WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for compensating the Reverend John William Grier, perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the new parish of Amblecote, otherwise Amblecote, in the counties of Stafford and Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, whose fees, dues, or other emoluments, have been diminished by reason of proceedings under the said Act.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that the fees, dues, or other emoluments, of the said John William Grier, as such perpetual curate or incumbent as aforesaid, have been diminished by reason of the constitution under the provisions of the said Act of the District of Wollaston, which has since become a new parish, under the provisions of the same Act, and that the assignment to the said John William Grier, of the annual sum hereinafter mentioned, would be a just and reasonable compensation for such diminution.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us to the said John William Grier, perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the New Parish of Amblecote, otherwise Amblecote, aforesaid, so long as he shall remain such perpetual curate or incumbent, and no longer, the annual sum of ten pounds, by equal half yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, by way of compensation for the loss of fees, dues, or other emoluments, sustained by him by reason of the formation of the District of Wollaston, which has since become a new parish, as before mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that payment of the said annual sum of ten pounds shall be held to commence as from the seventeenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty, being the day on which a church provided for the said new parish of Wollaston was consecrated, and from which day the incumbent of the same new parish became empowered to perform in the church thereof various offices which had theretofore been performed at the church of the said new parish of Amblecote, otherwise Amblecote, and also became entitled to

retain for his own benefit the fees accruing therefrom.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices or churches of Aberpergwm; Saint James, Bath, with the chapelry of Corn-street annexed; Biggin; Saint Stephen, Bowling; Greenhow-hill; Hatfield; Havenstreet; Saint Mary, Lowton; Milcombe; Ribchester; Smallthorn; Walton, in the county of York; and Saint James's, High Wych; are so recommended by us, either partly or wholly in consideration of benefactions which have been paid over to us on behalf of, or have been otherwise legally secured to such benefices or churches
