes of the said two several Acts of Parliament, such parts of the county of York as are not excepted by the section therein and hereinbefore referred to in that behalf, should be divided into the districts set forth in the schedule thereunder and hereunder written, that the same districts should be designated by the several names also specified in the said schedule; and that the places mentioned in the second column of the said schedule, should be those within each district at which the courts for the election of coroners for each such district should be holden. And the petitioners further humbly certified to Her Majesty, that the reasons on which the petition was founded were, that the division and arrangement submitted to Her Majesty was that, which having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of the inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as appeared fit to be considered, in carrying into execution the provisions of the said Acts, the petitioners conceived to be best suited to promote the convenience and advantage of the inhabitants of the said county.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that such parts of the county of York as are not excepted by the operation of the twenty-seventh section of the first-mentioned Act, be divided into ten districts, being the districts set forth in the schedule to the said petition, and hereunder written, and that the same districts shall be designated by the several names, also specified in the said schedule, and that the places mentioned in the second column of of the said schedule, shall be those within each district at which the courts for the election of coroners for each such district shall be holden, and which said schedule was and is in the words and columns following, that is to say:—

No person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a pilot unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship to a pilot of the district for five years, and been at least two years in the coasting or over-sea trade, or shall have been engaged in the coasting trade in the waters of the

district for not less than five years, and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-five years or more than forty-five years of age.*

8. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot in the district unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz. :—

- 1st. He must be able to give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- 2nd. The rise, velocity, and set of the tides.
- 3rd. The depth and character of the soundings.
- 4th. The best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.
- 5th. The sand-banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers.
- 6th. The landmarks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distance.
- 7th. The appearance of the different headlands.
- 8th. The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor, unmoor, and get under weigh, and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

9. Each pilot shall provide himself with a good and efficient skiff or boat, which shall be registered and licensed by the Pilotage Board for the port to which he may belong, which skiff or boat shall be kept in good repair, and subject to periodical examination by the Pilotage Board, only it may be permitted that two, or not more than three pilots may sail in the same boat, and act in conjunction, at the discretion of the Board, and that there shall be one indentured apprentice to each boat.

10. Each pilot-skiff or boat shall have on the stern the name of the owner thereof, and the name of the port to which she belongs, painted in white letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long; on each bow, the number of the license of such boat or ship, and shall have the first letter of her port marked in black paint, of not less than three feet in length in her mainsail, and shall, by day, carry at her mast-head a flag of not less than four feet by three feet, of two colours, the upper horizontal half white, and the lower horizontal half red; and at "night," a white light only, at the masthead, and shall exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes, under a penalty of not exceeding £20 for non-compliance.

11. Any pilot who shall refuse or neglect to proceed to sea when ordered by the Clerk or other person duly appointed by the Board, unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstances, or who shall be guilty of drunkenness when in the discharge of his duty, or of insolent or unwarrantable conduct towards any master, owner, or agent, of vessel for which he may be engaged, shall be liable to penalty of not exceeding £5 for the first offence, and for the second or any subsequent offence, to a like penalty, or the loss of his license.

12. Any pilot who shall absent himself from duty, or who may go overland to take charge of any ship or vessel, or who shall seek employment otherwise than in his own boat, without the written consent of the Board, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than £5 nor exceeding £10.

13. Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound, except to a port to which he is not licensed,

shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock lock, or harbour of the port; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port to which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound, to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding £10, or the loss of his license.

14. That every pilot shall, from time to time, conform himself strictly to all directions which shall be given to him by the Harbour or Dock-Masters touching the mooring, unmooring, placing, or removing of any ship or vessel under his charge, as long as such ship or vessel shall be lying and situate within the limits of the authority of such Harbour or Dock-Masters.

15. Every master, owner, or agent, of any vessel navigating the Bristol Channel within the limits of this pilotage, who shall employ any unlicensed person to act as, or perform the duty of a pilot, unless proved that no licensed pilot could be obtained, or who shall retain such unlicensed pilot on board to act as a pilot, after a licensed pilot shall have offered his services, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding fifty pounds for every such offence.

16. If any vessel, whilst in charge of a pilot, does, or receives damage, the circumstances of the accident will be investigated by the Board, and the Board may, if it see fit, require the license of the pilot to be given up to the Board, until the case has been disposed of.

17. The licenses of the pilots shall be renewed annually, or otherwise, at the discretion of the Board, in the first week in January, and a fee of two pounds and two shillings shall be paid by each pilot to the Board upon receiving his license, and one guinea upon each renewal of it, and each pilot shall pay to the Board an annual sum of two shillings and sixpence for registering his boat.

18. Each pilot shall, within twenty-four hours from his return from a cruise, report himself to the Clerk to the Board, and make a full and proper return (according to a form which shall be provided by the Board), of all vessels he may have piloted, moneys received during the cruise, date of sailing, &c. Penalty not exceeding £5 for the first offence, and the loss of his license, for any subsequent one.

19. The pilots are permitted to collect their own pilotage rates, or they may be collected by a person who may be appointed for the purpose by the Board; and every pilot is required to make a monthly return to the Board of the pilotage earned by him, whether in piloting vessels to or from the Port of Newport or elsewhere, the name and tonnage of the vessels piloted—where belonging, where from, and where bound—the cargo and the distance piloted, paying over at the same time a poundage of one shilling in the pound on the amount earned to the person appointed by the Board to receive it. Each pilot shall provide himself with a good and efficient skiff or pilot boat, which shall be approved of and registered by the Board, and such skiff or boat shall be kept in good repair, and be subject to periodical examination by the Board, and there shall be one indentured apprentice to each boat. Two, but not more than three pilots, may, by the permission of the Board, sail in the same boat, and act in conjunction.

8. If from stress of weather or accident, any ship or vessel be compelled to bear up and return from the westward, the pilot in charge shall, upon completion of his engagement, be entitled to one-third pilotage, for the distance for which he may have been engaged, in addition to the fixed rates.

9. Each pilot's skiff or boat shall have her number painted on each bow, and the name of the pilot or pilots as well as her own name, and the name of the port, painted in legible characters upon the stern, and shall have the first letter of her port marked in black paint, of not less than four feet in length in her mainsail, and shall by day carry at her mast-head a flag of not less than four feet by three feet, of two colours, the upper horizontal half *white*, and the lower horizontal half *red*, and at night a white light only at the mast-head, and shall exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes, under a penalty of £20 for non-compliance.

10. Each pilot shall, within twenty-four hours after his return from a cruise, report himself to the clerk and make a full and proper return, giving the number of his boat, the day of his last sailing for sea, the distance he proceeded, the number of ships spoken, the date of his return, the name, flag, and captain's name, of the ship he may have taken in charge or brought to port, together with the port from which the ship may have come, if in ballast or with cargo, with the name of the consignee, and the draft of water of the ship, and registered tonnage. Penalty not exceeding £5 for the first offence, and the loss of his license for any subsequent offence.

11. Each pilot shall deliver all money received by him for pilotage, with an account and vouchers, to the clerk, on the day following that on which they are received, or in case of such vouchers and money being received at sea, then they shall be delivered to the clerk as soon as the pilot returns to port; and all claims for extra days shall be inserted in the certificate for pilotage, and signed for by the master of the vessel. 14. Any pilot who may absent himself from duty, or go overland to take charge of any ship or vessel, or seek employment otherwise than in his own boat, without the written consent of the clerk, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

15. Any pilot taking charge of a vessel not bound to the port to which he is licensed, shall be paid the rates, and be governed by the laws established at the port to which such vessel is bound.

Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound, shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock, basin, or harbour of the port; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port for which he is not licensed, he shall be reduced from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound, to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding £10, or the loss of his license.

20. If any vessel, whilst in charge of a pilot, does or receives damage, the circumstances of the accident will be investigated by the Board, and the Board may, if it see fit, require the license of the pilot to be given up to the Board, until the case has been disposed of.

21. Each pilot shall keep in his possession his license, together with a printed copy of the present rates, bye-laws, and regulations, and shall produce the same to the captain or commander of any ship or vessel, when required so to do, under a penalty not exceeding £10.

No. 2. Pilots taken on board of any vessel inward bound to the westward of Ilfracombe, shall be paid the same pilotage rates as from Lundy Island; if between the Nash Point and Ilfracombe, the same rates as from the Nash Point; if between the Nash Point and the Holmes, the same rates as from the Nash Point; and if between the Holmes and King Road, the same rates as from the Holmes.

No. 3. Pilots, discharged from any vessel on the outward voyage between any of the stages mentioned in the above scale of rates, shall be paid the same pilotage rates as if they had been taken to the next stage beyond the place where they were discharged.

No. 4. All vessels piloted to Chepstow or to Lydney shall pay the same pilotage rates as to Sharpness, and *vice versa*, with the exception of coal laden vessels coastwise to or from Lydney under 200 tons register, and such vessels shall pay the following charges each way, viz. :—

No. 5. All light vessels between King Road and Sharpness, or any intermediate point, shall be entitled to one-fifth reduction on the full pilotage charges for that portion of the district: and all vessels propelled or towed wholly by steam power, between King Road and Sharpness, or any intermediate point, shall be entitled to a further reduction of one-fourth of the full pilotage charges for that portion of the district.

Any pilot who shall be detained at the request of the master, or owner, or agent of any vessel in King Road, waiting for water up the river Severn; or outward bound in any roadstead on account of contrary winds, longer than twenty-four hours, shall be paid ten shillings a day for each day's detention, in addition to the pilotage rates.

No. 9. In case any vessel shall be compelled to bear up and return from the westward from stress of weather or accident, the pilot in charge shall be entitled to, and shall be paid one-third of the pilotage charge in addition, according to the distance such vessel may have reached, before she shall have put back.

No. 11. The pilots are permitted to collect their own pilotage rates, or they may be collected by a person who may be appointed for the purpose by the Board; and every pilot is required to make a monthly return to the Board of the pilotage earned by him, whether in piloting vessels to or from the Port of Gloucester or elsewhere, the name and tonnage of the vessels piloted, where belonging, where from, and where bound, the cargo and the distance piloted; paying over at the same time a poundage of one shilling in the pound on the amount earned to the person appointed by the Board to receive it. The pilots shall also state in such return all cases where vessels bound to or from Gloucester have been piloted over any and what portion of the district by a pilot not licensed for the port. Pilots making a false return shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds, and may, at the discretion of the Board, forfeit their licenses.

No. 12. Subject to the provisions contained in the 24th Section of the Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861, no person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a pilot, unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a pilot of the district, and been at least two years in the coasting or over sea trade, or shall have been engaged as master in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years; and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-five years or more than forty-five years of age.

No. 13. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot in the district unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz. :

- 1st.—He must be able to give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- 2.—The rise, velocity, and set of the tides.
- 3.—The depth and character of the soundings.
- 4.—The best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.

- 5.—The sand banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers.
- 6.—The land marks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distance.
- 7.—The appearance of the different headlands.
- 8.—The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor, unmoor, and get under weigh, and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

No. 14. Each pilot shall provide himself with a good and efficient skiff or pilot boat, which shall be approved of and registered by the Board, which skiff or boat shall be kept in good repair, and be subject to periodical examination by the Board. The Board may permit, two, but not more than three pilots to sail in the same boat and act in conjunction. There shall be one indentured apprentice to each boat.

No. 15. Each pilot's skiff or boat shall be painted black or tarred on the outside; shall have the number of the licence painted in white on each bow, and the name of the pilot and the port to which she belongs painted on her stern, in white letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long, and shall have the first letter of her port marked in black paint of not less than three feet in length in her mainsail, and shall by day, carry at her masthead a flag of not less than four feet by three feet, of two colours, the upper horizontal half white, and the lower horizontal half red, and at night a white light only at the masthead, and shall exhibit a flare-up light every fifteen minutes, under a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for non-compliance.

No. 16. Any pilot who shall refuse or neglect to proceed to sea when ordered by the Clerk or other person duly appointed by the Board, unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstances, or who shall be guilty of drunkenness when in the discharge of his duty, or of insolent and unwarrantable conduct towards any master, owner, or agent of any vessel for which he may be engaged, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds, or the loss of his licence.

No. 17. Any pilot who may absent himself from duty without the written consent of the Board or the Clerk of such Board, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds; and no pilot shall be absent from Sharpness more than seven days at a time under a like penalty, unless from unavoidable circumstances.

No. 18. Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound, except to a port to which he is not licensed, shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock, basin, or harbour of the port; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port to which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound, to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, or the loss of his licence.

No. 19. Every master, owner, or agent of any vessel who shall employ within the limits of this pilotage district, any unlicensed person to act as, or perform the duty of pilot, unless proved that no licensed pilot could be obtained, or who shall retain such unlicensed pilot on board to act as a pilot after a licensed pilot shall have offered his services, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding fifty pounds for every such offence.

No. 20. If any vessel, whilst in charge of a pilot, does, or receives damage, the circumstances of the accident will be investigated by the Board, and the Board may, if it see fit, require the licence of the pilot to be given up to the Board until the case has been disposed of.

No. 21. The pilots shall make a survey of the river Severn between King-road and Sharpness, at low water, once a month at least, and shall report from time to time to the Board any changes which may have taken place in the navigable channel.

No. 22. The licences of the pilots shall be renewed annually, or otherwise, at the discretion of the Board, in the first week in January, and a fee of two pounds and two shillings shall be paid by each pilot to the Board upon receiving his licence, and one pound one shilling upon each renewal of it; and each pilot shall pay to the Board an annual sum of two shillings and sixpence for registering his boat.

No. 23. In cases of dispute between masters of vessels and pilots, the decision of the Board shall be final.

No. 24. Each pilot shall be furnished with, and keep in his possession, a printed copy of these Bye-Laws and regulations, and he shall produce the same to the master of any vessel or other person employing him when required to do so, under a penalty, in case of default, of not exceeding five pounds.

And whereas certain Orders in Council have been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards and burial ground hereinafter mentioned, from the time mentioned in such Orders respectively; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards and burial-ground be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards and burial ground be postponed, as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Kington, Herefordshire, from the tenth of April to the tenth of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

In the churchyard of Beaumaris, from the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to the thirty-first of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three. In Saint John's Churchyard, Dukinfield, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; provided that interments be conducted in accordance with the regulations contained in the Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

In the burial-ground of the Methodist New Connection Chapel, Dukinfield, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, provided that the burials be conducted in accordance with the regulations contained in the Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and that no new graves be opened in the north-west compartment of the burial-ground, nor within eighteen feet of the north-east portion of the boundary.

In the churchyard of Holy Trinity, Rotherhithe, so far as the part called the "Best Ground" is concerned, from the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, on the same conditions as those contained in the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the thirteenth of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

In the churchyard of Saint John, Bacup, near Manchester, from the sixth of April, to the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

And whereas by an Order in Council of the eleventh December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, it was directed that burials should be wholly discontinued, from and after the first of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the churchyard of East Hornington, Wells, Somersetshire, and whereas it seems fit that the said Order be varied: now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased to order that interments be permitted in that part of the churchyard which is not within twenty feet of the edge of the well there, provided that the Regulations for new burial-grounds be observed, and that the only bodies interred be those of parishioners of Hornington Chapelry (excluding non-parishioners who may die at the Somerset County Asylum).

2nd. National and Foreign vessels which may enter the ports of the island for commercial purposes shall pay, besides the port dues, the tonnage dues indicated in the "Arancel," according to their tonnage specified in the builder's certificate.

The above regulations are to come into force four months subsequent to the publication of the Royal Order, on the 28th March last.

(No. 6—ATLANTIC—UNITED STATES.)

Alteration of Lights at Navesink.

THE United States' Lighthouse Board has given notice, that on after the 1st day of May, 1862, lights will be shown from the two new light-towers which are being erected at Navesink, coast of New Jersey, a few feet in the rear of the two existing light-towers, from which one fixed and one revolving light have hitherto been exhibited.

The lights will be *fixed* white lights. Both lights will be placed 258 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather for a distance of about 25 miles.

The illuminating apparatus of each light will be dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The light-towers, built of reddish gray granite, are each 53½ feet high, from base to lantern deck. They stand 228 feet apart, and preserve the bearings of the old towers from each other. The old towers will be removed.

The mariner should bear in mind, that in approaching the entrance of the bay of New York from the southward, he may see (if within their range) the *fixed* light at Absecom, or the *flashing* light, visible every *ten seconds*, at Barnegat on the New Jersey coast, and then the two *fixed* lights at Navesink. Or if approaching from the eastward, after passing the *fixed* light, varied by a *flash* every *two minutes*, on Montauk point, the east extreme of Long Island, he may see the *fixed* light on the north side of Shinnecock bay, or the *revolving* light, every *minute*, at Fire Island.

The Navesink lights are 38½ miles northward of Barnegat light, and 38 miles westward of Fire Island light. The Barnegat and Navesink lights will be seen at the same time in clear weather, in 16 fathoms water, and at 13 miles from the New Jersey beach. The Fire Island and Navesink lights will be seen at the same time in clear

weather, in 16 fathoms water, and at 17 miles from Long Island beach.
