CORRESPONDENCE respecting the Schleswig Holstein Question.

No. 1.

Earl Russell to Mr. Paget.*

Sir, Foreign Office, September 24, 1862.

IT appears from the accounts received from various quarters that the correspondence between Austria, Prussia, and Denmark, which it was asserted would lead to a settlement of the dispute so long subsisting between Germany and Denmark in regard to the obligations of Denmark in the affairs of Holstein, Lauenburg, Schleswig, and the common Constitution of the Danish Monarchy, has grown more and more bitter. The longer the lapse of time, and the further the negotiation is carried, the wider is the space which separates the two parties, and the stronger the language which they use towards each other.

Upon considering, with pain and regret, this unsatisfactory aspect of the affair, and contemplating the unfavourable results which may be expected from further direct communications between Powers so adverse in their opinions, Her Majesty has directed that you should be furnished with instructions which may, it is hoped, tend to the

long-desired settlement.

In framing these instructions it is advisable to throw out of the calculation, in the first place, those matters upon which controversy may be said to be exhausted.

The first of these matters relates to the question whether any taxes can be imposed, or any laws enacted, in Holstein or Lauenburg without the express consent of the Representatives of those Duchies.

This question has been resolved in the negative by the German Confederation, of which the Duchies of Holstein and Lauenburg are members.

Another question which need not be further discussed is the Constitution of 1855.

It is clear that whether a representation according to numbers of the Kingdom, as well as the Duchies, be a good or a bad Constitution, yet, not having been accepted by the Duchies, the Constitution of 1855 has no force in Holstein, Lauenburg, or Schleswig.

Neither is it necessary to discuss the rights of Denmark in reference to her Rigsraad. It is

quite clear that Denmark can legislate for herself, and impose taxes to be levied upon her own people, without the consent of Holstein, Lauenburg, or Schleswig.

Two questions of great importance remain. The first regards the Duchy of Schleswig; the second, the common constitution of the Monarchy.

Schleswig was formerly in a position altogether nomalous. Unconnected with the German Confederation, it was yet connected with Holstein, which formed part of that Confederation. Later arrangements have dissolved this inconvenient tie, and Schleswig is at present only connected with Holstein by non-political relations affecting the two communities.

There are, however, relations between Germany and Denmark in respect to Schleswig which have

given rise to the present controversy.

The obligations of honour contracted by Denmark towards Schleswig, and imparted to the German Confederation as such by the King of Danmark in 1852 chiefly regard two points. The Denmark in 1852, chiefly regard two points. first of these is the Royal promise that Schleswig shall not be incorporated with Denmark. The second is, in substance, an engagement that the Germans in Schleswig shall be treated on an equal footing with persons of Danish or any other nat onality.

The grievances of which Germany complains as violations of these promises are thus summed up in the recent Prussian note of the 22nd of

· August :-

The systematic destruction of national and neighbourly connection between Schleswig and Holstein; the disregard of the determination concerning the University of Kiel; the overfilling of the Duchy of Schleswig with Danish officials in the Administration, with Danish clergy in church and school, as well as the whole spirit of the administration in this Duchy; finally, the violation of all actual and practical relations by the maintenance of the language Edict, are matters of fact which are notoriously public, and of which the evidence is in the hands of every onc.

For all practical purposes, it would be vain to attempt a constant supervision by Germany of the nomination to civil offices of Danish officials in Schleswig, or the administration in church and school by Danish Ministers of religion. superintendence would lead to a constant renewal

of quarrels, and a perpetuity of ill-will.

The best mode, therefore, of remedying these evils for the present, and of preventing complaints for the future, is to grant a complete autonomy to Schleswig, allow the Diet of Schleswig fairly to treat, and independently to decide upon questions affecting their university, their churches and schools, the language to be used where the Danish population prevails, where the Germans preponderate, and where the races are mixed.

I come lastly to the question of the Constitution, the most entangled and the most embarrassing

question of all those in discussion.

Treaties, Protocols, and despatches afford us little light upon this subject, and the glimmering rays which they do afford tend rather to lead us astray than to guide us right.

For what could be more destructive of all union, all efficiency, all strength, and, indeed, of all independence, than to lay down as an absolute rule that no law should be passed, and no Budget sanctioned, unless the four States of the Monarchy all concurred? What would Austria say if she were asked to accept a Constitution which should paralyze the action of the Reichsrath at Vienna till separate Diets in Hungary, in Gallicia, and in Venetia, should have adopted the same law or sanctioned the same Budget? How would Prussia

herself bear an absolute veto on the proceedings of her Parliament given to the Diet of Posen?

If such a Constitution must lead to an early and decisive rupture, let us consider whether each portion might not have its due independent movement without clogging the wheels of the whole machine. For instance, if the sums required for the navy were represented by 90, of which Denmark were to furnish 60, and the other States 30, Denmark might vote, and apply her contingent of 60, independently of the vote of the other three portions.

There is only one objection to be made to this

suggestion which deserves consideration.

If the 1,600,000 people of Denmark were taxed to pay the army and navy, and the 50,000 of Lauenburg were to refuse any grant for these purposes, a hardship would be suffered by the inhabitants of the kingdom when compared with the situation of the King-Duke's subjects in Lauen-

The remedy for this inequality is to be found in a proposal for a normal Budget, to be laid before the Rigsraad, and before the Diets of Holstein, Lauenburg, and Schleswig, for their consent.

It is obvious that the Government of an independent kingdom like Denmark must, for the maintenance of that independence, require a certain amount of expenditure for the Civil List of the Sovereign, for the Diplomatic Service, for the Army and Navy of the State.

Let this be reckoned as economically as possible; for the least amount of royal dignity; for the most

frugal establishments of profound peace.

Obtain that sum from the four Representative Bodies. Confide its distribution to a Council of State, formed, two-thirds of Danes, and one-third of Germans. Let the votes of this Council be taken in public, and accounts of the expenditure published yearly.

The normal Budget to be voted in gross for ten years. The distribution or expenditure to be voted

yearly.

Extraordinary expenses beyond the normal Budget to be voted freely by the Kingdom and the three Duchies separately.

The suggestions I have made may be summed

up in a few words :-

1. Holstein and Lauenburg to have all that the German Confederation ask for them.

2. Schleswig to have the power of self-government, and not to be represented in the Rigsraad.

3. A normal Budget to be agreed upon by Denmark, Holstein, Lauenburg, and Schleswig.

4. Any extraordinary expenses to be submitted to the Rigsraad, and to the separate Diets of Holstein, Lauenburg, and Schleswig.

You will give a copy of this despatch to Mon-sieur Hall and invite his serious attention to its contents.

M. Hall to M. Bille .- (Communicated to Earl Russell by M. Bille, October 10).

Monsieur, Glucksborg, le 5 Octobre, 1862.

SI le Gouvernement du Roi n'a pu encore expédier sa réponse—et il n'y en a qu'une possible—aux notes des deux Puissances Allemandes, vous devinez, Monsieur, qu'il n'y a d'autre raison à cela que l'absence du Roi de la capitale, qui ne permet pas la réunion du Conseil d'Etat nécessaire pour l'envoi de cette réponse. Car sur le fond de l'affaire la manière de voir du Gouvernement ne

saurait être douteuse pour personne, pas même, j'ose le dire, pour les Gouvernements qui ont formulé des demandes si exorbitantes.

Glucksborg, October 5, 1862.

IF the King's Government has not yet been able to send its answer—and only one answer is possible—to the notes of the two German Powers, you can imagine, Sir, that it is only on account of the absence of the King from the capital, which does not allow of the assembling of the Council of State necessary for the dispatch of this answer. For, with regard to the principle of the affair, the view taken by the Government can be a matter of doubt to no one—not even, I may venture to say, to the Governments who have made such exorbitant demands.

To dictate to the Danish Government the abolition of the common Constitution, which now only embraces those parts of the Monarchy which are quite beyond the competence of Germany; to impose on us, as a substitute for Constitutional Government, either absolutism, in which the spirit of the people and the progress of our civilization would no longer acquiesce, or anarchy, for that is the only name which can be given to the proposal

according to which every general law and every item of expenditure of the Government would have to be previously approved by four Deliberative Assemblies; to attempt, finally, to decide the purely internal questions of an exclusively Danish province;—these are demands to which the King's Government could not accede without abdicating, I do not say our dignity, but even the existence of a Danish State independent of the arbitrary will of Germany. The Government of England will appreciate, better than any other Government, how impossible it is for Denmark to allow herself to be thrust back into the obsolete forms of absolute power. It is, therefore, with true pleasure that I remember how often Lord Russell has recognized and claimed, in the most precise terms, the independence of the non-German portion of the Danish Monarchy from all foreign intervention, "which would imply a contempt, not only for the law of nations, but also for the most sacred interests of the North;" and Mr. Paget accurately foresaw the aspirations of the Germanic Confederation when he said, in his despatch of the 3rd of July, 1860, that it would not be contented with less than "a subversion of the existing organization of the Monarchy, in order to revert to the state of things which existed before 1848, and a re-establishment of the former political union between Schleswig and Holstein; an arrangement to which no Danish Government could be brought to agree, even if it could be urged to do so."

I request you, Sir, to express to Lord Russell our hope that he will continue to afford us his powerful support with Powers which, until now, had not perhaps judged with the same clearness as English diplomacy has, how far the pretensions of Germany would reach, and at what point all possibility of concession on the part of the Danish Cabinet would cease.

Earl Russell to Mr. Paget.

ir, Foreign Office, October 11, 1862.

I HAD, yesterday, a long conversation with M. Bille.

He began by informing me that he had been desired by M. Hall to come immediately to London, in consequence of a report sent by Csptain Falbe of a despatch which I was about to send to the Great Courts recommending an abrogation of the Danish Constitution of 1855.

M. Bille proceeded to say that this report had caused great alarm in the Danish Government; that they had hitherto reason to believe Her Majesty's Government favourable to the rights of Denmark. The Danish Government, upon the advice of the British Government and other allies of Denmark, had complied with the requisitions of Germany in regard to Holstein and Lauenburg. Their only stronghold, at present, was the Constitution which bound together Denmark and Schleswig; this gone, the Danish Monarchy would fall to pieces. He gave me a copy of a despatch from M. Hall to this effect.

I replied, that he would recollect the advice I had given, on behalf of Her Majesty's Government, to the Danish Government, to remedy all the practical grievances of Schleswig, and thus to present an unassailable front to Germany.

This advice had not been taken.

I had afterwards suggested the adoption of some one of several plans, emanating from Holstein through Hanover, for a common Constitution.

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This suggestion was also rejected by M. Hall. It was then that Her Majesty's Government had devised a plan which, by securing on the one hand self-government to Schleswig, and on the other an adequate normal Budget to the Danish Monarchy, seemed to Her Majesty's Government to provide at once for the redress of the complaints of the German inhabitants of Schleswig and for the supplies necessary to maintain the independence and the dignity of the Danish Monarchy.

I was convinced, I told M. Bille, that, when my despatch was communicated to M. Hall, his apprehensions would be diminished; and I even trusted the plan of Her Majesty's Government, conceived in a spirit of equity and fairness, would be found to afford a reasonable basis for a definitive arrange-

ment.

M. Bille, however, continued to affirm that Denmark had taken no engagements to Germany, or to Austria and Prussia, in regard to Schleswig, and that the King of Denmark was free to do exactly as he pleased in respect to that portion of the Danish Monarchy. Adopting the language of M. Hall, he said that the adoption of any such plan as I had sketched out must lead either to absolutism or to anarchy; that absolutism was happily impossible, but the division of the Danish Monarchy into independent portions would lead to anarchy and dismemberment.

I could only refer M. Bille to my despatch.

M. Hall to M. Bille.—(Communicated to Earl Russell by M. Bille, October 28.)

Monsieur, Copenhague, le 15 Octobre, 1862.

Je crois devoir à l'intérêt que Lord Russell a toujours porté au Danemark de répondre sans délai à la dépêche, ci-jointe en copie, que Mr. Paget m'a communiqué hier et qui a dû nous causer d'autant plus de surprise et de regret que Lord Russell avait, jusqu'à présent, exprimé des vues bien différentes de celles vers lesquelles il semble incliner aujourd'hui.

Le Ministre commence dans sa dépêche par écarter la question de la position du Holstein dans la Monarchie, comme ne faisant plus objet d'une discussion. A nous aussi cette question paraît épuisée, en ce sens, que la solution définitive ne dépend plus que du réglement de quelques points dont la nécessité ne saurait être méconnue.

Vis-à-vis de la demande de la Diète Germanique notre attitude est nette et bien détérminée. Nous avons prouvé que la faculté que la Diète exige pour les Etats Holsteinois de voter le Budget commun et les lois communes, en tant qu'ils regardent le Duché, est aussi contraire au droit public que la demande en est insoutenable au point de vue de la compétence de la Diète. Néanmoins, nous avons déclaré que nous serions prêts à y accéder, quelques dangers pour l'intégrité de la Monarchie que cela puisse entraîner, si cette position éventuelle du Holstein pourrait être précisée de telle sorte que le reste de la Monarchie ne fût pas réduite à une dépendance continuelle de l'Allemagne, et si, par ce sacrifice, nos rapports avec la Confédération pouvaient être rétablis sur une base durable.

C'est pour bien fixer ces points que nous sommes entrés dans les négociations actuelles avec la Prusse et l'Autriche, et l'opinion que Lord Russell émet sur la nécessité de la dite concession de notre part,

est accompagnée, j'en suis convaincu. d'une entière approbation des deux conditions que je viens

Pour ce qui est des affaires intérieures du Slesvig, nous aurions pu espérer que notre ligne de conduite n'était pas moins propre à nous assurer les sympathies du Gouvernement Anglais. Les intentions qu'à l'égard de ce Duché le Roi avait spontanément exprimées dans le temps, l'engagement d'honneur, pour me servir de l'expression employée par Lord Russell, que le Roi aurait pris, ont été immédiatement et consciencicusement remplies par lui. Même pour ce qui concerne le réglement sur l'usage des deux langues, qui, je le répète aujour-d'hui, n'avait nullement été mentionné dans la correspondance de 1851, le Gouvernement a scru-puleusement gardé la même mesure, puisque les dispositions aujourd'hui en vigueur sont les mêmes qui, en 1851, ne provoquèrent aucune objection. Lorsque ensuite Lord Russell recommande l'extension des libertés accordées à la Diète Provinciale du Sleswig, le Roi a déjà, dans le discours de la Couronne de cette année, annoncé cette même intention. Toutefois, un tel développement ne pourrait être que l'œuvre de la libre volonté du Roi, et de même c'est Sa Majesté qui peut le mieux juger de l'opportunité d'une telle mesure. Le Gouvernement y procédera dès que la situation de la question Holsteinoise le permettra, et dans l'organisation nouvelle qu'il compte donner alors aux Etats Provinciaux du Slesvig, il suivra les mêmes principes libéraux qui le guident dans toute son administration, et principalement il les suivra dans la rédaction de la nouvelle loi électorale qu forme l'élément le plus indispensable de tout nouvel ordre de choses dans le Duché.

Lord Russell aborde enfin la question de la Constitution commune, en tant qu'elle regarde le Royaume et le Slesvig. Je n'ai, à cet égard, rien à ajouter à ce que vous avez déjà dit au Ministre, et vous prierez sa Seigneurie de voir dans les explications que vous lui avez déjà présentées l'expression définitive des vues du Gouvernement du Roi.

Je n'entrerai dans aucun détail pour prouver combien peu est fondée l'objection que la Constitution cut du être soumise au vote des différentes représentations spéciales de la Monarchie. Je l'ai déjà suffisamment démontré, mais quelqu'ait été l'avis de la Diète de Frankfort à l'égard du droit des Etats Holsteinois, j'aime à croire que, pour ce qui concerne le Royaume et le Slesvig, Lord Russell, tout en émettant un avis, n'entend pas méconnaître le devoir impérieux qui défend au Roi de se soumettre aux arrêts de l'Allemagne pour l'appréciation de ce qu'il doit à ceux de ses Etats qui n'appartiennent pas à la Confédération. Aussi peu que la Constitution commune est entâchée d'aucun défaut formel, aussi peu il serait possible de la remplacer par l'organisation dont Lord Russell a voulu esquisser les traits principaux, sans que la Monarchie fût dissoute et sans que cette intégrité même que le Traité de Londres avait pour but de sauvegarder fût gravement compromise. Dans sa depêche, Lord Russell a fait ressortir lui-méme, avec une parfaite justesse, tout ce qu'une telle organisation comporterait de dangers pour des Monarchies étendues et puissantes. A plus forte raison il reconnaîtra sans peine, je le crois, que pour un Etat comme le Danemark cette organisation amènerait l'anarchie, et serait suivie de près du démembrement complet de la Monarchie. Le maintien de la Constitution commune, pour le Royaume et le Slesvig, est donc la question de vie et de mort pour le Danemark, et autant le Gouvernement est pénétré de cette certitude, autant il est déterminé à ne point s'écarter de la ligne de conduite qui lui est tracée par cette conviction.

Je vous prie, Monsieur, de donner lecture de cette dépèche au Ministre et de lui en laisser copie. Je suis profondémenent convaincu que, même en formulant les conseils que Lord Russell vient de nous donner, il n'a pas cru se mettre en contradiction avec les sympathies qu'il a toujours témoignées envers le Danemark. Cet intérêt sincère et le souvenir des antécédents politiques de sa Seigneurie me donnent le ferme espoir qu'il trouvera dans nos franches explications des motifs suffisantes pour ne plus s'arrêter à des propositions qu'il n'a pu mettre en avant, j'en suis certain, que parcequ'il ne lui est pas aussi évident que pour nous, que leur adoption préluderait à l'anéantissement de la vie constitutionnelle du Danemark et bientôt mettrait en question l'existence même de la Monarchie.

Copenhagen, October 15, 1862.

I think it due to the interest which Lord Russell has always taken in Denmark to reply without delay to the despatch, inclosed herewith in copy, which Mr. Paget communicated to me yesterday, and which has occasioned us the more surprise and regret inasmuch as Lord Russell had hitherto expressed views very different from those towards which he now appears to incline.

The Minister in his despatch begins by putting aside the question of the position of Holstein in the Monarchy as being no longer a subject under discussion. To us, too, this question appears to be exhausted, in the sense that its final settlement only depends on the arrangement of some points the necessity of which cannot be ignored.

Our attitude in regard to the demand of the Germanic Diet is clear and well defined. We have proved that the power which the Diet claims for the Holstein States of voting the common Budget and the common laws, in so far as they regard the Duchy, is as contrary to international law as the demand of it is indefensible in respect to the competency We have, nevertheless, declared that of the Diet. we should be ready to accede to it, whatever dangers to the integrity of the Monarchy it might involve, if the eventual position of Holstein could be defined in such a manner that the rest of the Monarchy would not be reduced to a constant dependence on Germany, and if by this sacrifice our relations with the Confederation could be reestablished on a permanent basis.

It was to settle these points that we entered upon the present negotiations with Prussia and Austria, and the opinion which Lord Russell expresses on the necessity of this concession on our part is, I am convinced, accompanied by an entire approval of the two conditions which I have just pointed out.

With regard to the internal affairs of Schleswig, we might have hoped that our line of conduct was not less fitted to assure us the sympathics of the English Government. The intentions in respect to this Duchy which the King had on a former occasion spontaneously expressed, the engagement of honour, to use the term employed by Lord Russell, which the King had taken, were immediately and conscientiously fulfilled by him. Even in respect to the regulation as to the use of the two languages — which, I repeat, never was mentioned in the correspondence of 1851—the Government has scrupulously maintained the same measure, for the arrangements now in force are the same which in 1851 did not provoke any objection. Lord Russell next recommends an extension

of the liberties accorded to the Provincial Diet of Schleswig, but the King has already, in the Speech from the Throne of this year, proclaimed the same intention. Such a development could not, however, take place otherwise than by the King's free will, and in like manner His Majesty is the best judge of the opportuneness of such a measure. The Government will act in this matter as soon as the state of the Holstein question permits it, and in the new organization it proposes then to give to the Provincial Estates of Schleswig, it will follow the same liberal principles which guide it in the whole of its administration, and will especially do so in framing the new electoral law which, by universal consent, is the most indispensable element of any new order of things in the Duchy.

Lord Russell enters, finally, on the question of the common Constitution in so far as it concerns the Kingdom and Schleswig. I have nothing in this respect to add to what you have already said to the Minister, and you will beg his Lordship to look upon the explanations which you have already given him as the final expression of the views of

the King's Government.

I will not enter into any detail to prove how unfounded is the objection that the Constitution ought to have been submitted to the vote of the different special representations of the Monarchy. I have already sufficiently demonstrated it; but, whatever may have been the opinion of the Diet of Frankfort in respect to the right of the Holstein States, I trust that, in what concerns the Kingdom and Schleswig, Lord Russell, while expressing an opinion, does not intend to ignore the imperious duty which forbids the King to submit to the decrees of Germany in estimating what he owes to those of his States which do not belong to the Confederation. So little as the common Constitution is defaced by any defect in form, so little would it possible to substitute the organisation of which Lord Russell has endeavoured to sketch the principal outlines, without the Monarchy being dissolved, and that very integrity which it was the object of the Treaty of London to maintain being seriously compromised. Lord Russell himself has, in his despatch, shown, with perfect justice, all the dangers that such an organization would entail on great and powerful Monarchies; with still more reason he will, I believe, readily admit that, for a State like Denmark, this organization would produce anarchy, and would shortly be followed by the entire dismemberment of the Monarchy. maintenance of the common Constitution for the Kingdom and for Schleswig is, therefore, the question of life and death for Denmark; and as the Government is convinced of this, so is it resolved not to depart from the line of conduct prescribed to it by such a conviction.

I beg you, Sir, to read this despatch to the Minister, and to give him a copy of it. I am firmly convinced that, even in drawing up the advice which he has just given us, Lord Russell did not believe that he was acting in contradiction to the sympathies which he has always shown for Denmark. This sincere interest, and the political antecedents of his Lordship, afford me a firm hope that he will find in our frank explanations sufficient reasons for not adhering to propositions which I am sure he can only have put forward because it is less evident to him than to us that their adoption would be the prelude of the extinction of Constitutional life in Denmark, and would soon jeopardize the very existence of the Monarchy.

M. Bismark to Count Bernstorff.—(Communicated to Earl Russell by Count Bernstorff, October 30.)

(Translation.) Berlin, October 27, 1862.

YOUR Excellency is already cognizant of the despatch which the British Secretary of State for the Foreign Department wrote on the 24th ultimo to Mr. Lowther, communicating his views as to the manner in which the long-pending dispute between Germany and Denmark might be terminated. A like communication was sent to Vienna, and Lord Russell has recommended his views, and the propositions grounded upon them, to the consideration of the two great German Powers. It is not necessary to assure you that this consideration will be fully given to them by us. It is true that this difference essentially relates to nothing more than the performance of requisitions settled by Treaty between Germany and Denmark. But we understand the desire of friendly Powers to see the settlement of a dispute which in its further developments might certainly lead to very serious results, as it is impossible, as your Excellency is aware, that Germany should yield up claims which are most intimately bound up with the whole of her political position. If, in the interests of peace, we hold it to be our duty seriously to examine every view offered to us upon the solution of this weighty question, a proposition from England especially has the fullest claim / to our searching considera-

I am rejoiced to be able at the outset to express the conviction that Earl Russell's despatch, particularly the four points in which the propositions are summed up at the close, contains the basis for coming to an understanding, provided that they be unreservedly accepted by the Danish Government, and then carried out also, in a suitable manner.

We do not, it is true, conceal from ourselves that the propositions of Lord Russell do not strictly turn upon the basis of the agreements of 1851 and

No one could make it a reproach to us if we should simply insist that Denmark also should absolutely not deviate from this basis, and that in case Denmark should declare herself unable to fulfil the obligations she has contracted, all existing obligations would then cease for us also, and from that moment the ancient right, for which an equivalent was offered, but not guaranteed, to us, might be the only basis of our demands and acts. But, however, we can gather in the propositions of Lord Russell also a means of securing the essential objects and interests which prevailed in the negotiations of 1851 and 1852; and it is in consideration of this, and in our sincere wish for the maintenance of peace, that we find the justification of our efforts to reach our object in a somewhat devious way.

We must, first of all, thank the British Secretary of State for having simplified the question by discarding all those points upon which there remains no dispute. In this respect we fully concur with him, and we have always most deeply regretted that we were compelled to go back to circumstances which should have been clear of themselves; the acknowledgment contained in the despatch of the 24th September will dispense with our doing so for the future.

The first of these points referred to, which negatives the levy of taxes, or the enacting of laws in Holstein and Lauenburg, without the assent of the States, is in accordance with the conditions set up by the well-known Federal Resolutions for the immediate provisional situation, the discontinuance of which we have shown to be necessary, if Federal measures are to be averted. As the

British Secretary of State declares that this is decided by the Federal Resolutions, he shows that he perfectly understands this part of the question to be a matter purely appertaining to the Confede-

The second point, relative to the nullity of the collective Constitution of 1855, is also clearly This nullity is a condition of the conceived. exclusion of Schleswig from the Reichsrath, and it is expressly stated also in the second of the recapitulating paragraphs at the close of the despatch. It would be difficult for the Cabinet of Copenhagen to oppose these simple statements of facts by any deductions, however ingenious.

And, lastly, the third of these points, which expresses the independence and freedom of the Kingdom of Denmark to impose taxes and to legislate for itself, is a matter of course, and is so understood by us. We have always been very far from claiming a right for the Duchies to interpose

in the affairs of the kingdom.

After Earl Russell has thus put away those elements which have but too much contributed to obscure the whole affair, he proceeds to lay down his direct ("positiv") propositions in regard to the two great questions-upon the position of Schleswig, and upon the ordering of such relations in the different parts of the monarchy as imply, in some form, a common action.

In speaking of the first of these two points, we will not argue upon the designation of the obligations of Denmark as being that of a debt of honour; we certainly look upon the performance of Treaty obligations as being also a debt of honour.

Here again also Lord Russell brings forward clearly the two essential parts: the security of Schleswig against incorporation, and the protection of German nationality in the Duchies; and he helieves that a suitable remedy for both is to be found in a complete autonomy of the Duchy, by which it would stand in no nearer a political relation to the Kingdom than to the other territories in the Monarchy, and would have to decide independently upon all the points regarding which Danish encroachments have up to this time given occasion for such just and hitherto such fruitless complaints; complaints resting upon such notorious facts that a superintendence, such as we have neither exercised nor claimed, was not required to prove their reality.

We declare ourselves to be fully in accordance with the propositions of Lord Russell; but they will certainly not attain their object unless they be carried out with perfect sincerity on the part of His Majesty the King of Denmark; unless the system of Danish arbitrariness ("Vergewaltigung") which has hitherto prevailed in Schleswig be really terminated; and unless a guarantee be given for a perfectly free election and voting of the Assembly of States, which is to decide upon all the given points. This is a matter which is quite self-evident, and it will indeed appear so to the British Secretary of State; but frequent and sad experience unfortunately compels us again to mention it, and urgently to recommend it to the attention of Earl Russell.

The despatch finally treats of what it designates, justly, as the most difficult and complicated point of the whole affair; namely, the ordering of common financial matters.

In this point, also, I can but declare myself to be in accordance with the propositions as they are contained in the third and fourth summary paragraphs at the close of the despatch. The union with the States of the several territories of the Monarchy for a normal Budget, and free voting, by the same States, for extraordinary expenses going beyond it, corresponds, in our view, with the rights and interests of those territories, as also with the wants of the whole body; and it will, I should suppose, find no objection on the part of the Duchies themselves. If the Danish Government accepts without reserve these points, together with the two first mentioned, it will be possible to determine, also, by a further agreement, a suitable form for ordering the expenses appertaining to the common body. The plan intimated in Earl Russell's despatch of paying and distributing the normal Budget, with the co-operation of a Council of State, may offer, I am of opinion, the connecting point ("Anknüpfung.") for such agreement, if in this the principle be strictly adhered to, that each of the territories be secured from an unjust preponderance of the rest.

In expressing, therefore, our assent to the four paragraphs in which the British Secretary of State sums up his propositions, I need hardly add the observation that we can speak at present in our indi-We have now no express vidual name only. mandate from the Confederation, and can neither prejudge its views nor dispose of its rights. it is likewise a matter of course that if Lord Russell's propositions be accepted by the Danish Government, we shall also represent our view to the Confederation, and exert ourselves to obtain thereto the consent of our Federal colleagues. Should this endeavour to come to an understanding be frustrated by the failure of a corresponding move on the part of the Danish Government, the Agreements of 1851 and 1852, and the rights and claims of Germany, naturally remain in full

I request your Excellency to express yourself in this sense to the British Secretary of State, and, at the same time, I authorize you to give him a copy of this despatch.

Count Rechberg to Count Wimpffen.—(Communicated to Earl Russell by Count Wimpffen, November 1.)

(Traduction.)

M. le Comte, Vienne, le 29 Octobre, 1862.

MR. JULIAN FANE m'a communiqué la dépêche ci-jointe en copie, que le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat pour les Affaires Etrangères lui a adressée par ordre de Sa Majesté la Reine, afin de rendre plus facile d'arriver à un arrangement final du différend qui subsiste entre l'Allemagne et le Danemark.

Ainsi que vous le verrez par cette pièce, Lord Russell, comme introduction à ses propositions, désigne d'abord les points dans lesquels, selon sa conviction, les discussions qui ont eu lieu jusqu'ici ont livré un résultat incontestable. Il considère comme parfaitement établi:—

1. Que dans le Holstein et le Lauenbourg aucune loi ne peut être décrétée et aucun impôt levé sans le consentement des Etats de ces Duchés.

2. Que la Constitution générale du Royaume du 2 Octobre, 1855, déjà formellement suspendu pour le Holstein et le Lauenbourg, doit nécessairement être et rester sans effet aussi pour le Slesvig.

3. Que le Royaume de Danemark, proprement dit, a le droit de se donner les lois et de se décréter des impôts indépendamment de l'assentiment des Duchés.

Prenant ces articles comme point de départ, Lord Russell a tracé ensuite les lignes fondamentales d'un plan d'après lequel la question de la

position du Slesvig, aussi bien que le problème compliqué de l'établissement d'une Constitution commune pour toute la Monarchie Danoise, doivent être résolus à la satisfaction des deux parties.

Ces lignes fondamentales sont résumées par le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat dans les quatre points suivants:—

1. Les Duchés de Holstein et de Lauenbourg doivent obtenir tout ce que la Confédération Germanique a demandé pour eux.

2. Le Slesvig doit avoir le droit de jouir de son autonomie et il ne doit pas être représenté dans le Conseil du Royaume ("Reichsrath").

3. Un Budget normal doit de dix en dix ans être voté par les quatre Corps Représentatifs du Danemark, du Holstein, du Lauenbourg, et du Slesvig.

4. Les dépenses communes extraordinaires doivent être approuvées également par la Diète Danoise ("Reichstag") et par les Etats des trois Duchés.

Après avoir examiné attentivement cette importante communication, et après nous être concertés avec la Cour de Prusse, à laquelle le Cabinet de Londres a fait parvenir les mêmes ouvertures, je réponds par les observations suivantes au désir de Lord Russell de connaître nos vues sur son plan d'arrangement.

Après une longue et infructueuse discussion entre les Puissances Allemandes et le Cabinet de Copenhague, le Gouvernement Impérial a acquis la conviction que pour trouver la clef d'une solution finale des complications subsistant jusqu'à ce jour, il faut maintenant avant tout persuader le Danemark de l'impossibilité de conserver comme un lien unissant entr'elles les autres parties seulement de la Monarchie la Constitution Générale du 2 Octobre, 1855, qui a été établie contrairement aux Conventions de 1851 et 1852, et qui a déjà été abolie pour le Holstein et le Lauenbourg. Ceci formait le point principal de notre Mémorandum du mois d'Août.

Nous éprouvons donc une satisfaction particulière en voyant la Grande Bretagne partager ce point de vue, et en en prenant acte je n'hésite pas à exprimer la conviction que le Gouvernement Britannique aura le mérite d'avoir contribué fortement à l'apaisement d'un différend menaçant pour le repos de l'Europe, s'il amène le Gouvernement Danois, qui a tant de motifs de tenir compte des conseils de l'Angleterre, à renoncer définitivement aussi pour le Slesvig à la Constitution de 1855.

Il n'est pas moins satisfaisant pour nous que Lord Russell reconnaisse entièrement le droit de la Confédération Germanique de trancher en dernier ressort par ses décisions les questions concernant le Holstein et le Lauenbourg qui sont pendantes à Francfort.

Nous sommes, de notre côté, loin de contester que le Royaume de Danemark proprement dit ne puisse user de ses droits particuliers en matière de législation et d'impôts sans être lié au consentiment des Corps Représentatifs des Duchés.

Nous nous félicitons donc de nous trouver entièrement d'accord avec le Gouvernement Britannique quant aux points qu'il admet comme placés hors de toute discussion ultérieure. Nous nous empressons d'ajouter que pour notre part nous sommes également disposés à voir dans les propositions positives qui forment la seconde partie de la dépêche de Lord Russell une base convenable et équitable pour la solution définitive du différend Dano-Germanique:

Pour couvrir la responsabilité du Gouvernement Impérial, je dois cependant observer que dans cette affaire l'intercession d'une Puissance tierce doit trouver ses limites dans le droit de la Confédération Germanique, reconnu par Lord Russell luimême en tant qu'il est question d'une affaire intérieure de l'Allemagne, d'agir conformément aux lois de la Confédération, indépendamment de toute immixtion étrangère.

Je dois de plus rappeler que les Cabinets de Vienne et de Berlin n'ont pas de mandat précis pour négocier au nom de la Confédération Germanique, et qu'ils ne sont donc pas à même d'accepter un changement quelconque à l'état légal de la question sans l'assentiment de la Confédération.

Les quatre points posés par Lord Russell comme base d'un arrangement ne concordent pas entièrement avec les stipulations de 1851 et 1852, desquelles la Contédération fait dériver ses demandes, et il n'appartient pas aux Gouvernements d'Autriche et de Prusse d'accepter, en vertu de leur propre décision, au lieu de l'exécution exacte de ces stipulations, une proposition qui n'est pas parfaitement

identique à ces stipulations.

Les deux Gouvernements doivent se borner à exprimer leur opinion individuelle sur la question de savoir s'ils jugent cette base, ainsi modifiée, admissible pour la Confédération, et s'ils peuvent plaider en sa faveur auprès de leurs confédérés Allemandes. Cela posé, je n'hésite pas à déclarer que d'après le sentiment du Cabinet Impérial les droits et les intérêts qu'il a le devoir de défendre dans l'affaire en question pourraient être sauvegardés par la mise à exécution franche et complète des quatre points posés par le Cabinet de Londres tout aussi efficacement que par l'exécution des stipulations de 1851 et 1852. Le Gouvernement Impérial, dans son amour de la paix, ne peut surement qu'accompagner de ses me:lleurs vœux une proposition d'accommodement sur laquelle il porte ce jugement, et qui a pour clle l'autorité de l'Angleterre. Dans l'intérêt du succès désiré, le Gouvernement Impérial croit d'ailleurs ne pas pouvoir assez recommander que le même esprit d'équité envers les différentes parties de la Monarchie Danoise qui se montre incontestablement dans les quatre points susmentionnés, préside aussi au traitement des questions qui demanderont à être réglées, soit en dehors de ces qua're points sommaires, soit pour assurer leur mise à exécution. Lord Russell a ind qué lui-même une des plus importantes de ces questions, en recommandant dans le texte de sa dépêche l'institution d'un Conseil d'Etat commun.

Je conclus en répétant que les explications qui précèdent ne peuvent rien enlever à la force et à la validité des engagements qui subsistent entre la Confédération Germanique et le Dauemark, et que bien entendu nous réservons non seulement à la Confédération, mais aussi à nous-mêmes, le droit d'en revenir uniquement à ces engagements si l'influence conciliante de l'Angleterre venait à ne pas atteindre son but par suite d'un manque de bonne volonté de la part de la Cour de Copenhague.

Vous voudrez bien, M. le Comte, vous exprimer envers le Principal Secrétaire d'Etat dans le sens de ces observations, et vous pourrez aussi placer à la disposition de son Excellence une copie de la présente dépêche.

M. le Comte, Vienna, October 29, 1862.

MR. JULIAN FANE has communicated to me the despatch, of which a copy is inclosed, addressed to him by the Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, by command of Her Majesty the Queen, with a view to facilitate a final

arrangement of the difficulty which subsists between Germany and Denmark.

As you will see by this despatch, Lord Russell, as an introduction to his proposals, designates, in the first place, the points on which, in his opinion, the discussions which have hitherto taken place have produced an indisputable result. He considers it as quite established—

1. That in Holstein and Lauenburg no law

 That in Holstein and Lauenburg no law can be decreed and no tax levied without the con-

sent of the States of those Duchies.

2. That the general Constitution of the Kingdom of the 2nd October, 1855, which has been already formally suspended as regards Holstein and Lauenburg, must, of necessity, be and remain without effect as regards Schleswig.

3. That the Kingdom of Denmark Proper has the right to frame its laws and impose its taxes, independently of the assent of the Duchies.

Taking these Articles as a point of departure, Lord Russell proceeds to trace the fundamental outlines of a plan by which the question of the position of Schleswig, as well as the complicated problem of the establishment of a common Constitution for all the Danish Monarchy, may be solved to the satisfaction of both parties.

These fundamental outlines are comprised by the Secretary of State in the four following

points:-

 Holstein and Lauenburg to have all that the German Confederation ask for them.

2. Schleswig to have the power of self-government, and not to be represented in the Rigsraad.

3. A normal Budget to be agreed upon by Denmark, Holstein, Lauenburg, and Schleswig.

4. Any extraordinary expenses to be submitted to the Rigsmand, and to the separate Diets of Holstein, Lauenburg, and Schleswig.

After having attentively examined this important communication, and having come to an agreement with the Court of Prussia, to whom the Cabinet of London has addressed the same proposals. I reply by the following observations to the wish expressed by Lord Russell to be made acquainted with our views of his plan of arrangement.

After a long and fruitless discussion between the German Powers and the Cabinet of Copenhagen, the Imperial Government has acquired the conviction that to find the key of a final solution of the complications hitherto existing, it is above all necessary to persuade Denmark of the impossibility of preserving as a bond of union for the other portions only of the Monarchy, the general Constitution of 1855, which was established contrary to the Conventions of 1851 and 1852, and which has already been abolished for Holstein and Lauenburg. This was the principal point of our Memorandum of last August.

We feel, therefore, especial satisfaction at sceing Great Britain share this opinion; and in taking note of it I do not hesitate to express the conviction that the British Government will have the merit of having greatly contributed to the settlement of a difference threatening to the peace of Europe, if it brings the Danish Government, which has so many motives for attaching value to the counsels of England, finally to renounce for Schleswig also the Constitution of 1855.

It is no less satisfactory to us that Lord Russell completely recognises the right of the Germanic Confederation to settle in the last resort, by its decisions, the questions concerning Holstein and Lauenburg which are pending at Frankfort.

We, on our side, are far from contesting that the Kingdom of Denmark Proper should not use its special rights in the matter of legislation and of taxes without being bound by the consent of the

Representative Bodies of the Duchies.

We congratulate ourselves, therefore, at finding that we are entirely in accord with the British Government as to the points which it considers to be removed from all further discussion. We hasten to add that, for our part, we are equally disposed to see in the positive proposals which form the second part of Lord Russell's despatch, a proper and equitable basis for the final solution of the Dano-Germanic question.

To cover the responsibility of the Imperial Government, I ought, however, to observe that in this affair the intercession of a third Power should be limited by the right of the Germanic Confederation, as recognized by Lord Russell himself, to act, in matters concerning the internal affairs of Germany, in conformity with the laws of the Confederation, independently of all foreign interference.

I should further recall to mind that the Cabinets of Vienna and Berlin have not precisely a commission to negotiate in the name of the Germanic Confederation, and are not, therefore, in a position to accept a change of any kind in the legal state of the question without the consent of the Confederation.

The four points laid down by Lord Russell as the basis of an arrangement do not entirely agree with the stipulations of 1851 and 1852, from which the Germanic Confederation derives its demands, and the Governments of Austria and Prussia have not the right of accepting, in virtue of their own decision, a proposition which is not perfectly identical with these stipulations, in place of their exact execution.

The two Governments must confine themselves to an expression of their individual opinion on the question whether this basis, thus modified, should be considered as admissible by the Confederation, and whether they can plead in its favour with their German confederates. This point established, I do not hesitate to declare that, according to the view of the Imperial Cabinet, the rights and interests which it is called upon to defend in the affair in question might be secured by the frank and complete execution of the four points laid down by the Cabinet of London, quite as effectually as by the execution of the stipulations of 1851 and 1852. The Imperial Government, in its love of peace, can assuredly not fail to give its best wishes to a proposal of settlement of which it entertains such an opinion, and which has on its side the authority of England. In the interest of the success which it desires, the Imperial Government thinks, moreover, that it cannot sufficiently recommend that the same spirit of equity towards the various portions of the Danish Monarchy which is incontestably shown in the four points above mentioned, should also guide the treatment of the questions which will require to be settled, either in addition to these four summary points, or to secure their execution. Lord Russell has himself pointed out one of the most important of these questions when recommending in the text of his despatch the establishment of a common Coun-

I conclude by repeating that the preceding explanations can take nothing from the force and validity of the engagements subsisting between the Germanic Confederation and Denmark; and that, of course, we reserve not only to the Confederation, but to ourselves also, the right of reverting entirely to those engagements if the conciliatory influence of England should not attain its object from want of good-will on the part of the Court of Copenhagen.

You will be good enough, M. le Comte, to speak to a constant dependence on Germany, and if by to the Principal Secretary of State in the sense of this sacrifice our relations with the Confederation

these observations; and you may also place at the disposal of his Excellency a copy of this despatch.

Earl Russell to Mr. Paget.

Sir, Foreign Office, November 20, 1862.

SINCE my conversation with M. de Bille related in my despatch of the 11th ultimo, that Minister has placed in my hands the copy of a despatch addressed to him by M. Hall of the date of the 15th ultimo.

I am sorry to see, by that despatch (of which I inclose a copy), that the Danish Government show a strong repugnance to the adoption of the counsels given them by Her Majesty's Government. I am persuaded that the Danish Government have not sufficiently reflected on the evils of their present position, and have exaggerated to themselves the consequences which they think would follow their consent to the plan of arrangement sketched out by Her Majesty's Government. Her Majesty's Government, therefore, are desirous, with a view to the maintenance of the Danish Monarchy, and not to its dismemberment or its subversion, to point out more fully the obligations of the King of Denmark and the means of fulfilling them.

It will not be denied that the King of Denmark holds the Duchy of Holstein as Duke of Holstein, and Lauenburg as Duke of Lauenburg, and that in both capacities he is a member of the German Confederation, bound by its laws, and amenable to the authorities constituted by the Federal Act.

Neither can it be denied that, as Duke of Schleswig, the King of Denmark is bound to Austria and Prussia, and to the German Confederation collectively, as sovereign States of Europe, by certain promises made in 1851, and which (as M. Hall reminds me) I have always stated His Danish Majesty is bound in honour to fulfil.

Such being the position and such the obligations of the King of Denmark, I feel sure that M. Hall will agree with me when I say that no argument ab inconvenienti can be allowed to prevail against these positive stipulations and honourable engagements. It will not be enough to say that, by the arrangement which has been proposed, the march of the Danish Government will be retarded; and that it is difficult to obtain the sanction of Holstein to measures which the Danish Ministers think expedient: considerations of this kind must yield to the demands of justice, and to the good faith due from a Prince towards those with whom he has contracted engagements.

Taking, then, these obligations in this order, I must remind M. Hall that Her Majesty's Government have always declined to give an opinion upon matters belonging to the competence of the German Confederation. Speaking very generally, Her Majesty's Government see nothing unreasonable in a demand that no taxes should be imposed, and no laws should be binding, on Holstein which have not obtained the consent of the people of that Duchy, represented in the States thereof.

But, on the other hand, when M. Hall declares that the Danish Government are ready to accede to the demands of the Diet in regard to Holstein, "whatever dangers to the integrity of the Monarchy that concession may involve, if this eventual position of Holstein can be defined in such a manner that the rest of the Monarchy should not be reduced to a constant dependence on Germany, and if by this sacrifice our relations with the Confederation

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might be re-established on a permanent basis,', the principle thus stated has the cordial assent and

approbation of Her Majesty's Government.

Before I go further, I must ask you to state to M. Hall that it is with great satisfaction I find that, as regards Holstein and Lauenburg, no difference of principle will prevent the adoption of the views set forth in my despatch of the 24th of September. The differences, if any, will rather be on questions of detail.

We come, next, to the question of Schleswig, the real obstacle to a final and solid arrange-

ment.

Upon this subject, also, there is little difference between Her Majesty's Government and the Government of Denmark as to general principles. M. Hall does not disavow the two principal Articles of the Declarations made by the King of Denmark, by which, in substance, he assured his people of the Duchy of Schleswig that that Duchy should not be incorporated with Denmark, and that his Schleswig subjects of German origin should be placed on an equality with those of Danish origin. M. Hall, I say, does not deny either the existence or the validity of these promises, but he maintains that they have been fulfilled

M. Hall's words are:—"The intentions with respect to this Duchy (namely, Schleswig), which the King had spontaneously expressed at the time, the engagement of honour, to use the term employed by Lord Russell, which the King had taken, were immediately and conscientiously fulfilled by him."

The question is thus converted into one of fact. The Cabinet of Berlin and the Germans generally have maintained that these engagements have not been fulfilled.

Some time ago a British Agent, acquainted with the country and with the language, was sent into Schleswig to ascertain on which side the truth lay.

His report, which was very detailed, and appeared very trustworthy, was to the effect that the inhabitants of Schleswig did not wish to change masters, that they were loyal to the Crown of Denmark, but that in many places the German inhabitants complained that they were obliged to attend church service in Danish, to send their children to schools where the teaching is in Danish, and that before their children could receive the rite of confirmation they are obliged to undergo an examination in the Danish language.

When I reported these complaints, the Danish Government replied that the parents might employ private tutors, and that their children might receive the rite of confirmation in German, although the examination must be in Danish. These replies appeared to Her Majesty's Govern-

ment to be insufficient and illusory.

Among other instances, I reported, from information I had received, that the inhabitants of Schleswig were not allowed to sign more than three names to one petition; and that the liberty of the press, which exists to the fullest extent in Denmark, is not allowed in Schleswig. When these restrictions were mentioned to the Danish Minister in London, he did not deny the truth of these allegations, but justified them by urging the necessity of counteracting German aggressive agitation.

It has been my duty repeatedly to advise the Danish Government to remedy the grievances of Schleswig, to fulfil completely all the promises of the King on this matter, and thus to take away all pretext for German intervention.

In these representations Her Majesty's Government have acted in concert with the Governments of France and Russia; but these three powerful

and friendly Governments have seen their advice neglected, and the oppressions and inequalities complained of but little abated. It has become necessary, therefore, to consider and to select some other course.

Such being the case, there are various courses

to pursue:-

1. To allow the present state of uneasiness and danger to continue till it ends in some violent explosion.

2. To adopt a common Constitution, in which the German element would have more weight than

mere numbers would give it.

3. To divide Schleswig into two parts, of which one to be German, and closely connected with Holstein; and the other to be Danish, and to be incorporated with Denmark.

4. To adopt a plan framed upon the basis which

I have suggested.

The last of these courses appears to Her Majesty's Government the most favourable to the integrity and independence of Denmark, and, therefore, most in accordance with the Treaty of London.

M. Hall does Her Majesty's Government justice when he says that he does not believe I intend to renounce, or put myself in contradiction with, the sentiments of sympathy and sincere interest which

I have always expressed for Denmark.

Her Majesty's Government, however, are bound to weigh the position of Denmark, uninfluenced by those passions which in the course of a long controversy may have gained an ascendancy among all parties in the controversy. Nor does Her Majesty's Government stand alone in its view of these matters, for Russia partakes the views of Great Britain, and France thinks them deserving of the gravest consideration. Her Majesty's Government can only, therefore, express a hope that the voice of impartial friends may be listened to, even amidst the storms of controversy; and that this long and bitter dispute may at last be terminated in such a manner as may be consistent with the honour and conducive to the interests of all parties concerned.

Her Majesty's Government trust that the cessation of this long strife may increase the stability and strengthen the independence of Denmark.

I request you to read and give a copy of this despatch to M. Hall.

OPIES of Correspondence with Her Majesty's Minister and Consuls in China.

(Extract.)

My LORD, Peking,

Peking, September 8, 1862.

I have the honour to enclose a circular to Her Majesty's Consuls in China, and a letter to Sir James Hope, the Admiral on the station.

The circular contains instructions drawn up with a view to prevent the Consuls from calling in the aid of Her Majesty's naval forces, in any case in which the lives and property of Her Majesty's subjects are not directly endangered. All other cases of breach of treaty are to be referred to the Minister at Peking.

Though, therefore, there may be cases in which it may be necessary for the Minister to call on the Admiral to act, he ought only to adopt this course in the last extremity, after having expostulated in vain, and after full warning of the steps he is about

to take.

I have received, by this mail, a despatch from Mr. Consul Gingell, informing me that the land question at Hankow, is being satisfactorily arranged.

To the Right Honourable Earl Russell, &c. &c. &c.

SIR.

Peking, September 2, 1862.

WITH respect to the mode of dealing with cases in which the Treaty rights of Her Majesty's subjects are violated, I have to inform you that Har Majesty's Government has issued instructions that in no case whatever is force to be resorted to unless the security of British life or property is threatened.

In cases where there exists no such risk, you will represent firmly but temperately to the local authority that a right under Treaty has been violated, and you will demand redress.

When you have exhausted your efforts in vain, you will send me a detailed statement of the case, accompanied by the Chinese text of your correspondence with the local authorities. It is of importance that the case should be so complete as to leave no loophole to the Foreign Board at Peking for requiring farther information from the local authority.

It will be well to communicate officially to the Chinese authority that you are about to bring the case under my notice, should he wish to make any representation to his Government on the case.

I must warn you against the assumption that because a violation of right has been committed, you are justified in obtaining redress for it by force. The Consul is not entitled to call in the aid of Her Majesty's naval forces except in the cases above alluded to. Illegal exactions, to levy which sailing craft are sometimes detained, which detention has been frequently removed by calling in the aid of Her Majesty's naval forces, can always be paid under protest, and the necessity of violent proceedings be thus avoided.

The desirable object to be attained is that of forcing the local officials to observe the Treaty, and protect Her Majesty's subjects in the exercise of their privileges, through the pressure brought to bear upon them by the Peking Government, and thus to escape from the false position in which we have hitherto been placed, of coercing the local authorities and people, and thus doing the work of the Imperial Government. The Government must be made to feel that the responsibility of the acts of its officers falls upon it. To initiate of the acts of its officers falls upon it. this new system of relations is a task which can only be effected gradually and patiently, but the attempt must be steadily and perseveringly made, in order that the Chinese Government may be forced to teach its people that treaties are recognised by it as the laws which are to regulate the

To Her Majesty's Consuls in China.

SIR, Peking, September 6, 1862. Ningpo have established a regular Custom House, and published a Customs' Tariff; and I am to of a circular which I have addressed to Her instruct you, if that is the case, to send to this

Majesty's Consuls in China, pursuant to instructions I have received from Her Majesty's Government.

The principle laid down for their guidance is, that redress for illegal acts is not to be sought for by force by the Consul, unless the lives and property of Her Majesty's subjects, at the ports, are endangered by violence. When illegal exactions are levied, they are to be paid under protest, and in such cases, as well as in the numerous instances of evasion and delay, practised by the provincial authorities, the particulars are to be reported to me; and I shall endeavour, before proceeding further, to obtain satisfaction in a regular manner,

through the Imperial Government.

It is very desirable that the Chinese Government should be induced to force its officers to act up to the spirit of the treaty with Great Britain, so as to relieve the Naval Commander-in-Chief from the necessity of constantly stationing vessels of war up the unhealthy rivers in China; and I think there is more likelihood of obtaining this result, and of foreigners acting in a considerate and courteous manner, if they find that the Consul is not empowered to support them by an appeal to Her Majesty's naval forces, unless in exceptional cases. In the existing state of China, it may sometimes be necessary to bring a perverse provincial authority to reason by a menacing demonstration, but this step should not be taken until I have had the opportunity of trying the effect of re-monstrances at Peking. If they fail, I shall apply to the Admiral, who will be able to judge on a full statement of the circumstances, how far the presence of a superior officer, or of a more imposing force, may be required to bring the matter in question to a satisfactory conclusion. In short, except in the case of immediate danger to life and property, I do not think that proceedings of the nature of reprisals, or acts of war, should be taken without previous reference to the Minister.

I HAVE had the honour to receive your despatch of the 16th June last, in which you call my attention to a statement which has been made in England, that the Taepings, whilst in the possession of Ningpo, had established a regular Custom House, and published a Customs' Tariff, and instructing me, by direction of Earl Russell, should that be the case, to send to the Foreign Office a copy of such tariff, and to report generally as to the manner in which the Custom House was carried on, the amount of trade, and the mode in which the tariff was enforced.

I apprehend that the question relates solely to a foreign Custom House, and to a foreign tariff, in which case, I have the honour to inform you in reply. that no foreign Custom House was ever established by the Taepings at this port, no foreign Customs' Tariff was ever promulgated by them, and that, in short, Ningpo was a free port for foreign ships and cargoes from the 9th day of December, 1861 (when the city was captured by the Taepings), until the return of the Foreign Customs' Inspectorate, shortly after the expulsion of the rebels from their occupation of this town.

Had the Tacpings shown the least inclination to establish a regular foreign Custom House, it would of course have been my duty to have reported to you, for Earl Russell's information, these first symptoms of a desire to lay the foundations of commercial institutions at this port, for, next to our personal safety here. during the rebel rule, the question of a Custom House was the most prominent consideration in my mind at the time, and one to which I gave much serious thought. As temporary masters of this port, and surrounding districts, I had fully decided on not disputing, in any manner, the right of the Taepings to levy duties on foreign trade; all I had proposed effecting, when the proper time came, being to watch narrowly and vigilantly that our merchants were not placed in a worse position with the rebels than they previously stood under the Imperial tariff; but that time never came, and consequently there was no call for the exercise of any vigilance on my part, the matter never having assumed any shape whatever, or any serious attempt having been made by the Taepings to organise anything so regular as a foreign Custom House.

I may, however, here mention that they did open a kind of Chinese office on the east side of the river, opposite to our "Concession," for the purpose of levying taxes on the few native boats, with trifling passengers and goods, which necessity compelled to approach that quarter of Ningpo; but from what I personally saw and witnessed, the arrangements pertaining to this office were made in the usual loose and hand-to-mouth manner which generally characterises Taeping institutions. It seemed to me that want and fancy settled and dictated terms more than the application of any fiscal regulations upon the Chinese who fell within the grasp of the rebels at that station. A peculiar feature connected with this pseudo customs' establishment was the fact that, after the day's labour was supposed to have been accomplished, the heads of the department, with their cash and daily profits in a bag, retreated with great precipitation

into the city, hastily closing the gates after them, as they did not consider their persons safe outside the walls during the night. In the morning they reappeared at their office, where, having little or nothing to do, they were seen beguining the long hours by gambling, the filthiest debauchery, and drinking, the last pushed to extreme intoxication. Two or three visits that I personally paid to this establishment were as much as I could bear, but they were more than sufficient to edify me as to the internal economy of the whole of the arrangements, to say nothing of the shamelessly obscene character of the worthies who presided over it. This was about the best and only attempt at administrative initiative adopted by the Taepings during their sojourn in Ningpo.

I have reasons for knowing that similar loose and irregular offices, or barriers, are set up in districts held by the Taepings in the interior of the country, at which native and other boats are stopped, and a duty of some sort levied on them and their contents. But, generally speaking (I am now stating facts, and not expressing opinions), a friendly and brotherly compromise is effected between the rebels and foreigners, one or two boxes of German percussion caps, for instance, tending to facilitate negotiations with wonderful rapidity. Foreign guns and muskets, pistols and powder, with ammunition of every description, are likewise in great demand by the Taepings; and these, it is painfully notorious, they contrived to obtain from disreputable foreigners here and at Shanghae (these arms, &c., being paid for by the rebels, at enormous rates, with money, silk, and other valuable produce, forcibly wrenched and plundered from the murdered and oppressed inhabitants of the interior), notwithstanding all the strenuous efforts of Sir James Hope and the British authorities in these parts to check and put a stop to this nefarious and disgraceful

It is not to be wondered at, therefore, that those foreign merchants in China, who are still engaged in these lucrative but shameful dealings with the rebels, should lament over the lesson given, in May last, to the Taepings at Ningpo, and that the agents or constituents of these merchants, out of China, should join in those lamentations, and view with particular distaste any coercive action taken against their profitable rebel clients. These foreign traders sagaciously conclude that it is not every year that a Taeping horde will be permitted to occupy one of our treaty ports, and consequently, that the casy terms and exceptionally gainful days of Ningpo, under rebel rule (without Imperial authorities, custom-house, or tariff) are not likely to return and flourish once more very quickly. Hence we have seen, as was indeed expected, a certain amount of obloquy cast by parties in China (very few in number, I am proud to add) upon the noble and humane proceedings of Sir James Hope and other public functionaries; such obloquy originating, of course, in the fact of the pockets of those merchants having suffered by our action and policy at this port towards the rebels, as well as by the long range at which those hordes are compelled to remain outside of Shaughae. It is, we all know and admit, in human nature to resent the loss of large profits; and for my part I am able, to a certain extent, even in this case, to enter into the disappointed feelings of those whose gains and perquisites have been considerably lessened by unavoidable acts of political interference.

But, unfortunately, those merchants are by no means alone in the field of the discontented. There are a few others, I grieve to add, of a far different stamp and character, and of vastly dis-

similar pursuits, who also entertain, in China, an incredible bias towards Taepingdom and its tenets. And because that secret leaning is suppressed and unavowed, let it not be supposed that it does not fully exist in their inmost bearts, patiently waiting for its open avowal and more patent vitality, when the times and circumstances may seem less generally averse to the Taepings and their cause. Let us earnestly hope, for the honour of Christianity, that those times and circumstances may never be seen. In truth, I must confess that what my mind cannot embrace, what my comprehension is still unable to grasp, is this morbid sympathy, on religious grounds, alleged to be entertained, by the parties in question, for those Taeping miscreants. I find it so difficult a task to appreciate or even to understand that sympathy, that I am almost forced sometimes to disbelieve in its real existence, mentally placing its incentive on quite a different basis; for instance, upon a pedestal more terrestrial than spiritual in its nature. Be that as it may, however, I feel fully convinced that if ever the Taeping chiefs are seriously informed of this compassionate and Christian regard for their principles, it will not fail to afford them the liveliest entertainment.

My Lord,

I HAVE had the honour to receive your Lordship's despatch, dated the 26th June last, on the subject of a letter published in the "Times of India," of May 13, 1862.

The description quoted by the correspondent of the "Times of India" is, as far as I can ascertain, a fabrication, and must have been the production of a person whose grossness and mendacity even a

Chinese might be ashamed of.

The only notable execution of prisoners that has happened at Shanghae since the commencement of the proceedings against the Taepings, took place in February last of this year, and the description of the scene, given by an eye-witness in a letter to the editor of the local paper, was considered so exaggerated that it was at once contradicted by another looker-on, writing to the same journal,

The first writer defended the truth of his statements in a rejoinder, but the general feeling of the community at the time was that the milder view was the correct one, and that the execution was not accompanied by any horrors not usual on such occasions in this country. possible that this very scene was the one the cor-respondent of the "Times of Iudia" attempted to describe.

From my own knowledge of the Chinese, derived from an acquaintance of two-and-twenty years, I should say that as a race they are cruel and callous, where they have no interest in the victim save that of sport, revenge, or neglect. But I have never observed that the Government officials are more inhuman or barbarous than the rest of their kind, and I am sure that no one but a prejudiced or a casual observer could declare that the Imperialists are more cruel than the Taepings.

In the particular instance of prisoners taken in the late proceedings in this neighbourhood I can honestly aver that the Imperialists have, if anything, relaxed their usual severity in dealing with rebels and pirates. I have saved many captives handed over to me by simply requesting that they might not be beheaded, and I have passed over numbers of women and children found amongst the rebels by our forces to a benevolent Chinese institution licensed by Government, whose committee have undertaken to support and clothe the unfortunates till their friends could be found. I certainly have never heard of an instance in which women and children have been beheaded and treated cruelly, nor do I think such a thing probable, as the Chinese are not in the habit of punishing women, save when they are the proved relatives or accomplices of accused persons, and it is well known that the Taepings have only pressed or captive women amongst them. The Chinese, moreover, in all cases, even when the prisoners are captives of war, subject them to an examination in which wonderful care and trouble are taken to sift out the truth, and although this principle is often lost sight of, at the instance of a bribe or other powerful interest, yet it is perhaps more strictly adhered to in the case of trials of rebels, robbers, and traitors than in any other, as they are of that important class of criminals which inferior Mandarins have always to give a detailed account of to their superiors.

I HAVE been honoured by Earl Russell's despatch of the 26th June last, inclosing an account, by an eye-witness, of atrocities perpetrated on Taeping prisoners by the Imperialists at Shanghae; and instructing me to report whether any similar cruelties have been committed by the Chinese, within the district of my Consulate.

The statement from the "Overland Times of India" is the first intimation I have received of these atrocities. It seems to me very strange that, living so near Shanghae, I should not, before now, have heard of them, considering that at the period of their alleged occurrence, there were two newspapers published in Shanghae. But, perhaps, it is even more strange that these barbarities were allowed to be perpetrated (so it is stated) in the presence of English and French officers (the eyewitness included), without the slightest effort having apparently been made by the lookers-on to check and otherwise put a summary stop to this butchery. Mr. Consul Medhurst will, however, be able to supply all necessary details as to the correctness and authenticity of the statement; and further be in a position to lay before his Lordship the fullest particulars bearing upon the subject.

As regards Ningpo and its districts, my despatches on late events will have conveyed to you all needful information upon this important point; I am bound to admit that Chinhai, Ningpo, and Yuyaou, have been recaptured, successively, under circumstances of great humanity, modera-tion, and soberness. No efforts have been spared by both Captain Dew and myself, to impress on the local authorities, in the strongest language possible, and at opportune moments, our firm determination not to allow the shedding of blood, or to countenance any of those acts of Asiatic revenge and gratified cruelty which have so often disgraced the Imperial cause. And as we spoke, so we acted. There were very few executions, and no torture of any kind whatever. In the half dozen cases of decapitations, real old rebels were the sufferers, traitors to their sovereign and country, and most wicked and dangerous criminals. I must add, for the credit of our local authorities. that they understood and fully appreciated our wishes and demands in this respect—and that they readily complied with them,—thereby rendering it needless that we should take the steps necessary to have them enforced.
