WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among Sheep, Cattle, and other Animals," (which Act has since been extended and continued in force until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament), after reciting that "a contagious or infectious disorder known or described as the Sheep Pox or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and it is necessary to take Measures to prevent such disorder from spreading;" it was and is enacted (amongst other things) as follows, namely:—"In case any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said Disorder, or any Disorder of the like Nature, be exposed or offered for sale, or be brought or attempted to be brought for the Purpose of being so exposed or offered for Sale, in any Market, Fair, or other open or public Place where other Animals are commonly exposed for Sale, then and in any such case it shall be lawful for any Clerk or Inspector or other Officer of such Fair and Market, or for any Constable or Policeman, or for any other Person authorized by the Mayor, or by any Two Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction in the Place, or for any person authorized or appointed by Her Majesty in Council, to seize the same, and to report such Seizure to the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place; and it shall be lawful for such Mayor or Justice either to restore the same, or to cause the same, together with any Pens, Hurdles, Troughs, Litter, Hay, Straw, or other Articles which he may judge likely to have been infected thereby, to be forthwith destroyed or

"otherwise disposed of in such manner as he shall deem proper, or as may be directed in manner hereinafter provided; and any Person bringing or attempting to bring any Sheep, Lambs, Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, or other horned Cattle, into any such Market, Fair, or open or public Place as aforesaid, knowing such Sheep, Lambs, or Cattle to be infected with or labouring under either of such Disorders as aforesaid, shall, upon Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for each and every such Offence a Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act, it was, and is further enacted as follows, that is to say:

"If any Person turn out, keep, or depasture any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, in or upon any Forest, Chase, Wood, Moor, Marsh, Heath, Common, waste Land, open Field, Road Side, or other undivided or uninclosed Land, such person shall on Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act it was and is further enacted (for the more effectually preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disease) as follows, that is to say:—

"It shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of Sheep, Cattle, Horses, Swine, or other Animals, or of Meat, Skins, Hides, Horns, Hoofs, or other parts of any Animals, or of Hay, Straw, Fodder, or other articles likely to propagate Infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any Yard, Stable, Outhouse, or other place, or any Waggons, Carts, Carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any Animals dying in a diseased state or any Animals, Parts of Animals, or other Things, seized under the provisions of this Act, are to be disposed of; and also for the Purpose of causing Notices to be given of the Appearance of any Disorder among Sheep, Cattle, or other Animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the Purpose of giving Effect to the Provisions of this Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and all Provisions for any of the Pur-

“poses aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like Force and Effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act; and all Persons offending against the same shall for each and every Offence forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or such smaller Sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty’s Privy Council may in any Case by such Order direct.”

And whereas a Contagious or Infectious Disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the Sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such Disorder from spreading;

Now, THEREFORE, the Lords of Her Majesty’s Privy Council, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them, as aforesaid, make and ordain the following Order, namely:

It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said Disorder, from the ports and places following, or any or either of them, that is to say, Bristol; Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster; Birkenhead, in the county of Chester; and Holyhead, in the county of Anglesea.

And it is further ORDERED that this Order shall continue in force for three calendar months from and after the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

And whereas in and by the said Act, it was, and is further enacted as follows, that is to say:

“If any Person turn out, keep, or depasture any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, in or upon any Forest, Chase, Wood, Moor, Marsh, Heath, Common, waste Land, open Field, Road Side, or other undivided or uninclosed Land, such person shall, on Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.”

“ Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or such smaller Sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty’s Privy Council may in any Case by such Order direct.”

And whereas, on the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the Lords of Her Majesty’s Privy Council, in and by an Order (reciting therein that a contagious or infectious disease known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, then prevailed among the Sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and that it was expedient to take measures to prevent such disorder from spreading), did, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the several orders and regulations following (that is to say):—

## I.

“ It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs to or from any or either of the parishes and tythings following, all lying and being in the county of Wilts, and near to the town of Devizes, that is to say, the parishes or tythings of Horton, Bishop’s Cannings, Allcannings, Etchilhampton, and Allington, or to drive or conduct any Sheep or Lambs through or by way of such parishes or tythings, or any or either of them, unless the person so removing, driving, or conducting such Sheep or Lambs shall first have obtained a certificate, in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorized by two or more Justices of the said county of Wilts to seize Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorders, under the 1st section of the said Act, that such removal, driving or conducting may take place without danger of spreading the said disease.

## II.

“ All Sheep and Lambs dying in any of the stages of the said disease, wheresoever such death or deaths shall or may occur, shall forthwith be buried by the person or persons in whose possession such Sheep or Lambs may be at the time of death, with their skins on, in pits of not less than five feet in depth, and the carcasses so buried shall be covered with quicklime.

## III.

“ All sheds and places whatsoever, and all railway trucks and other vehicles which may or shall have been used or occupied by Sheep or Lambs affected by the said disease, shall forthwith, after having been so used, be thoroughly cleansed with water, and immediately afterwards purified with chloride of lime by the person or persons in possession of such sheds, places, trucks, and vehicles, respectively.

## IV.

“ Every person in possession of any Sheep or Lambs in or amongst which the said disease shall manifest itself, shall forthwith give notice, in writing, of the fact to the Chief Constable or Superintendent of Police of the county or borough, in which such Sheep or Lambs may be.

## V.

“ And it is further ordered that this Order shall continue in force for three calendar months from and after the date hereof.”

AND WHEREAS the said disease now prevails in the several parishes following, that is to say, the parishes of

Stanton St. Bernard,  
Avebury,  
Aldbourne,

all respectively in the county of Wilts, and the parish of

Hampstead Norris,

in the county of Berks, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such disease from spreading; Now, THEREFORE, the Lords of Her Majesty’s Privy Council do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the following order, namely:

It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs to or from any or either of the above-mentioned parishes of

Stanton St. Bernard,  
Avebury,  
Aldbourne, and  
Hampstead Norris,

or to drive or conduct any Sheep or Lambs through or by way of such parishes or any or either of them, unless the person so removing, driving or conducting such Sheep or Lambs shall first have obtained a certificate, in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorized by two or more Justices of the said counties of Wilts or Berks, respectively, to seize Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorders, under the 1st section of the said Act, that such removal, driving, or conducting may take place without danger of spreading the said disease.

And it is further ORDERED that this Order shall continue in force for three calendar months from and after the tenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-fourth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, cap. 159, intituled, "An Act for the better Regulation of the several Ports, Harbours, Roadsteads, Sounds, Channels, Bays, and Navigable Rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's Docks, Dockyards, Arsenals, Wharfs, Moorings and Stores therein, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose." It is enacted (among other things) that no person or per-

sons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this Kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being, shall find it necessary for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by Order under their hands, or the hand of their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds.

And whereas we, as Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, have found it necessary for the protection of the harbour of Paignton and the roadsteads adjoining in Torbay, in the county of Devon, to prohibit the taking or removing of any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks at Goodrington, Paignton, and Livermead sands, communicating with the said harbour between the southern extremity of Goodrington Sands and Corban Point on the north. And we do hereby Order that no person or persons shall take or remove any ballast or shingle from such shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks aforesaid.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 24)—MEDITERRANEAN—ADRIATIC.

*Fixed Light at Rimino.*

THE Minister of Public Works at Turin has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of September, 1862, a light would be exhibited from a light-house, recently erected in the harbour of Rimino, on the west coast of the Adriatic.

The light is a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 70 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 9 to 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The tower is in lat. 44° 4' 39" N., long. 12° 34' 14" East of Greenwich.

Information has also been received at the Admiralty, that two lights in the town clock tower, and the light at the mole head at Fiume, in the gulf of Quarnero, on the east coast of the Adriatic, are now exhibited all night.

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY LOWER  
BRIXHAM, DEVONSHIRE.

WHEREAS the Local Government Act, 1858, was duly adopted on the 27th day of August, 1862, by the District of Lower Brixham, in the parish of Brixham, in the county of Devon, within the boundaries of such district as settled for the purposes of the aforesaid Act; and notice of such adoption has been duly given, in writing, to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by the said Act; and whereas it has now been duly certified to me that a copy of such notice has been advertized for three successive weeks in the Western Times and the Western Morning News, those being two of the local newspapers published and circulated in such district, and that copies of such notice have also been affixed to the principal doors of each church and chapel in such district to which notices are usually affixed; and the period of twenty-one days fixed by the said Act for appeal against the resolution for the adoption of the said Act by such district has now expired, and no such appeal has been made:

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby give notice, that the Local Government Act, 1858, has been duly adopted within the said district of Lower Brixham, in the county of Devon, and that, in accordance with the provisions thereof, the said Act will, at the expiration of two months from the date of the passing of the aforesaid resolution, have the force of law within such district.
