ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES WITHIN THE PARISHES OF MORDEN AND MITCHAM, IN THE COUNTY OF SURREY.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives, unless restricted as hereinafter mentioned, on any highway within the parishes of Morden and Mitcham, in the county of Surrey, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public.

I do hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever propelled by steam, or any other than animal power, in the highways within the limits of the said parishes, except between the hours of nine at night and eight in the morning.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of Regulations issued by the European Commissioners of the Danube to ensure the payment of the navigation dues on that river, of which the following is a translation:—

ART. 1.—The captain or master of every sea-going vessel, whatever may be its capacity, is required immediately after entering the Danube, to present his papers to the Accountant Agent of the Navigation Chest at Soulina. The Accountant Agent will insert in a register kept for the purpose, the name, nationality, and tonnage of the vessel, the nature and amount of the cargo (or state that she is in ballast), and the name of the captain or master. The vessels are inscribed year by year under a single series of numbers.

ART. 2.—The Accountant Agent will place upon the muster roll of every vessel entering the Danube a stamp bearing the words "Commission Européenne du Danube, Caisse de Navigation de Soulina," the date, and the number under which the vessel is inscribed upon the register mentioned in the preceding article.

ART. 3.—The muster roll must be presented to the Accountant Agent on the clearing of the vessel; the stamp affixed in accordance with Art. 2 will be cancelled, and the number of the counterfoil receipt will be delivered to the captain, or, in the case of vessels under 30 tons, the date of clearance will be inserted in the register referred to in Art. 1, opposite the vessel's name.

ART. 4.—Every sea-going ship found in the Danube, the muster roll of which is not stamped in conformity with Art. 2, or bears only cancelled stamps, will be liable to a penalty of 50 Dutch ducats.

ART. 5.—The penalty can be inflicted either by the Inspector-General of Navigation, or by the Captain of the port of Soulina.

These two officers may require at any moment the production of the muster rolls of any vessels which may be found in the Danube.

The amount of the fine must be paid into the Navigation Chest of Soulina before the vessel clears; and in case of appeal, the fine will be placed in the Chest as a deposit.

ART. 6.—The above regulations will come into force on the 1st January, 1863, and are not applicable either to ships of war or to steam-ships engaged in the mail service, and performing periodical voyages according to a published programme.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of an Order signed by the Belgian Minister of Finance, reducing the rate of duties levied on bottles and other objects of bottle glass, of French origin, imported into Belgium, of which the following is a translation: "It was stipulated by the Treaty of 1st May, 1861, R. 837, that the Belgian import duty on bottles and other objects of bottle glass of French origin should be reduced to 1 fr. per 100 kilos., in the event of the abolition of the supplementary duty levied in France by the terms of Art. 4 of the Treaty on similar articles of Belgian manufacture."

By an Imperial (French) Decree this supplementary duty has been suppressed from the 1st January, 1863.

In consequence and from that date, the import duty (in Belgium) fixed by the Treaty, on bottles and other objects of bottle glass, is reduced from 2 frs. to 1 fr. per 100 kilos.

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Hemel Hempstead, in the county of Hertford, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said Parish, held at the Vestry Room, in the Parish Church, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Saturday, the twenty-fourth day of May last, it was resolved,—

"That application be made by the Overseers to the Poor Law Board, to put the Act of the 13th and 14th Victoria, chapter 57, in force in the parish, so far as relates only to providing a room for the purpose of holding Vestries and other meetings of or relating to parish business, in lieu of the Vestry Room now used at the Parish Church; and that this meeting, pursuant to the provisions of the same statute, and of the 24th and 25th Victoria, chapter 125, do consent that the Overseers shall take upon lease the building under the new Reading Room for the term of 21 years, at the yearly rent of £15, for such purpose, and also for the purpose of an Office for the transaction of the business of the parish."

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution;

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding vestry or other meetings for the transaction of any business of, or relating to, the said parish of Hemel Hempstead, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish.

ARTICLE II.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of Our Lady the Queen, held at the Shire-hall, Taunton, in and for the county of Somerset, on Tuesday, the 6th day of January, in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1863, before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Charles Aaron Moody, Esquire, Chairman, and others, their Companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in and for the county of Somerset aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors, committed in the same county.

Whereas at a Court of General or Quarter Sessions, held at the city of Wells, in and for the county of Somerset, on Tuesday, the 14th day of October, 1862, and continued by adjournment to Tuesday, the 18th day of November, 1862; at the city of Wells, in and for the said county, a Provisional Order was made in the words following; that is to say:—

Somerset to wit.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the city of Wells, in and for the county of Somerset, on Tuesday, the 14th day of October, in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1862, before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Charles Aaron Moody, Esquire, Chairman, and others, their Companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of our said Lady the Queen, in and for the county of Somerset aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses and other misdemeanors, committed in the same county, and continued by adjournment to Tuesday, the 18th day of November, in the year of our Lord, 1862, at the city of Wells, in and for the said county, and then and there holden before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Chairman, Charles Aaron Moody, Esquire, and others their Companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned for the purposes aforesaid:

In pursuance of an Act passed in the session holden in the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter 61, intituled "An Act for the better management of Highways in England," and of a requisition thereunder, duly made by writing, under the hands of more than five Justices of the Peace of this county to the Clerk of the Peace, stating that a proposal would be made at these Quarter Sessions to divide the county of Somerset into highway districts, and also requiring the Clerk of the Peace to send by post, in a prepaid letter, in the form prescribed by the said Act, notices to the churchwardens and overseers of every parish in the said county, and to add to and send with the notice required by law to be given of the holding of this present Court of General or Quarter Session, a copy of such notice:—All which notices have been duly given, added, and sent by the Clerk of the Peace, as by law required, the Justices assembled at this Court of General Quarter Sessions do entertain a proposal for dividing this county into highway districts, and do decide that the county shall be divided into highway districts, and inasmuch as the several parishes separately maintaining their own poor, named in the first column of the schedule

hereto are divided into the townships, tithings, hamlets or places separately maintaining their own highways, named in the second column of the said schedule, and it is expedient that such townships, tithings, hamlets, and places should be combined for the purposes of the said Act, the said Justices do provisionally order that the townships, tithings, hamlets, and places into which each of the parishes named in the said first column of the said schedule is divided as aforesaid shall be combined for the purposes of the said Act; and that after the date of the confirmation of this Order separate Waywardens shall not be elected for the townships, tithings, hamlets, and places named in the second column of the said schedule, and that after such date as aforesaid each of the parishes named in the said first column of the said schedule shall be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it which were before maintained by the said townships, tithings, hamlets, and places separately, as if their several liabilities had attached to the whole parish named in the first column of the said schedule.

And the said Justices do further provisionally order—that the following parishes (that is to say), Axbridge, Badgworth, Banwell, Barrow, Bid-disham, Blagdon, Bleadon, Bream, Brent East, Brent South, Burnham, Burrington, Butcombe, Chapel Allerton, Charterhouse Vill, Cheddar, Churchill, Christon, Compton Bishop, Congres-lury, Hutton, Kewstoke, Locking, Loxton, Lymsham, Mark, Nyland and Batcombe, Puxton, Rowberrow, Shipham, Uphill, Weare, Wedmore, Week Saint Lawrence, Weston-super-Mare, Winscombe, Worle and Wrington, subject to the restrictions and provisions mentioned in the said Act, be united into and form a Highway District, and that such district be known by the name of "The Axbridge District;" and that one Waywarden be elected from each of such parishes, except the said parish of Wedmore, and that from the said parish of Wedmore two Waywardens be elected.

And the said Justices do further provisionally order—that the following parishes (that is to say), Ashcott, Asholt, Bawdrip, Broomfield, Canning-ton, Catcott, Charlinch, Chedzoy, Chilton-super-Polden, Chilton Trinity, Cossington, Durleigh, Edington, Edstock and Beer, Enmore, Fidding-ton, Goathurst, Grenton, Huntspill, Lyng, Mid-dlezoey, Moorlinch, Nether Stowey, North Pether-ton, Othery, Otterhampton, Over Stowey, Paw-lett, Puriton, Saint Michael Church, Shapwick, Spaxton, Stawell, Stockland Bristol, Sutton Mallett, Thurloxton, Weirbdon, Westonzoyleand, and Woollavington, subject to the restrictions and provisions mentioned in the said Act, be united into and form a Highway District, and that such district be known by the name of "The Bridg-water District;" and that one Waywarden be elected from each of such last-mentioned parishes, except the said parish of North Pether-ton, and that from the said parish of North Pether-ton three Waywardens be elected.

And the said Justices do further provisionally order—that the following parishes (that is to say), Belton or Belluton, Camely, Camerton, Chelwood, Chew Magna, Chewstoke, Chilcompton, Clutton, Compton Martin, East Harptree, Farmborough, Farrington Gurney, High Littleton, Hinton Blewett, Litton, Midsomer Norton, Norton Hawk-field, Norton Malreward, Paulton, Publow, Rad-stock, Regilbury, Saint Thomas in Pensford, Stanton Drew, Ston Easton, Stowey, Thrubwell Nempnett, Timsbury, Ubley, West Harptree, and Widcombe, subject to the restrictions and provisions mentioned in the said Act, be united into

and form a Highway District, and that such district be known by the name of "The Clutton District;" and that one Waywarden be elected from each of such last-mentioned parishes.

And the said Justices do further provisionally order—That the following parishes (that is to say), Chillington, Chinnock East, Chisselborough, Combe and Ashcombe, Crewkerne, Cudworth, Dinnington, Hardington Mandeville, Haselbury Plucknett, Hinton Saint George, Lopen, Merriott, Middle Chinnock, Misterton, North Perrott, Norton under Hamdon, Oathill, Seaborough, South Petherton, Wayford, West Chinnock, and Winsham, subject to the restrictions and provisions mentioned in the said Act, be united into and form a Highway District, and that such district be known by the name of "The Crewkerne District;" and that one Waywarden be elected from each of such last-mentioned parishes.

And the said Justices do further provisionally order—That the following parishes (that is to say), Brompton Regis, Brushford, Dulverton, Exford, Exmoor, Exton, Hawkridge, Huish Champflower, Skilgate, Upton, Winsford, Witheypoole, and Withieldforey, subject to the restrictions and provisions mentioned in the said Act, be united into and form a Highway District, and that such district be known by the name of "The Dulverton District;" and that one Waywarden be elected from each of such last-mentioned parishes except the said parishes of Brompton Regis, Dulverton, Exford, and Exmoor, and that from each of the said parishes of Brompton Regis, Dulverton, Exford, and Exmoor, two Waywardens be elected.

Provided always, that if any parish or place, or part of a parish or place included by this Provisional Order in a highway district, is situate as follows (that is to say), is or forms part of a district, constituted under the Public Health Act, 1848, and the Local Government Act, 1858, or either of such Acts, is a parish or place, or part of a parish or place, the highways of which are under the superintendence of a board established in pursuance of section 18 of the Act of the session holden in the 5th and 6th years of the reign of his late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter 50, and to the inclusion of which in a highway district, the consent of the said Board has not been given, is a parish or place, or part of a parish or place, the highways of which are maintained under the provisions of any local Act of Parliament, is a parish or place, or part of a parish or place, situate within the limits of a borough; and to the inclusion of which in a highway district the consents required by the said first-mentioned Act may not have been given, this Order shall be deemed not to apply to the parish or place, or part of the parish or place so situate, and shall be construed as if the said parish or place, or part of the said parish or place, had not been named or referred to in this Order.

Lastly.—This Court doth appoint the next Court of General or Quarter Sessions to be held in and for this county, on Tuesday, the 6th day

of January, 1863, for the taking into consideration the confirmation of this Provisional Order by a Final Order.
