The **QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James the Less, situate in Upper Garden-street, in the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Tothill-fields (heretofore part of the parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Westminster), in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint James the Less, situate in Upper Garden-street aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said district chapelry of Saint Mary, Tothill-fields, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church,

and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint James the Less, Upper Garden-street, Westminster.'

"And with the like consent of the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of London, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that so long as the Reverend John Jennings, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Westminster, shall remain such rector or incumbent, all the fees which shall be payable in respect of the solemnization or performance of marriages at the said church of Saint James the Less, shall be paid by the said minister thereof to the said John Jennings.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint James the Less, Upper Garden-street, Westminster, being:—

All that part of the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Tothill-fields (heretofore part of the parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Westminster), in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the south-west of an imaginary line, extending along the middle of Vauxhall-bridge-road."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint James the Less, situate in Upper Garden-street, in the district chapelry of Saint Mary, Tothill-fields, in the county of Middlesex, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint James the Less, Upper Garden-street, Westminster," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, with reference to the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, bap-

tisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for compensating the Reverend John William Grier, perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the new parish of Amblecoat, otherwise Amblecote, in the counties of Stafford and Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, whose fees, dues, or other emoluments, have been diminished by reason of proceedings under the said Act.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that the fees, dues, or other emoluments, of the said John William Grier, as such perpetual curate or incumbent as aforesaid, have been diminished by reason of the constitution under the provisions of the said Act of the District of Wollaston, which has since become a new parish, under the provisions of the same Act, and that the assignment to the said John William Grier, of the annual sum hereinafter mentioned, would be a just and reasonable compensation for such diminution.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us to the said John William Grier, perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the New Parish of Amblecoat, otherwise Amblecote, aforesaid, so long as he shall remain such perpetual curate or incumbent, and no longer, the annual sum of ten pounds, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, by way of compensation for the loss of fees, dues, or other emoluments, sustained by him by reason of the formation of the District of Wollaston, which has since become a new parish, as before mentioned.

“And we further recommend and propose that payment of the said annual sum of ten pounds shall be held to commence as from the seventeenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, being the day on which a church provided for the said new parish of Wollaston was consecrated, and from which day the incumbent of the same new parish became empowered to perform in the church thereof various offices which had theretofore been performed at the church of the said new parish of Amblecoat, otherwise Amblecote, and also became entitled to

retain for his own benefit the fees accruing therefrom.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

“We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

“And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Aberpergwm; Saint James, Bath, with the chapelry of Corn-street annexed; Biggin; Saint Stephen, Bowling; Greenhow-hill; Hatfield; Havenstreet; Saint Mary, Lowton; Milcombe; Ribchester; Smallthorn; Walton, in the county of York; and Saint James's, High Wych; are so recommended by us, either partly or wholly in consideration of benefactions which have been paid over to us on behalf of, or have been otherwise legally secured to such benefices or churches

as from the dates hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—in the case of the perpetual curacy of Aberpergwm, as from the fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the rectory of Saint James, Bath, with the chapelry of Corn-street annexed, as from the twenty-first day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Biggin, as from the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Stephen, Bowling, as from the sixteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Greenhow-hill, as from the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Hatfield, as from the twenty-fifth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Havenstreet, as from the twenty-seventh day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Mary, Lowton, as from the fifth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Milcombe, as from the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; in the case of the vicarage of Ribchester, as from the eleventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Smallthorn, as from the twenty-eighth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty; in the case of the perpetual curacy of Walton, in the county of York, as from the twenty-eighth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine; and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint James's, High Wych, as from the eleventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants which are hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices or churches respectively, shall in each case commence and take effect as from the respective dates at which such benefactions were so paid over to us or were otherwise legally secured as aforesaid.

"And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Holy Trinity, Darlington, Hendon; Lanchester; Litton; Saint Paul, Bunhill-row, London; Saint Matthew, City-road, London; All Saints, Haggerstone or Stonebridge, London; Saint Mary, Haggerstone, London; Saint Paul, Haggerstone, London; Saint John, Hoxton, London; Holy Trinity, Hoxton, London; Saint Barnabas, King-square, London; Saint Mark, Old-street, London; Saint Cuthbert, Stella, and Walford, are so recommended by us, with special reference to and in compliance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the several grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said last-mentioned benefices or churches shall commence and take effect as from the twenty-eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, being the day on which the said secondly mentioned Act received your Majesty's assent.

"And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Saint John, Bowling; Budehaven; Colnbrook; Saint Thomas, Elson; West Hartle-

pool; Hempton; All Saints, Hereford; Llanuwchllyn; Peak Forest; Skegby; and Lower Whitley, were voted and agreed upon by us on or about the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, that being the commencement of our financial half-year.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said lastly mentioned benefices or churches shall commence and take effect in each case as from the said first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Billinge and Minera are so recommended in respect of the proceeds which have accrued to us under certain mining leases of glebe lands, belonging to the incumbents of those benefices or churches respectively, which leases have been granted by such incumbents with our consent, under the provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eight.

"And whereas the dates at which the receipts under such leases have accrued are various; but the first day of April and the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty appear to us to be as nearly as may be the mean of the dates at which such receipts have accrued to us in each instance.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice of Billinge shall commence and take effect as from the said first day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice of Minera shall commence and take effect as from the said first day of May in the last-mentioned year.

"And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Alton Pancras is so recommended by us in respect of property which became vested in us by the expiration of a lease at or about the twenty-fifth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

"And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Scamblesby is so recommended by us in respect of property which became vested in us by the expiration of a lease, at or about the seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the annual payments respectively so recommended by us as last-mentioned, shall, in each case, commence and take effect as from the respective dates of the expiration of such leases as aforesaid, that is to say; that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice or church of Alton Pancras shall commence and take effect as from the said twenty-fifth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty; and that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Scamblesby shall commence and take effect as from the said seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

"And whereas the grant hereinbefore proposed to be made to the benefice or church of Saint Peter Earley was recommended by our Estates Committee, at a meeting held on the 8th day of

August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the said proposed grant to the benefice or church of Saint Peter Earley shall commence and take effect as from such last-mentioned date.

"And whereas the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Pokesdown is to be recommended by us in respect of the balance of certain moneys which have been held by us for the purpose of providing a parsonage house for the said benefice or church.

"And whereas such parsonage house has now been completed and interest is no longer payable by us to the incumbent of such benefice or church in respect of such moneys.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the grant hereinbefore proposed to be made to the said benefice or church of Pokesdown shall commence and take effect as from the twenty-fourth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, being the day upon which interest upon such moneys ceased to be payable by us as aforesaid.

"And whereas, by and under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, certain estates, theretofore vested in us, were assigned to the Archbishoprick of York, as a permanent endowment of such Archbishoprick, and such assignment took effect as from the thirtieth day of June in the last-mentioned year.

"And whereas the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Nether Poppleton is so recommended by us in respect of the reserved rent formerly payable to the Archbishop of the said Archbishoprick of York, under a lease of certain property forming a part of the ancient estates of such Archbishoprick, which property was, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, enfranchised by the then Archbishop, with the consent of the Church Estates Commissioners, appointed under the provisions of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the said grant, hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Nether Poppleton, shall commence and take effect as from the day from which the aforesaid re-endowment of the See of York took effect, videlicet the thirtieth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"And whereas the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Saint Thomas, Salisbury, is so recommended by us in pursuance of an agreement entered into between us and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Salisbury upon the occasion of the transfer to us of the estates formerly belonging to such Chapter, which said transfer was effected by or under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and took effect as from the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the said hereinbefore recommended grant to the benefice of Saint Thomas, Salisbury, shall commence and take effect from the last-mentioned date.

"And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Coddington and Fridaythorpe are so recommended by us in respect of property

formerly belonging to the prebend of Stoke, and to the prebends of Fridaythorpe and Wetwang; and whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Lynesack with Softley, is so recommended by us in respect of property formerly belonging to the bishoprick of Durham.

"And whereas the property formerly belonging to the said prebend of Stoke became vested in us upon the avoidance of the said prebend by the last holder thereof, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine; and the property formerly belonging to the said prebends of Fridaythorpe and Wetwang became vested in us upon the avoidance of the said prebends by the last holders thereof, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five respectively; and the property formerly belonging to the said bishoprick of Durham became vested in us in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

"And whereas the incumbents of the said lastly-mentioned benefices or churches of Coddington, Fridaythorpe, and Lynesack with Softley, were not licensed thereto until after the dates at which the property in each instance became vested in us as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that the grants hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefices or churches of Coddington, Fridaythorpe, and Lynesack with Softley, shall, in each instance, commence and take effect as from the dates at which the present incumbents of such benefices or churches were licensed thereto by the bishops of the dioceses within which such benefices or churches are situate, that is to say: in the case of the benefice or church of Coddington, as from the twelfth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; and in the case of the benefice or church of Fridaythorpe, as from the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; and in the case of the benefice or church of Lynesack with Softley, as from the twenty-third day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"And we further recommend and propose that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Christ Church, Lumley, shall commence and take effect as from the seventh day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, being the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the fifth day of the same month, under and by virtue of which said Order of your Majesty in Council a separate district for spiritual purposes was assigned to the said church of Christ at Lumley.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any of the said benefices or churches, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or that any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."
