To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the city and borough of Chester, and county of the same city, take the opportunity of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales attaining his majority respectfully to tender to your Majesty our most loyal congratulations upon this auspicious event.

We beg to express our hope that the Prince ever mindful of those constitutional principles which bind this great Empire to your Majesty's person, crown, and dignity, may sincerely cherish those views of enlightened freedom which have so remarkably distinguished your Majesty's reign ; and also that he may be of material support and aid to your Majesty in the arduous duty of governing these realms.

If, by the decree of Divine Providence, he shall hereafter be called to reign over us, it is our fervent prayer that he may follow your Majesty's example as the most certain mode to assure himself of the loyalty and affection of the people.

IT is hereby notified that Earl Russell, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Consul at Vera Cruz, information that the Admiral in command of the Naval Forces of His Majesty the Emperor of the French, duly notified on the 8th September last to Captain Tatham, of Her Majesty's ship Phaeton, that the port of Tampico would forthwith be open to all neutral vessels, provided they had no contraband of war on board, or passengers endeavouring to land for hostile purposes.

The aforesaid letter of Admiral Jurien is as follows :

MONSIEUR, LE COMMANDANT,

EN reponse à la lettre que vous m'avez fait l'honneur de m'adresser le 6 Septembre, relativement aux effets du blocus établi par la Marine Française devant le port de Tampico, j'ai l'honneur de vous informer, que je suis en effet autorisé, sous ma responsabilité, à temperer autant que possible les rigueurs de ce blocus, dont l'objet principal est d'empêcher l'introduction des objets de contrabande de guerre.

En consequence, dès que je pourrai communiquer avec Mons. le Commandant du Berthollet, je modifierai dans ce sens les instructions qui lui ont été données.

Il ne sera donc apporté jusqu'à nouvel ordre aucun obstacle à l'entrée des bâtimens neutres dans le port de Tampico, lorsqu'il aura été con-

staté que ces bâtimens ne portent ni objets de contrabande de guerre, ni passagers cherchant à débarquer dans un but hostile sur le sol Mexicain.

MONSIEUR LE COMMANDANT,

IN answer to the letter which you did me the honour to address to me on the 6th of September, relative to the effect of the blockade established by the French navy at the port of Tampico, I have the honour to inform you, that I am, in fact, authorised to mitigate on my own responsibility the rigour of the blockade, the principal object of which is to prevent the introduction of articles of contraband of war.

Consequently, as soon as I am able to communicate with M. le Commandant du Buthollet, I shall modify in this sense the instructions which have been given him.

Until further notice therefore, no obstacle will be placed in the way of neutral vessels entering the port of Tampico, when it has been shown that these vessels carry neither articles contraband of war, nor passengers attempting to disembark on Mexican soil, for hostile purposes.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Hamburg, enclosing a copy of a law recently passed by the Senate of Bremen, abolishing, from and after the 1st January next, the custom and excise duties now levied in that territory upon the import and export of merchandize, and levying instead thereof a transfer duty of $\frac{5}{100}$ per cent. ad valorem on all original sales effected within the Bremen territory in cases in which the vendor is the subject of that State; and further providing that in cases of resale $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. only shall be charged.

Another law, passed by the Senate of Bremen, a copy of which has also been received by the Board of Trade, provides that from and after the 1st January next, all parcels of goods exceeding 10 dollars in value, imported into, exported from, or conveyed in transit through the State of Bremen shall be declared, for statistical purposes, and that a stamp duty shall be levied upon such goods, at the rate of 1 grot per 100 dollars value. Goods declared in direct transit through the Bremen territory without the intervention of an inhabitant of Bremen, will be exempt from the above duty.
