THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, give Notice that the Moniteur of the 30th instant, contains a French Imperial Decree, of which the following is a translation, fixing the import duties on British and Belgian products, having Salt as their basis, and abolishing the supplementary duties upon glass of British or Belgian origin:

ART. 1. The British and Belgian productions, having salt as their basis, which are specified in the table annexed to the present decree, will, after the 1st January, 1863, pay on importation, in lieu of the existing supplementary duties, the supple-

mentary duties therein set forth, to countervail the direct and indirect charges attaching to the manufacture of soda.

Nevertheless, the supplementary duties fixed by the treaties of the 16th November, 1860, and the 1st May, 1861, with England and Belgium respectively, will continue to be levied:—1st, on sulphate of anhydrous soda, containing more than 25 per cent. of salt; 2nd, upon artificial raw sodas below 30 degrees; 3rd, upon carbonates of soda below 60 degrees.

ART. 2. From the 1st of January, 1863, the supplementary duties upon looking glass or mirrors, upon glass wares, window glass, and other white glass and glass bottles of British or Belgium origin, will be abolished.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs the following translation of the Customs Tariff and Regulations recently promulgated by the Government of the Netherlands, which came into force on the 1st November last.

ART. 1.

Under the name of import duty, a duty shall be paid on the articles, as specified in the following list (1) and declared for home consumption.

ART. 2.

No duty is to be paid on articles not mentioned in the art. 1, except that they could be classed, according to their nature or destination, as one of the articles mentioned in the list.

The excise on foreign turf for fuel is to be paid, conformably to art. 1 of the law of the 26th December, 1833 (Offic. Journal, No. 77).

ART. 3.

No import duty is to be paid on:

- a. The merchandise, relanded within two years from our colonial possessions, after being exported from the Netherlands;
- b. The merchandise of certified Dutch origin, relanded within two years, after being exported to foreign markets;
- c. The merchandise relanded, after being exported from the Netherlands to places where it cannot be imported in consequence of prohibition or augmentation of import duty, which could not be known when exported.

ART. 4.

When the merchandise mentioned by the art. 3 is exported from the Netherlands, with discharge or restitution of excises, it cannot be relanded before the drawback is repaid.

ART. 5.

No import-duty is to be paid on provisions and victuals for consumption on board inward-bound ships, unless the merchandise is declared as such, and does not exceed the quantity fixed by the law.

When it exceeds the fixed quantity, freedom of import-duty will be granted, when it is to be exported in the same ship. In this case it must remain under the care of the custom-house until exported.

These articles are free of excise.

ART. 6.

No import-duty is to be paid on:

- a. Utensils and cordages belonging to and whereof use is made on rafts of wood descending the rivers provided this use is duly stated by an inventory when imported;
- b. Goods belonging to ambassadors of foreign states in the Netherlands, but only for those states where the goods of our ambassadors are also exempted from duty;
- c. Carriages used in travelling.
- d. Luggage of travellers;
- e. Furniture in course of removal;
- f. Fruits and productions of the earth and trees, the produce of places situated within the distance of five thousand five hundred ells from the frontiers of the country, imported for consumption in the Netherlands, provided that they are imported between sun-rise and sun-set and during the ordinary time of harvest. The possession or the occupation of the grounds is to be duly stated;
- g. Empty bags, barrels, baskets, and all objects intended only for the transport of merchandise when exported;
- h. Merchandise free of excise imported to be dressed or prepared and re-exported;
- i. Merchandise free of excise exported for restoration in any foreign country, and which is imported again within six months.

The goods mentioned sub b are free of excise.

ART. 7.

The stipulations necessary to prevent abuse, relative to the freedom mentioned in the articles 3, 5, and 6, are fixed by the law.

ART. 8.

For the calculation of the import-duty, the fractions of the lb., the litre, the cubic ell or the florin, shall be reckoned integrally.

Fractions of cents are counted for whole cents.

(1) See the Tariff hereafter.

ART. 9.

No less import-duty than five cents will be charged for any declaration, however trifling the quantity or value may be.

ART. 10.

For merchandise, of which the tare is not fixed by the tariff, the following tare may be subtracted from the gross weight:

- a. For merchandise packed in barrels, or wooden boxes, fifteen per cent.;
- b. For merchandise packed in leather, mats, baskets, canisters, linen or such articles, eight per cent.

ART. 11.

When the importers object to the tare, as fixed by the preceding article, they may pay the import-duty of the net weight, which shall be determined by the custom-officers at the expense of the importers.

ART. 12.

When there are a great number of barrels, casks, baskets, canisters, bales, or packets of the same size and sort, the tare may be determined by weighing the empty barrels, &c., which shall be indicated by the custom-officer. The tare shall be fixed according to the result.

ART. 13.

When ad-valorem goods are packed with those whereof duty is to be paid according to the weight, then the net weight can be determined by the custom-officers at the expense of the importer.

ART. 14.

For the determination of the import-duty on liquids, which do not pay excise, the following deduction will be allowed for leakage.

- a. When imported by sea, from the harbours of the North Sea and Baltic, of France, Portugal, and Spain, from this side of the Strait of Gibraltar, six per cent.
- b. When imported from elsewhere, twelve per cent.

ART. 15.

When the importer objects to the deduction fixed by the preceding article, he may pay duty for the real quantity, to be determined at his own expense.

ART. 16.

For liquids, imported by land or by the rivers, which do not pay excise, and which are charged according to the measure, no deduction will be allowed.

The duty is to be paid for the whole contents of barrels, except when the importer should prefer to have the real contents determined by the custom-officers, at his own expense.

ART. 17.

In extraordinary circumstances, or whenever it should be for the interests of trade and industry, the duty fixed by the tariff can be decreased or annulled by the law.

In this case our resolution shall be communicated to the States-General within thirty days after the opening of the session, accompanied by a project of law.

When circumstances require that a resolution should be taken when the States-General are assembled, then the communication shall be made within thirty days after the date of the resolution.

When the project of law is rejected by the States-General, the resolution remains in force for twenty days after the date of rejection.

ART. 18.

The duties that are determined by the tariff shall not be increased:

ART. 19.

Importation of the following articles is:

a. Reprints of books, the copyright of which exist in the Netherlands or in foreign states with which they have concluded a copyright convention.

b. Copper coin and plates for copper coin.

Copper-plates for coin, however, may be imported, with our consent, for the use of the mint, by paying the import duty as fixed by the tariff for beaten copper, leaves or plates.

ART. 20.

An export duty of five guilders per 100 lbs. shall be paid on linen and cotton rags, including old useless paper, torn or not, linen and cotton, worn clothes of linen and cotton, sold by weight, pulp for paper, and all these articles when they are mixed with woollen rags.

An export-duty of two guilders fifty cents, per 100 lbs. shall be paid on unmixed woollen rags.

ART. 21.

The export or transit of gunpowder and ammunition can be prohibited, entirely or partially, by the law.

ART. 22.

The existing legal stipulations concerning the formalities of transit, which are to be observed, may be modified by the law when it can tend to the accommodation of trade, preserving the necessary rules to secure the import-duties.

ART. 23.

The duty of four per cent., mentioned in art. the 2d. of the Law of the 8th August, 1850 (Off. Journ., No. 49), shall be reduced to two per cent.

ART. 24.

The exemption of inland passports for transports, as provided by art. 161, litt. f, of the Law of the 26th August, 1862 (Off. Journ., No. 39), is limited for linen, cotton and woollen rags, to a quantity of not less than five pounds.

ART. 25.

The following Laws are annulled; Law of the 19th June, 1845 (Off. Journ., No. 28), those of the 30th May, 1847 (Off. Journ., No. 24), with exception of the articles 3, 4, and 5, the articles 1, 2, 4, and 5 of the Law of the 8th August, 1850 (Off. Journ., No. 47), art. 1 of this Law however, only concerning the freedom, specified by art. 3 § 1 of the Law of the 19th June, 1845 (Off. Journ., No. 28), the Laws of the 18th Septemb., 1852 (Off. Journ., No. 176), of the 9th Septemb., 1853 (Off. Journ., No. 101), and of the 1st Septemb., 1854 (Off. Journ., No. 126), art 1 of the Law of the 19th of December, 1857 (Off. Journ., No. 164), and the Law of the 23rd of December, 1859 (Off. Journ., No. 136).

ART. 26.

The present Law shall come into operation on the 1st November, 1862.

Particular Stipulations.

(1) The tare is 18 pct. for tea in ordinary chests of 25 pds. and more, and 25 pct. for the ordinary chests of 25 pds. and inferior weight.

(2) Under this article is classed the deals not exceeding 5 ins. in thickness, 30 ins. in breadth and 4 ells in length; likewise trunks of trees suitable for the construction of railways and only sawn once in the length and roughly hewn or not, imported with unbroken cargo by sea.

By unbroken cargo is to be understood when half the ship is charged with timber. Duty is to be paid on the whole cubic contents of the ship, whether the cargo consists only partially of wood or that the ship has still a cargo on her deck. By mixed cargoes, by which are to be understood those consisting of wood sawn or unsawn, the principle of paying duty according to the whole cubic contents of the ships, shall be applied in this manner: from the number of tons, making the cubic contents of the ship, shall be subtracted the tons of sawn wood effectually present, and the difference shall be regarded to be the cargo of unsawn wood.

Under this article may be admitted staves, wainscot, staves for pipes, for cooperage and poles, being the part of a whole cargo, timber for ship-building or building, imported by sea with unbroken cargo, but no firewood.

(3) Under this article may be admitted the deals of which the floors and cabins on the rafts descending the rivers are made, but in no greater quantity than four cubic ells for every 100 cubic ells which the raft contains.

Under this article may also be admitted trunks of trees to be used in the construction of railways.

(4) Only the roughly hewn oars belong to this article; if planed or otherwise dressed, they belong to the article wooden work.

(5) Planed staves suitable for making barrels or cooperage belong to wood work.

(6) Under this article is included fine wood for furniture, sawn to the thickness of a decimetre or more.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant, under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, or Inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new and other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid. And it is provided that the power thereby given should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act, made and passed in the Session of Parliament, holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, for amending the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and for providing for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by certain Warrants in writing, under their hands, relating to the transmission by the post of letters, and newspapers, and other printed papers, between the United Kingdom and Bremen, and between Bremen and Her Majesty's colonies, and foreign countries through the United Kingdom respectively, and bearing date respectively, the 31st day of August, 1841; the 30th day of September, 1841; the 8th day of October, 1847; the 27th day of June, 1859; and the 16th day of April, 1860; did make and give certain orders, directions, and regulations relating to the transmission by the post of such letters, and newspapers, and other printed papers respectively.

And whereas a Convention hath been lately made and entered into between the General Post Office of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Post Office of Bremen, for the purpose of regulating the communications by post between the United Kingdom and Bremen; and it is expedient for the better carrying out of the same, that the said recited Warrants of the several dates hereinbefore-mentioned should be respectively repealed, and that certain other regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us, in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:—

1. The said recited Warrants, bearing date respectively, the 31st day of August, 1841; the

30th day of September, 1841; the 8th day of October, 1847; the 27th day of June, 1859; and the 16th day of April, 1860; be, and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, shall wholly cease and determine, except so far as the said recited Warrants shall respectively repeal, revoke, or annul any other Warrants, or any orders, directions, regulations, or rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, which said several last mentioned Warrants, orders, directions, regulations, or rates of postage shall remain repealed, revoked, and annulled, as if this present Warrant had not been made or signed.

2. On every letter, not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Bremen, and on every letter not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, posted in Bremen, addressed to any place within the United Kingdom, when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Bremen in closed mails via Belgium, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, an uniform rate of British postage of two-pence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid; and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of threepence halfpenny; and when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Bremen direct, by private ship, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform rate of British postage of fourpence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of sixpence.

3. On every letter, not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, posted in Bremen, addressed to any place in any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any foreign country, transmitted by the post between Bremen and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom, and on every letter, not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any foreign country, addressed to Bremen, transmitted by the post between any of Her Majesty's Colonies or any foreign country and Bremen, through the United Kingdom, when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Bremen, in closed mails, via Belgium, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, an uniform rate of British postage of two pence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of three pence halfpenny; and when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Bremen direct, by private ship, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, an uniform rate of British postage of fourpence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid; and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of six pence; and also on every letter mentioned in this 3rd Clause there shall be charged, taken, and paid, such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters, not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port, and any such colony or foreign

country; provided, that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance, under this clause, of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

4. On every letter transmitted, as is hereinbefore in this Warrant mentioned, exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates following, that is to say:

On every such letter so transmitted, exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter so transmitted, exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter so transmitted, exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of three ounces there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional ounce shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

5. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Bremen, or if any letter shall be posted in Bremen, addressed to the United Kingdom, and the value of the postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of the postage stamp or stamps thereon, and the rate of postage payable under or by virtue of this Warrant as an unpaid letter.

6. Registered letters may be transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, upon the payment of such additional charges or rates of postage, or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct or appoint, provided that all rates of postage and additional charges or rates from time to time payable thereupon shall be prepaid, and that no payment shall be made thereupon on the delivery of any such registered letters.

7. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Bremen, *viâ* France, all which said letters shall be charged and chargeable with the same rates of postage as are now chargeable and payable thereon, as if this Warrant had not been made.

8. All packets consisting of printed newspapers, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and not being respectively of the dimensions or weight hereinafter in the 10th clause of this Warrant specified, posted in any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the schedule A to this Warrant annexed, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the said schedule A, may be

transmitted by the post from any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said schedule A, to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said schedule A, and all such respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such respective countries and places in the said schedule A, and all such respective packets so transmitted, and chargeable with postage under this clause, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned and set forth (that is to say):—

On every such packet so transmitted, if not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places, respectively, in the said schedule A.

And on every such packet, exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows (that is to say)—

On every such packet if exceeding two ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one-half of a pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one-half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, eight rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, twelve rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, sixteen rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding two ounces in weight.

9. Every packet consisting of a printed newspaper, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and every packet consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and not being respectively of the dimensions or weight hereinafter in the 10th clause of this Warrant specified, posted in any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the schedule B to this Warrant annexed addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the said schedule B, may be transmitted by the post from any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said schedule B to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said

schedule B; and all such respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto; and for the purposes of this Warrant every printed newspaper shall be deemed and considered a packet, and shall be charged and chargeable with a separate and distinct single rate or separate and distinct progressive and additional rates of postage according to the weight thereof, as hereinafter mentioned, notwithstanding two or more newspapers shall be enclosed and transmitted in one and the same cover, wrapper, envelope, or bundle, and form only one parcel or bundle of newspapers; and the single rate of postage for the transmission of every such packet respectively, shall be that which is mentioned and set forth respectively against such countries and places in the said schedule B; and all such respective packets transmitted under this clause, shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned and set forth; that is to say:—

On every such packet consisting of a printed newspaper, or consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, so transmitted if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rates of postage which are respectively mentioned and set forth against the said respective places in the said schedule B.

And on every such packet exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say,—

On every such packet if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one-half of a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one-half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage;

And for every additional half a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight, shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

10. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post, under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant hereinbefore contained, shall be so transmitted, in conformity with, and under and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say:

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same

shall be registered by the proprietor or printer thereof at the General Post Office, in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of the publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof;

No packet shall be transmitted by the post under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant, which in length, or breadth, or width, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet (British), or which shall exceed three zoll pounds in weight;

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant, shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides; and there shall be no written letter, either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter, either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to, or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), nor any inclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other inclosure not authorised by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any writing, figures, or manual marks whatsoever of any description upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof, not authorized by this Warrant, except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent; but the name or title of any newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, news-vender, or agent, by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof; and any other packet, not being a newspaper, may have any matter or thing printed on the cover thereof;

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the post-office, at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

The postage of every packet transmitted by the post under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant, shall be paid at the time of the same being posted by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall, in every case, be affixed, or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant,

11. If any packet, authorized to be transmitted by the post under this Warrant, shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Bremen, or if any such packet shall be posted in Bremen, addressed to the United Kingdom, the postage whereof shall be insufficiently prepaid by having thereupon, or affixed thereto, a postage stamp or stamps which shall represent a sum less than the amount of postage duty payable in respect thereof; every such packet shall be charged with double the amount of the postage which shall be so insufficiently prepaid upon any such packet.

12. If any packet transmitted by the post under the 8th or 9th clause of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by or under the authority of this Warrant (except only as in the last preceding clause mentioned), the same shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be

either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the option of the Postmaster-General, be either free of postage or be charged with any rate of postage he may think fit, not exceeding the rate that would be chargeable on such packet as an unpaid letter.

13. The respective letters and packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain other Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

14. The rates of postage chargeable on letters, printed newspapers, books, publications, or works of literature or art, and other printed papers, transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.

15. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exceptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's Service, are now by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

16. The term "books, publications, or works of literature or art," in this Warrant used, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and com-

prise all printed books, or other printed publications, printed or lithographed letters, and such artistic productions as prints, printed maps (whether on paper, parchment, or vellum), and photographs (when not on glass, or in frames containing glass), together with any binding, mounting, or covering of or upon or belonging to any such article or production, or any portion thereof, and including also any cases or rollers of prints or maps, book markers (whether of paper or otherwise), or other thing usually appertaining to any such article or production, or necessary for its safe transmission, which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article or production to which they or it shall belong, and and also when contained in any packet consisting of unbound proof sheets only, any ordinary corrections in writing of such unbound proof sheets, provided nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the sending by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, of any patterns or books of patterns or papers of patterns of any article or thing whatsoever, unless such patterns consist merely of paper, and the other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage.

17. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

18. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1863.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by the law, on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and, from time to time, by Warrant, as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new and other rates in lieu thereof, and, from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided that the power thereby given should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act made and passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters, by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, for amending the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and for providing for the transmission, by post, of printed periodical publications.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by certain Warrants in writing, under their hands, relating to the transmission, by the post, of letters and newspapers, and other printed papers, between the United Kingdom and Hamburg, and between Hamburg and Her Majesty's colonies and foreign countries, through the United Kingdom respectively, and bearing date, respectively, the 18th day of August, 1847; the 27th day of June, 1859; the 28th day of July, 1859; and the 17th day of April, 1860; did make and give certain orders, directions, and regulations relating to the transmission, by the post, of such letters and newspapers, and other printed papers respectively.

And whereas a convention hath been lately made and entered into between the General Post-office of the United Kingdom of Great Britain

and Ireland and the Post Office of Hamburg, for the purpose of regulating the communications by post between the United Kingdom and Hamburg, and it is expedient, for the better carrying out of the same, that the said recited Warrants of the several dates hereinbefore mentioned should be respectively repealed, and that certain other regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:

1. The said recited Warrants, bearing date respectively the 18th day of August, 1847; the 27th day of June, 1859; the 28th day of July, 1859; and the 17th day of April, 1860; be, and the same are hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled: and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth shall wholly cease and determine, except so far as the said recited Warrants shall respectively repeal, revoke, or annul any other Warrants, or any orders, directions, regulations, or rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, which said several last-mentioned Warrants, orders, directions, regulations, or rates of postage shall remain repealed, revoked, and annulled as if this present Warrant had not been made or signed.

2. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Hamburg, and on every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in Hamburg, addressed to any place within the United Kingdom, when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg, in closed mails, via Belgium, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform rate of British postage of two pence half-penny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of British postage of three pence half-penny; and when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg direct by private ship, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform rate of British postage of four pence half-penny if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid an uniform rate of British postage of six pence.

3. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any place in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, transmitted between the United Kingdom and such colony or foreign country, through Hamburg, and on every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, transmitted between such colony or foreign country and the United Kingdom, through Hamburg, when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg in closed mails, via Belgium, there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of British postage of two pence halfpenny if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid a uniform rate of British postage of three pence halfpenny; and when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg direct by private ship, there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of British postage of four pence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid a uniform rate of British postage of sixpence.

4. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in Hamburg, or posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, and forwarded through Hamburg, addressed to any place in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, transmitted by the post between Hamburg and any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country; through the United Kingdom; and on every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, addressed to Hamburg, or to any place in any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country, and forwarded through Hamburg, transmitted by the post between any of Her Majesty's colonies or any foreign country and Hamburg, through the United Kingdom; when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg in closed mails, via Belgium, there shall be charged, taken, and paid a uniform rate of British postage of two pence halfpenny if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, a uniform rate of British postage of three pence halfpenny, and when the said respective letters are conveyed between the United Kingdom and Hamburg direct by private ship, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, a uniform rate of British postage of four pence halfpenny, if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, a uniform rate of British postage of sixpence; and also on every letter mentioned in this fourth clause there shall be charged, taken, and paid, such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, as shall from time to time be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country; provided that in all cases where such additional rate includes both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance, under this clause, of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.

5. On every letter transmitted, as is hereinbefore in this Warrant mentioned, exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage, according to the scale of weight and number of rates following, that is to say:

On every such letter so transmitted exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter so transmitted exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter so transmitted exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of three ounces there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional ounce shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

6. If any letter shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Hamburg, or if any letter shall be posted in Hamburg addressed to the United Kingdom, and the value of the postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of the postage stamp or stamps thereon, and the rate of postage payable under or by virtue of this Warrant, as an unpaid letter.

7. Registered letters may be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, upon the payment of such additional charges or rates of postage or otherwise as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct or appoint, provided that all rates of postage and additional charges or rates from time to time payable thereupon shall be prepaid, and that no payment shall be made thereupon on the delivery of any such registered letters.

8. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed to extend to any letters transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and Hamburg, via France, all which said letters shall be charged and chargeable with the same rates of postage as are now chargeable and payable thereon, as if this Warrant had not been made.

9. All packets consisting of printed newspapers, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and not being respectively of the dimensions or weight hereinafter in the 11th clause of this Warrant specified, posted in any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the schedule A to this warrant annexed, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the said schedule A may be transmitted by the post from any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said schedule A to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said schedule A, and all such respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several

regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and the single rate of postage for the transmission of such packets shall be that which is mentioned and set forth against such respective countries and places in the said schedule A, and all such respective packets so transmitted and chargeable with postage under this clause shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned and set forth (that is to say):—

On every such packet so transmitted, if not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively, as aforesaid, the uniform single rate of postage which is mentioned and set forth against the said places respectively in the said schedule A.

And on every such packet, exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows (that is to say):—

On every such packet, if exceeding two ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, eight rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, twelve rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, sixteen rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding two ounces in weight.

10. Every packet consisting of a printed newspaper, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and every packet consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, whether British, Colonial, or Foreign, and not being respectively of the dimensions or weight hereinafter in the 11th clause of this Warrant specified, posted in any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the first column of the schedule B to this Warrant annexed, addressed to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the second column of the said schedule B, may be transmitted by the post from any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said first column of the said schedule B, to any of the respective countries and places mentioned and set forth in the said second column of the said schedule B; and all such respective packets shall be transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto; and for the purposes of this Warrant, every printed newspaper shall be deemed and considered a packet, and shall be charged and

chargeable with a separate and distinct single rate, or separate and distinct, progressive, and additional rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, as hereinafter mentioned, notwithstanding two or more newspapers shall be inclosed and transmitted in one and the same cover, wrapper, envelope, or bundle, and form only one parcel or bundle of newspapers; and the single rate of postage for the transmission of every such packet respectively, shall be that which is mentioned and set forth respectively against such countries and places in the said schedule B, and all such respective packets transmitted under this clause shall be subject to the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned and set forth (that is to say):—

On every such packet consisting of a printed newspaper, or consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, so transmitted, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the uniform single rates of postage which are respectively mentioned and set forth against the said respective places in the said schedule B.

And on every such packet exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, progressive and additional rates of postage as follows; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight, shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

11. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clauses of this Warrant, hereinbefore contained, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say:—

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same shall be registered by the proprietor or printer thereof, at the General Post Office, in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

No packet shall be transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clause of this Warrant,

which in length, or breadth, or width, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet (British), or which shall exceed three zoll pounds in weight.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clause of this Warrant shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides; and there shall be no written letter either closed or open, nor any written communication in the nature of a letter, either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed, or any other person), nor any inclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant sent in or with any such packet, nor shall there be any writing, figures, or manual marks whatsoever of any description upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof not authorized by this Warrant, except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent; but the name or title of any newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, newsvendor, or agent, by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof, and any other packet not being a newspaper may have any matter or thing printed on the cover thereof.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clause of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the Post Office at such hours in the day and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

The postage of every packet transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clause of this Warrant shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

12. If any packet authorized to be transmitted by the post under this warrant shall be posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Hamburg, or if any such packet shall be posted in Hamburg, addressed to the United Kingdom, the postage whereof shall be insufficiently prepaid, by having thereupon or affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps which shall represent a sum less than the amount of postage duty payable in respect thereof, every such packet shall be charged with double the amount of the postage which shall be so insufficiently prepaid upon any such packet.

13. If any packet transmitted by the post under the 9th or 10th clause of this Warrant shall be so transmitted otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by or under the authority of this Warrant (except only as in the last preceding clause mentioned), the same shall and may be detained and opened, and, at the option of the Postmaster General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet, on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the option of the Postmaster General, be either free of postage, or be charged with any rate of postage he may think fit, not exceeding the rate that would be chargeable on such packet as an unpaid letter.
