NOTICE OF INTENDED DISTRIBUTION OF NAVAL PRIZE MONEY.

*Department of the Accountant-General of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset-House, January 28, 1863.*

NOTICE is hereby given to the Officers, Seamen, and Marines, and to all persons interested therein, that the distribution of the tonnage bounty, awarded for the slave schooner *Jacinta*, captured on the 27th day of May, 1861, by Her Majesty's ship *Prometheus*, will commence on Friday, the 6th proximo, in the Prize Branch of the Department of the "Accountant-General of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset-House."

Agents and other persons holding powers of attorney, prize orders, assignments, or other instruments, by virtue of which they may be legally entitled to claim the share of any captor, serving in the above-named ship, are requested to present the same at this office.

Any Officer, Seaman, Marine, or other person, who may desire to receive his share from the Collector of Customs or of Inland Revenue within the United Kingdom, is required to intimate the same by letter to be addressed "On Prize Business, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, London," (enclosing his certificate or an attested copy thereof,) in which letter his own place of residence is to be precisely stated, as well as the place of the nearest Collector of Customs, or of Inland Revenue, from whom it would be convenient to receive such share of prize money.

Hemel Hempstead Union.—Parish of Hemel Hempstead.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of Hemel Hempstead, in the county of Hertford;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of Hemel Hempstead, in the county of Hertford, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said Parish, held at the Vestry Room, in the Parish Church, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on Saturday, the twenty-fourth day of May last, it was resolved,—

"That application be made by the Overseers to the Poor Law Board, to put the Act of the 13th and 14th Victoria, chapter 57, in force in the parish, so far as relates only to providing a room for the purpose of holding Vestries and other meetings of or relating to parish business, in lieu of the Vestry Room now used at the Parish Church; and that this meeting, pursuant to the provisions of the same statute, and of the 24th and 25th Victoria, chapter 125, do consent that the Overseers shall take upon lease the building under the new Reading Room for the term of 21 years, at the yearly rent of £15, for such purpose, and also for the purpose of an Office for the transaction of the business of the parish."

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution;

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding vestry or other meetings for the transaction of any business of, or relating to, the said parish of Hemel Hempstead, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish.

ARTICLE II.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
