The Humble Address of the Principal and Professors of the University of Aberdeen.

*May it please your Majesty,*

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Principal and Professors of the University of Aberdeen, beg leave to approach the Throne, that we may offer to your Majesty our sincere and respectful congratulations, on the occasion of the marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

Deeply sensible of the blessings which we, in common with all our fellow subjects, enjoy under your Majesty's beneficent and illustrious reign, and devotedly attached to your Majesty's person and Government, we regard every event which contributes to your Majesty's happiness, and to the welfare of your Royal House, as a cause of gratitude to Divine Providence, and of heartfelt joy.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice

of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the third day of February, last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the sixteenth day of March instant, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

Forthwith in the churchyard of Saint Giles, SHREWSBURY, except in now existing vaults and brick graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and entombed by concrete, or by masonry properly cemented.

London and South-Western and Andover and Redbridge Railways Bill.

Proposed Additional Provisions.

(Alteration of Proposed Michaelmarsh Junction Line.)

## Shropshire.

AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at the Shirehall, in Shrewsbury, in and for the county of Salop, on Monday, the 16th day of March, 1863:

The Provisional Order made at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for this county, on the 5th day of January, 1863, for dividing this county into Highway Districts, pursuant to the Act passed in the then last Session of Parliament for the better management of Highways in England, having been read, and it appearing that the Justices who made such Provisional Order duly appointed this present Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace the Court for taking into consideration the confirmation by a Final Order of the said Provisional Order, and it appearing that the notices in that behalf by the said Act required have been duly given, sent, and published, Now the Justices assembled at this present Court, having duly considered the said Order and the confirmation thereof, do, in pursuance of the said Act, hereby order that the said Provisional Order be, and the same is hereby, varied in the following respects, that is to say: That the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Condover District be held in the Board-room of the Atcham Union Workhouse, at the Cross Houses, Berrington, and not in the Shirehall, Shrewsbury; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Bridgnorth District be held at the Punch Bowl Inn, commonly called the Hundred House, in the parish of Oldbury, near Bridgnorth, and not at the Bridgnorth Union Workhouse; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Ludlow District be held at the Board-room of the Ludlow Union Workhouse, and not at the Guildhall, in Ludlow; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Wrekin District be held at the Hotel, at Admaston Spa, and not at the Magistrates' Room, in Wellington; and that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Oswestry District be held at the Board-room of the Oswestry House of Industry, and not in the Magistrates' Room, in Oswestry.

And it is hereby further ordered, that the number of Waywardens to be elected for the parish of Diddlebury be two instead of one, as mentioned in the said Provisional Order; and it is hereby further ordered, as aforesaid, that the said Provisional Order do accordingly stand as follows:—

For the more convenient management of highways such parts of the said county as are in that behalf specified in the Schedule hereunder written shall be divided into Highway Districts:

Such Highway Districts shall be twelve in number, and shall be known by the several names in that behalf mentioned in the Schedule:

The several parishes to be united in each of the said districts shall be respectively the parishes named in the said Schedule under the head of such districts:

In the said several parishes (the same being respectively parishes which separately maintain their own poor) the townships, hamlets, or places into which such parishes respectively are divided (and which are in the said Schedule named in connection therewith under the head of townships), and each of which separately maintains its own highways, shall be combined, and no separate Waywardens shall be elected for such townships,

hamlets, or places, or any of them, but each of the said parishes respectively shall be subject to the same liabilities in respect of all the highways within it which were before maintained by such townships, hamlets, and places separately, as if all their several liabilities had attached to the whole parish, and a Waywarden or Waywardens as hereinafter mentioned shall be elected for each such parish as a whole:

Each parish shall elect the number of Waywardens specified by the number set opposite to the name of such parish in the said Schedule:

The place at which the first Meeting of the Highway Board is to be held in each such District shall be the place in that behalf mentioned at the head of such district in the said Schedule:

In each of the several places next hereinafter named in which respectively no Surveyor of Highways has, prior to this order, been elected, a Waywarden shall be elected by such persons, and at such Meeting and time, and in the manner and subject to the same qualification, and the same power of appointment in the Justices in the event of no election taking place, or in the event of a vacancy at, in, and subject to which a person to serve the office of Surveyor would have been required to be chosen or appointed, if such place had been a parish maintaining its own highways within the meaning of the Act of Parliament (5 and 6 W. 4, c. 5), for consolidating and amending the laws relating to highways in that part of Great Britain called England, that is to say—Haughmond Demesne, Woodhouse, Dinmore, Horderley Hall, Ludlow Castle, Heath Farm, Halston, Hill End, Old Church Moor, Skirmage, and Boscobel:

And it is by this present Court also ordered as aforesaid, that the said Provisional Order, as so varied, be, and the same is, by this Final Order confirmed; and it is hereby further ordered, that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Condover District, and the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Oswestry District, shall respectively be held on the 6th day of April next, at twelve o'clock at noon; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Church Stretton District be held on the 9th day of April next, at twelve o'clock at noon; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Pimhill District be held on the 13th day of April next, at twelve o'clock at noon; that the first meeting of the Highway Board for the Ludlow District be held on the 2nd day of April next, at twelve o'clock at noon; and that the first meeting of the several Highway Boards for the respective districts of Bridgnorth, Cleobury Mortimer and Kidderminster, Bishop's Castle, Drayton, Newport, The Wrekin, and Wem, be respectively held at twelve o'clock at noon, on the sixth day next after the first election of Waywardens, in pursuance of the first above-mentioned Act of Parliament, for the said several districts respectively, unless such sixth day shall happen to be Good Friday, or a Sunday, and in such case such first meeting shall be held at twelve o'clock at noon on the seventh day next after such election.

## County of Anglesey to Wit.

**W**HEREAS at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Anglesey, held on the 6th day of January, 1863, a Provisional Order was made in the words following; that is to say:—

Provisional Order made by the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace in and for the county of Anglesey, for the formation of a Highway District in the said county.

Whereas John Williams, Esq., the Right Honourable Clarence Edward Paget, commonly called Lord Clarence Edward Paget, Owen John Augustus Fuller Meyrick, Robert Lloyd Jones Parry, and Edward Octavius Pearse, Esquires, and others, being five and more of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting in and for the county of Anglesey, did, by a writing under their hands, dated the 4th day of September, 1862, require Richard Owen, Esq., the Clerk of the Peace for the said county, to add to or send with the notice required by law to be given of the holding of the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, a notice in the form marked [A] in the schedule to the Act of the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 61, intituled "An Act for the better Management of the Highways in England," or as near thereto as circumstances admit, that at such Court of General Quarter Sessions a proposal would be made to the Justices then and there assembled to constitute the county of Anglesey a Highway District, for the purposes of the "Highway Acts;" and did also require the said Clerk of the Peace to send by post, in a prepaid letter, notices in the form aforesaid to the Churchwardens and Overseers of each and every of the parishes hereinafter mentioned;

And whereas, at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, held at the County Hall, in the town of Beaumaris, in the said county, on the 14th day of October, 1862, a proposal was submitted to the said Court by the said Justices, that the county of Anglesey be constituted a Highway District;

And whereas the said Court, in pursuance of the powers vested in the Court in and by the said Act, did, by a Provisional Order, direct that the parishes under-mentioned, in the said county, should be formed into a Highway District, for the purposes of the "Highway Acts," namely, the parishes of Llanfaes, Llanbedrgach, Llandysilio, Llanfihangel-Tinfilwy, Llanddona, Llaniestyn, Llansadwrn, Pentraeth, Llangoed, Llandegfan, Llanddyan, Penmynydd, Penmon, Llanfair-pwllgwyngyll, Llanfairmathafarneithaf, Llandaniel, Llanedwen, Llanfihangel Esceifiog, Llangaffo, Llangainwen, Llanffinan, Llangefni, Llanfair-y-cwmwd, Llangwyllog, Llanidan, Newborough, Rhodogaidio, Rhoscolyn, Tregaeon, Bodedern, Bodwrog, Ceirchiog, Holyhead, Llanfairynubwll, Llanlibio, Landrygarn, Llanfaelog, Llanfihangel-y-nhowyn, Llantrisant, Llechynfarwydd, Llanynghenedl, Llechylched, Amlwch, Coedana, Llanallog, Llanwenllwyfo, Llandyfydog, Llaneilian, Llaneugrad, Llanfihangel-tre'r-beirdd, Penrhosligwy, Gwredog, Rhosberio, Bodewryd, Llanbabo, Llanbadrig, Llanddeusant, Llanfachreth, Llanfaethlu, Llanfigel, Llanfairynghornwy, Llanfechell, Llanflewyn, Llanfwrog, Llanrhydryn, Llanrhuddlad, Aberffraw, Cerrigceinwen, Heneglwys, Llangadwaladr, Trewalchmai, Llangristiolus, Llangwysfan, Trefdraeth, to be called the Anglesey Highway District;

And whereas, by the said Provisional Order, it was further ordered by the said Court, that the

number of Waywardens which each parish in the said district should elect should be as follows:— The parish of Amlwch should elect four Waywardens, the parish of Holyhead should elect three Waywardens, the several parishes of Llangefni, Llanidan, Bodedern, Llaneilian, Llanbadrig and Aberffraw should each elect two Waywardens, and the other parishes in the said district should each respectively elect one Waywarden;

And whereas, by the said Provisional Order, the said Court ordered that the confirmation of the said Provisional Order, by a Final Order, should be taken into consideration by the Justices at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held at the County Hall aforesaid, in and for the said county, on the 6th day of January, 1863.

Now, therefore, at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held at the County Hall aforesaid, on the 6th day of January instant, the Justices then and there assembled, having considered the premises, do amend the said Provisional Order, by striking out of the same, the several parishes of Amlwch, Holyhead, Llanfaes, Llandegfan, Llaniestyn, Llanfihangel-Tinsilwy, and Penmon.

And it is further ordered, that the confirmation of the said Provisional Order, by a Final Order shall be taken into consideration by the Justices at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held at the County Hall aforesaid, in and for the said county, on the 7th day of April now next.
