**C**ORRESPONDENCE respecting Montenegro:

Despatch 1.

THE EARL RUSSELL TO MR. J. SAYILE LUMLEY.

SIR,

*Foreign Office, Sept. 30, 1862.*

I HAVE read and laid before the Queen your despatches, Nos. 88 and 93, of the 2nd and 5th instant, relating to the affairs of Montenegro.

Her Majesty's Government have to express their regret that they cannot agree with the views of Prince Gortschakoff either on the general question of interference in the affairs of Turkey or on the particular question of Montenegro.

Her Majesty's Government have always understood that when Turkey was allowed to form part of the system of Europe, she was to have all the advantages, and be liable to all the duties, of an independent State. She was, in short, to be as independent as Prussia or Portugal, Sweden or Saxony, and, on the other hand, to be bound like those States by the faith of treaties and the ties of international comity and good will.

If this be so, it is not justifiable, where treaties are silent to interfere without necessity or provocation in a case where an insurrection has broken out in Turkey, and that insurrection has been supported by a neighbouring Prince.

Such was the case in Herzegovina, where an insurrection broke out, and in Montenegro, from which it was fomented and supported.

If the Prince of Montenegro was a vassal, the Sultan had a right to reduce him to obedience, and to impose such conditions as will secure that obedience for the future; if he was an independent Prince, the Sultan had a right to force him to accept such terms of peace as would prevent a renewal of his aggression.

As to the particular terms demanded by Turkey, Her Majesty's Government do not pretend to justify or to condemn them.

It is for the Porte to declare what guarantees are necessary for her future quiet.

The terms proposed, however, are not without example.

Soon after the beginning of the last century the Highlanders of Scotland attempted to overthrow the throne of the Hanoverian family, and

to set up another dynasty. The advisers of the British Crown took means to overcome this resistance. They defeated the insurgents in two rebellions, they made good roads through the Scotch mountains, and they erected forts to keep the disaffected in awe.

At the present day Her Majesty has no more loyal subjects than the Highlanders of Scotland.

I will not conclude without giving, in a few words, the view taken by Her Majesty's Government of what is going on in Turkey.

If the Slavonic and Greek subjects of the Sultan rise in insurrection, and that insurrection is suppressed, the weight of authority will be made heavier, privileges will be withdrawn, and the sums which ought to be expended in making roads and harbours, and in promoting improvement, will be diverted to the pay and maintenance of a large military force.

If, on the other hand, the darling scheme entertained in some quarters of overthrowing the Turkish rule should be successful, Greeks and Slavonians will quarrel, each province will claim supremacy, civil war will ravage the countries where the authority of the Sultan shall have been thrown off, and an appeal will be made to the great Powers of Europe to put an end to this anarchy by dividing among themselves the Turkish provinces. But the European Powers would hardly be able to perform this task without giving rise to fresh conflicts—probably to a general war.

Such are the views which induce Her Majesty's Government, while sincerely desirous of improving the condition of the Christian subjects of the Porte, to refuse all countenance to projects which in Greece go by the name of the 'great idea,' and which, whether Greek or Slavonic, tend to the disruption of all existing ties of allegiance in the Turkish empire, and are more or less connected with the criminal intrigues of which Turkey feels the effects in Servia, and which aim no less at the subversion of every monarchy in Europe than at the destruction of the integrity of the Ottoman empire.

You may give a copy of this despatch to Prince Gortschakoff.

COPIE D'UNE DEPECHE du Prince Gortchacow au Baron de Brunnow, en date du 28 Septembre, 1862.

MONSIEUR LE BARON,

J'AI l'honneur de transmettre ci-près à votre Excellence la copie d'une dépêche de Lord Russell, dont M. l'Ambassadeur d'Angleterre m'a donné communication d'après l'ordre du Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique.

Elle a trait aux évènements du Monténégro, ainsi qu'à la question générale d'intervention dans les affaires de Turquie, et exprime le regret du Cabinet Anglais de ne point pouvoir adhérer aux vues que nous avons énoncées à cet égard.

Le prix que nous attachons à nous trouver autant que possible d'accord avec le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique, m'engage à examiner de plus près la question, afin de constater les points sur lesquels cet accord peut exister et ceux sur lesquels nous devons maintenir une opinion différente.

Nous ne contestons nullement le point de vue général émis par Lord Russell que, du moment où la Turquie a été admise à faire partie du système Européen, elle a droit aux mêmes avantages que tout autre Etat indépendant, et est liée par les mêmes devoirs résultant des Traités et des rapports internationaux de convenance et de bon vouloir. Lord Russell en infère que dès lors le Gouvernement Ottoman était parfaitement libre d'agir à son gré à l'égard du Monténégro, de le réduire à l'obéissance si c'était un Etat vassal, à telles conditions qui pouvaient assurer à l'avenir le maintien de cette obéissance, et si c'était un Etat indépendant, de lui imposer telles conditions de paix qui pouvaient prévenir de nouvelles agressions.

Ici je ferai observer incidemment que l'Angleterre a toujours professé des doctrines politiques tendant à la reconnaissance des Gouvernements de fait, c'est-à-dire, de ceux dont l'existence se manifeste par des faits assez notoires et assez durables pour constater leur vitalité.

D'après cette doctrine, il nous semble que le Cabinet Anglais ne devrait pas contester au Monténégro un droit à l'indépendance que ce pays a maintenu depuis plus d'un siècle avec une indomptable énergie, à moins d'admettre que le principe en question ne cesse d'être applicable du moment où il s'agit de réduire un Etat Chrétien sous la domination Turque.

Quant à l'opinion que la Porte, étant en guerre avec le Monténégro comme avec un Etat indépendant, était en droit de lui imposer des conditions ressortant de la situation respective des belligérants à l'issue de la guerre, nous ne la contestons nullement.

Nous rappellerons seulement à Lord Russell qu'en insistant avec raison sur les droits qui appartiennent à la Turquie comme membre de la famille Européenne, il a lui-même indiqué les devoirs correspondant à ces droits et découlant des rapports internationaux.

Or, dans la question présente, à côté de la Porte et du Monténégro comme belligérants, il y a un troisième élément: les Grandes Puissances de l'Europe. Indépendamment de l'intérêt profond qu'elles doivent vouer à des évènements dont les conséquences, en affectant le repos de l'Orient, rejaillissent sur la sécurité générale, et sans parler des antécédents qui ont amené leur participation solennelle à des actes publics concernant les rapports entre la Turquie et le Monténégro, les Grandes Puissances ont vu leur sollicitude appelée sur ce débat par la Porte elle-même, qui,

en prenant spontanément vis-à-vis d'elles l'engagement de ne modifier en rien le *statu quo* territorial et administratif de la Montagne, a posé de sa propre initiative une limite à son droit de belligérant.

Il nous paraît impossible d'admettre qu'elle en soit dégagée par le fait que le Prince Nicolas n'a accepté que d'une manière évasive le premier ultimatum d'Omer Pacha.

Lorsque la Porte a fait la déclaration dont nous parlons, la réponse du Prince Nicolas lui était parfaitement connue, et c'est même à la suite de cette réponse qu'elle s'est décidée aux opérations militaires sur les conséquences desquelles elle a pris soin de rassurer d'avance les Grandes Puissances intéressées à ce débat.

Il en eût sans doute été autrement, si, dans le cours de la guerre, le Gouvernement Ottoman avait déclaré qu'il ne se considérerait plus comme lié par sa promesse antérieure. En pareil cas, les Puissances auraient été à même de combiner en conséquence leur attitude et leurs conseils.

Ce n'est pas ainsi que les choses se sont passées. Aucune déclaration semblable n'a été faite. Pas une parole n'a été prononcée qui fût de nature à affaiblir l'engagement primitif, spontanément contracté par le Gouvernement Ottoman. Les Grandes Puissances ont été tenues jusqu'au dernier moment dans l'ignorance des conditions envoyées à Omer Pacha, et lorsqu'elles ont pu les apprécier, elles se trouvaient en présence d'un fait accompli qui ne saurait invalider le droit que la Porte elle-même leur avait concédé.

C'est donc à ces Puissances à juger si ces conditions sont d'accord avec les engagements pris à leur égard; si nommément la clause qui stipule la construction d'une route militaire avec des blockhaus gardés par des garnisons Turques n'équivaut pas à une véritable occupation militaire, à une prise de possession réelle du pays; si elle n'introduit pas dans la Montagne un principe dangereux, celui du contact immédiat des races—principe qui vient précisément d'être condamné d'après ses résultats, et définitivement aboli en Serbie comme incompatible avec le maintien des relations pacifiques que l'Europe désire voir s'établir et se consolider en Orient pour la sécurité générale; si, par conséquent, cette clause ne détruit pas entièrement le *statu quo* que la Porte s'était engagée à maintenir; et si enfin elle n'est pas de nature à constituer un état de guerre permanent là où les efforts collectifs des Puissances qui sont intervenues dans la Convention de 1858, ont eu pour but de prévenir des conflits.

Nous croyons, quant à nous, que l'examen de ces questions est pour ces Puissances un devoir de prévoyance et de dignité.

Lord Russell cite comme un exemple à l'appui des derniers actes de la Porte à l'égard du Monténégro, un fait historique du siècle dernier, la révolte des Highlanders d'Ecosse contre la Maison de Hanovre, révolte qui fut domptée par les mêmes moyens dont le Gouvernement Ottoman prétend user envers les Monténégrins.

Lord Russell nous permettra de lui faire observer que l'Ecosse se trouvait réunie depuis longtemps à l'Angleterre lorsqu'une fraction du pays, les Highlanders, essaya de renverser la dynastie Hanovrienne, tandis que le Monténégro n'a jamais reconnu ni souveraineté ni suzeraineté de la part de la Porte et a su maintenir son indépendance de fait à travers une lutte de plus d'un siècle.

J'ajouterai qu'en employant la rigueur à l'égard des Highlanders, la Dynastie de Hanovre les ralliait sous un Gouvernement qui leur apportait les lumières et le bien-être; c'est pourquoi ses

efforts ont abouti à faire aujourd'hui des Highlanders de loyaux sujets de Sa Majesté la Reine.

Quelque convaincus que nous soyons des bonnes intentions qui prévalent dans les conseils du Gouvernement Turc, le respect que nous professons pour le haut degré de civilisation dont s'honore à juste titre la nation Britannique, ne nous permet pas d'établir sous ce rapport une analogie qui d'ailleurs n'existe, quant aux faits, ni dans leur principe, ni dans leurs conséquences probables.

Lord Russell aborde, en terminant, la question plus générale, soulevée par l'état présent de la Turquie.

Il n'y voit que deux solutions possibles : ou bien des insurrections permanentes des sujets Slaves ou Grecs du Sultan, dont la répression devrait avoir pour effet de restreindre leurs privilèges, de rendre plus lourd le poids de l'autorité, et d'obliger celle-ci à dépenser en armements militaires les ressources qui pourraient être affectées à l'établissement de routes ou de ports ;—ou bien le succès définitif des entreprises tentées par les populations Chrétiennes pour secouer la domination Musulmane, résultat qui aboutirait à l'anarchie, à la lutte des races, et finalement à l'intervention de l'Europe et au partage des provinces Turques au prix d'une guerre générale.

Le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique nous permettra d'abord de lui rappeler que les privilèges dont jouissent les provinces Chrétiennes du Sultan reposent sur la garantie des Grandes Puissances de l'Europe, et que par conséquent elles ne sauraient être restreintes sans violer une des stipulations les plus solennelles du Traité du 13 Mars, 1856.

Mais, en outre, nous ne pouvons pas nous résigner à admettre que la solution d'un problème d'un si haut intérêt pour la sécurité, le repos, la prospérité générale, les principes modernes de civilisation et de progrès, et les sentimens d'humanité des Grandes Puissances de l'Europe, ne puisse se trouver ailleurs que dans les termes extrêmes où le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique la cherche exclusivement, en ne laissant d'autre alternative aux deux parties en présence qu'une lutte d'extermination réciproque, et d'autre rôle aux Grandes Puissances de l'Europe que de se diviser en appuyant, selon leurs vues particulières, les unes des répressions à outrance de la part de la Porte, les autres des aspirations passionnées de la part des populations Chrétiennes.

A notre avis, cette solution doit plutôt être cherchée dans les voies de la conciliation mieux appropriées aux intérêts en conflit et aux besoins de notre époque.

La conservation de l'Empire Ottoman est pour nous, comme pour toutes les Grandes Puissances, un principe essentiel d'équilibre Européen. Mais, en présence des élémens de désordre et de lutte, légués à ces contrées par les siècles passés, un pareil résultat ne saurait être atteint d'une manière solide et durable que par un système de Gouvernement qui tendrait à concilier au Sultan l'affection et la reconnaissance de ses sujets Chrétiens, en donnant à leurs besoins et à leurs vœux une satisfaction légitime, et en les dotant à cet effet des conditions d'existence indispensables à une vie sociale, heureuse et prospère.

Sous ce rapport nous accueillons avec plaisir l'assurance de Lord Russell que le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique désire sincèrement l'amélioration du sort des sujets Chrétiens du Sultan.

C'est là en effet la voie que nous n'avons pas cessé de recommander comme la seule qui puisse conduire à l'affermissement et à la prospérité de l'Empire Ottoman dans des conditions compatibles

avec les Traités existans, comme avec les sympathies, les convictions, et les intérêts généraux de l'Europe.

C'est également dans ce but que nous n'avons pas cessé de convier les Grandes Puissances à un accord qui, en écartant tous les calculs fondés sur leur rivalité politique, aurait exercé une salutaire influence, d'un côté sur les Chrétiens, en leur inspirant confiance et espoir, de l'autre sur le Gouvernement Turc, en le fortifiant dans les bonnes intentions manifestées à plusieurs reprises par Sa Majesté le Sultan.

Nous avons la conviction que si nos conseils avaient été écoutés ils eussent prévenu les calamités qu'on a aujourd'hui à déplorer.

Nous ne voulons pas porter un jugement trop sévère sur les actes du Gouvernement Ottoman. Nous savons qu'il a à lutter avec de grandes difficultés et nous sommes tout disposés à lui tenir compte de ses moindres efforts. Mais, nous devons aussi reconnaître que des faits tels que la guerre qui vient de s'accomplir en Herzégovine et dans le Monténégro, ou le bombardement d'une cité sans défense, ne sont pas les moyens qui peuvent conduire au but désiré.

Ce sont précisément ces mesures violentes qui, en exaltant à la fois les prétentions des vainqueurs et les ressentimens des vaincus, amènent les choses à un point où il n'y a plus de recours possible qu'à la force, et plus de solution que l'une ou l'autre des deux extrémités signalées par Lord Russell.

C'est parceque nous croyons qu'un pareil résultat n'est conforme ni à l'intérêt des Chrétiens, ni à celui du Gouvernement Turc, ni à celui des Grandes Puissances de l'Europe, que nous persistons à recommander aux premiers la prudence, au second la modération, aux dernières le bon accord qui peut seul donner à leurs conseils l'autorité nécessaire.

Le jour où le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique voudra entrer dans cette voie de conciliation, vous pouvez l'assurer qu'il nous trouvera à ses côtés, pourvu toutefois qu'il ne se renferme pas dans un optimisme que nous ne pourrions pas partager, et qu'il consacre avec nous ses efforts à ramener les populations Chrétiennes à la confiance par le sentiment réel d'une amélioration pratique.

Quant à l'éloignement, exprimé par Lord Russell à la fin de sa dépêche, pour toute coopération à des intrigues criminelles tendant à la dissolution les liens d'obéissance des sujets envers le Souverain et au renversement de toute monarchie en Europe, nous prenons acte de cette assurance avec une sincère satisfaction, et je n'ai pas besoin d'ajouter qu'elle rencontrera toujours la plus complète adhésion de la part du Cabinet Impérial.

Votre Excellence est autorisée à donner lecture et à laisser copie de la présente dépêche à Monsieur le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique.

COPY OF A DESPATCH from Prince Gortchakoff to Baron de Brunnov, dated 28th September, 1862.

M. LE BARON,

I HAVE the honour to inclose herewith to your Excellency a copy of a despatch from Lord Russell, communicated to me by the English

Ambassador, by order of the Principal Secretary of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

It relates to the events in Montenegro, as well as to the general question of intervention in the affairs of Turkey, and expresses the regret of the English Cabinet that they are unable to adhere to the views which we have expressed in that respect.

The value which we attach to finding ourselves, as far as possible, in accord with the Government of Her Britannic Majesty, requires me to examine the question more closely, so as to ascertain the points on which such agreement can exist, and those on which we must maintain a different opinion.

We do not in any manner call in question the general view of the case put forth by Lord Russell, that from the moment when Turkey was admitted to form a part of the European system, she has had a right to the same advantages as belong to every other independent State, and is bound by the same duties resulting from Treaties and from international relations of courtesy and good will.

Lord Russell thence draws the inference that from that period the Ottoman Government was perfectly free to act independently as regards Montenegro; to reduce it to obedience if it were a vassal State, upon such conditions as might insure for the future the maintenance of that obedience; and if it were an independent State, to impose upon it such conditions of peace as might prevent fresh aggressions.

Here I may incidentally make the observation, that England has always professed political doctrines tending to the recognition of Governments *de facto*; that is to say, such whose existence is manifested by facts sufficiently notorious and lasting to establish their vitality. According to this doctrine, it appears to us that the English Cabinet ought not to contest the right of Montenegro to the independence which that country has maintained for above a century with unconquerable energy, unless they admit that the principle in question ceases to be applicable when it is proposed to reduce a Christian State under the Turkish dominion.

As to the opinion that the Porte, being at war with Montenegro as with an independent State, had the right to impose upon it conditions arising from the relative attitudes of the belligerents at the end of the war, we in no wise question it.

We will simply remind Lord Russell, that in insisting with reason upon the rights which belong to Turkey as a member of the European family, he has himself indicated the duties corresponding to those rights and emanating from international relations.

Now, in the present question, besides the Porte and Montenegro as belligerents, there is a third element,—the Great Powers of Europe. Independently of the profound interest which they must devote to events, the consequences of which, by affecting the repose of the East, react upon the general security, and not to mention the preceding events which have led to their solemn participation in public acts regarding the relations between Turkey and Montenegro, the Great Powers have had their anxious consideration called to this dispute by the Porte herself, which in spontaneously taking towards them the engagement not in any way to modify the *status quo* territorial and administration of the mountain, has by its own initiative placed a limit to its rights as a belligerent.

It appears to us impossible to admit that it is released from its engagement by the fact that Prince Nicolas only accepted in an evasive manner the first ultimatum of Omer Pasha.

When the Porte made the declaration of which we speak, the reply of Prince Nicolas was perfectly known to it, and it was even as a consequence of that reply that it decided upon the military operations, as to the consequences of which it was careful to reassure beforehand the Great Powers interested in this struggle.

It would doubtless have been otherwise if, in the course of the war the Ottoman Government had declared that they would no longer consider themselves bound by their former promise. Consequently, in such a case, the Powers would have been in a position to take a joint attitude and joint counsels.

This is not what has happened. No such declaration has been made. Not a word has been said of a nature to weaken the original engagement, contracted spontaneously by the Ottoman Government. The Great Powers have been kept, up to the last moment, in ignorance of the conditions sent to Omer Pasha, and when they were enabled to weigh them they found themselves in presence of an accomplished fact, which could not invalidate the right which the Porte itself had conceded to them.

It is, then, for those Powers to judge if those conditions are in accordance with the engagements taken with respect to them; if, namely, the clause which stipulates for the construction of a military road, with block-houses guarded by Turkish garrisons, is not equivalent to a real military occupation, to a real taking possession of the country: if it does not introduce into the Mountain a dangerous principle, that of the immediate contact of races;—precisely the principle which has just been condemned through its results, and which has been definitively abolished in Servia, as being incompatible with the maintenance of the pacific relations which Europe desires to see established and consolidated in the East for the general security; if, consequently, this clause does not entirely destroy the *status quo* which the Porte had engaged herself to maintain; and, lastly, if it is not of a nature to constitute a permanent state of war there, where the collective efforts of the Powers which intervened in the Convention of 1858 had for their object to prevent conflicts.

We are of opinion, as far as we are concerned, that the investigation of these questions is for these Powers a duty of foresight and of dignity.

Lord Russell cites, as a precedent in support of the late acts of the Porte towards Montenegro, an historical fact of the last century,—the revolt of the Scotch Highlanders against the House of Hanover,—a revolt which was suppressed by the use of the same measures which the Ottoman Government claims the right to employ towards the Montenegrins.

Lord Russell will permit us to point out to him, that Scotland had been united during a long period to England, when a fraction of the people, the Highlanders, attempted to overturn the Hanoverian dynasty, whilst Montenegro has never recognized either sovereignty or suzerainty on the part of the Porte, and has known how to maintain her independence *de facto* through a struggle of more than a century.

I will add that, in employing severe measures in regard to the Highlanders, the Hanoverian dynasty rallied them under a Government which was bringing to them enlightenment and welfare;



for this reason, its efforts have resulted at this day in converting the Highlanders into loyal subjects of Her Majesty the Queen.

However well convinced we may be of the good intentions which prevail in the councils of the Turkish Government, the respect which we profess for that high degree of civilization of which the British nation is so justly proud, does not permit us to establish in this respect an analogy which, as regards the facts, exists neither in their principle, nor in their probable consequences.

Lord Russell, in conclusion, enters upon the more general question raised by the present state of Turkey.

He can see in it but two possible solutions,—either permanent insurrections of the Slavonian or Greek subjects of the Sultan, the repression of which would have the effect of restricting their privileges, of rendering heavier the weight of authority, and of obliging the Government to spend in military armaments, resources which might otherwise be applied to the construction of roads or of ports; or, on the other hand, the final success of enterprises attempted by the Christian population against Mussulman dominion, a result which would terminate in anarchy, in a strife of races, and finally, in the intervention of Europe, and in the partition of the Turkish provinces at the cost of a general war.

The Principal Secretary of State of Her Britannic Majesty will permit us to remind him, in the first place, that the privileges enjoyed by the Christian provinces of the Sultan are secured by the guarantee of the Great Powers of Europe, and that in consequence they cannot be curtailed without violating one of the most solemn obligations of the Treaty of 18<sup>th</sup> March, 1856.

But, moreover, we cannot bring ourselves to admit that the solution of a problem of so high an interest for the security, the repose, the general prosperity, the modern principles of civilization and progress, and the sentiments of humanity of the Great Powers of Europe, can only be found in the extreme terms in which the Principal Secretary of State of Her Britannic Majesty seeks for it exclusively, leaving no other alternative to the two opposite parties than a struggle of reciprocal extermination, and no other part for the Great Powers of Europe to play than take sides according to their own particular views;—one party supporting extreme measures of repression on the part of the Porte;—the other party the passionate aspirations of the Christian population.

In our opinion, this solution should rather be sought by means of conciliation better suited to the interests at stake, and to the requirements of our age.

The preservation of the Ottoman Empire is to us, as well as to all the Great Powers, a principle essential to the balance of power in Europe. But in presence of the elements of disorder and strife bequeathed to those countries by past ages, such a result could not be attained in a solid and durable manner, except by a system of government which would tend to conciliate to the Sultan the affection and the gratitude of his Christian subjects, by granting a legitimate satisfaction to their wants and their wishes, and by granting to them for this purpose those conditions of existence which are indispensable to a happy and prosperous social life.

In this respect, we accept with pleasure the assurance of Lord Russell, that the Government of Her Britannic Majesty sincerely desires an

improvement in the lot of the Christian subjects of the Sultan.

This is, in fact, the path which we have never ceased to point out as the only one likely to lead to the consolidation and to the prosperity of the Ottoman Empire, in conditions compatible with existing treaties, as well as with the sympathies, the convictions, and the general interests, of Europe.

It is equally with this object that we have not ceased to invite the Great Powers to an understanding which, putting aside all the calculations founded upon their political rivalry, would have exercised a wholesome influence, on the one hand, upon the Christians, by inspiring them with confidence and hope; on the other, upon the Turkish Government, by fortifying it in the good intentions manifested on many occasions by His Majesty The Sultan.

We are convinced that if our counsels had been listened to, they would have prevented the calamities which we have now to deplore.

We do not desire to pass too severe a judgment upon the acts of the Ottoman Government. We know that they have to contend with great difficulties, and we are quite disposed to give them credit for their smallest efforts. But we are also bound to acknowledge that facts such as the war which has just taken place in the Herzegovina and in Montenegro, or the bombardment of a defenceless city, are not the means which can lead to the desired end.

It is precisely these violent measures, which at once arousing the pretensions of the conquerors and the resentment of the vanquished, bring matters to a point, where no course is left but to resort to force, and no other solution than one or other of the two extremes indicated by Lord Russell.

It is because we believe that such a result is in conformity neither with the interests of the Christians, nor with those of the Turkish Government, nor with those of the Great Powers of Europe, that we continue to recommend to the first—prudence, to the second—moderation, to the last—that good understanding which alone can give the necessary authority to their councils.

Whenever the Government of Her Britannic Majesty shall be inclined to enter upon this path of conciliation, you may assure them that they will find us at their side, provided always that they do not shut themselves up in an optimism which we are unable to share, and that with us they will devote their efforts to restoring the Christian populations to confidence by a sense of real and practical amelioration.

As to the absence of all co-operation in criminal intrigues tending to the dissolution of the bonds of obedience of subjects towards the Sovereign, and to the overthrow of every monarchy in Europe, which Lord Russell asserts at the end of his despatch, we take note of this assurance with sincere satisfaction; and I need not add, that it will always receive the fullest adhesion on the part of the Imperial Cabinet.

Your Excellency is authorized to read this despatch, and to give a copy of it to the Principal Secretary of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at New York, enclosing a copy of the following Circular Instructions to Collectors and other Officers of the United States Customs, containing regulations for the execution of the recent Act of the United States' Congress for increasing, temporarily, the duties on imports.

(Circular.)

**INSTRUCTIONS TO COLLECTORS AND OTHER  
OFFICERS OF THE CUSTOMS.**

*Treasury Department, August 1, 1862.*

THE following regulations are transmitted for the information and government of Officers of the Customs, in executing certain provisions of an Act entitled "An Act increasing temporarily the duties on imports, and for other purposes," approved July 14, 1862, said Act to take effect on the 1st day of August, 1862.

1st. The 16th section of the Act provides that "from and after the passage of this Act, in estimating the allowance for tare on all chests, boxes, cases, casks, bags, or other envelope or covering of all articles imported liable to pay any duty, where the original invoice is produced at the time of making entry thereof, and the tare shall be specified therein, it shall be lawful for the Collector, if he shall see fit, or for the Collector and Naval Officer, if such Officer there be, if they shall see fit, with the consent of the consignees, to estimate the said tare according to such invoice; but in all other cases the real tare shall be allowed, and may be ascertained under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may from time to time prescribe."

In contemplation of this legislation, the following regulations are established, viz:—

Where the original invoice is produced at the time of making entry thereof, and the tare shall be specified therein, the consignees, owners, or agents, must declare, in writing, their assent to the estimate of tare as set forth in the invoice; and if the Collector, or the Collector and Naval Officer, see fit, the tare shall be so estimated. In the absence of such written assent, or if the Collector doubts the correctness of the tare as specified in the invoice, it will be his duty to cause the actual tare or weight of the cask or package to be ascertained, and for that purpose he may cause to be emptied and weighed such number of casks and packages as he may think proper. In all other cases, actual tare only shall be allowed.

2nd. The 17th section provides that "from and after the first day of November, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, no goods, wares, or merchandise subject to ad valorem or specific duty, whether belonging to a person or persons residing in the United States, or otherwise, or whether acquired by the ordinary process of bargain and sale, or otherwise, shall be admitted to entry, unless the invoice of such goods, wares, or merchandise be verified by the oath of the owner or one of the owners, or in the absence of the owner, one of the party who is authorized by the owner to make the shipment and sign the invoice of the same, certifying that the invoice annexed contains a true and faithful account, if subject to ad valorem duty and obtained by purchase, of the actual cost thereof, and of all charges thereon, and that no discounts, bounties, or drawbacks, are contained in the said invoice but such as have actually been allowed on the same; and when consigned or obtained in any manner other than by purchase, the actual market value thereof, and if subject to specific duty, of the actual quantity thereof; which said oath shall be administered by the Consul or Commercial Agent of the United States in the district where the goods are manufactured, or from which they are sent; and if there be no Consul or Commercial Agent of the United States in the said district, the verification hereby required shall be made by the Consul or Commercial Agent of the United States at the nearest point, or at the port from which the goods are shipped, in which case the oath shall be administered by some public officer, duly authorized to administer oaths, and transmitted with a copy of the invoice to the Consul or Commercial Agent for his authentication; and this Act shall be construed only to modify, and not repeal the Act of March first, eighteen hundred and twenty-three, entitled "An Act supplementary to, and to amend an Act entitled 'An Act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage,' passed second March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, and for other purposes," and the forms of the oaths therein set forth shall be modified accordingly."

In executing the provisions of section 17, the following forms are prescribed:

**FORM A.—Owner's or Agent's Oaths, where goods, wares, or merchandise have been actually purchased.**

FORM B.—*Owner's or Agent's Oath, in cases where goods, wares, or merchandize have been consigned or obtained in any manner other than by purchase.*

B., do solemnly and truly swear (or affirm) that the invoice now produced and herewith annexed contains a true and faithful account of the goods, wares, or merchandise therein mentioned, subject to *ad valorem* duty, at their market value at , at the time the same were procured, and of all charges thereon, and a true and faithful account of the actual quantity of the goods, wares, or merchandise therein mentioned subject to specific duty; and that the said invoice contains no discounts, bounties, or drawbacks, but such as have been actually allowed.

If there be no Consul or Commercial Agent of the United States in the district where the goods are manufactured, or from which they are sent, then the above verification shall be made by the Consul or Commercial Agent of the United States at the nearest point, or at the port from which the goods are shipped; in which latter case the oath (or affirmation) shall be administered by some public officer duly authorized to administer oaths, and transmitted with a copy of the invoice to the Consul or Commercial Agent for his verification.

3rd. The 21st section provides that "all drugs, medicines, and chemical preparations, entered for exportation and deposited in warehouse or public store, may be exported by the owner or owners thereof in the original package, or otherwise, subject to such regulations as shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury."

For this section the following regulation is prescribed:

Whenever the owner or owners, or consignees, desire to export any drugs, medicines, or chemical preparations, otherwise than in the original packages, written application for such export must be made by him or them to the Collector of the Port where the drugs, medicines, and chemical preparations may be; such application to specify the name of the article proposed to be exported, and, if less than the entire package, the quantity thereof, and the kind of package in which it is proposed to make the export, whether a box, chest, bag, or bale, and also to give the name of the vessel in which the original importation was made, and the date thereof.

Upon such application, the collector will make the proper endorsement, directing the reopening of the original package and the repacking of so much as may be specified in the application; and the package so made up shall be marked and numbered in the same manner as the original package. The officer in charge of the store in which the articles shall have been deposited (which shall be designated as Bonded Warehouse No. 2), shall cause the opening and repacking to be done under his immediate supervision.

Where the merchandise is to be weighed, gauged, or measured, it shall be done by the United States Weigher, Gauger, or Measurer, as the case may be, prior to being repacked. All labour performed and services rendered under this regulation, shall be under the supervision of an Officer of the Customs, and at the owner's expense.

4th. The 21st section of the Act of July 14, 1862, also provides that "all goods which now are or may be deposited in public store or bonded warehouse after this Act takes effect and goes into operation, must be withdrawn therefrom, or the duties thereon paid within one year from the date of original importation, but may be withdrawn by the owner for exportation to foreign countries, or may be transhipped to any port of the Pacific or western coast of the United States, at any time before the expiration of three years from the date of original importation; such goods, on arrival at a Pacific or western port, as aforesaid, to be subject to the same rules and regulations as if originally imported there."

The following regulation is prescribed:

All goods, wares, or merchandise transhipped under this section to a port on the Pacific or western coast, may, on arrival there, be entered for consumption within one year from the date of original importation into the United States, or may be warehoused for such period of the three years, allowed by law, as may not have expired since their first arrival in the United States.

5th. The 22nd section provides that "the privilege of purchasing supplies from the public warehouses duty free, be extended, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe to the vessels-of-war of any nation in ports of the United States, which may reciprocate such privilege towards the vessels-of-war of the United States in its ports."

Therefore, if the vessel to which supplies are to be conveyed under authority of this section be within the port where the public warehouse is located, the goods must be delivered on board such vessel under the supervision of an Officer of the Customs, whose certificate, together with that of the Captain or Purser of the vessel, shall be taken as sufficient evidence, that the goods have been withdrawn from warehouse in pursuance of law.

If the vessel be at a port other than that in which the public warehouse is located, a transportation bond, in the usual form, must be given for the delivery of the articles on board, under the regulation above prescribed.

The transportation bond will be cancelled on the production of the certificate of the Customs' Officer, together with the certificate of the Captain or Purser of the vessel, that the supplies have been so delivered.

And it was also enacted that the Postmaster-General might examine any printed paper or any packet which should be sent by the post without a cover or in a cover open at the sides in order to discover whether it was contrary in any respect to the conditions thereby required to be observed, or to any regulations which the Postmaster General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, might from time to time make in respect of any paper or packet of such a description:

All printed periodical publications (not being strictly newspapers) and printed proceedings of the Parliament of the United Kingdom, authorized to be sent by the post between the United Kingdom and Holland, under and by virtue of the said recited Warrant, bearing date the 2nd day of December, in the year of our Lord, 1843, may have the name and address of the sender printed on the covers thereof.

3. All packets consisting of printed papers, other than newspapers authorized to be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Belgium, under and by virtue of the said recited Warrant, bearing date the 24th day of September, in the year of our Lord, 1857, may have any matter or thing printed on the covers thereof.

4. ## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 35.)—WEST INDIES—CUBA.

### *Fixed and Flashing Light on Cayo Bahia de Cadiz.*

THE Commandant of Marine at Havana has given notice, that on and after the 10th day of October, 1862, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cayo Bahia de Cadiz, on the north coast of the island of Cuba.

The light is a *fixed* white light, varied by a bright *flash* every *minute*. It is elevated 175 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 24 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The tower is iron, 159 feet high, slightly conical, and painted white. It stands near the north-east end of the Cayo, with the keeper's dwelling and store-house on either side, in lat. 23° 12' 24" N., long. 80° 29' 18" West Greenwich.

### *Fixed Light on the Reefs of Cruz del Padre.*

Also, that on and after the 10th day of October, 1862, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the reefs of Cruz del Padre, on the north coast of Cuba.

The light is a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 49 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The tower is 46 feet high, slightly conical, and painted white. It stands at the distance of about 6½ cables N.E., from the Cayo Cruz del Padre, near the south-east extreme of the reefs surrounding that Cayo; in lat., 23° 17' 7" N., long. 80° 54' 12" West of Greenwich, or about 1' east of that of the Admiralty Charts.

### *Fixed Light at Puerto de Cayo Diana.*

Also, that on and after the 10th day of October, 1862, a *fixed* white harbour light would be exhibited from a pole on the west part of Cayo Diana, in Cardenas Bay, 5 miles from the village of Cardenas. The light is elevated 43 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 7 miles. It is in lat. 23° 9' 56" N., long. 81° 7' West of Greenwich.

### *Alteration of Light on Tapion Point, St. Lucia.*

A *fixed, red* light is now exhibited from the lighthouse on Tapion Point, on the south side of entrance to Port Castries, island of St. Lucia;

and the two white lights hitherto shown, are discontinued.

Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held at Lewes aforesaid, in and for the said county of Sussex, on the 6th day of January, 1863.
