**ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES
WITHIN THE BOROUGH OF CAMBRIDGE.**

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives unless restricted, as hereinafter mentioned, on any highway within the limits of the borough of Cambridge, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public :

I hereby do, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever propelled by steam or any other than animal power on the highways within the limits of the borough of Cambridge, at any time except between the hours of nine at night and seven in the morning.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the regulation of the duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or Inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and to make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of Letters by Post, and for the regulating the duties of Postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act passed in the 18th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Stamp duties on Newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by Post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing under their hands, bearing date the 20th day of December 1856, did order and direct, amongst other things, that all packets consisting of printed

newspapers posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the Schedule C to that Warrant annexed, might be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said Schedule C; and that all such respective packets should be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions thereafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and that the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets should be that which was mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule C. And that all packets consisting of printed papers other than newspapers posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the Schedule D, to that Warrant annexed, might be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column to the said Schedule D. And that all such respective last-mentioned packets should be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions thereafter mentioned and contained relating thereto. And that the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets should be that which was mentioned and set forth against such countries and places in the said Schedule D. And that all such respective packets so transmitted should be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage thereafter mentioned.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain other Warrant, under their hands, bearing date the 4th day of June, 1857, did order and direct amongst other things, that on every packet consisting of printed newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in Constantinople, and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom (the sea conveyance between France and Constantinople being by French packet-boat), there should be charged, taken, and paid a uniform British rate of postage of one penny. And that on every packet consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in Constantinople, and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom (the sea conveyance between France and Constantinople being by French packet boat), there should be charged, taken, and paid a uniform British rate of postage of three-pence. And that on every such packet consisting of printed newspapers, or of printed papers other than newspapers so transmitted by the post as aforesaid, from Constantinople, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, exceeding four ounces in weight, there should be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as thereafter mentioned.

And whereas it is expedient that the rates of postage now payable under the said recited Warrants on certain printed newspapers, and other printed papers, should be altered, and that certain other regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts

of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers, enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, and direct, as follows:

1. That on every packet, consisting of a printed newspaper, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in any of the islands of the Grecian Archipelago, or the several places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains post offices (the sea conveyance in the Mediterranean being by French packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of postage of twopence.

2. That on every packet consisting of printed papers, other than printed newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in any of the islands of the Grecian Archipelago, or the several places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, at which France maintains post offices (the sea conveyance in the Mediterranean being by French packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of postage of fourpence.

3. That on every packet, consisting of a printed newspaper, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in Constantinople, and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom (the sea conveyance between France and Constantinople being by French packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of postage of twopence.

4. That on every packet, consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in Constantinople and transmitted by the post from thence via France, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom (the sea conveyance between France and Constantinople being by French packet boat), there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of postage of fourpence.

5. That on every such packet, consisting of a printed newspaper, or consisting of printed papers other than printed newspapers so transmitted by the post, as in the first, second, third, and fourth clauses of this Warrant is mentioned, exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and

every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

6. For the purposes of this warrant, every printed newspaper shall be deemed and considered a packet, and shall be charged and chargeable with a separate and distinct single rate, or separate and distinct progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, as hereinbefore mentioned, notwithstanding two or more newspapers shall be inclosed and transmitted in one and the same cover, wrapper, envelope, or bundle, and form only one parcel or bundle of newspapers.

7. That every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this warrant shall be so transmitted in conformity with and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions contained in and established by the said hereinbefore recited warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date respectively the 20th day of December, 1856, and the 4th day of June, 1857, relating to the transmission by the post of the packets of printed newspapers and other printed papers therein respectively mentioned and authorised to be transmitted, so far as the same shall or may be applicable to packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this warrant, save and except that packets consisting of printed papers other than printed newspapers transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this warrant, may have any matter or thing printed on the covers thereof.

8. That the rates of postage chargeable on printed newspapers, or other printed papers, transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.

9. That the respective packets transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage, respectively, contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage, upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

10. That the term "a printed newspaper," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning as the term "printed newspapers," used in the said Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date, respectively, the 20th day of December, 1856, and the 4th day of June, 1857, and that the term "printed papers," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to have the like meaning as the term "printed papers" used in the said Warrant, of the said Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date, respectively, the 20th day of December, 1856, and the 4th day of June, 1857, so far as the same shall or may be applicable to packets transmitted from the United Kingdom to any of the islands of the Grecian Archipelago or the several places in Turkey, Syria, or Egypt at which France maintains post offices, and from Constantinople to the United Kingdom, via France, and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

11. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions in lieu thereof, and may, from time to time, appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

12. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1863.
