THE following Addreffes have been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Deputy-Recorder, Aldermen, Bayliffs, and Burgesses of the Corporation of New Windsor.

**W**E Your Majesties most Obedient Loyal Subjects, being highly sensible of God's great Goodness and Mercy to us, in placing Your Majesty upon the Throne of Your Royal Progenitors; making Your Subjects happy under the Government of so Great and Prudent a King; do render our humble and hearty Thanks to God Almighty for the same, and to You (Great SIR,) for Your Gracious Declaration of Indulgence; by which You have made all Your Subjects easie in the free Exercise of their Religion, as well as secure in the Enjoyment of their Properties.

And we do assure Your Majesty, that we are, and ever will be, ready to serve Your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes, as becomes Loyal Subjects, and True Sons of the Church of England.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Grand Jury for the County Palatin of Durham, at the Assizes held there the One and twentieth day of July, 1687.

May it please Your Majesty,

**W**E Your Majesties most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects, being highly sensible of Your Majesties Princely Care in preserving our Rights, Properties, and Liberties, as appears in Your Majesties late Royal Declaration; do think our selves obliged upon this opportunity, to return our most humble Thanks to Your Majesty: And withal, to assure Your Majesty, that we shall always endeavour to maintain Your Crown and Dignity; and shall for ever pray for the Preservation of Your Majesty, and the continuance of Your Reign, in Health, Wealth, Peace, and Prosperity.

**Batavia, Decemb. 12.** The Old King of Bantam was removed about a month since from the Custody he was under at the Town of Bantam; for there having been several disturbances raised by the endeavours of some to set him at Liberty, though to the disadvantage of those concerned in it: And the Young King therefore fearing that the many provocations he meets with upon this account, may tempt him to abate off and lessen the respect he owes to his Father; it has been thought advisable, that the Old King should be carried to Batavia, who was accordingly conducted hither with a formal Solemnity, where he is now lodged in the Castle with his Wives and some Slaves.

**Vienna, August 10.** We have no fresher Advices from the Army than the 20th of the last month;

from whence it is concluded, that the Duke of Lorraine is forming a design which is to be kept secret till its execution. An Express arrived this morning sent from Prince Lewis of Baden, reports, That the Turkish Army is all on this side of the Drave; and encamped as regularly as if they had been instructed by the ablest Masters of Europe; so that there was no great prospect of attacking them in their Retrenchments; though before he was come a League from the Army, he heard great and continued Shooting, which he knew no reason for, unless there should be some Engagement. It is believed, that General Veterani may be arrived before Vienna with the Regiments of Piccolomini, St. Croix, Hammer, Herbeville, and Derwin; and that something may be attempted on that side. The Duke of Mantua was at Buda the 31st past, waiting the return of a Courier that he had sent to the Duke of Lorraine before he set forward for the Army. At Hamburg, Aug. 2. The King of Denmark sent a Letter last week to this Senate, Citing the whole Body, and six of them by Name, to appear before his Majesty's Court of Chancery at Glückstadt, there to answer to what should be objected against them: Copies of the said Letter have been sent to the Elector of Brandenburg and the House of Lunenburg. We hear, that the Sieur Hope, Envoy from the States of the United Provinces, to the Elector of Brandenburg in his Passage to that Court, had been successful in clearing up some points that might otherwise have occasioned a misunderstanding between the the House of Lunenburg and the said Elector.

**Amsterdam, August 18.** We have this account of the Cargo of 7 of the East-India Ships lately returned, whose Names are the Helder; the Arins of Alcoraer, Princeland, and Langewijk; all for the Chamber of Amsterdam; the Schoonwaer for the Chamber of Zealand; the Voorschotten for the Chamber of Delft; and the Cronenburg for the Chamber of Rotterdam; from Bergale, the Coast of Cormondel, and Ceylon; which parted thence in December, 1686, and January, 1687; laden with 1500466 pounds of Black-pepper, 1382607 l. of Salt Peter, 210100 l. of Siam's Sapan-wood, 213839 l. of Calcutour's-wood, 198080 l. of Cinamon, 13976 l. of preserved Ginger, 60020 l. of Tin, 112595 l. of raw Bengal Silk, 24½ l. of Silk of Huissies, 151½ l. of stitching and sowing Silk, 19726 l. of Florette Yarn, 12795 of Cotton-Yarn, 6003 l. of Sealing-Wax, 102 l. of Lacker, 22800 l. of Cardamums, 112730 l. of Cauris of Bouffies, 112760 l. of Indigo of several sorts, 817 Caps of Oyl of Camphire, 24000 pieces of Taffeta's; 234 pieces of Commerbands with Gold Flowers, 42 pieces of Cuffen Stuffs, 2000 pieces of Lhymania's; 4000 pieces of Golga's, 497 pieces of Souffies, 1599 pieces of Taffeta's of Foula, 1632 pieces of Silk Stuffs of divers sorts, 331 pieces of Gold, Silver, and Silk Stuffs, 500 pieces of Mouris of several sorts, 57160 pieces of Salampores, 12800 pieces of Parcattees, 8174 pieces of Malle-molens, 9459 pieces of Calloes of Bengall, 11862 pieces of Dourias, 4172 pieces of Humnumms, 932 pieces of Sannqes, 320 pieces of Dongarees, 1000 pieces

Paris, August 20. The Duke of Martemar having his Majesties leave to come a shoar on account of his Indisposition, hath left the Command of his Squadron (till the Arrival of the Chevalier Foxwise) with the Chevalier d'Anfreville, who hath taken a Ship of Algiers, whose Passports he had examined, and found they had expired three years since; and therefore he was to be looked upon as a Pirate, and one that sailed with pretended Commissions, Another of the King's Ships meeting with an Algerine on their own Coast, and having Commanded the Captain to produce his Passports, he returned answer, That they lay in the mouth of his Cannon, and those that had a mind to be further satisfied about them, must look for them there: Whereupon the French Ship gave him two Broad-sides, killing him about 30 of his Men; and the Algerine also had made himself ready to make him a return in the same kind, but finding himself unable to maint in a Fight, he made the best of his way homeward, and had the good luck to escape into Port, though in a torn condition: In this Action the French lost about 7 or 8 Men. The 15 Gallies that have been before *Civita Vecchia*, have since also appeared before *Naples*: There are 15 others sitting out at *Marseilles* to believe these against their return. The King has given the Government of *Foix*, void by the death of the Marquis de *Foix*, to his Son, who is Ensign to the First Company of Musquetiers. And his Majesty has likewise disposed of the vacant Benefices: The Bishop of *Montauban* is promoted to the Archbishoprick of *Ithouffe*. The old Bishop of *Nismes* having resigned his Bishoprick (accepting in lieu thereof of the Abby of *Lire* in *Normandy*) that is now divided into two, and out of it is erected the new Bishoprick of *Alez*, which is conferred upon Doctor *de Saultx* of the Colledge of *Sorbonne*. The Bishop of *Layaur* succeeds to the remaining part of *Nismes*; and his vacancy is given to the Prior of *St. Victor*, Brother to the Marquis de *Maily* that lately Married *Made-moiselle St. Hermine*. We hear, that the Chevalier d' *Humieres*, Brother to the Marechal, is lately dead at *Naples*. They write from *Rome*, that the Pope had assisted a third time at a Congregation held concerning the *Quintists*; where it was decreed, That Doctor *Molinus* should publicly recant several Propositions drawn out of his Books, his Letters, and the Confessions of some that have been apprehended for those Opinions: And it is since said, that the said Doctor has accordingly made a publick Recantation in *St. Peter's Church*.

Windsor, August 13. The Sieur *Zulestein* being sent from the Prince of Orange to make the Compliments of Condolence in his Highness's Name, upon the death of the late Duchess of *Modena*, has had his Audience of Their Majesties, as also of the

Queen Dowager, and her Royal Highness the Princess *Ann of Denmark*; being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies; by whom he was also conducted in the same manner to his Audiences of Leave.

Windsor, August 16. This day Their Majesties left this place; the King going for *Portsmouth* on His Progress, and the Queen towards the *Bath*.

London, August 15. Yesterday his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark* landed at *Harwich*, and arrived here this afternoon, from whence he went immediately for *Windsor*.
