An Ordinance, No. 19, of 1862, having been enacted by the Governor of Mauritius and its Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Council of Government thereof, and confirmed by Her Majesty, entitled as follows:—"An Ordinance for enabling the Government to pay three hundred thousand pounds from the Colonial Treasury and to borrow money on debentures to the extent of one million pounds for the construction of Railways in the Colony";—Section IV. of which Ordinance is as follows:—

"Every Debenture shall be signed on behalf of the Government by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Government of Mauritius for the time being, and by Her Majesty's Agents-General for Crown Colonies in London for the time being, or by either of them, as Agents for the negotiation of the loan, provided that if the Secretary of State think fit to appoint any public officer in London to sign such debentures on behalf of the Government of Mauritius, the said debentures may be signed by the public

officer so appointed instead of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Government, and any public notice in the London Gazette of such appointment shall be deemed and held sufficient evidence thereof."

Notice is hereby given, that in pursuance of the said IVth Section of the said Ordinance, Edward Bullock Andrews, Esq., Collector of Internal Revenues in Mauritius, has been appointed, by the Secretary of State for the Department of the Colonies, His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, K.G., to sign, in London, on behalf of the Government of Mauritius, the debentures to be at present issued under the said Ordinance, to the extent of two hundred thousand pounds, instead of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Government of Mauritius.

DHAR PRIZE MONEY.

VICTORIA, R.

VICTORIA, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith. To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS it has been represented unto Us that the Principality of Dhar, in the Province of Malwa, in India, has for many years been under Our protection, and on the death of the Rajah, in the month of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, the Government of India allowed the adopted heir of the late Rajah to succeed to the Principality. That shortly after this event the mercenary soldiers of the Rajah of Dhar rose in revolt, and burnt the stations of Bhopawa and Sirdarpore, hoisted the Mussulman standard, seized the fortress of Dhar, and defied Our authority. That for the suppression and punishment of these outrages a force, consisting of Our troops and of the European and native troops of the East India

Company, was, in October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, assembled under the command of Brigadier Charles Shepherd Stuart, of the Bombay Army, who regained possession of the said fortress of Dhar on the second of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, when booty consisting of gold and silver coins, brass cannon, elephants, and sundry articles was captured, which has realized the sum of rupees seven hundred and seventy-one thousand and ten, or thereabouts. And whereas Our Commissioners have recommended unto Us to grant all the said booty for the use of the Commanders, officers, and men, belonging to the forces employed in the said operations, and to give such directions as to the appropriation and distribution thereof as to Us should seem fit, to which We are graciously pleased to condescend.

Now We do hereby give and grant to Our Secretary of State for India in Council for the time being all the aforesaid booty and proceeds, in trust for the use of the Commanders, officers, and men belonging to the forces employed in the said operations, such booty to be distributed by Our Secretary of State for India in Council for the time being, or by any person or persons he may appoint for that purpose in the following proportions, viz.:—To the said Brigadier Charles Shepherd Stuart, one twenty-fifth part of the whole of the said booty and proceeds, and the remainder of the said booty and proceeds to be distributed amongst the subordinate officers and men belonging to the forces which took active part in the aforesaid operations, in the following proportions as the same may be applicable to the several ranks of officers and men engaged therein, such scale and proportions being settled and determined and fixed by and according to the calculation of the day's pay of each rank, and being in the proportion of one share for each shilling of such day's pay, videlicet:—Colonels and Lieutenant-Colonels, seventeen shares each; Majors, sixteen shares each; Captains, twelve shares each; Lieutenants, First Class, after seven years' service, seven shares and a half each; Lieutenants, Second Class, under seven years' service, six and a half shares each; Ensigns, five shares and a half each. ## SARUN FIELD FORCE PRIZE MONEY.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

WHEREAS it has been represented unto Us that in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, a rebellion took place within Our East Indian dominions, and that steps were taken on Our behalf to suppress and put down such rebellion.

And whereas a force, designated the Sarun Field Force under the command of Brigadier Rowcroft on the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, took possession of the palace of the Rajah of Satsasee when property, consisting of cash, grain, elephants, and cattle, which has realized on sale the sum of forty-nine thousand and six hundred rupees, or thereabouts, was captured.

And whereas Our said Commissioners have recommended unto Us to grant all the said booty and proceeds thereof, so as aforesaid captured, for the use of the force under the command of Brigadier Rowcroft, by which the same was captured and to give such directions as to the appropriation and distribution thereof as to Us should seem fit, to which We are graciously pleased to condescend.

#### NURGOOND PRIZE MONEY.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

WHEREAS it has been represented unto Us, that in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, a rebellion took place in Our East Indian dominions: That during the progress of the rebellion the Chief of the fort or stronghold of Nurgood rose in open insurrection and defied our authority, and murdered the Political Agent at that place: And whereas a force composed of a detachment of Our Royal Artillery, two companies of Our Seventy-fourth Foot, a detachment of the Twenty-eighth Bombay Native Infantry, and one

hundred and fifty of the Southern Mahratta Horse under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel George Malcolm, C.B., of the Bombay Army, stormed and occupied the Petta of Nurgood on the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and captured and occupied the fort of Nurgood on the second of the said month of June: That during the aforesaid operations, booty consisting of live stock, grain, horses, elephants, &c., was captured by the said force under the command of the said Lieutenant-Colonel George Malcolm, the sale proceeds of which have realized the sum of ten thousand and twenty-six rupees, fifteen annas, and eight pies, or thereabouts: And whereas our said Commissioners have recommended unto us to grant all the said booty or property so as aforesaid captured for the use of the troops under the command of the said Lieutenant-Colonel George Malcolm, and to give such directions as to the appropriation and distribution thereof as to Us should seem fit. #### SHORAPORE PRIZE MONEY.

## PRIZE TAKEN IN KHANDEISH.

### VICTORIA, R.

VICTORIA, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen Defender of the Faith, to all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

WHEREAS it has been represented unto Us by the Commissioners of our Treasury, that, in the year 1857, certain Bheels, inhabiting the province of Khandeish in our East Indian dominions, rebelled and levied war against us, and our authorities, and that steps were taken on our behalf to suppress and put down such rebellion.

And whereas, during the proceedings had and taken for that purpose, Lieutenant-Colonel Evans commanded the Satpoora field force, which force was composed of a party of the district police, and of regular troops. And whereas, the said party of police under the command of Captain Birch, Superintendent, captured in the months of April and May in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, in the neighbourhood of a place called Pulsod in Indore, booty consisting of bars of silver, gold and silver coins, and ornaments, which has realized the sum of one hundred and seventeen thousand and ninety-three rupees, or thereabouts.
