THE following Addresses of Congratulation to the Queen, on the attainment of his Majority by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for Presentation, have accordingly been presented by him to Her Majesty, who has been pleased to receive the same very graciously :

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Brecknock, in the principality of Wales, desire to convey our sincere and heartfelt congratulations on the attainment of his majority by your Royal Son, our own Prince.

We observe with the greatest satisfaction that your Majesty has sanctioned the Treaty for a Marriage between His Royal Highness and Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra of Denmark, and we feel assured that such a marriage is one of which not only the Principality, but the whole of your Majesty's dominions, has just reason to be proud.

We venture to hope that the time is not far distant when His Royal Highness may, in company with his future Bride be induced to visit the Principality, in order that the inhabitants thereof may have an opportunity of effectually demonstrating that the loyalty and attachment of which they pride themselves as a national characteristic, has not degenerated.

We trust that the life of your Majesty may be spared for many years to see realized in your noble son the fruits of that high moral, religious, and intellectual education which it has been the study of your Majesty, and your most deeply lamented Consort to inculcate, and that when the time shall come (which may God long avert) when he is called to ascend the Throne of this realm, he will emulate the deeds of his ancestors, and earn for himself a name as endearing to his country as that of Albert the Good.

VICTORY GAINED BY COMBINED FORCES OF
IMPERIALISTS AND BURGOVINE'S FORCES.

SIR,

*British Consulate,
Shanghai, November 19, 1862.*

I HAVE the honour to inform you that a large force of rebels, left Soochow, Hangchow, and Hoochow, heading by the Ting Wang, Mu Wang, and Ha Wang, for the purpose of attempting the recapture of Kahding and Tsingpo, and take if possible Sung Keong, Shanghai, and Paushun. They were to have assembled at Na-ziang and thence marched in three separate divisions on the above-named enterprise. Information being received that a large portion of this force had already reached Wangdo, between Tsingpo and Kahding, the Governor of the Province marched against them from this city in person, and Colonel Burgovine with a force of some 1,500 disciplined Chinese, simultaneously left Sung Keong for Tsingpo. Both parties fell in with the rebel force on the 16th instant, and after a hard fight of some hours the main body of rebels were dislodged from their position in a strong stockade by Colonel Burgovine's Artillery, and the whole force was utterly

routed with immense loss. The Ting Wong was drowned, the Mu Wong badly wounded, and an extraordinary number of Chiefs killed and taken prisoners, the rebels having incautiously trusted to a floating bridge, which gave way at the first rush for escape. What with killed, prisoners, and deserters (chiefly the last), ten thousand only are said to have got away, and the Chinese authorities express their confidence that this victory will have the effect of keeping the 30 miles round Shanghai free from rebels for some time to come.

Colonel Burgovine's men are said to have behaved extremely well, and to have shewn great confidence in their officers. Their loss was trifling.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Consul-General in Peru enclosing a translation of a Decree of the Peruvian Government extending to British vessels of less than 200 tons burden the privilege of national treatment, as regards port, light, tonnage, pilot, and quarantine dues.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires, at Hamburg, enclosing a copy of an ordinance recently passed by the Senate of Hamburg, modifying, in various respects, the Customs' Laws of that State.

The principal alterations effected, are:—

- (1.) Goods in transit, whether the property of citizens or imported on account of foreigners, may pass free of customs' duty.
- (2.) The abolition of customs' duties on mohair yarn, mohair wool, slates, cement-stones, tufa stones, and the fat of whales, seals and walruses, for burning.
- (3.) Ships wholly laden with rice, salt, or herrings, are to pay only half tonnage duty (viz., 1½d. per ton English).
- (4.) Ships arriving or departing in ballast are exempt from tonnage duty.
- (5.) Ships not exceeding 60 commercial lasts burden (180 tons English), and taking no pilot, are exempted from pilotage duty.

The above alterations came into force on the 1st instant, and are to continue till the end of September next, equally with the other existing Customs' regulations.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 2.) **MEDITERRANEAN—COAST OF ALGIERS.**
Fixed and Flashing Green Light on El Djerda Peninsula.

INFORMATION has been received at the Admiralty, that from and after the 24th day of June, 1862; a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the north-eastern extremity of the peninsula El Djerda, at the entrance of the gulf of Collo or Kolah, province of Constantina, on the coast of Algiers.

The light is a *fixed* light, varied by a *green flash* every two minutes. It is placed at an elevation of

78 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles.

The tower is said to stand in lat. $37^{\circ} 1' 22''$ N., long. $6^{\circ} 32' 25''$ East of Greenwich.

Also that the *fixed, red* light formerly shown from the peninsula of Djerda would be removed to a lighthouse recently erected on the south point of the small bay of Collo. It is visible 4 miles.
