## TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Conmissioners of Her Majesty's'Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant. under their'hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of Birtish or Inlanid postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters, and to sulject the same to rates of Postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in süch Warriant.
And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's -Treaisury by another Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her prēsent Majesty, intituled : An Act for giving farther facilities'for the transmicsion of letters by post and for the regulating the duties of postago thieroon, and for other purposes relating to the post office."
And wheieas it is expedieut that regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of the letters hereinafter mentioned.
Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose, vested in and by the said Acts or either of them, and of all other. powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hauds of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the anthority of the statute in that case nuade and provided) :otder and direct as follows:-

1. On every letter not exceeding oue quarter of an oince in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Egypt, or posted in 'Egypt addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the. posit between any place in the United Kingdom and Figypt (the conveyance between the United Kingdom and Egypt being viâ Marseilles, by British packet boat, between that port and Alexandria), there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform rate of postage (British and foreign combined) of sixpence; if such respective letters be prepaid, and if such respective letters be not prepaid, an uniform rate of postage, (British and foreign combined) of ninepence.
2. On every letter not exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, posted in or addressed to Egypt, and transmitted by the post between Egypt and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign counntry through the United Kingdon (the conveyance : between the United Kingdom and Egypt being vià Marseilles, by British packet boat, between that port and Alexandria), there shall be charged, taken, and pail the rates of postage. following, that is to say :-
For the conveyance of every such letter between. Egrpt and any part of the United Kingdom, an uniform rate of postage (British and foreign combined) of sixpence, if such respective letters be prepiod, and if such respective letters be not prepaid; -an -uniform rate of postage (British and foreign combided) of ninepence; - and for the con-
veyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conreying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shal be forwarded such a further or additional rate of postage as . shall from time to time be charged and payable for postage on letters posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colouy or foreign country ; provided that in all cases where such additional. rate includes -both inland and sea services, there shall be deducted therefrom the sum of one penny in respect of the inland conveyance under this clause of every such letter sent through the United Kingdom.
3. On every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant, exceeding one quarter of an ounce in weight, there shall be charged taken and paid progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say :-
On every such letter exceeding one-quarter of ain ounce in weight, and not exceering onehalf of an ounce in weight two rates of postage.
On every such letter exceeding one-half of an ounce and not exceeding three-quarters of an ounce in weight three rates of postage.
On every snc̄h letter exceeding three-quarters of an ounce and not exceeding one ounce in weight, four rates of postage.
And for every additonal quarter of an ounce in weight above the weight of one ounce there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of an additional quarter of an ounce above the weight of one ounce shall be charged as one additional quarter of an ounce; and each progressive and additional rate clargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum. which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding one-quarter of au ounce in weight.
4. The postage of every such letter addressed to any part of Egypt (Alexandris, Cairo, and Suez excepted) shall be paid at tho time of the same being posted.
5. The rates of postage chargeable on letters trunsmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be in lieu of any rates of postage now chargeable by law thereon.
6. The several letters tiansuitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be subject to the several orders, directions, and regulations contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's 'Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of Hebruary, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post, so far as the same shall be applicable to such letters.
7. Nothing in this Warrant contained shäll in anywise annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptious or privileges granted by or under the said hereinbeforérecited Acts; or either of them, or by or under any other Acts of Parliament relating to the Post Office, or any of the privileges which officers, seamen, and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's sarvice are by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post letters subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.
8. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be constried to have the like meaning, in all respects, as they:would have had if
