DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received at the War Office from Brigadier-General Staveley, C.B., commanding Her Majesty's Troops in China:—

No. 22. *Head Quarters, Shanghai,*
April 19, 1862.

SIR,
 IN my letter of the 6th instant (extract annexed) I reported to the Military Secretary, for the information of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-Chief, that, in compliance with the instructions received from Her Majesty's Minister at Peking, to drive the rebels from the vicinity of Shanghai, the Naval and Military force at my disposal made a successful attack, on the 14th instant, on the intrenched rebel camp of On-katz, 2 miles from Shanghai.

2. I have now to report the capture of Tserpoo, another of the strongholds of the rebels, by a combined English and French Naval and Military force.

Tserpoo is situated seven miles up a creek running into the Woosung river, 12 miles above and on the opposite bank to Shanghai, and is one of the principal places on that side of the Woosung

river, from whence the rebels devastated the country. Vice-Admiral Sir J. Hope and the French Admiral Protêt, having placed under my orders the seamen, troops, and guns detailed in the margin,* the force, with the regiments under my immediate command, numbering in all 1951 men and 12 guns, as per accompanying return, was conveyed in gunboats, and landed at the mouth of the Tserpoo Creek on the morning of the 17th instant. By 2 P.M. the force had arrived in front of Tserpoo, a long and very strongly entrenched stockade and partly-walled town.

The part I selected for attack, though composed of 2 small bastions and a curtain, each bastion mounting 2 guns, appeared the easiest of approach.

Having thrown out Captain Burton's detachment of the 99th Regiment and a company of French Zephyrs to cover the advance of the guns, the former took advantage of some good cover afforded by ruined houses 200 yards from the rebel works, the English Naval and Royal Artillery guns took up a position on some mounds to the right rear of the skirmishers, at a distance of 400 yards from the wall, the French guns being in the left rear of the covering party.

The infantry and small-arms men of the Navy, provided with bridges, ladders, and axes, being under cover, and in immediate support of the guns.

After 5 rounds of shell from each gun, all which burst in and over the works with great precision, the English and French skirmishers, urged by the spirit of rivalry which invariably breaks out on such occasions, made a sudden rush at the place, compelling me to cause the guns to cease firing, and the 5th Bombay Native Light Infantry to dash up to the immediate support of the skirmishers; and thus, with the assistance of the bridges and axe-parties of the 5th Bombay Native Light Infantry and Royal Navy, the difficulties offered by a brisk fire from the rebels, an abatis of felled trees, two staked ditches, and a 14-foot wall flanked by 2 bastions, were overcome with—considering the strength of the place—the trifling loss noticed in the margin.†

I shall do myself the honour to report, by the next mail, the measures contemplated by Sir J. Hope, Admiral Protêt, and myself, for the further expulsion of the insurgents from this neighbourhood.

Extract of Letter addressed to the Military Secretary, Horse Guards, dated Shanghai, April 6, 1862, referred to in the foregoing Despatch.

I HAVE the honour to report for the information of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-Chief that, in consequence of instructions I received from Mr. Bruce, Her Majesty's

Minister at Peking, to drive the rebels from the vicinity of Shanghai, I attacked on the 4th instant a camp containing about 9,000 rebels, twelve miles distant from this place, with a force numbering in all 1,700 men and 12 shell guns, and composed as follows, viz., 400 seamen and marines and 3 guns, placed at my disposal by Vice-Admiral Sir James Hope; 300 seamen and 4 guns, placed at my disposal by the French Admiral Protêt; half a company of Royal Artillery, with 4 mountain guns and 1 24-howitzer, under Captain Bradshaw, R.A.; 70 men of the 99th Regiment, under Captain Burton; the 5th Bengal Native Infantry, under Lieutenant-Colonel Stanley; and the 22nd Punjabees, under Major Stafford. The latter military forces being under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Moody, Royal Engineers, the officer in command of the troops at Shanghai.

Colonel Ward, of the Imperial Army, who has been drilling some Chinese, also assisted with 200 of his men.

After about three-quarters of an hour's shelling the rebels bolted from their stronghold, which consisted of a chain of forts very strongly stockaded and entrenched; we pursued them for about two miles, and then returned and burned their camp.

The loss of the rebels was about 300; the casualties on our side, 1 sepoy, of the 5th Bengal Native Infantry, killed, and two privates of the 22nd Punjabees, slightly wounded.

P.S.—Lieutenant Birch, of the 22nd Punjabees, who was my only Staff officer, was most active, not only during the action, but in making preparations for the expedition.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to transmit for your information copy of an agreement which has been made between Vice-Admiral Sir James Hope, the French Admiral Protêt, and myself, for the protection of Shanghai.

The red line on the accompanying plan shows the limit to the extent of country which we have thought it necessary to clear of the rebels with a view to the safety of Shanghai, and to the supplies of provisions for the support of its population.

Mr. Bruce having consented to the evacuation of Tientsin, I have arranged with Vice-Admiral Sir James Hope, that all the troops in the north, with the exception of a garrison of half a battery of Royal Artillery, and 500 men of the 67th Regiment at Taku, come to Shanghai to assist in the operations decided upon in the accompanying copy of agreement.

When these troops arrive from the north, I shall have at my disposal 2,824 men and 22 guns, as detailed in the margin;* a force, I consider,

as regards the resistance the rebels may offer, capable, with the assistance of the two 32-pounder guns worked by the Royal Navy, of effecting anything that may be required in this country, supposing of course that the Imperialists occupy and hold the places we take for them, and which they have undertaken to do.

Agreed,

1st. That it is necessary, for the defence of Shanghai, to occupy Kading, Tsing-poo, Sung-Keoug, Najaor, and Tsao-lin, by which means a district of country will be secured sufficient in extent, to afford the supplies requisite for the support of its numerous population, and to keep the rebels at a distance, which will preclude the continuance of that state of alarm which has prevailed during the last few months, and which has been so detrimental to its commerce.

2nd. Colonel Ward at present occupies Sung-Keoug, and he undertakes, as soon as Singpoo is taken, to establish his head-quarters there and to hold it; the Chinese authorities have undertaken, and will be required to furnish sufficient garrisons for Kading, Najaor, and Tsao-lin; in each of the two first of which it will also be expedient to place two hundred troops, half English and half French, in support of the Chinese, until Colonel Ward's force is sufficiently augmented to enable him to replace them by three hundred of his men.

3rd. Previous to the capture of Kading and the other towns from the rebels, proper arrangements shall be made to prevent any men leaving their ranks for the purpose of pillage; and subsequently to collect whatever may be of value, in order to its fair distribution amongst the troops, to whom the same is to be made known before the commencement of the operations.

4th. After the proposed operations have been brought to a successful conclusion, it is intended to retain at Shanghai, 500 French Infantry, and of English, a half battery of Artillery, 250 European and 350 Native Infantry.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report for your information, and with a view to carrying out the plan of operations detailed in my letter of the 25th ultimo, that the walled city of Kading was taken from the rebels by escalade, on the 1st instant, by Her

Majesty's troops under my immediate command, together with the seamen and marines of the Royal Navy, and the French troops placed at my disposal respectively, by Vice-Admiral Sir J. Hope, K.C.B., and Admiral Protet, of His Imperial Majesty's Navy.

2. On the 26th April part of the force left Shanghai and arrived at the ruined town of Nezang, some 5 miles from Kading, where they found the rebels in occupation of two small, but strongly intrenched stockades, on the Kading side of the town, and within gunshot of its suburb.

3. On the 27th I moved out with 4 mountain guns and 300 men, to reconnoitre these posts, and in effecting my object, I regret having to report, that the Fort Adjutant of Shanghai (Lieutenant Brown, 5th Regiment Bombay Native Light Infantry) and a private of the 67th Regiment, were dangerously wounded.

4. I found the stockade resting on the principal canal, and commanding the direct road and water communication to Kading—singularly well defended by ditches, staked on either side, 5 or 6 feet deep, and too broad for the plank bridges with which the force was provided.

5. I resolved, therefore, to turn the position, and on the morning of the 29th, passed the mountain guns and most of the troops over the canals, on the left of the stockades by means of pontoons, while the heavier guns shelled the enemy from the front.

6. As soon as it became apparent to the rebels that they were about to be surrounded, they quitted the stockade in disorder by the rear entrance, running the gauntlet of a fire from the 31st Regiment and 22nd Punjaub Native Infantry, at point blank range.

7. The 31st Regiment, followed by the remainder of the force, was then moved on in rapid pursuit, so that the rebels had not time to break down the bridges over the creeks and canals, between their recent position and Kading.

8. The whole force arrived in front of Kading in the course of the day.

9. The next day was spent in reconnoitring the city, and landing the heavy guns which had been brought up in boats by the main canal from Shanghai.

10. We found Kading to be a square walled town, with projecting gateways, mounting four guns in the centre of each face, thus furnishing flanking defences. The wall, including an eight feet parapet, measured thirty-one feet in height. The moat, which was thirty feet from the wall, was forty-five feet broad, and seven deep, strongly staked and stockaded on both sides.

11. One hour before dawn on the 1st instant, the English and French guns were in position, and the troops in their respective places under cover in a ruined suburb.

At daylight the guns opened on the parapet, gateway, and flanking defences in our front, and in an hour and a-half had so far performed their work as to render an escalade practicable.

12. A bridge of boats was then formed by the navy, and the storming parties of the troops, Royal Navy, and French escaladed the walls without resistance.

13. About 1000 rebels were taken prisoners and some hundreds were killed in the city. The Chinese General, Lee, whom I had placed outside the gates so as to cut off the retreat of the insurgents, reported to me, that his troops had destroyed 2,300 of the enemy.

14. I have the satisfaction to state that these operations were performed with comparatively slight loss to Her Majesty's forces.

15. The troops returned this day to Shanghai, leaving a garrison of 200 British and 200 French troops to hold Kading until relieved by organised Imperialists.

16. A considerable amount of silver and a large quantity of rice was taken in the town, and I have much satisfaction in reporting that the orders previously given forbidding individual plundering were obeyed by Her Majesty's troops, seamen, and marines, to the letter.

17. The English and French admirals and myself propose our next operation being directed on the walled city of Tsingpoo, and I feel confident that we shall be in possession of it, and the other towns which complete the circuit of our limit of operations, in the course of three weeks, and before the hot weather sets in.

18. I beg to transmit a return of the troops, &c., employed in the recent operations, as well as a list of casualties; respecting the latter, I am happy to state that those dangerously wounded are considered likely to recover.

SIR,

My letter of the 25th ultimo has already apprised you of the plan of operations agreed upon by Vice-Admiral Sir James Hope, Admiral Protêt, of His Imperial Majesty's navy, and myself, for driving the rebels from Shanghai, to a radius of 30 miles.

I reported the first step taken in the above operations in the capture of Kading.

2. I have now to inform you that the walled city of Tsingpoo was taken by escalade on the 12th instant, by Her Britannic Majesty's land forces and the seamen, marines, and troops placed at my disposal by the British and French Admirals.

3. The force employed in the operation is detailed in the accompanying return.

4. The expedition left Shanghai, in steamers, on the 7th instant, and rendezvoused the same night at the Imperialists' town of Soonkong, situated about half way between Shanghai and Tsingpoo.

The next day it was embarked in small country boats, so as to proceed up the creek or canal leading to Tsingpoo, where it arrived on the 9th inst.

The 10th and 11th were occupied in reconnoitring the city and works, and in making preparations for the attack.

5. Tsingpoo I found to be about 3 miles in circumference, entirely surrounded by a wall 25 feet high, and a ditch 10 feet deep and 60 feet wide, the approaches affording but little cover, and canals intersecting the neighbourhood almost every 200 yards, rendering the country impassable except by means of bridges. Upon the walls several guns were mounted, varying from 6 to 18-pounders, and very many large gingalls.

6. Having decided on the point of attack, the whole of the guns and troops, with the axe, ladder, covering and storming parties were in position by 4 A. M. the 12th instant. Parties of British and French seamen were placed under cover in small

boats in canals leading into the moat, ready when the moment arrived to push forward and form bridges. At daylight the heavy guns opened fire, and by 7 A. M. two practicable breaches were established in the wall, the British Naval 32-pounders and especially a French rifled 64-pounder gun, which was worked from the only gun-boat whose draught of water enabled its being brought up, doing great execution.

7. The English and French bridge parties under the protection of coverers now cleared the stakes in the canals leading into the moat, and established two bridges across it.

8. As soon as the bridges were reported ready, the French ladder and storming parties on the right, and the English, consisting of detachments of the 31st, 67th Regiments, and 22nd Punjab Native Infantry, on the left, advanced, the whole of the small guns being dragged forward and opening fire at the parapet during the movement.

The enemy, however, did not quit the walls, but kept up a smart fire from gingalls up to the moment our men gained the top of the breach.

9. The troops having established themselves within the walls, the city was given in charge to Colonel Ward, of the Imperial Service, and the allied force withdrawn.

10. The next day the whole of the troops returned to Soonkong to prepare for further operations on the opposite side from Shanghai of the Woosung River.

11. We found that the rebels had built on the inside of the parapet a strong stockade, which extended all round the city, this, with the parapet, formed a passage which was covered with a beamed and tiled roof for protection; this roof, however, did not afford much safety to the defenders, four Armstrong guns having been placed in a position to partly enfilade the wall, almost every shell entered through the roof, and burst between the parapet and the stockade.

12. During the attack the city was surrounded by the Imperial troops, and Colonel Ward reports to me, that the whole garrison has been made prisoners.

13. In transmitting a list of casualties, I much regret having to report the death of Captain Bradshaw, R. A., from exposure and over exertion on the march to Tsingpoo; in him the service has lost a most zealous and energetic officer.

The health of the troops I have the satisfaction of reporting as being excellent.

 I HAVE the honour to report for your information the capture yesterday of the fortified town of Najow by the allied British and French forces, and I might have added with trifling loss, had it not been for the death of Admiral Protêt, Commanding H.I.M. Naval Forces in China, who was unfortunately shot through the heart during the advance of the storming party.

In Admiral Protêt the French Navy has lost a most able and zealous officer, and one whose hearty energetic co-operation greatly conduced to the success of the recent operations.

The mail being on the eve of departure, I must defer entering into details of the attack until another opportunity.

A return of casualties, so far as I have been enabled to ascertain, is enclosed.

YOU will be pleased to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the force noted below was collected on the 9th instant, under the command of Brigadier-General Staveley,

about two miles below Tsing-pu, and that the town was captured on the morning of the 12th, the operations having been delayed by wet weather, which rendered the ground impracticable for 24 hours.
