The many noble and amiable qualities of Her Royal Highness, her unselfish devotion and thoughtful consideration, so conspicuously displayed by her in your Majesty's late deep affliction, have won for Her Royal Highness a high place in the affections of all your Majesty's subjects; and it is a source of great pleasure to us, and to the country at large, that there is a great probability that Her Royal Highness will spend some portion of every year in this country, and thus conduce to your Majesty's happiness and comfort by her presence.

That the Almighty may, in his infinite mercy, support and strengthen your Majesty under the arduous and important duties which devolve on the sovereign of this great empire, and that your Majesty may long be spared to reign over an attached, grateful, and happy people, is the earnest prayer of all your Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects.

THE following Despatches have been received by the Secretary of State for War from Brigadier-General Staveley, C.B., commanding H.M.'s Troops in China:—

No. 32. *Head Quarters, Shanghai, May 31, 1862.*

SIR, ON the 18th instant I did myself the honour to report to you briefly the capture of Na-jow, a rebel stronghold on the south side of the Woosung River, and twenty miles distant from Shanghai. I have now to detail the particulars of the operation.

On the day after the capture of Tsing-poo, the force proceeded in small country boats to Najow, where it arrived on the 16th instant. This town was found to be strongly entrenched and stockaded, about two miles in circumference, with an outwork commanding it, and a creek which ran into the town. I decided upon shelling the defenders out of the outwork and establishing a breaching battery on its reverse. Two French naval 30-pounders, six Armstrong guns, and four mortars, were accordingly got into position, and opened fire at five o'clock on the evening of the 17th instant, and in an hour, the outwork having been rendered untenable, a storming party, composed of 250 men of the 31st Regiment, and the same number of French Chasseurs and Marines, advancing to take possession, dashed through it under a brisk fire of match-locks and jingals, and, finding a pathway through the stakes and planks over the ditches right up to the wall, took advantage thereof, and got into the place by climbing through the embrasures or over the stockades.

It was during this advance that the French Naval Commander-in-Chief, Admiral Protêt, whose death I have already reported, was killed.

As it was of importance that this place should be held until the Chinese authorities should place a garrison in it, 200 British and 120 French troops were left there.

A return of casualties is appended, marked A.

On the 18th instant, the force marched for Cho-lin, six miles from Najow, the guns, provisions, and baggage, being conveyed in country boats, it being found impracticable to make arrangements for their transport by land, owing to the numerous canals and very narrow bridges which intersected the line of march.

Cho-lin is a walled town, three miles in circumference, surrounded by a wet ditch, and situated about one mile from the sea.

On the morning of the 19th instant, the garrison was observed to be engaged in destroying some houses, distant about eighty yards from the walls, and close to a small entrenchment which was placed between these houses and the walls. As these buildings were of value to me for cover, I directed that they should be at once taken possession of, which was done by a company of the 67th Regiment, under cover of the fire of two British naval 32-pounders from the front, and an enfilading fire of two Armstrong guns from the right.

A creek running directly into the ditch under the walls afforded means of passing boats along, and so establishing a bridge for the passage of the assaulting parties.

During the night of the 19th two British naval 32-pounders, two French naval 30-pounders, six Armstrong guns, and five field-pieces, were placed in position. The Armstrongs on the right, to enfilade the wall, and the other guns in front of our position for breaching purposes.

At daylight, on the 20th, the guns opened fire, and at 6 A.M. two breaches having been made, a bridge was established, and the troops entered the place without opposition.

I forward a list of casualties, marked B.

On the evening of this day, and as we were preparing to advance on the next rebel town, news reached me from Shanghai that the Imperialist troops in the neighbourhood of Kading had advanced beyond that place, and been completely cut up or taken prisoners by the rebels; that Kading itself, garrisoned temporarily by the Allies, was invested; that the town of Woo-sung was threatened, and that the Chinese authorities had declared themselves unable to meet their engagement to place garrisons in the towns we might capture.

Under these circumstances I decided upon returning to Shanghai, to reopen communication with Kading, where provisions and ammunition were running short.

On the 24th instant I left Shanghai with the force detailed in the accompanying statement, marked C, and arrived at Nai-zain, six miles from Kading, the same day. All the guns, ammunition, and provisions, owing to the impossibility of carrying them across narrow bridges over innumerable canals, being conveyed in boats in charge of the Royal Navy. The day succeeding our arrival at Nai-zain, and while the boats were, in consequence of the lowness of the tide, unable to reach us, the rebels, who appeared in very great force, attacked us in the town in front and flanks continually during the day, and eventually in the evening made a movement round to our rear towards the boats. In all these attacks they were driven back with loss, the casualties on our side being but few, viz.: one sepoy, 22nd Punjaub Native Infantry, killed; and four sepoy of the same corps, wounded.

The night following these attacks, one side of a street in Nai-zain (in which were housed a few gunners, R.A., and the Chinese Gun Lascar Company) fell down, killing 19 and injuring 75 of the Chinese, and 3 men, Royal Artillery; this accident is attributed to the coolies having made use of some of the timbers of the houses for fire-wood.

It now appearing that the difficulties of transport were very great, that the boats (our sole means for conveyance) were constantly grounding in the shallow creeks, while the enemy continued to hover round us, rendering a lengthened line of boats most dangerous and difficult to protect, and taking into consideration the harassing nature of the service for the troops at the present season, together with the fact that the Chinese authorities

had declared themselves unable to garrison the captured town as they had engaged to do, and seeing that the occupation of Kading alone did not prevent the rebels from ravaging the country between it and Shanghai, I resolved upon withdrawing the garrison from that place, and accordingly sent a column of 500 men and 4 mountain guns, under Lieutenant-Colonel Stanley, 5th Bombay Native Infantry, to Kading, with instructions to bring the garrison out, and return to Nai-zain: this operation was performed without a casualty, the rebels retreating before the column as it advanced.

On the 28th instant the force returned to Shanghai.

The accompanying copy of letter (marked D) I have addressed to Her Majesty's Minister at Peking, will show you that the Chinese authorities are scarcely able to make any effort whatever for their own defence, and that with the force at my command I feel, under present circumstances, unable to do more than protect the city of Shanghai itself.

The rebels are now in force, investing Tsing-poo and Soong-Kong, and have marauding parties ten miles from Shanghai, driving in the country people and burning their houses in every direction. I apprehend, therefore, that the crops will remain ungathered, and that famine must be the consequence.

As Shanghai, if attacked, will, I consider, require all the available troops in this part of the country for its defence. I shall retain the whole of the troops leaving Tien-Tsin, until I receive your instructions.

MY letter of the 26th instant will have informed you that I found it necessary to withdraw the garrison from Kading, for the reasons therein stated.

I have since had an interview with the Viceroy, and find that the Imperial troops which I found here on my arrival from the north have disappeared altogether, having either been taken prisoners or destroyed by the rebels, and that the whole number of troops at his disposal are 4,500, brought by steamers last month from Ngankin, and these without a single musket among them.

He further informed me that the rebels are fast clearing out of the Pootung side of the Woosung river, and that the inhabitants of all the towns on that side had sent in their allegiance.

That the rebels are, however, in considerable force on the line between Soon-kong and Kading, burning the villages and destroying all around them.

I have now to inform you of the measures proposed under the circumstances.

You are aware that the town of Na-jow, situated midway between the Woosung river and the sea on the Pootung side, is held by the Allies, and that the walled town of Cholin was captured by them a short time since.

The Viceroy has engaged to place 1,000 of his troops in Nauwei, on the Poo-tung side, one of the towns which has recently sent in its allegiance. This leaves the Viceroy with only 3,500 men on the Shanghai side.

The force at my disposal is at present 1,643 infantry and 187 artillery, the French having 400 Chasseurs and 300 sailors.

The accompanying memorandum (Report annexed) by a Committee I appointed to report on the immediate defences of Shanghai, shows that nearly the whole of my troops are required for this purpose, besides the French force stationed here.

On the arrival of the remainder of the troops from the north, I shall be able to move out with a column and attack the rebels, should they venture to come near the city; but with so small a force,

and not the slightest assistance to be expected from the Chinese troops, I consider that it will be useless and unsafe to attempt to do more than hold Shanghai itself, especially now that the hot weather is coming upon us.

I quite agree with you that the prospect of the Chinese being able to do anything for themselves, depends entirely upon their organizing a force of Chinese, trained by European officers, and armed with muskets.

The Viceroy, however, shows much reluctance in placing men at my disposal for this purpose, and says that if he engaged men they would not remain.

This is, I consider, because the pay he would give them would not render it worth their while to do so.

That they would remain, if properly paid and treated, may be inferred from the fact that a company of Royal Artillery here have a company of 280 Chinese drilled to the guns, and to assist in moving them, who not only adhere to their engagement, but are very willing, hardworking men, and behave well under fire.

I would, therefore, most strongly urge you to move the Chinese Government to place at my disposal 3,000 men for training, in the same manner as was done at Tien-Tsin, and that arrangements be made by which these men should be paid by our Commissariat, and the necessary funds be supplied from the Custom's revenue of Shanghai.

It might be still better if I were allowed to raise these men myself, and decide on the rate of pay they should receive, the Chinese finding the officers, clothing, barracks, &c.

THE Undersigned having assembled, in accordance with the orders of the Brigadier-General Commanding, proceed to examine and report upon the state of the defences around the settlement and city of Shanghai.

They are of opinion that for the defences as already existing, a force of 1400 infantry, 160 artillerymen, and 19 guns of sorts, will be required to be retained at Shanghai, and also that the force should be disposed as follows, viz. :—

In drawing up this detail, the Undersigned have made no allusion to the portion of the defences lying between the Yang Ping Pau Creek and the city wall, nor to the defence of the eastern suburb, as these lines are held by the French.

They would call attention to this memorandum having been drawn up with respect to the defences, as now existing, and do not doubt but what with the modification of the line of defence, the force mentioned might be considerably reduced.

The Undersigned, in stating their opinion that 1400 men are necessary for the defence of Shanghai, have considered the force which was necessary to render the safety of the place beyond all doubt, and which would make the enemy give up all idea of attacking.

They have no doubt but that a very small force would repel an attack if made, but it would at the same time invite one.

They presume that the main object to be attained is to restore perfect confidence in the minds of the inhabitants as to their safety, and considering the importance of the interests at stake, would not consider they were justified in recommending the diminution of the force they mention, more especially so when it has been deemed advisable to withdraw our garrison from the towns lately captured from the rebels in the neighbourhood of Shanghai, a circumstance most likely to embolden them to undertake more daring operations than heretofore.

I HAVE the honour to report, that, during my absence with the Field Force on the south side of the Woosung river, the Officer commanding the Garrison, in concert with the Senior Naval Officer at Shanghai, thought it necessary to send to Kading a reinforcement of one naval 12-pounder howitzer, manned by sailors of the Royal Navy; also a supply of provisions and ammunition, escorted by a detachment of one Native Officer and 15 sepoy of the 5th Bombay Native Infantry, the whole under a Lieutenant of the Royal Navy.

At Nai-zain this party, unfortunately, was met by a large body of rebels: the gun, ammunition, and provisions lost, three sepoy of the 5th Bombay Native Infantry Regiment killed, and four taken prisoners.

A DESPATCH, of which the following is a copy, was received at the Admiralty on the 28th ultimo, from Vice-Admiral Sir James Hope, K.C.B., the Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the East Indian and China Station:

OPERATIONS AGAINST THE REBELS IN THE
VICINITY OF SHANGHAE.

No. 218.
MY LORD,

"Impérieuse," Shanghai,
June 3, 1862.

YOU will be pleased to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 18th ultimo the force under General Staveley and Comodore Kersanson moved up the creek from Najaor to Tsiolin, which town was taken on the morning of the 20th.

Information being received on that day of the irruption of a large number of rebels in the vicinity of Woosung, the force returned to Shanghae on the 22nd, leaving a garrison in Najaor with the view of eventually securing the Pootung Peninsula when the rebels shall have been entirely cleared out.

On the 24th, the force moved out to Nanseang; the 25th was occupied in closing up the boats which had been considerably retarded by want of water in the creek, during which day some desultory skirmishing took place with the rebels, who, in considerable numbers, surrounded the village on all sides except the south.

On the following morning the great mass of rebels had moved off to the westward, and the detachment noted in the margin* moved on to Kading, for the purpose of withdrawing the garrison, and returned the same evening, having effected their object without difficulty or loss.

On the 27th, the force returned to Shanghae, the last boat arriving on the following morning.

Between the 9th and the 18th, a force of Imperialist troops, consisting of from 7,000 to 10,000 men (got together by breaking up their camps at Tsipoo and Yakiton and withdrawing 2,000 men from the garrison of Paoshan,) was moved out to the vicinity of Taitseam, a town in the occupation of the rebels, where they suffered a severe defeat, and were entirely dispersed with the exception of a few hundred who got back to Pawoshan.

This movement, ordered by the late Viceroy Sich in opposition to the remonstrances of the present Governor, by whom he has since been replaced, and without communication with the Allied commanders, with the design of effecting the capture of Taitnam, has resulted in completely uncovering the country to the westward of Shanghae, to which the camps at Tsipoo and Yakiton had afforded a certain amount of protection.

On the 18th, the rebels first appeared in the vicinity of Woosung and Paoshan, from whence they retired on the 21st, having failed in making any impression on the former town, the capture of which may have been in their contemplation.

On the same day the defeat of the Imperialists was heard of at Kading, and on the 21st the rebels were first seen in the neighbourhood of that town, occupying the village of Nanseang, by which its communication with Shanghae was cut off.

Between that day and the 25th, when the greater part of their force moved off to the westward, the town was more or less surrounded by large numbers of rebels, estimated at not less than 25,000, and was attacked on several occasions but without effect.

From Kading the rebels moved by Wangdon to Sekim, where they have established a camp of 20,000, men with two smaller posts of 5,000 and 3,000 men, in advance towards Sung-Keong, at Tsakapan and Tomkio, respectively.

They have also surrounded Tsing-pu in large numbers, which town is held by a garrison of 1,000 of Colonel Ward's troops, and they have established camps at Quang-fu-lung and higher up on the water communication to Tsing-pu, containing about 2,000 men each.

I have stationed the "Pearl" at Minhong, to maintain the communication with Najaor, and the "Centaur" at Sung-Keong for the like purpose.

On the morning of the 30th, probably on information that Colonel Ward with a portion of the garrison was absent for the purpose of throwing supplies into Tsing-pu, an attack was made on

Sung-Keong by a body of 1,500 rebels, who were driven off with a loss of 100 by a party of the Centaur's people, under the orders of Lieutenant P. W. Stephens, 1 man being slightly wounded.

This party from the "Centaur" will rejoin their ship on the arrival of 300 of Colonel Ward's troops, which will return from Ningpo.

On the map which I forward, the recent operations of the troops, the movements of the rebels and their present positions are given, with as much accuracy as the information at my command, in regard to the topography of the country and other matters, will permit.

Having been present with the force, except at the capture of Kading, I avail myself of this occasion to express the sense I entertain of the general good conduct of the officers and men composing the Naval Brigade which has been employed with the troops, a return of which is annexed, and to bring under their Lordships' notice the names of those officers whose position has rendered them most prominent during a service, which, if unattended by any severe fighting, has involved a good deal of hard work, the material and supplies of the army being conveyed entirely by water, the chief labour of which naturally devolved on the Brigade.

The organization and management of the flotilla was conducted by Captain Borlase of the "Pearl," in command of the Brigade, assisted by Captain Willes of my Flag Ship, and Commanders Gibson of the "Impérieuse," and Strode of the "Vulcan," under whose immediate superintendance the guns were got into position, the bridges moved up for crossing the ditches, (operations generally performed at night and in close proximity to the enemy;) and the other duties devolving on the Brigade were performed with a zeal and ability to which, in conjunction with that of the other officers, I ascribe their uniform success.

Such preliminary investigations of the creeks as became requisite in consequence of their complexity, were undertaken by Captain Willes, assisted by Mr. Dathan, Master of the Impérieuse, during the course of which he had an affair with the rebels in the vicinity of Tsiclin, described in the letter I annex.

Sir, *May 18, 1862.*

I HAVE the honour to report, that from an early hour yesterday morning, a large body of well-equipped rebel troops were seen assembling on a high bund, about three-quarters of a mile on our right flank. It was quite evident that the city had been reinforced during the previous night, and prisoners, since taken, state that they were from Vongmai. Later in the day troops were seen leaving the city by the East Gate, and gathering on our left flank. I felt then quite convinced that some hostile measure was intended, and awaited the result with anxiety, but with the most perfect confidence.

About 2 P.M. the people on our right flank advanced in large numbers, whilst others sallied out from the city, amidst a frightful noise of gongs and trumpets.

I directed our advanced piquet to fall back, until met by Captain Holland and his party of Marines, with a few small arm men under Lieutenant Grant, of the Vulcan.

A stand was here made, until a number of the rebels had passed the bridge and creek, and were well down to our quarters.

The Marines and Seamen then advanced in a most gallant manner, drove the assailants back at the point of the bayonet. Captain Holland with the main body of his men passed the bridge, and continued his advances for a considerable distance. Lieutenant Grant, with his men, and First Lieutenant II. E. Sturt, Royal Marine Light Infantry, with a few Marines, forded the creek, which was between our quarters and the city, found the rebels in some out-houses, bayoneted them, and drove them up to the walls of the city. During this time Captain Strode kept up a well-directed fire from the three field pieces in their position near the boats.

About 5 P.M. the rebels, who had been collecting on our left flank, assisted by a few of the more spirited on the right, advanced with frightful yells. The 12-pounder howitzers played upon them with Shrapnell shell, and with good effect; whilst the Marines again advanced, and drove them back.

The loss to the assailants on each occasion was considerable, at least 40 killed, most of whom were fine well-dressed men, and armed with the old musket, marked "Tower."

I beg particularly to call your attention to the good conduct of the Marines, headed by their Captain, John Y. Holland, whose coolness and steadiness under fire render him an invaluable support; and this opinion is confirmed by the experience of nine occasions.
