West Ham Union.—Parish of West Ham.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the parish of West Ham, in the county of Essex;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the parish of West Ham, in the county of Essex, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons.

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry, held in the Vestry Hall, Rokeby House, Stratford, after public notice in that behalf, on Monday, the 16th day of March last, it was resolved,—

“That in the opinion of this Vestry, the assistance of a Vestry Clerk is required in the transaction of the various duties imposed by law upon, and required to be performed by, the Officers of this parish, and for the business transacted at Vestry and other Meetings, and that it is expedient that a Vestry Clerk should be appointed for this parish, and that the Churchwardens be and are hereby authorized to make application in writing to the Poor Law Commissioners for an Order under their Seal of Office, that a certain part of the Act 13 and 14 Victoria, cap. 57., entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry and other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ viz. the 6th section thereof, shall be applied to and put in force within this parish.”

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the before-recited resolution,

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to and put in force within the said parish of West Ham.

And whereas there is a Collector of Poor Rates in the said parish, duly appointed under an Order of the Poor Law Commissioners in that behalf, but it is nevertheless expedient that the Poor Rate for the parish should be made out by the Vestry Clerk,

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct;—

ARTICLE II.—That the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and of this Order, shall perform the following duties, in addition to those set forth in the said Act;

Firstly. To obtain from the Relieving Officers of the Union a report of all persons who become chargeable to the said parish, to make all due inquiries as to their settlements, and to take the necessary and proper steps for the removal of such as shall be removable to the parishes in which they may be settled.

Secondly. To attend the Board of Guardians at their meetings when requisite; to give them any information in his power as to the paupers relieved by them, and to receive any instructions relative thereto which the said board may deem proper to give.

Thirdly. To attend before the Justices with all paupers to be examined and removed; to produce the evidence of their settlement, to superintend their examination, to copy the orders of removal and transmit them to the respective parishes, and to cause the paupers to be removed according to the terms of the orders.

Fourthly. To assist the Churchwardens and Overseers in all matters of assessment, to calculate the amount of rate necessary for the relief of the poor and for the other purposes to which the Poor Rate is legally liable, and to prepare statements for the Churchwardens and Overseers at the making of the rate.

Fifthly. To make up all the Poor Rate books, to get the rates allowed by the Justices, and

make publication of the same, to fill up the Receipt Check books, and to receive the reports of the Collector of the Poor Rate as to his receipts, and to check the same.

ARTICLE III.—That an annual salary of four hundred pounds shall be paid to such Vestry Clerk by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish.

ARTICLE IV.—That the salary of such Vestry Clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, and Lady Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

ARTICLE V.—That every person appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk in the said parish shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the West Ham Union, in the county of Essex, a bond, in the penal sum of one thousand pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by the said Guardians produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be insolvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or insolvent; provided that the Guardians, may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law officer.

ARTICLE VI.—That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Union shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Commissioners, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the said parish for the time being, appointed under the authority aforesaid, together with the particulars in the said General Order required; and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

ARTICLE VII.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
