To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Chancellor, Doctors, and Masters of the University of Dublin, beg to approach your Majesty with sentiments of profound attachment to your Throne and person, and to offer our respectful congratulations on the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

We trust that in the happiness which a union in every way so worthy of him is likely to produce, your maternal heart will find some degree of consolation for the great and bitter bereavement with which it has pleased Almighty God to visit
