WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Principal and Professors of the University of Aberdeen, beg leave to approach the Throne, that we may offer to your Majesty our sincere and respectful congratulations, on the occasion of the marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

Deeply sensible of the blessings which we, in common with all our fellow subjects, enjoy under your Majesty's beneficent and illustrious reign, and devotedly attached to your Majesty's person and Government, we regard every event which contributes to your Majesty's happinesss, and to the welfare of your Royal House, as a cause of gratitude to Divine Providence, and of heartselt joy.
