

as such Vicar and Prebendary as aforesaid, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette, of any order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than such duly gazetted Order, the said prebend and vicarage shall become and be permanently united and consolidated, and that the same shall become, and be one benefice with cure of souls, by the name of the vicarage of Broadclyst, and that the said Peter Leopold Dyke Acland, and his successors, Vicars of the said vicarage, shall be entitled to all the emoluments as well of the said prebend as of the said vicarage.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in Law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Exeter.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the twenty-sixth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas, situate at Glyndyfrdwy, in the parish of Corwen, in the county of Merioneth, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Glyndyfrdwy aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph,

testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Corwen, described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Glyndyfrdwy.'

"And with the like consent of the said Thomas Vowler, Bishop of Saint Asaph, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Glyndyfrdwy, being:—

"All those portions of the parish of Corwen, in the county of Merioneth, and in the diocese of Saint Asaph, which are comprised within, and are co-extensive with the township of Mvstwr, the township of Carrog, the township of Bonwm, and the township of Tirllanerch, within the said parish."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas, situate at Glyndyfrdwy, in the parish of Corwen, in the county of Merioneth, to be called "The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Glyndyfrdwy," be accordingly made; and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners with reference to the publication of banns of matrimony, and the solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and with reference to the fees to be paid in respect of those offices, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts. And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint Asaph.
