"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at Blakenhall, in the parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, of the particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton, in the said county and diocese, and of the parish of Sedgley, in the same county and diocese, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at

a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes and particular district.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, of the said particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton, and of the said parish of Sedgley, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke, situate at Blakenhall aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lichfield, the bishop of the diocese; of the Right Honourable George Harry Earl of Stamford and Warrington, the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton; of the Reverend William Dalton, of the Lloyd House, in the said county of Stafford, Clerk, the patron of the perpetual curacy or incumbency of the said particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton; and of the Right Honourable William Earl of Dudley the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Sedgley (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, of the said particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton, and of the said parish of Sedgley, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Luke, situate at Blakenhall aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Blakenhall.'

"And we further represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said George Harry

Earl of Stamford and Warrington, the said William Dalton, and the said William Earl of Dudley (testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry shall belong to, and be exercised jointly by the said William Dalton; by Henry Ward, of Penn-road, Wolverhampton, in the said county of Stafford, Ironmaster; by Edward Perry, of Penn-road aforesaid, Manufacturer; by Henry Rogers, of Penn-fields, near Wolverhampton aforesaid, Merchant; and by Richard Shelton, of Queen-street, Wolverhampton aforesaid, Merchant; their heirs and assigns.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Blakenhall, being:—

"All those several portions of the parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, of the particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton, in the same county and diocese, and of the parish of Sedgley, in the same county and diocese, which are comprised within and bounded by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, from the said parish of Sedgley, at a point in the middle of the Turnpike road leading from Wolverhampton to Sedgley, near the public-house known as "The Fighting Cocks;" and extending thence eastward along such boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, from the particular district of the Holy Trinity, Etingshall, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence in a direction first northward, and then north-westward, and then north-eastward along the last described boundary, to its junction with the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, from the parish of Saint Matthew, Wolverhampton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at or near Rough Hill-lane Bridge; and extending thence north-westward along the last described boundary, as far as the eastern end of Monmore Green Bridge, which carries the occupation road and foot-path leading from Monmore Green to Derry-street over the Birmingham Canal; and extending thence westward along the middle of such occupation road and foot-path, and across Green-lane, and along the middle of Derry-street aforesaid; to a point in the middle of the Turnpike road leading from Wolverhampton to Sedgley aforesaid; and extending thence southward along the middle of such Turnpike road, for a distance of one hundred and forty-nine yards or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the eastern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 1033 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, and upon the map hereunto annexed, from the closes numbered respectively 1034 and 1035 upon the same maps; and extending thence westward to and along the middle of such fence, to a point in the middle of the road leading from Wolverhampton to Moor-fields, opposite to the middle of the western extremity of the said fence; and extending thence southward along the middle of the last described

road, to the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, from the said particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton; and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern extremity of the fence which divides the close numbered 1153 on the said maps from the close numbered 1121 on the same maps; and extending thence south-westward to and along the middle of the last-described fence, and along the middle of the fences which divide the closes numbered respectively 1152a, 1162, 1163, and 1169 on the said maps from the aforesaid close numbered 1121, and from the closes numbered respectively 1118 and 1117 on the same maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. L. C. C., 1862, No. 1,' placed at the southern extremity of the fence dividing the close numbered 1117 from the close numbered 1169 as aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward in a direct line across the said close numbered 1169 to another boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. L. C. C. 1862, No. 2,' placed at the northern extremity of the fence dividing the same close from Goldthorn-hill-lane, and continuing thence in the last described direction to a point in the middle of such lane; and extending thence southward along the middle of the same lane to the boundary dividing the said particular district of Saint Paul, Wolverhampton, from the parish of Penn, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point in the middle of Goldthorn-hill-road; and extending thence eastward along the last described boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the said parish of Penn from the parish of Sedgley aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the last described boundary for a distance of seven hundred and seventy yards, or thereabouts, to a point in the middle of the western end of the fence which divides the close numbered 1595 on the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Sedgley, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the close numbered 1594 on the same maps; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last described fence, and continuing thence first in the same direction, then south-eastward, and then northward along the middle of the fence which divides the close numbered 1596 upon the said maps from the road leading from Goldthorn-hill to Sedgley Lodge Farm, and from the farm premises numbered 1597 upon the same maps to a boundary stone inscribed 'B. St. L. C. C. 1862, No. 3,' and placed at the northern extremity of the last described fence; and continuing thence in the last mentioned direction and in a straight line across a certain occupation road leading from the farm premises aforesaid to the close numbered 1601 on the last mentioned maps, to a point in the middle of the fence dividing the last described occupation road from the close numbered 1599 upon the same maps; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such last described fence and of the fences which divide the close numbered 1601 as aforesaid, and the enclosure numbered 1575 upon the said maps, and occupied by the Sedgley Park Schools, from the closes numbered respectively 1600, 1576 and 1577 upon the same maps, to the extremity of the fence which divides the said enclosure numbered 1575 from the close numbered 1577 as aforesaid; and extending thence, still in the same direction and in a straight line across the road leading from the Sedgley Park Schools aforesaid towards Wolverhampton, to a point in the middle of the fence which divides such road from the close numbered 1574 upon the said maps; and

extending thence southward along the middle of the last mentioned fence to a point in the middle of the northern end of the foot-path which leads from the Sedgley Park Schools before mentioned, to the Turnpike road leading from Wolverhampton to Sedgley aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last described foot-path as far as a point in the middle of the fence, which divides the close numbered 1549 on the said maps from the close numbered 1574 as aforesaid; and extending thence eastward along the middle of such last mentioned fence and of the fence which divides the close numbered 1550 upon the said maps from the closes numbered respectively 1571 and 1552 upon the same maps, to a point in the middle of the Wolverhampton and Sedgley Turnpike road aforesaid, opposite to the middle of the eastern extremity of the fence which divides the close numbered 1550 from the close numbered 1552 as aforesaid; and extending thence, first northward and then north-westward, along the middle of the said Turnpike road, to the point upon the boundary dividing the parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, from the parish of Sedgley aforesaid, where the said imaginary line commenced."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at Blakenhall, in the parish of Saint John, Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, be accordingly formed; and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation with respect to the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and that the said right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church shall belong to, and be exercised jointly by, the Reverend William Dalton, of the Lloyd House, in the said county of Stafford, Clerk; by Henry Ward, of Penn-road, Wolverhampton, in the said county of Stafford, Ironmaster; by Edward Perry, of Penn-road aforesaid, Manufacturer; by Henry Rogers, of Penn-fields, near Wolverhampton aforesaid, Merchant; and by Richard Shelton, of Queen-street, Wolverhampton aforesaid, Merchant; their heirs and assigns.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas the patronage of the said parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear and the right of nominating a minister to serve the church of such parochial chapelry is at present vested in Henry Chaytor, of Witton Castle, in the said county of Durham, Esquire.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us, that the church of the said parochial chapelry is insufficiently endowed, and that it is desirable that some additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the limits of the same parochial chapelry.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear have become vested in us, under the provisions of, and for the purposes of, the herein-mentioned Act.

"And whereas the said Henry Chaytor is willing that the alteration in the exercise of the patronage of the church of the said parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear, hereinafter recommended and proposed, should be made upon the understanding that the income of the cure should be augmented by us as is hereinafter also recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Charles Bishop of Durham, and of the said Henry Chaytor (testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law, the right of patronage of the said parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear, and the right of nominating and presenting a minister to serve the church thereof, shall be exercised alternately by the said Henry Chaytor, his heirs, or assigns, and by Your Majesty and your successors, in right of the crown, the first nomination of a minister to serve the same church, which shall occur next after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid, to belong to and be exercised by the said Henry Chaytor, his heirs or assigns.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said parochial chapelry of Witton-le-Wear, when duly licensed, the annual sum of one hundred and eighty-eight pounds by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May, and on the first day of November, in each year, and that the first such payment or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May, or the first day of November (as the case may be) next following the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of

any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme as aforesaid : Provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent or minister of the said parochial chapelry, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land tithe or other hereditament should be conveyed and secured to such incumbent or minister, and his successors in fee, nothing herein, or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

" And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in Law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Durham.

" All that part of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the north-west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such new parish from the parish of Twickenham, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the Isleworth Mill River, under the centre of Chase Bridge, and extending thence, in a direction generally south-westward, along the middle of such river (following the middle of its northern or back stream at the Twickenham Paper Mills), and passing under Hospital Bridge to the boundary which divides the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, from the parish of Teddington, in the same county and diocese."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in certain parishes and districts.

"We humbly recommend and propose that there shall be paid by us out of the common fund in the said Acts mentioned, in each and every year, to the incumbent for the time being of each of the benefices or churches described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the annual sum set opposite to the name of each such benefice or church in the last column of the same schedule, by equal half-yearly payments, on the first day of May and the first day of November in each year.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the lands and premises, rent-charges, messuages, and other hereditaments particularly described in the second and eight following schedules hereunto annexed, with their appurtenances, now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, be transferred to and become absolutely vested in the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: that the lands and premises, with the house of residence erected thereon, which are described in the second schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Saint Giles, Durham, in the county and diocese of Durham, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Giles, Durham; that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the third schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered I., arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Lyss, in the county of Hants, and diocese of Winchester, and also the lands and hereditaments described in the same schedule, and therein numbered II., situate within the same parish of Lyss, all which formerly belonged to the chancellorship of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and are now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Lyss; that the tithes or rent-charges in lieu of tithes described in the fourth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Rotherwick, in the last mentioned county and diocese, also formerly belonging to the said chancellorship of the cath-

edral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Rotherwick; that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the fifth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Weston-Patrick, in the said last mentioned county and diocese, also formerly belonging to the said chancellorship of the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Weston-Patrick; that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the sixth schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered I., arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of North Moreton, in the county of Berks and diocese of Oxford, and also the lands and hereditaments described in the same schedule, and therein numbered II., situate within the said parish of North Moreton, all which formerly belonged to the archdeaconry of Berks, and are now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of North Moreton; that the lands and hereditaments described in the seventh schedule hereunto annexed, situate at Sadberge, in the county and diocese of Durham, formerly belonging to the bishoprick of Durham, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Sadberge aforesaid; that the messuage, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the eighth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Sandiacre, in the county of Derby and diocese of Lichfield, formerly belonging to the prebend of Sandiacre, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the vicar or incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of the said parish of Sandiacre; that the lands and hereditaments described in the ninth schedule hereunto annexed, situate within the parish of Southwell, in the county of Nottingham and diocese of Lincoln, together with the tithes, or rent-charge in lieu of tithes, arising thereon, as also set forth in the same schedule, formerly belonging to the chapter of the collegiate church of Southwell, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the rector or incumbent for the time being of the rectory of the said parish of Southwell; that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the tenth schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the parish of Saint Mary, Bishophill, Junior, in the city, county, and diocese of York, formerly belonging to the prebend of Osbaldwick, in the cathedral and metropolitical church of Saint Peter, at York, and now vested in us, shall be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the perpetual curacy of Saint Paul, Bishophill, in the same city, county, and diocese.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Poole, Clerk, the Perpetual Curate or Incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the parish of Firbeck-cum-Letwell, in the county and diocese of York, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, described in the eleventh schedule hereunto annexed, arising out of or upon lands situate within the said parish of Firbeck, and within the townships

of Langold and Letwell, in the said parish of Firbeck, with their appurtenances, formerly belonging to the prebend of Laughton, in the said cathedral church of York, and now vested in us, and all our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of Firbeck-cum-Letwell, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of fifteen pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence, and also of the annual sum or stipend of one hundred and twenty pounds now payable by us to the said perpetual curate or incumbent in respect of the estates formerly belonging to the said prebend of Laughton.

now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and of the annual sum or stipend of eleven pounds, now payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of another Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-first day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Howlett, clerk, the perpetual curate or incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint Paul, Southwark, in the last mentioned county and diocese, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that the messuages, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the fifteenth schedule hereunto annexed, and therein numbered I, situate within the parish of Lambeth, in the same county, and also the messuages, lands, hereditaments, and premises described in the same schedule, and therein numbered II, situate at Upper Holloway, in the said parish of Islington, in the county of Middlesex, with their appurtenances and all

our estate and interest therein, shall, in like manner and by the authority aforesaid, be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in, the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy of Saint Paul, Southwark, in lieu of and in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of forty-six pounds heretofore payable by us to the same perpetual curate or incumbent, under the provisions of the said last-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council.

“And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Dinington, is so recommended by us in respect of the reserved rent accruing under the lease of property which became vested in us by the death of the late Chancellor of the said cathedral church of York, on the twenty-sixth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice or church of Dinington, shall commence and take effect as from the last-mentioned date.

“And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice of Firbeck-cum-Letwell, is so recommended by us, in respect of property which became vested in us by the expiration of a lease, on or about the eleventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

“And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church

of Llanfair Talhaiarn, is so recommended by us in respect of property which became vested in us by the expiration of a lease, on or about the tenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

“Now therefore we humbly recommend and propose, that the grants respectively so recommended by us, as last mentioned, shall, in each case, commence and take effect as from the dates of the expiration of such leases respectively, that is to say, that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice of Firbeck-cum-Letwell, shall commence and take effect as from the said eleventh day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and that the grant, hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice of Llanfair Talhaiarn, shall commence and take effect as from the said tenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

“And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice of Hildenborough, is so recommended by us, with special reference to certain circumstances similar to those under which the grants ratified by the Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, were recommended to be made by us, and a proposal to make such grant so herein recommended to be made to the said benefice of Hildenborough, would have been included in the scheme, confirmed and ratified by the said last-mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council, if the said circumstances, so affecting the case of the benefice of Hildenborough, had been at that time within our knowledge.

“And whereas the said several lastly mentioned grants commenced, and took effect, as from the first day of May in the same year.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the grant hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice or church of Hildenborough as aforesaid, shall commence and take effect as from the said first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

“And whereas the grants which are hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefices of Hillesley, and Saint Philip, Maidstone, are so recommended by us in consideration of benefactions which have been paid over to us on behalf of such benefices on the dates hereinbefore mentioned, that is to say:—in the case of the perpetual curacy of Hillesley, on the seventeenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine; and in the case of the perpetual curacy of Saint Philip, Maidstone, on the twenty-ninth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the grants which are hereinbefore recommended by us to be made to the last-mentioned benefices or churches respectively, shall, in each instance, commence and take effect as from the date at which such benefactions were so paid over to us aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the said grants of lands and tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, and of an annual money payment, shall commence and take effect as from the last-mentioned date.

"And whereas the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the benefice of Saint Perran, Uthnoe, is so recommended, in respect of the proceeds which have accrued to us, under a mining lease of certain glebe lands belonging to the rector or incumbent of such benefice, which has been granted by such rector or incumbent, with our consent, under the provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eight.

"And whereas the dates at which the receipts under such lease have accrued are various; but the first day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, appears to us to be as nearly as may be, the mean of the dates at which such receipts have accrued to us.

Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the grant which is hereinbefore recommended to be made to the said benefice or church of Saint Perran, Uthnoe, shall commence and take effect as from the said lastly mentioned date.

And whereas the leasehold interest in the lands and tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, hereinbefore recommended to be granted to the benefice of North Moreton, has been surrendered to us as from the first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty one, and such surrender has been made upon the understanding, that the same lands and tithes should be annexed,

by us, to the said benefice or church as from such last-mentioned date.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the grant of the said lands and tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, shall commence and take effect as from the said first day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

"And whereas the grant hereinbefore proposed to be made to the benefice of Saint Philip, Arlington-square, Islington, was recommended by our Estates' Committee, at a meeting held on the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the said hereinbefore recommended grant to the benefice of Saint Philip, Arlington-square, Islington, shall commence and take effect from such last-mentioned date.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent the further augmentation by us of any of the said benefices or churches, if it shall be deemed fit; and that if it shall appear to us to be expedient, at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then in course of payment by us to the incumbent of any of the said benefices or churches, or instead of any part of such annual sum, a gross sum equivalent thereto should be substituted, or any land, tithe, or other hereditament, should be conveyed to such benefice or church in fee, nothing herein, or in any other scheme contained, shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution, or from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament,

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate at Broomfleet, in the parish of South Cave, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary the Virgin, situate at Broomfleet aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Charles Thomas, Archbishop of York, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of South Cave, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Broomfleet.’

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Halifax, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Halifax.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Robert, Bishop of Ripon, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at the said church of the Holy Trinity, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid

and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Charles Musgrave, Doctor in Divinity, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Halifax; shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, a moiety of the fees which shall be received in respect of the performance of the offices aforesaid, in the said church of the Holy Trinity, shall be paid by the said minister thereof to the said Charles Musgrave.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared that by the authority of a scheme prepared by us and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds, or in any other security or securities, in trust for any Ecclesiastical Body Corporate, aggregate or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such Body Corporate, and in the case of any chapter with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold and the same should be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose and in such manner as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such Body Corporate; and also that for any like purpose any arrangement might be made with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other

hereditaments, and that the aforesaid provisions relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any Ecclesiastical Body Corporate did and should include and apply to all monies and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds or elsewhere standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals for or to the credit of, or in trust for, any bishop, dean and chapter, dean or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise.

"And whereas the said chapter now consists of a dean and six canons, two canonries in the said cathedral having been suspended under the provisions of the said first recited Act, and the canonry in the same cathedral now held in commendam with the bishoprick of Exeter will, on its next avoidance, be also suspended under the provisions of the same Act.

"And whereas the dean and chapter are seized in fee of certain manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, the greater part of which have been and now are demised or granted on leases or grants for years or lives at small annual reserved rents, and upon payment of fines, and they are also beneficially interested or otherwise entitled to a certain sum of stock invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly specified and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed marked A.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said dean and chapter have proposed to us, with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments (except as herein-after excepted) so belonging to them as aforesaid, should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned; and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce as well to the improvement of the said fund as to the permanent benefit of the said dean and chapter that the same should be dealt with accordingly.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Exeter, and of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of Exeter, as visitor of the said dean and chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments which now belong, either in possession or reversion, to the said dean and chapter, (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage the said cathedral church and the precincts thereof, and the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed marked B), together with the benefit of the perpetual land-tax charged thereupon, which has been redeemed, subject nevertheless to the liabilities and claims upon or in respect of the same manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments of or to which the said dean and chapter are now liable. And also to the discharge of the stipends of four pounds each, payable to the said dean and chapter, in respect of certain non-residential prebends in the said cathedral church. And all the estate and interest therein of the said dean and chapter shall, upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than any such duly published Order, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we and they shall thereupon

become absolutely seized of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two; and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance, we shall surrender all right and be excluded from all participation in respect of the said suspended canonries to and in the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and chapter, or to be hereafter transferred to them as their permanent endowment, and in the rents and profits thereof, or in the money payments hereinafter mentioned; and that there shall be paid by us on the first day of April and the first day of October in every year, to the said dean and chapter, until they shall have been put into possession of real estates as hereinafter mentioned in respect of the half year then last past, the sum of five thousand seven hundred and fifty pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, that until such re-endowment as aforesaid, there shall also be paid by us to the said dean and chapter on the said first day of April, and the first day of October in every year, a sum of one hundred pounds (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to their chapter clerk for the time being); and also on the same days in every year during the life of their present chapter clerk, and notwithstanding the completion of such re-endowment as aforesaid, a further sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to be by them appropriated and paid to the said chapter clerk in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates hereby proposed to be transferred to us.

"And we further recommend and propose, that so long as the present holder of the canonry to be suspended as aforesaid, or his representatives, would under the statutes and customs of the said cathedral church be entitled to a share of the capitular revenues, if the arrangement contemplated by this scheme were not carried into effect, there shall be paid by us to the said dean and chapter on the said first day of April and the first day of October in every year, an additional sum of five hundred pounds; and that the first of each such half-yearly payments shall be made upon the first day of October next, and that the receipt or receipts of the receiver for the time being of the said dean and chapter shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money, as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of this scheme when ratified as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose, that none of the monies or estates to be received or acquired by us under the provisions of this scheme, shall be applicable to the purposes of our common fund (except only so far as it may be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made thereout under the provisions of this scheme), until, or unless, by and under the like authority the said dean and chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates of which not more than one-fourth part shall consist of tithe rent charges sufficient to secure to the said dean and chapter a clear annual income therefrom (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings), of eleven thousand and five hundred pounds.

"And we further recommend and propose, with the like consent of the said dean and chapter and of their visitor, that the said sum of stock described in the said schedule marked A, and also any other sums of stock or cash which may be now invested or held in trust for the said dean

and chapter, shall as soon as conveniently may be, be sold out or transferred, and the same or the proceeds thereof be paid or carried to our account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us, or any, or either of them, or of any other real estates.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of Ralph Barnes of Exeter, Esquire, to the credit of the said dean and chapter of Exeter, being the proceeds of certain monies arising from the sale of lands under the provisions of the Land Tax Redemption Acts.
