NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales will receive Addresses of Congeatulation upon His Royal Highness's Marriage, on behalf of himself and of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, from corporate and other public bodies, at Marlborough House, on Wednesday; the 29th instant, at two o'clock, p.m.
A Deputation to present an Address must not exceed four persons.

A card, containing the names of the Gentlemen who will form the Deputations, and a statement of the object of the Address and the body from which it originates, must be submitted, on or before Monday, the 27 th instant, to LieutenantGeneral Knollys, Treasurer and Comptroller to His Royal Highness, at Marlborough House.
At the time of presenting the Address, a similar. card must be placed in the hands of the Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness, who will announce its contents to His Royal Highness.

The Address will be presented to His Royal Highness by the Deputation, who will then pass on.

No other statement is on this occasion to be addressed to His Royal Highness.

A duplicate card should be left with the Page in the Corridor.
