*The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Thursday, February 5, 1863.*

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

HER Majesty commands us to inform you that since you were last assembled She has declared Her consent to a Marriage between His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and Her Royal Highness the Princess Alexandra, daughter of Prince Christian of Denmark ; and Her Majesty has concluded thereupon a Treaty with the King of Denmark, which will be laid before you.

The constant proofs which Her Majesty has received of your attachment to Her person and family persuade Her that you will participate in Her sentiments on an event so interesting to Her Majesty, and which, with the blessing of God, will, She trusts, prove so conducive to the happiness of Her family and to the welfare of Her people.

Her Majesty doubts not that you will enable Her to make provision for such an establishment as you may think suitable to the rank and dignity of the Heir Apparent to the Crown of these realms.

A revolution having taken place in Greece, by which the Throne of that Kingdom has become vacant, the Greek Nation have expressed the

strongest desire that Her Majesty's son, Prince Alfred, should accept the Greek Crown. This unsolicited and spontaneous manifestation of goodwill towards Her Majesty and Her Family, and of a due appreciation of the benefits conferred by the principles and practice of the British Constitution, could not fail to be highly gratifying, and has been deeply felt by Her Majesty.

But the diplomatic engagements of Her Majesty's Crown, together with other weighty considerations, have prevented Her Majesty from yielding to this general wish of the Greek Nation.

Her Majesty trusts, however, that the same principles of choice which led the Greek Nation to direct their thoughts, in the first instance, towards His Royal Highness Prince Alfred may guide them to the selection of a Sovereign under whose sway the Kingdom of Greece may enjoy the blessings of internal prosperity, and of peaceful relations with other States ; and if in such a state of things the Republic of the seven islands should declare a deliberate wish to be united to the Kingdom of Greece, Her Majesty would be prepared to take such steps as may be necessary for a revision of the Treaty of November, 1815, by which that Republic was re-constituted and was placed under the protection of the British Crown.

Her Majesty's relations with foreign Powers continue to be friendly and satisfactory.

Her Majesty has abstained from taking any step with a view to induce a cessation of the conflict between the contending parties in the North American states ; because it has not yet seemed to Her Majesty that any such overtures could be attended with a probability of success.

Her Majesty has viewed with the deepest concern the desolating warfare which still rages in those regions ; and She has witnessed with heartfelt grief the severe distress and suffering which that war has inflicted upon a large class of Her Majesty's subjects, but which have been borne by them with noble fortitude and with exemplary resignation. It is some consolation to Her Majesty to be led to hope that this suffering and this distress are rather diminishing than increasing ; and that some revival of employment is beginning to take place in the manufacturing districts.

It has been most gratifying to Her Majesty to witness the abundant generosity with which all classes of Her subjects in all parts of Her Empire have contributed to relieve the wants of their suffering fellow-countrymen ; and the liberality with which Her Majesty's Colonial subjects have, on this occasion, given their aid has proved that, although their dwelling-places are far away, their hearts are still warm with unabated affection for the land of their fathers.

The relief committees have superintended with constant and laborious attention the distribution of the funds entrusted to their charge.

Her Majesty commands us to inform you that she has concluded with the King of the Belgians a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation, and a Convention respecting Joint Stock Companies. That Treaty and that Convention will be laid before you.

Her Majesty has likewise given directions that there shall be laid before you papers relating to the affairs of Italy, of Greece, and of Denmark, and that papers shall also be laid before you relating to occurrences which have been lately taken place in Japan.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

Her Majesty has directed that the estimates for the ensuing year shall be laid before you. They have been prepared with a due regard to economy,

and will provide for such reductions of expenditure as have appeared to be consistent with the proper efficiency of the Public Service.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

We are commanded by Her Majesty to inform you, that notwithstanding the continuance of the civil war in North America, the general commerce of the country during the past year has not sensibly diminished.

The Treaty of Commerce which Her Majesty concluded with the Emperor of the French has already been productive of results highly advantageous to both the nations to which it applies; and the general state of the revenue, notwithstanding many unfavourable circumstances, has not been unsatisfactory.

Her Majesty trusts that these results may be taken as proofs that the productive resources of the country are unimpaired.

It has been gratifying to Her Majesty to observe the spirit of order which happily prevails throughout Her dominions, and which is so essential an element in the well-being and prosperity of nations.

Various measures of public usefulness and improvement will be submitted for your consideration; and Her Majesty fervently prays that in all your deliberations the blessing of Almighty God may guide your counsels to the promotion of the welfare and happiness of Her people.

parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled 'An Act to settle and describe the divisions of Counties and the limits of Cities and Boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the Election of Members to serve in Parliament,' shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such district to each polling place."

And whereas by another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to limit the time for proceeding to Election in Counties and Boroughs in England and Wales, and for Polling at Elections for the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and for other purposes," it is enacted—"That it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, hereafter, on Petition from the Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled of any county, riding, parts, or division of any county, other than any county of a city or of a town in England and Wales, representing that it would be expedient that any polling place or places mentioned in the said petition should cease to be such, and that any other place or places mentioned in the said petition should be substituted in lieu thereof, and praying that such alteration and substitution might be made, to declare that the said alteration and substitution shall be made in respect of all or any of the places mentioned in the said petition; and the said declaration shall be certified under the hands of one of the Clerks in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and when so certified shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall then be of the same force and effect as if the same had been expressly made by the authority of Parliament."

And whereas the Justices of the Peace acting in and for the West Riding of the county of York, in General Quarter Sessions assembled at Wakefield, in the said riding, on Tuesday, the sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, have presented their Petition to Her Majesty, representing that some of the existing polling places within the said West Riding are found to be inconvenient; and the number of the polling places insufficient, and humbly praying Her Majesty in Council that Her Majesty would be graciously pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to appoint the townships or places of Brighouse, Sherburn, Tadcaster, Bilton with Harrogate, Boroughbridge, Sowerby Bridge, and Scissett, in the said West Riding, to be polling places for the said riding, and to appoint Sedbergh, in the Dent polling district, in the said riding, to be the polling place for that district, instead of Dent, and also to appoint Dobcross, in the New Delph polling district, in the said riding, to be the polling place for that district, instead of New Delph, and to discontinue the said townships or places of Dent and New Delph, and also the township or place of Aberford, in the said riding, as polling places for the said riding.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration doth, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct that the townships or places of Brighouse, Sherburn, Tadcaster, Bilton-with-Harrogate, Boroughbridge, Sowerby Bridge, and Scissett, in the said West Riding, shall be polling places for the said riding; and that Sedbergh, in

the Dent polling district, in the said riding, shall be the polling place for that district, instead of Dent; and also that Dobcross, in the New Delph polling district, in the said riding, shall be the polling place for that district, instead of New Delph; and that the said townships or places of Dent and New Delph, and also the township or place of Aberford, in the said riding, shall cease to be polling places for the said riding.

And further, that the Justices of the peace for the said West Riding of the county of York, assembled in Quarter Sessions or some special sessions, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of His late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide the said West Riding of the county of York into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

And whereas by the 411th section of the said Act, it is enacted that no dues for any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon to be erected or placed in or near the islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Sark or Alderney, shall be taken in the said Islands of Guernsey or Jersey without the consent of the States of the said islands respectively, nor shall any of the powers thereinbefore given to the Trinity House, in respect of any lighthouse, buoy, or beacon erected or placed in the Islands of Guernsey or Jersey, or thereafter to be erected or placed in such islands, be exercised without the consent of Her Majesty in Council; and whereas the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, has, under the provisions of the said Act, erected a new lighthouse on the Hanois Rocks, off the west end of the Island of Guernsey, and a light is already exhibited therein: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that there shall be paid, in respect of the said lighthouse, for every vessel, whether British or foreign passing from any port in the United Kingdom to any port west and south of Cape La Hague to Saint Brieux inclusive, when navigated to the westward of Guernsey, and vice versa, for every such voyage, and for every vessel whether British or foreign passing from any port between Saint Brieux and Brest or from any port not in the United Kingdom west or south of Ushant and also passing to the eastward of an imaginary line drawn from the Bill of Portland to Cape La Hague, for every such voyage the toll of four-sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such vessel. And that the said tolls in respect of the said lighthouse shall be levied by the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, subject to the restriction on taking dues in the islands of Guernsey and Jersey contained in the 411th section of the said recited Act, and also subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent., mentioned in an Order in Council made under the authority of the said recited Act, and dated the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Tables of Light Duties sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine. And Her Majesty, in exercise of the said powers, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased

to declare her consent to the exercise by the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond, in respect of the said lighthouse, of all powers in the 411th section of the said recited Act referred to, as thereinbefore given to the Trinity House.

**W**HEREAS by the "Passengers' Act, 1855," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to prescribe such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty may seem fit, for preserving order, promoting health, and securing cleanliness and ventilation on board of passenger ships proceeding from the United Kingdom, to any port or place in Her Majesty's possessions abroad; and the said rules and regulations from time to time in like manner to alter, amend, and revoke, as occasion may require.

And whereas, it is expedient to make provision for preserving order in private passenger ships conveying to the colony of Victoria, in Australia, as many as ten unprotected female passengers.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth, by, and with the advice of her Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the authority vested in her by the said "Passengers' Act, 1855," order, and it is hereby ordered that in addition to the rules prescribed in the Order in Council, dated the twenty-fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, the rules hereinafter contained shall be observed in respect to unprotected female passengers on board such ships as last aforesaid.

1. In the construction, and for the purposes of this Order in Council, the term "unprotected Female Passengers," shall signify every female passenger between the ages of twelve and thirty-five, proceeding to the colony of Victoria, by virtue of a Passage Warrant issued by the Government of that colony, who, if married, shall not be accompanied by her husband, or if unmarried, shall not be accompanied by her father or stepfather, or by a married brother with his wife, or a married sister with her husband, or by an unmarried brother over the age of twenty-five; the terms "Passengers," "Passenger Ship," and "Master," shall have the same significations as are assigned to them respectively in the said Passengers' Act, 1855, and words used in the plural number shall import the singular number also, and the converse, unless inconsistent with the context.

2. All unprotected female passengers shall, during the voyage, be berthed in open berths, in a compartment in the aftermost part of the upper passenger deck of the ship, effectually divided off by substantial bulkheads from the other portions of such deck; and no single men, or men without their wives, shall be berthed next to the bulkhead dividing off such compartment.

3. The children under twelve years of age of married female passengers, unaccompanied by their husbands, shall be berthed with their mothers.

4. There shall be an entrance to such compartment from the upper deck or poop, exclusively appropriated to the use of such female passengers.

5. There shall be carried on board a Matron, to be appointed by the owner or master of the ship, and to be charged with the maintenance of

discipline among such female passengers as aforesaid.

6. No unprotected female passenger shall on any account be allowed to act, or shall act as servant or attendant on the surgeon, master, or any of the officers of the ship, or on any male cabin passenger.

7. All intercourse between unprotected female passengers and any of the officers or crew of the ship, or between such females and any of the male passengers (except brothers or brothers-in-law, and in case of unprotected married women, their children) is hereby strictly prohibited.

8. The master of the ship, before sailing, shall, with the approval of the Emigration Officer at the port of clearance, mark out the portion of the poop or main deck to be assigned for the purpose of exercise to such unprotected female passengers, who, during the voyage, shall keep within the limits so marked out.

9. Before dark, all such female passengers as aforesaid shall go below to their own compartment, and as soon as they are there collected, the master shall lock the entrance, and on no account shall any man enter the compartment during the night, except the surgeon in case of illness, or the officers and crew in case danger to the ship shall render their entrance necessary.

10. If the surgeon is required to attend professionally any of such unprotected female passengers at night, the matron shall accompany and remain with him while he discharges his duties.

11. The master of the ship shall afford to the matron and to the surgeon all the assistance in his power in carrying these regulations into effect.

12. Any person who shall refuse or neglect to obey any of the rules herein contained, or who shall obstruct the surgeon or master of the ship in the execution of any duty hereby imposed on them respectively, or who shall be guilty of insubordinate conduct, shall, on conviction, be liable for each offence to the penalties of fine and imprisonment, imposed by the said Passengers' Act, 1855.

13. This Order in Council shall not apply to ships chartered by Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture, bearing date the fifth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and made or expressed to be made between Charles Pott, of Bridge-street, Southwark, in the county of Surrey, Esquire; Arthur Pott, of Bentham-hill, near Tonbridge Wells, in the county of Kent, Esquire; and William Pott, of Bridge-street, Southwark aforesaid, Esquire, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part; certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments, situate in the parish of Saint Saviour, Southwark, in the county of Surrey, and particularly described in the schedule hereto annexed, became and are now vested in us in fee simple for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

Whereas at a Court of General Quarter Sessions, held in and for the county of Salop, on the 5th day of January last, a Provisional Order was made in the words following, that is to say:—

Shropshire.

**A**T the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at the Shirehall in Shrewsbury, in and for the county of Salop, on Monday in the first week after the 28th day of December, 1862, to wit, the 5th day of January, 1863.

The Provisional Order made at the general quarter sessions of the peace in and for this county, on the 13th day of October, 1862, for dividing this county into highway districts, pursuant to the Act passed in the last session of Parliament for the Better Management of Highways in England, having been read, and it appearing that the Justices who made such Provisional Order duly appointed this present Court of general quarter sessions of the peace the Court for taking into consideration the confirmation by a Final Order of the said Provisional Order, and it appearing that the notices in that behalf by the said Act required have been duly given, sent, and published, Now the Justices assembled at this present Court, having duly considered the said Order and the confirmation thereof, do, in pursuance of the said Act, hereby order that the said Provisional Order be, and the same is hereby, varied in the following respects, that is to say: That in the description of the Condover District, Betton township be added to Berrington parish. The township of Forest of Hayes in Westbury parish be added to Westbury parish. The township of Forest of Hayes in Worthen parish be added to Worthen parish. That in the description of the Bridgnorth District, Great and Little Oxenbold and Skimscoate Farms be inserted as in the parish of Stanton Long. That in the description of the Cleobury Mortimer and Kidderminster District, Hopton Wafers be Hopton Wafre. That in the description of the Bishop's Castle District, Horderley township be added to Edgton parish. Horderley parish be described as Horderley Hall, and that the like variation be made in the ordering part of the Order. That the township of Down in Lydbury North be described as Lower Down. That Moreswood township be added to More parish, and Stowe and Weston townships be added to Stowe parish. That in the description of the Drayton District, Hodnet have three Waywardens instead of two. That the following townships be omitted from Hodnet parish, to wit, Bletchley, Longford, Moreton Say, Styche, Weston, Whixill, and Woodlands. That Hodnet parish be described as consisting of the townships of Espley, Hodnet, Hawkstone, Hopton, Kenstone instead of Kenston, Little Bolas, Marchamley, Peplow, Woolerton instead of Wollerton, and that the township of Lostford be added. That Moreton Say parish be added, and that it have two Waywardens, and that it be described as consisting of the townships of Bletchley, Longford, Moreton Say, Styche, and Woodlands. That in the description of the Pimhill District, the township of Newton in Baschurch parish be stated as Newtown. That in the description of the Ludlow District, Lower Ledwiche in Bitterley parish be called Upper Ledwiche, and that to that parish the following townships be added Bitterley, Henley, Snitton, Luppencott, or Hillappencott. That the townships of Dinehop and Halford in Bromfield be omitted from Bromfield and made a separate parish, and that such separate parish have one Waywarden. That Moor Heath in

Stoke St. Milborough be omitted from Stoke St. Milborough and made a separate parish, and that such separate parish have one Waywarden. That in the description of the Newport District, the township of Chetwynd Aston be omitted from Chetwynd. That the townships of Chetwynd Aston, Cherrington, Church Aston, and Tibberton in Edgmond, be omitted from Edgmond, and made each a separate parish, with one Waywarden each. That in the description of the Wem District, Shawbury have two Waywardens instead of one. That in the description of the Wrekin District, Cherrington township be omitted from Bolas Magna, and that Horton in Eyton-upon-the Wildmoors be described as Horton in Eyton. And it is hereby further ordered as aforesaid, that the said Provisional Order do accordingly stand as follows:—

For the more convenient management of highways such parts of the said county as are in that behalf specified in the Schedule hereunder written shall be divided into highway districts:

Such highway districts shall be twelve in number, and shall be known by the several names in that behalf mentioned in the Schedule:

The several parishes to be united in each of the said districts shall be respectively the parishes named in the said Schedule under the head of such districts:

In the said several parishes (the same being respectively parishes which separately maintain their own poor) the townships, hamlets, or places into which such parishes respectively are divided (and which are in the said Schedule named in connection therewith under the head of townships), and each of which separately maintains its own highways, shall be combined, and no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such townships, hamlets, or places, or any of them, but each of the said parishes respectively shall be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it which were before maintained by such townships, hamlets, and places separately, as if all their several liabilities had attached to the whole parish, and a Waywarden or Waywardens as hereinafter mentioned shall be elected for each such parish as a whole:

Each parish shall elect the number of Waywardens specified by the number set opposite to the name of such parish in the said Schedule:

The place at which the first Meeting of the Highway Board is to be held in each such District shall be the place in that behalf mentioned at the head of such district in the said Schedule:

In each of the several places next hereinafter named in which respectively no Surveyor of Highways has, prior to this order, being elected, a Waywarden shall be elected by such persons, and at such Meeting and time, and in the manner and subject to the same qualification, and the same power of appointment in the Justices in the event of no election taking place, or in the event of a vacancy at, in, and subject to which a person to serve the office of Surveyor would have been required to be chosen or appointed, if such place had been a parish maintaining its own highways within the meaning of the Act of Parliament (5 and 6 W. 4, c. 50), for consolidating and amending the laws relating to highways in that part of Great Britain called England, that is to say—Haughmond Demesne, Woodhouse, Dinmore, Horderley Hall, Ludlow Castle, Heath Farm, Halston, Hill End, Old Church Moor, Skirmage, and Boscobel:

And it is by this present Court also ordered as aforesaid, that the further consideration of the said Provisional Order as so varied be, and the



same is hereby adjourned and respite to the next Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held at the Shirehall in Shrewsbury, in and for the said county of Salop, at such time, not earlier than the 7th day of March next nor later than the 22nd day of April next, as shall be fixed and notified, pursuant to the Act of Parliament (4 and 5 W. 4, c. 47) for preventing the interference of the spring assizes with the April quarter sessions, which next Court is hereby appointed the Court for taking into consideration the confirmation by a Final Order of the said Provisional Order as so varied:
